Official Answer for Monday

Attorney General's opinion on the constitutionality of changing Michigan name will be presented Monday.

William Broomfield, (R-Port), speaker pro-tem of the House, said he had been informed by Attorney General Millard.

Millard said he "had no opinion because myself and a number of other legislators in doubt as to whether the Legislature has power to change Michigan name."

Broomfield and Rep. Gibbs (R-Port), chairman of the House Committee on the original MSU bill, said that the Attorney General will go a long way in determining the bill's fate.

Decision rates the program change unconstitutional both felt that the bill is dead.

Legislature action, passed on Thursday's resolution calling for constitutional amendment to provide a four-year office for state officials, officials and legislators.

John Foster Dulles, Anthony Eden and George Bidault dropped their diplomatic disputes with Vyacheslav Molotov and entertained him at dinner, with a reception afterward.

Eight persons from each of the four delegations attended the banquet in the Allied Control Authority building, where the Berlin conference is meeting this week.

They were served clear turtle soup, lobster, Newburgh, roast chicken, shoestring potatoes, peas, salad, ice cream soufflé, cookies and coffee.

With this meal were served a red Burgundy wine 1947 Corton-Charlemagne, a red Bordeaux, 1937 Chateau Margaux champagne and cognac.

\$350,000 Fire Hits Ann Arbor

Blaze Destroys Campus Stores

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—A \$350,000 fire destroyed four campus stores, an office, reducing salon, and apartments of five families Thursday. The fire threatened a block of stores near the University of Michigan campus. Fifty-five firemen fought the pre-dawn blaze more than three hours before controlling it.

Some 15 occupants of apartments above the stores fled to safety. No one was injured. An unidentified apartment dweller notified firemen at 5:30 a. m.

Assistant Fire Chief Harold Gauss said the fire apparently started in electrical wiring in the basement of the Campus Drug Store on the northwest corner of S State and E Liberty.

Flames destroyed the drug store and demolished half of a women's apparel shop, north of the drug store.

Sweeping down E. Liberty St., the fire destroyed a youngsters' clothing shop and ruined a caramel corn store before firemen brought the blaze under control.

Above the stores, the reducing salon and the Ann Arbor office of the Michigan League for Planned Parenthood were destroyed. At least three shops suffered smoke and water damage.

Hundreds of curious students and others watched as 15 volunteer firemen of the city's civil defense organization joined 40 city firemen to fight the fire.

J-Hoppers will find the weatherman has given them the cold shoulder.

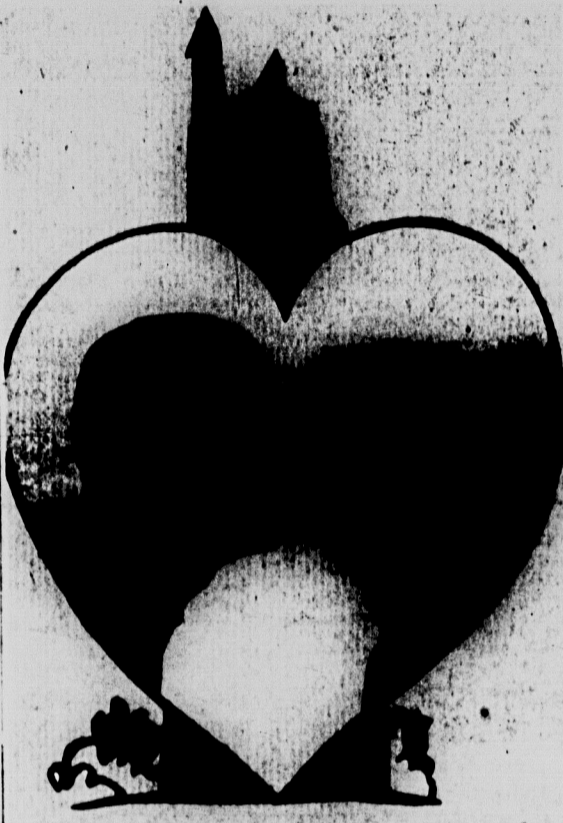
Today will be sunny, but cold enough to chill some of the high spirits. The low will be an icy zero and the high 18 degrees.

