NCAA Asks Rejection of Big 10 Plan

KANSAS CITY (AP)—An overwhelming rejection of the Big 10 Conference's demands for a change in televising major college football games has been ordered by members of the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

There was no immediate comment from the Big 10, which had asked its members to vote against a limited, nationally controlled program, essentially the same as that of last year, submitted to an NCAA mail referendum.

Under the program, approved 184 to 26, there will be 12 nationwide telecasts of Saturday games with regional TV contests restricted to Thanksgiving Day. A major team will be permitted to appear on TV only once during the season.

The Big 10 officials at the Western Conference wanted a program that would permit a team to appear twice regionally, once at home and once away, or once nationally.

At Chicago, Kenneth L. (Tux) Wilson, Big 10 commissioner, said he would have a statement later on the referendum, results of which were announced Thursday by Walt Byers, executive director of the NCAA.

Wilson said the subject may be discussed at a conference meeting April 26-27 at Chicago. There have been predictions that the Big 10 might embark on its own regional TV program next fall.

Act Takes Effect in June, '56

Students at MSC graduating after June 30, 1956, will be required to take a course in political science before graduating unless a bill signed by law by Gov. G. Mennen Williams Thursday.

The bill requires at least three semester hours of political science, public administration or government as a pre-requisite for a degree for all students at state supported colleges graduating after June 30, 1956.

First students to be affected under the bill are present freshmen who will graduate in the 1956-57 school year. It does not affect the graduating classes of this year 1955 or 1956.

Although the language of the bill states that the bill "shall take effect on the date of its passage," a question was raised Thursday night as to whether the bill would affect MSC and the University of Michigan.

Basically, the question was an MSC political science instructor who preferred not to be quoted.

He said that an opinion has been asked of Frank G. Millard, Michigan's attorney-general because of the autonomous status of the schools' ruling bodies, MSC's State Board of Agriculture and U of M's Board of Regents.

It was suggested during the bill's route through the Michigan Legislature that results carried out by the two legislatures could only be enforced by their respective ruling bodies.

But Frank Blackford, administrative assistant to Gov. Williams, told the State News.

"Frankly I interpreted it as applying to students at both MSC and Michigan I am not familiar with any request for an opinion from Millard."

Blackford pointed out that the bill apparently was dead in a House committee only a few weeks ago when it was suddenly revived.

At that time, there was talk about a request for an opinion from Blackford said. But since the bill was dead, there was no warrant.

Edward W. Weidner, head of the political science department, said that four term hours would be the MSC equivalent of the required three semester hours. Commenting on the bill, he said:

"In view of the findings of the recent public opinion polls concerning the quality of knowledge that citizens possess about their government, this act represents a very sincere effort to our citizens."




Opening day ceremonies beginning at 1:15 will include raising ceremonies, interviews and music.
