Sports Tickets To Remain At Present Prices

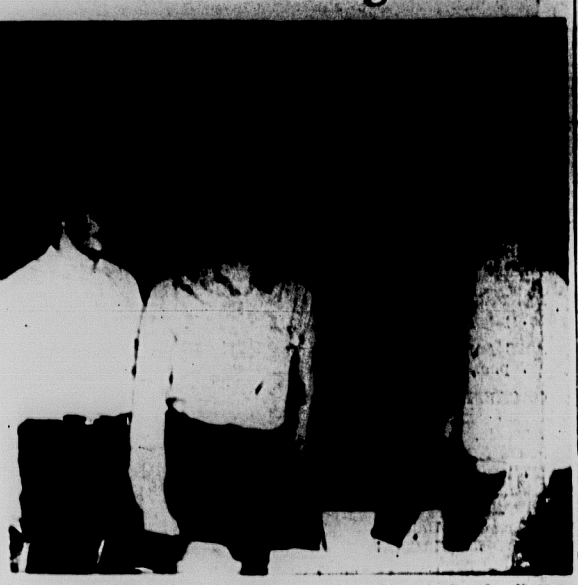
Ticket prices to MSC sports events will remain the same next year, despite recent reductions in the federal excise tax, the Athletic Council decided Monday afternoon.

Spring Grid Turnouts Heavy, But 'All to Get Opportunity'

Call Answered By Over 160 As Drills Open

If numbers mean anything, MSC football this year will be better than ever. Over 160 men turned out for Monday's opening session of Spartan spring football practice.

He said his plans, revised by the turnout, called for splitting the huge group into two parts for today's workout.

Of the more than 45 were members of varsity uniforms for the first time. The other 110 have played either varsity or freshman ball.

Introductions were in order as the first MSC practice started for so many people. The whistle blast that called the men together came from Daugherty but it was the same whistle that Biggie Munn, retired grid coach, had called players to a start and halt with for his seven-year tenure in the Spartans' ranks.

Daugherty started his initial session as head coach by introducing his co-captains, Don Kauth and Leloy Holter.

Next he introduced the members of his staff, many of them new to the MSC practice field. He ended the social formalities by introducing several former Spartan gridlers who returned to help him this spring.

Coach Sam Dick Tamburo, Paul Decker and Bob Breniff were the former Spartans. Breniff had planned to play in the spring workouts, but a recurring knee injury has ended his playing career.

MSC formation patterns were practiced for the benefit of the newcomers. After the veterans had run through some plays the group split into groups for position work.

Line Coach Don Mason, with the largest single group, sent his charges into a long session on the blocking dummies.

Coach Bob Devaney and Don Tamburo, working with the backs and their men through blocking drills.

Quarterback Dan Devine, the pace-setter of the day with his relative pass shadowing the new men.

Drummond held in brisk fashion, also had the group through a series of drills.

Ben One Stroke Off, Snead Nips Hogan To Win Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—Sam Snead gambled with the "graveyard of the masters," the tortuous 13th hole, and beat Ben Hogan by a stroke in an 18-hole playoff for the Masters golf title Monday.

Snead won by a score of 70 to Hogan's 71 in a duel that carried right up to the final green. They had finished the regulation 72 holes Sunday with scores of 289, highest ever to win a Masters tournament.

The victory made Snead the second man ever to win the Masters three times, putting him even with Jimmy Demaret.

It was the first head-to-head meeting between these two since 1950. And they went at it like a pair of cagey veterans. For the most part they were content to play par golf, hoping to get out of the trap when it counted.

The 13th was the deciding hole, and when Hogan three-putted the short 16th, Sam's victory seemed assured. But it wasn't until Snead came out of a trap within putting distance of the last hole that the crowd of some 7,000 really relaxed.

First Try for Morrall, Matsock Quarterbacks Choose Baseball

Spring football practice opened Monday, but without quarterbacks Tom Yewic, Earl Morrall, or John Matsock.

The fabled trio, who figured high in the Spartans' Rose Bowl win, instead, spent the afternoon at Old College Field, trying out for baseball varsity berths.

For graduating senior Yewic, the coming season will be his third as a Spartan catcher. After a finger injury last season that sidelined him, Yewic went on to hit a respectable .274, including three homers, over 16 games.

For Morrall and Matsock, this season marks their first attempt at college ball.

Morrall and Matsock, who might well be fighting for the varsity quarterback post next fall, are going through a "dry run" session on the baseball field. Both are hustling for the first-string shortstop berth.

Morrall won three letters playing short for Muskegon's Senior High in 1950, 1951, and 1952.

Alleged "serious irregularities and abuses" in the home modernization and repair program, where by some home owners have been charged twice the value of repairs and in some cases obtained "shoddy" work to boot.

Evidence of "illegal or unethical actions" in the financing of FHA-insured apartment projects under "Title 60," the so-called middle-income rental housing program which expired in 1950.

The housing chief said investigation has turned up 251 cases where FHA-insured mortgages on apartment houses exceeded the actual cost of the projects.