Civil War Survivor Peps Up Birthday

DULUTH, Minn. (AP)—"A jolly, old fashioned time" Thursday made his 107th birthday "the best one yet" for Albert Woolson, last survivor of the Union Army of the Civil War.

The "ageless" former drummer boy took personal command of a big celebration, keeping the party rolling at a merry pace by:

Singing a booming, bass voice "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp, the Boys Are Marching";

Reciting parts of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic";

Kissing women callers on the hand, cheek or forehead;

Rapping out a snappy roll on a snare-drum.

The old soldier was up a little earlier than usual, about 6:30 a.m., and started the day off with a hearty breakfast.

Through the day there was an almost steady stream of callers.

Mailmen hauled in three bags stuffed with bundles of greetings. One of the letters was from President Eisenhower, who wrote: "You have special cause for pride and for national recognition on this significant anniversary."

A three-tier cake topped off with a miniature cannon was also delivered.

Woolson, who is in good physical condition except for deafness, served about 11 months with an artillery regiment during the Civil War. He says he recalls seeing Abraham Lincoln.

Thornton Announces April Jaunt

State Leaders To Study Situation

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower, in a move believed unprecedented, has asked a group of state governors to go to Korea and appraise the situation there for the benefit of the American people.

Gov. Dan Thornton of Colorado, chairman of the Governors' Conference, announced in Denver that he will lead a delegation to Korea about April 1.

Eisenhower's invitation was interpreted here as another move in his program to bring state executives into closer relationship to major national problems. The White House already is cooperating in plans for a three-day meeting of the 48 governors here late in April to discuss national security and other problems.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said that so far as he knew this is the first time the federal government has initiated an inspection trip abroad by a representative group of governors.

The President wrote Thornton that he thought a short visit to Korea by a select group of governors who are close to the American people would be "highly beneficial."

Thornton told reporters that so far four governors have agreed to make the trip with him. He listed them as Govs. Allan Shivers of Texas, John Pine of Pennsylvania, Johnston Murray of Oklahoma and Robert Kennon of Louisiana, all members of the Governors' Conference.

Other committee members are Govs. William Bessley of Iowa, James F. Byrnes of South Carolina, Frank J. Lausche of Ohio, John Lodge of Connecticut and Lawrence Weatherly of Kentucky.

They are welcome to go along, too, Thornton said.

Applications Due For Scholarships

Today is the last day the scholarship office will accept applications for spring term grants. J. Robert Stewart, director of scholarships, announced.

Stewart also announced a number of other scholarships available to MSC students.

A two-year scholarship, valued at \$1,300, in industrial engineering is available to any southwestern Michigan sophomore.

This recently-established Eugene B. Clark Scholarship is for the Illinois Institute of Technology in Chicago, Ill.

Application can be made by contacting the Director of Admissions, Illinois Institute of Technology, Chicago 16.

Tuition for four years at any American college or university will be awarded for the best biographical essay or profile on a living American to be published in the "National Biographic."

The scholarship has been established by the American Institute of Management in New York. If the winning student is already enrolled in school he will be reimbursed for tuition already paid.

The subject of the biography must be listed in "Who's Who in America."

The manuscripts should be submitted in triplicate by May 15 and should be from 8,000 to 8,000 words in length.

Students interested in the contest are requested to write to the Scholarship Committee, American Institute of Management, 125 E. 38th Street, New York 16, N. Y. before Feb. 15, and to designate their subject.

Team depth will be the deciding factor when the Spartan tankmen meet the talented Wolverine splashers Saturday night in Ann Arbor.

Coch Charles McCaffree said that Michigan has the finest team that Matt Mann, Wolverine coach, has ever had.

"I don't want to sound pessimistic," McCaffree said, "but we will definitely be the underdog."

"They're loaded," he exclaimed. "They have unusual team strength and depth."

He said that Michigan has two brothers, Bert and Jack Wardrop, who were members of the British Olympic team and have just become eligible.

"I wish I knew what events they are going to swim," he said, "But I guess it wouldn't make any difference — they swim everything."

Bumpy Jones, Detroit Olympic squad member and NCAA

100-yard water polo champion Ben Goto, also an Olympian, in the 100 and 200 yard free stroke, winner of the national 50-yard crown last year along with Tom Blumer and John Chese, members of last year's record breaking 500-yard free style team, give Michigan five members of last year's All-American team to test against the Spartans.

