Don't Forget the Student Tax

Don't worry about the student tax over vacation. On the other hand, don't wait until the ballot is handed to you at spring registration to make up your mind.

And vote. That's the big thing. Failure of a majority of students to vote kills the tax just as dead as 13,000 "no" votes.

Frankly, the State News hopes you'll vote "yes," to renew the tax.

Early in February, we discussed possible consequences of the "yes" vote which can give the tax a long life (limited only by constitutional amendment).

We wrote about possible bids for power on the part of student government, about the use student government has made and will make of the money, and about controls available to the student body to curb abuse of the tax privilege.

Feb. 22, we devoted the entire editorial page to an appeal for passage of the student tax,—but we didn't say the student government was bound for the land of milk and honey.

In fact, we suggested five moves we felt—and still feel—the student government should make to do a better job for those of us it represents.

Two of the recommendations—cutting the size of the Student Congress, and establishing a better system of communication between representatives and their constituents—have been followed.

The other three—closer cooperation between executive and legislative branches, no allocation of funds without receipt of a constructive plan for their use from the asking group, and the release of Student Judiciary recommendations to the State News at the same time the dean of students gets them—well, we've got our fingers crossed.

Especially on the last recommendation. A Student Judiciary acting for the student body, and in the name of the entire student government, should have its actions reported at the time they are taken. We hope the Judiciary and the dean of student's office will eventually agree to this.

We have explained the services made available by the tax, and the setbacks student government and other campus organizations will suffer if tax funds are no longer available.

Student government officials are ready and anxious to answer your questions about the tax. They have prepared a booklet which probably will answer some. You can get free copies at the Union desk.

Their office is on the third floor of the Union, in the wing above the bookstore. Their telephone number is ED 2-1511, extensions 7181 or 7189. Call on them if you have questions.

We believe the advantages of a student tax far outweigh the disadvantages. We're going to vote "yes." We hope you will, too.

## Thinclads End Slim Year in Fifth Place

In the windup of a slim winter schedule, the Spartan thinclads finished fifth in the Big 10 race at Illinois. The Spartans won their fourth consecutive title of the strength of 55 points, to outclass their nearest competitor, Indiana, with 42. Michigan was a surprising third after many experts had picked them to take Illinois' crown. The Spartans picked up only one first place—Lyle Garber's win in the 800, and only after the Illinois entry—Gene Maxnard had been disqualified. State's sprinters, Ed Brabham and Travis Buzg, showed up well with a second and third respectively. Other scorers for MSC were Roy Eggleston, Dave Goodell, Joe Savoldi and John Corbelli. State started the season with some respectable times in the Michigan A.A.U. Spartan relay teams won two titles and finished second in three other events. The sprint medley relay team and the shuttle hurdle team won, while the mile, two-mile and distance medley teams picked up seconds. In the MSC Relays, the Spartan hurdlers showed well, with the shuttle hurdle team of Corbelli, Henry Gillis, Harlan, Benjamin and Savoldi taking the title. The Spartans finished second in a tri-meet between State, Illinois and Kansas with the Illinois winning. Buzg won the 60-yard dash and the mile relay team finished first for the Spartans. In a meet added to the original schedule, Indiana beat State, 75-56 at Bloomington. Turning in firsts for the Spartans were Dick Jarrett in the 1,000-yard run, Brabham in the 60-yard dash, Corbelli in both hurdle events and Ray Eggleston in the broad jump.

MSC's wrestlers topped a successful 7-2 season by taking third in the Big 10 title race. The season started on a sour note with a 21-9 loss to Pittsburgh. The record was quickly squared by a close 15-14 win over Iowa. The grapplers then took first place in a quadrangular meet with Northwestern, Purdue and Minnesota. An easy win over the Ohio State Buckeyes, 20-6, followed. Then came the big weekend. The MSC wrestlers defeated strong teams from Iowa State (24-4) and Purdue (18-10). Another conference win, over Illinois 20-10, preceded the second mat loss of the year. The wrestlers ran headlong into Michigan's defending Big 10 champs and lost, 15-9. They bounced back with a 5 win over Indiana to close the season. After a short rest, the wrestlers played host to the Big 10 championships at Jenison Fieldhouse. After a strong start in the preliminaries, the team faltered in the semi-finals and finished third, behind Purdue and Michigan. Heading the list of individual stars is senior Bob Hoke, who won his second straight title at that weight in the finals after going undefeated.

## Sportopics Looking Back

Looking back over the term... It seems like just a few days ago that we were out in Pasadena watching the Spartans come from behind to win the Rose Bowl. And with these memories still fresh in our minds we had settled down for the coming term.

The winter months seemed to have flashed by before we realized it, but they were packed with many newsworthy events as far as the sports picture at MSC is concerned.

The first big news of the term was the announcement that Stan Turner, Spartan shortstop, unexpectedly signed a contract with the Cleveland Indians.

