

Student Petitions Circulate Today for MSU Bill Revival

Congress Provides Last Try

Friday Deadline Set for Signing

With the MSU bill taking its last breath in House Committee on Education, student government sidetracked regular business and Wednesday night pushed through a resolution for a petition to serve as a last attempt for further consideration of the name change.

Students wishing to back the bill will have a chance to sign this petition today and Friday either in the living units or at a desk set up in the Union Concourse.

This hurriedly drawn up petition is in answer to the statement made by legislators that there was not enough interest to warrant a public hearing, according to Congress representative Nancy J. Blaser who introduced the resolution.

Quick action must be taken with this petition in order to give it to the State of Michigan Legislature before the seven-day legislative consideration period which ends Monday.

According to rules, if the bill is not reported out by then (and it has been generally implied that the bill would not, unless more interest was shown) it would automatically die in committee.



Rep. Gerald Graves (R-Alabama) said he would move Monday to extend time of consideration.

The petition asks for the bill to be held for consideration by the Legislature for an additional two weeks. Rep. Graves (R-Alabama) said that House majority had asked that legislation be reviewed. The petition would introduce a provision to extend consideration and provide a hearing by the bill.

Through the confusion of last minute distribution of petitions copies to district representatives, many living units may have been missing, according to Blaser.

In this case, a number of living units in the Union Concourse must get their petitions to Blaser by Friday. Blaser would then be able to present the petitions to the House on Friday.

According to the schedule of the Californians who are on a three-week debating tour across the nation, they were to debate the U. of M. on Tuesday and MSC on Wednesday. But, according to the MSC debate schedule, the California debate with MSC was Tuesday.

The whole mix-up came about because the card from the U. of C. office said the debate with MSC would be Wednesday, Feb. 2. Since Tuesday, not Wednesday was Feb. 2, the MSC debaters assumed the Californians meant Tuesday.

The two Californians, Stanford Lyman and Carey McWilliams, argued the affirmative of "The U. S. Should Adopt a Policy of Free Trade." The MSC team, Nic Dellis of Manistowick and Gordon Zerk of Grand Rapids, both freshmen, took the negative, "Trade, Not Aid." The debate was not judged.

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Councilmen OK Traffic Proposals

Removal of Three City Lots Approved

Traffic proposals sponsored by the traffic commission were sanctioned Monday night by the East Lansing City Council.

Councilmen agreed on an appropriation of \$1,000 from the contingency fund to purchase four RC-RCH traffic counters for traffic studies.

The Council further decided to install one-hour meters in the 300 block of Abbott St. on the south side and 100 block of Bailey St. on the west side to facilitate surplus traffic surveys.

A recommendation by the traffic commission to remove three municipal parking lots on Abbott Road to open up visibility for drivers was unanimously carried by the Council.

A group of merchants representing the 300 block of Abbott Road asked that parking be permitted on Abbott, which, if allowed, would harm their respective business establishments. No action was taken on the request.

Resignation of Max A. Struther from his post as city constable was accepted by the council.

Struther, the son of East Lansing's mayor, named a heavy load of college activities as his reason for resigning.

A police department request for a new patrol car was granted.

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Group Fails To Force FEPC Vote

GOP to Let Bill Die in Committee

A Democratic attempt to force a House vote on the Employment Practices Commission was beaten down by the Republican majority in a vote that closely followed party lines.

Rep. Ed Carney (D-Detroit), leader of the minority party, attempted to bring the bill to the floor by a motion to discharge the State Affairs Committee from further consideration of it.

The State Affairs group had voted on Tuesday to bill the measure for this session by re-appointing it.

The attempt to get the bill out of the committee was defeated by a 20-19 vote. The Democrats did not have the necessary 21 votes to carry the bill.

The House tabled a bill Wednesday, thereby refusing to consider a legislative resolution commending retiring Athletic Director Ralph H. Young. One reason given was the need for more time to study the bill.

What may have been a last battle of words over the FEPC was averted when Rep. Harry Phillips (R-Port Huron), majority leader, moved that the question be considered without debate right after Phillips' motion carried over the legislation's sponsors' objections, and the House moved quickly through the business of killing the civil rights measure by leaving it in the committee that had already voted not to report it.