The Wolverines will be seeking their 15th straight win. Mann, directing his final Michigan team before his retirement next June, has guided his charges to four victories this year, in addition to the eight straight they won last season.

The Spartans' only possible advantage will be in the 100-yard breaststroke, where John Dudek has turned in the best time of any Big 10 swimmer this year, 2:32.6.

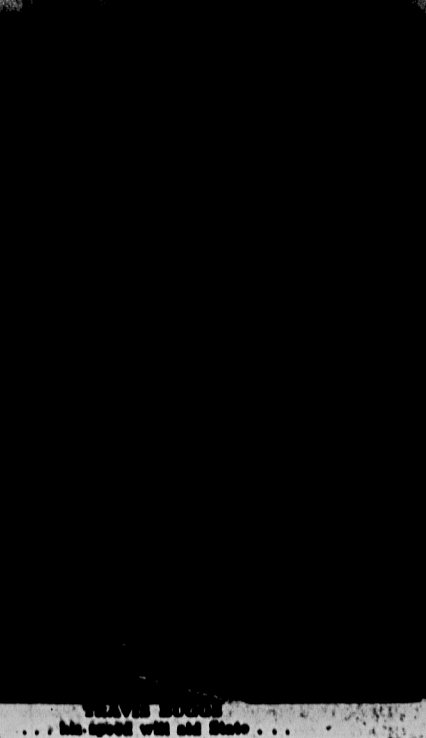

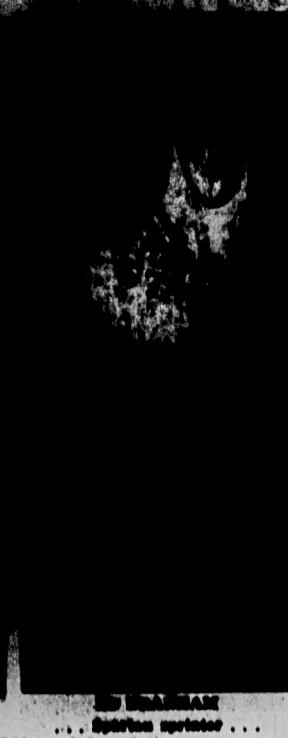

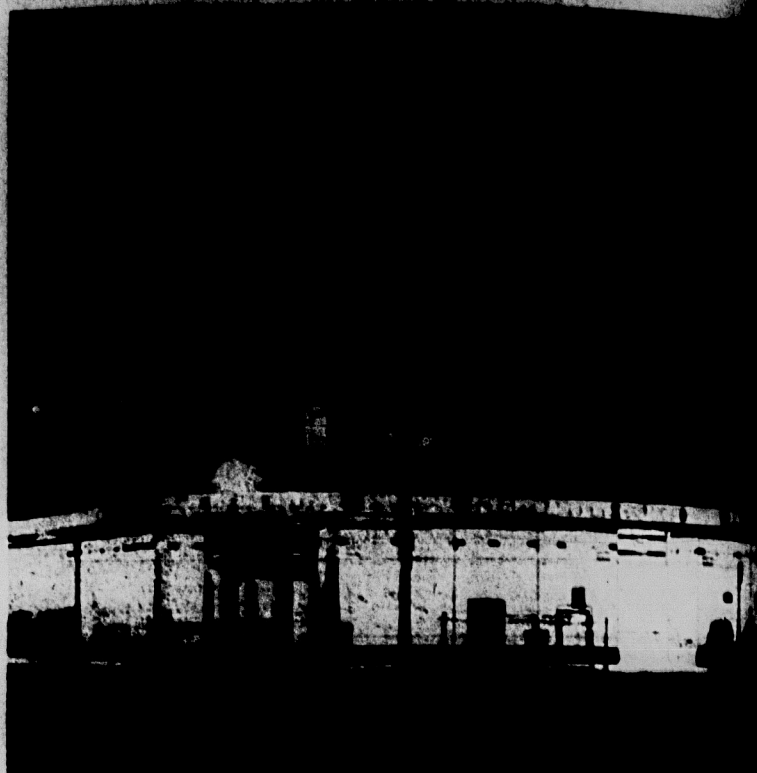