The next big event was the switch in the Athletic Department. Biggie Munn, fresh from leading his football team to a co-championship in the Big 10 and the Rose Bowl victory, moved into the Athletic Director's Office—replacing Ralph Young. At the same time Duffy Daugherty was promoted from line coach to head coach.

Following on the heels of this move, Backfield Coach Steve Sebo left to take over the head coaching job at Penn and End Coach Earl Edwards moved to North Carolina State.

Basketball forward Julius McCoy tied the school scoring record with a 34-point spree against Ohio State as the Bucks fell, 83-76.

The MSC Relays moved into the spotlight and with the performances of Wes Santee, proved to be one of the track highlights of the year.

The long-legged Kansas miler unofficially broke the world's indoor record with a 4:22.6 effort in the mile leg of the winning distance medley relay team. The team, sparked by Santee's mile, set a new American record of 9:51.4.

Two days later in the Kansas-Illinois-MSU meet, Santee officially broke the record with a time of 4:04.9.

Football moved back into the picture with Daugherty's appointment of his staff. Selected were: Bob Devaney, end coach; Dan Devine, backfield coach; Everett Grandelius, freshman coach; Bert Smith, assistant coach; Don Mason, line coach and Bill Yeoman, assistant coach.

WKAR-TV got into the news-making category with the announcement of its plans to televise Spartan sports.

Although no team won a title in the various championship meets, several individual winners emerged for the Spartans.

Bob Hoke successfully defended his Big 10 157-pound wrestling title. Gymnast Carl Rintz compiled 54 points in the finals to take individual honors for the second year—Ken Cook tied with him for first place in the flying rings. Lyle Garbe won the 880 in the conference track meet. John Dudeck set a new Big 10 record in the 100-yard breaststroke of :59.7 as he stroked to victory at Ann Arbor.

McCoy collected 24 points in the cagers' final game—76-61 win over Michigan to run his total to 409 which made him the first player in State's history to score more than 400 points.

One of the biggest surprises of the year was the resignation of Basketball Coach Pete Newell, who accepted a job at California. As yet, no successor has been appointed. However, there are many who believe that Newell's assistant, John Bennington will get the nod.

## Hockey Team Compiles Best School Mark

Michigan State's hockey team started with a rush and finished strong, as they compiled the best record in Spartan history during the past season.

The pucksters drafted the first game of the season, 10-1 Lawrence and then came back to win four straight before a betting competition in the Western Collegiate Hockey League.

In league play the Spartans won only four while losing 12 and tying one, a 0-0 overtime game with the University of Michigan.

All their league wins and their tie were compiled in the last nine games. They lost only four games in this final stretch, three of them by one goal.

In all, the Iceers drafted seven one-goal decisions and played four overtime games, testing to the never-say-die time of hockey they placed this year.

The Spartans will take to the ice next year with the entire team that finished out this season, with the exception of captain John Thomas, who graduated at the end of this term.

State will be aided by the injured half-way through the turn of John Polonsky, who this season, and the return to eligibility of Henry Campanini and John Mayes, both of whom had to sit out a term of scholastic ineligibility.

## MSC Team Undefeated In Six Meets

By winning four of their dual meets and tying two, the Michigan State boxing team gained the best record of any Spartan sports squad.

The mittmen started the season off in winning style by capturing the Quailty Marines, 4-2, and made it two straight when they topped Penn State, 2-1.

The team traveled next to Pocatello, Idaho, where they traded punches with the Idaho State squad. This meet came out as a deadlock, 4-4.

Returning to the friendly confines of Jenison, the Spartans dropped Maryland by a 4-1 decision and then came out on top of Idaho State in a rematch, sweeping the Bengals, 6-2.

Their next dual meet was a rematch with the Marines. This match ended in a draw, 4-4, giving the Spartans an undefeated record as they prepare for the Badgers from the University of Wisconsin, March 26.

Leading the Spartan boxer in the second straight year was Tom Mickey.

## What Happened?

### Cagers Dissappoint

After a record breaking start, the cagers hit a snag and ended the season with the worst record that coach Pete Newell has had—and his last.

The Spartans opened the season with an 88-51 win over unclassified Creighton for a new team scoring record. Then came three straight wins over Marquette, Southern California and Pittsburgh, before State slumped and dropped two games on the road to UCLA and a return match with Southern Cal.

On the 10 game to Iowa, 73-62, the Spartans edged Illinois, 60-59 in the last second of play.

Then came a heart-breaking loss to Michigan by the same token, a last minute 64-63 setback.

State never seemed to recover from this, except for two or three games. The team looked good in beating Kansas State, 78-64, and Ohio State, 83-76. However, after that State seemed to play good ball only when it played the top teams, and poor ball when the opposition was not so good.





State final elimination contest will be held in public speaking, parliamentary procedure, and arm forums.