Carney, Rep. Louis C. Cullen (R-Lapeer), one of the bill's authors and a couple of Democrats did not get in some oratorical flurries by explaining that they voted so on the motion, to cut off debate.

Republicans replied a little while later as they explained their reasons for voting against discharging the committee from further consideration of the bill.

Their explanation was that the purpose of the committee system was to consider legislation and that if the committee did not feel that the bill should be reported out then they had to go along with it.

Drustler Returns

Track runners to reach the 1000-meter mark where Drustler ran second and Drustler twelfth in the event in which American usually place.

Drustler completed his undergraduate career in 1951, winning the National Collegiate mile in his last race under Spartan colors. The 4:58.8 time has been bettered only twice in NCAA competition and still stands as the MSC variety record.

Shortly afterward, Drustler went to Japan with a group of AAD athletes under Spartan Coach Karl Schlademan.

Previously, Drustler had toured Europe in 1948 and 1950 to compete in various distance events, including the 3,000-meter steeplechase.

After the Olympics, Drustler and a few of his teammates took part in several other European meets. Again last summer, he was on a team that competed against the best runners in Sweden.

"Drustler" led the Spartan runners to National Collegiate Championships in 1950 and 1951.

He was a member of the Spartan five-mile relay team which broke the variety record at the Columbus Relay in Columbus in 1950. The team's last half-mile leg at the Syracuse was clocked in 7:22.4, setting a new three-mile record of the previous mark set by Columbus in 1941.

Drustler holds both the 1000-meter variety two-mile mark. He set the distance in 9:11.7 indoors and 9:50.8 outdoors.

Drustler, prep work at Lewis Township High School in La Grange where he established a state mile mark of 4:25.1.

He is married to the former Pat Fersland, also an MSC graduate, who was a member of the Spartan girls' synchronized swim team that gained national prominence.

Drustler's track career was widely recognized. He took on country club in 1948. Drustler, who is now in the U.S. Army, was a member of the 1948 Olympic team in Helsinki, Finland, in 1952, as a representative of the Army. There, he and Bob McMillen, of Central College, were the only

Big 10 Leading Indiana

Hoosiers Set Twenty-second Home Victory

Michigan State's basketball five has a stacked job on tap this evening, as it travels to Bloomington, Ind., for a game with the front-running University squad.

Indiana's basketball team on its home floor in 1952-53, with a 77-70 record, has the best record in the Big Ten since it has a home streak of 21 games, and is in the top three nationally.

The Hoosier five, which has a record of 19-10, has been hot along at a fast clip. In its last game, it defeated the non-league game that the Green State. Indiana holds a victory over the Oregon State squad.

Don Schlundt, Indiana center, holds almost every record in the Big Ten and currently tops all scorers with an average of 20.5 points per game. His team built on shooting accuracy, lanky Hoosier having 48 per cent of his field attempts on 80 per cent of his free throw efforts.

He is not a one man show, however. Three teammates are rated among the top ten in the conference, and one, Leonard, also is one of the outstanding defensive players, dancing and pairs events.

Stopping Schlundt is a duty if the Spartans hope to off an upset of the highly Indiana team. But counting on him alone could be a mistake. Leonard and his teammates, Burke Scott, Charley Dick Farley, are more than capable of taking up the slack.

Ice Arena to Host Skating Competitors

Future ice skating greats—potential Olympic champions and ice show stars—will make important bids for recognition at the Michigan State Ice Arena next weekend.

The occasion is the 1953-54 Mid-Western Figure Skating and Dance Championships at the arena Thursday through Saturday, Feb. 11-13, an event which in the past has produced some of the best names in skating.

For example, recent champions in Mid-Western competition include Virginia Smith and Miss Deak, of Detroit; Rosalie Robertson and Mary Ann DeWoy, of Colorado Springs; and Shyla Jenkins, of Cleveland. Jenkins now holds the United States, North American and World titles as successor for these crowns. Miss Baxter, a former Michigan State student, is a professional ice show star.

The Mid-Western meet is one of three sectional championships held each year in the United States. Champions and other top skaters from these events then compete in the United States Championships.

Approximately 150 skaters are expected, ranging from small youngsters to grown-ups, from near-beginners to top experts. They will compete in compulsory figures, dancing and pairs events.
