### Rebuttal Based on Confusion

### Special Session **Held for Decision**

The University of Michigan Board of Regents voted unanimously Wednesday to oppose Michigan State's plans to change its name to Michigan State University. The decision was reached at a special session which was secret as usual.

In a four-page letter to Gover nor Williams and the State Legislature, the Regents stated they viewed with deep concern any action that would give MSC the title of university or any other name similar to the University of Michigan.

Importance of the issue was underscored by the fact that this was the first Regents' press conference held since the Board announced Dr. Hariand Hatcher's appointment as U. of M. president in 1951.

General action announced at the conference Wednesday night by President Hatcher was:
