

## Spartacade Grosses \$4,966 For Highest Figure in History

### Chairman Estimates \$4,191 Net

'Pitch A Pic,'  
'City Lights' Win

Spartacade of 1954 grossed \$4,966, largest amount in the carnival's four-year history. Jack Gosdel, general chairman of events, said Sunday. Net proceeds will go to Campaign Club.

About \$4,191 will be donated this year since he estimates that overhead expenses will run about \$775. Gosdel said last year a net total of \$3,200 was donated to the Campaign Club fund. This year grossed over \$2,000 in 1952.

Kappa Alpha Theta and Kappa Sigma topped the honors in the audience participation class with their entry "Pitch A Pic." Pi Beta Phi and Sigma Nu's "City Lights" topped the non-participation entries.

An estimated crowd of 7,000 attended the carnival in Junction.

### McCarthy Discussed

## Ex-Senator, Bishop Speak to Methodists

A former senator opposed to Congressional investigating committees, and a bishop who has appeared before one were on campus Saturday to speak to 800 delegates to a "Methodist Men on the March" convention.

The former senator is Prentiss Brown, now chairman of the Mackinac Bridge Authority. The bishop is E. Brockley Oxnam of Washington, D. C.

Methodist current committees such as McCarthy's actually are encouraging Communism, Brown told one of the largest groups of Methodist laymen to gather in Michigan. They and radio commentators such as Fulton Lewis, Jr. give the downtrodden people of the world the feeling that the United States has nothing for them, but that Communism does, he explained.

Although a lawyer himself, Brown professed "shame" for the American Bar Association because of a resolution it passed in February, 1952, approving the methods of Congressional investigating committees.

"The tide is turning," however, he added. William Gossett, general counsel for the Ford Motor Co., and others have organized committees with the Bar to study the McCarthy question further, he said.

Brown also accused President Eisenhower of a "stilt halting" attack, although a strengthening one, on the Communist question, and the administration of insufficient consideration of the Red China issue.

"I don't know whether we should recognize Red China, but I do know you can't get anywhere in these negotiations without talking about them," he said. He added that he believed it is in the policy in diplomacy to recognize the party in power.

Bishop Oxnam spent most of his time talking on "The Mission of the Church," but he did refer occasionally to political world events.

The bishop appeared recently before Rep. Velde's committee on un-American activities.

The West does not understand the Chinese problem, and may succeed in uniting the Chinese Nationalists and the Communists, he said. This would be extremely undesirable, he added.

## Committee To Set Up Constitution

Married Students To Vote on 'City'

Students in MSC's married housing area took the first step toward reviving a representative governing body for their area by setting up a constitutional committee in a Sunday afternoon meeting.

The committee will draw up a proposed constitution whereby the 1100-unit group would help govern themselves as a city. The 12-member committee will pattern their constitution after the one used by Spartan City, the governing body which existed from 1947 to 1949.

If the constitution is approved by the majority of married students in the housing area, it will form a valuable organization to express the opinions of married students to the administrative officials, according to Pat Callahan, committee head.

Besides acting as a force to obtain improved living conditions in the area, the governing body would probably have aims similar to those of Spartan City. These were:

To provide democratic representation in the community.

To sponsor educational, recreational and social activities.

A second meeting for all occupants of the married housing area was set for Sunday, April 25. At this time the proposed constitution will be presented to the group for approval.

Activities which married students would like to see encouraged by a governing body were discussed in Sunday's meeting.

The proposed playground for the 1100 children living in the area was the most discussed project. The playground would be set up in a vacant lot between Birch and Harrison roads.

Area maintenance, street conditions and drainage systems were discussed as other outstanding projects. Problems needed to be tackled by the governing body included enforcement of pet control and driving and parking rules, according to the group.

### 'Wild Blue Yonder'

## Twenty Sophomores Take ROTC Flight

It was "into the wild blue yonder" for 20 AFROTC sophomore cadets Sunday.

The 20 cadets toured Lansing's Capitol City Airport and took an hour-long flight in a twin-engine C-45 transport plane piloted by Lt. Col. Oliver E. Fowler and Maj. Richard G. Mendrop, both instructors at MSC's AFROTC detachment.

Flights scheduled Saturday had to be called off because of bad weather. Bright sunshine and 15-mile visibility favored the cadets Sunday, however.

The only handicap came from slightly bumpy take-offs because of gusts of wind near the ground.

The first of five flights, each of which contained four cadets, took off at 9 a.m. Other flights followed at one-hour intervals until 3 p.m., with a two-hour break at noon.

Each of the cadets was at the controls for approximately 15 minutes, flying 15- to 25-mile jaunts.

At briefing for the flight Thursday afternoon, the cadets were informed of flight procedure, including strapping of parachutes.

The instructors took the C-45 up to 5,000 feet altitude and then, at 15-minute intervals, switched seats with the cadets.

Richard Kodnicki, Hamtramck, one of the "first time" passengers, said he was surprised at the ease of flying a plane by instruments.

Four of the cadets flew to Selfridge Airfield for refueling and lunch at the base officers' club. Landing at noon, the four cadets and two officers were taken to the club by car and were back in the air again at 1 p.m.

Jerry Chipman, Boyne City, was an important cog in the program as he guided and assisted the cadets on the "flight line" at the airport.

Cadets who were scheduled to fly in Saturday's cancelled flights will have a chance to "go up" at a similar week-end program later this term, Chipman said.

### ay-Boost Measure Approved

Michigan's Legislature passed a measure Sunday which would increase while rushing an adjournment over the weekend.

A controversial boost in unemployment compensation forced legislators to stay in session 8 p.m. Saturday instead of adjourning Friday as planned.

MSC's grant, approximately \$11,700,000 is earmarked for general operating funds and represents Gov. Williams' recommendation of \$13,000,000. The legislature's grant will cover \$3,000,000 and pay \$11,700,000 to MSC faculty and staff members.

Legislation introduced by Representative Philip J. May said he thought that the remainder of the \$13,000,000 granted to MSC would go to other areas of the agricultural experiment station and extension service. The total is approximately 2 1/2 percent of the combined budget-allocations for the college and its various branches.

He said that all of the funds for pay increases will be used to salary adjustments, he said he pointed out, however, that the legislature granted the 2 percent boost to other workers under the Civil Service Commission.

The anticipated rise of 2 1/2 percent does not approach this, he said.

The new building, MSC was awarded \$2,500,000 including a \$1,000,000 installment on the new building under construction, initial installment of \$750,000 to start construction of a \$4 million animal industrial building and the first \$100,000 of a \$750,000 grant for the new building on South Campus.

The plan for the animal industrial building would be to revamp the existing building, which is the original request by the state. The \$100,000 grant would be used for a boiler.

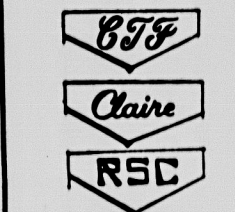

"Our hitting is continuing to improve," Kobs added. Matsock, John Polonsky, and Sack are all hitting over .300.

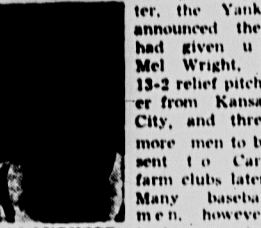

Stines, as expected, won the championship since 1952. Odom, leading all the way, pinned his opponent with frequent slashing left hooks and combinations to the head and body.

The welterweight Spartans' Chuck Davey, who won the 147-pound title in 1949 and 1951, led Odom to a few unanimous decisions in the quarter-finals Thursday and Friday. Odom, along with Bill Greenwood, scored Smith drew bites.

The Spartans' quarter-final win was unanimous. North Carolina's light-heavyweight, Bill Greenwood, was repeatedly hit to the head. He started a devastating attack on the second round.

Michigan State's Norm Anderson dropped a split decision to Chuck Magistro in the 150-pound quarter-final. Anderson, who won the 150-pound title in 1947 and 1948, was defeated by Magistro in a unanimous decision. Anderson's win marked the eleventh individual NCAA title in what boxers have taken.

Young, whose fame incorporates efforts as an entertaining host and a seeker of fine eating places both at home and abroad, is one of the few football men who had the honor to play under both Amos Alonzo Stagg and Fielding H. Yost.

He played under Stagg at Chicago, then went on to complete his college career at Washington and Jefferson in 1915. While in training with the signal corps during World War I on the University of Michigan campus, Young won a varsity letter with the Wolverines coached by Yost.

# Montreal Nips Detroit in Overtime, 1-0

DETROIT (AP)—Veteran Ken Mosdell kept Montreal in the Stanley Cup hockey playoffs by whirling in the winning goal unassisted at 5:45 of the first sudden death period to give the Canadiens a dramatic 1-0 victory over the Detroit Red Wings Sunday night.

It was Mosdell's first goal in nine playoff games this season and gave Montreal its second victory in the best-of-seven series. The Frenchmen will get a chance to square matters at three games apiece on their own ice Tuesday.

Mosdell's dramatic goal was

unexpected and completely fooled Detroit goalie Terry Sawchuk. The 31-year-old center stick-handled into Red Wing territory and seemingly was taken out of the play when checked by Bob Goldham, Detroit defenseman.

As both players became locked with each other Mosdell whirled around and whipped a low 10-footer into the opposite corner of the net.

It was the fifth game between the teams in an eight-day period and both were clearly fatigued. They played cautiously, checking closely and taking few chances.

If the Canadiens win Tuesday and force a seventh and deciding game, it will be played here Friday night.

Not at all unusual, you say? But this well was purposely drilled that way! In fact, precautions were taken to see that the well wouldn't contact oil-bearing sands. It was to be a vital part of an elaborate waste-disposal system built into one of Du Pont's new plants near Victoria, Texas. 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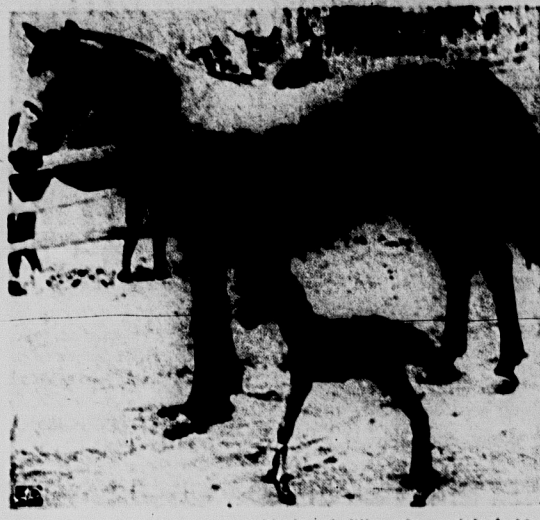

### Dulles Asks United Front In Indochina

#### Secretary Seeks Hurry-up Action

LONDON (AP)—U. S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles flew into London Sunday urgently seeking to win Britain to his hurry-up united action program designed to prevent Communist domination of Indochina.

Dulles told reporters the Western Allies face a common danger in Indochina and added there was need for him to talk with British leaders "in great intimacy." He heard Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, standing at his shoulder, say:

"I am confident that the work that we shall have to do together will be of service not only to each other's country but to the understanding and peace of the world."

The two gave no hint of the rift between Washington and the British and French Allies over the timing of Dulles' proposal for an immediate "hands-off" warning to Red China.

London and Paris are set to urge Dulles to postpone any move until after the Geneva Conference which opens April 26. They are in favor of first feeling out the Russians and the Chinese Reds at the Foreign Ministers' Geneva conference to see if they are ready to negotiate an Indochina settlement.

Dulles has come out for a common declaration so that the West can negotiate at Geneva from "a position of strength." He begins formal talks with Prime Minister Churchill and Eden Monday on Tuesday. He flies to Paris on the next stage of his busy five-day trip to weld Allied unity before Geneva.
