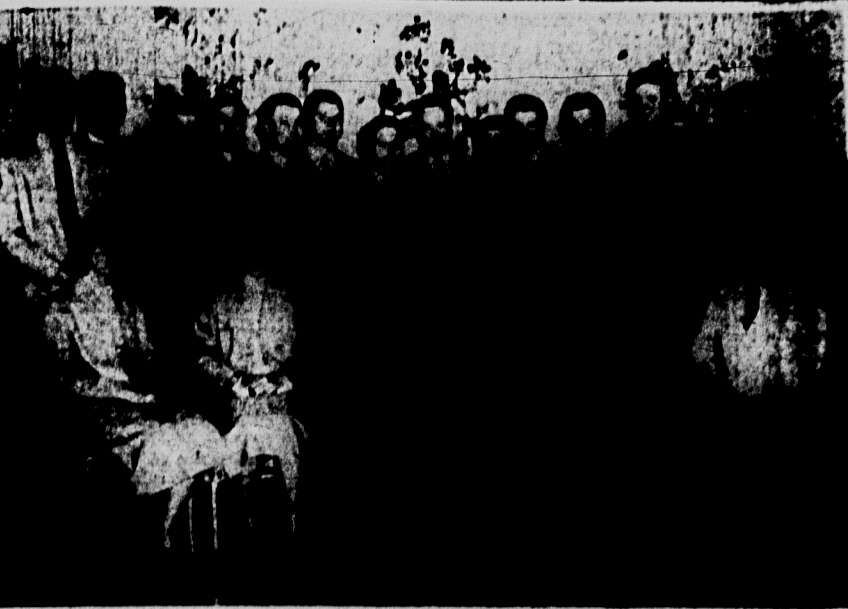


## Two Killed Unrest Suez

### Attack Follows Cabinet Shake-up

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — A British soldier and an Egyptian workman were killed today in scattered incidents that followed the Egyptian cabinet shake-up and the arrest of Gen. Gamal Abdel Nasser, an Egyptian strong man.

British army spokesman said today that British planes held up a British transport plane at Port Said, killing a British pilot and making away with the plane and its cargo. The plane was later returned. The British attack was the first in two days against Egyptian servicemen in the quiet Port Said area. A British sergeant was stabbed in the chest and wounded Friday in Port Said when a plane was thrown at him.

Oppenheimer: Hero or Traitor?

The case of Dr. Oppenheimer is provocative from several angles.

Most widely-publicized of the 16 FBI-gathered charges against the eminent scientist are those of participating in Communist activities after he took over the A-bomb development at Los Alamos in 1942 and delaying American H-bomb progress.

The attackers of Oppenheimer have revealed no clear-cut evidence that he has continued Communist activities—instead, they "link" the 19-year-old atomic expert with known Reds, his wife for one.

Oppenheimer has staunchly denied that he ever was a Communist although acknowledging "an emotional plunge into left-wing politics about the time of the Spanish Civil War."

Unless important evidence has been withheld from the American public, it appears that this particular charge against Oppenheimer has been built on a foundation of sand.

The fallibility of indictment on grounds of guilt by association has already been proven. And countless citizens of this country—prominent or not—eagerly opposed Franco in the famous Spanish War.

Weighing the allegation that Oppenheimer allowed H-bomb progress will be even more complicated a task for the three-man investigating committee, headed by Gordon Gray, president of the University of North Carolina.

Oppenheimer, in a 43-page report denying the charges against him, claims that he opposed attempts to construct an H-bomb on moral and technical grounds, but began working on it after receiving orders to do so from ex-President Truman.

It is easy to see why a power-mad individual would be only too anxious to further plans for an H-bomb or any of its destructive relations. It is also easy to understand why a more responsible, thoughtful individual would be hesitant to work on the bomb without sanction from higher officials—especially when aware that his efforts would directly affect the safety of all nations on earth.

If anything, Truman himself should share in any "guilt" assigned in the case because his orders to begin work were not made sooner. The feasibility of the H-bomb was first mentioned in 1912—by Oppenheimer.

There is one ray of hope in the situation—the hearings will be conducted in secret. Thus no back politicians will be able to take a free publicity ride while the case is continued.

To the Editor: We were pleased to read the State News report on the stand taken by our Student Government in protest against the proposed cuts of the International Student Exchange Program.

Because others at MSC have already listed in detail the merits of the Exchange Program, we choose to contribute to the argument against the cuts by examining the reasoning used by the budget planners and by Congressmen who have proposed the 60-per-cent budget cut of funds.

Several elements of the program (which the State News did not get available, we are forced to draw our own conclusions. There could be two basic reasons for this congressional action:

- 1. The exchange program, as they stand, are in some ways wasteful, unnecessary, or failing to carry out the designated purpose, etc.
2. As an economy measure. Answer to reason 1: The values that can and do result from a strong International Student Exchange Program have already been established. Even though some failures or excesses in the program may exist, the most reasonable alternative would be to reorganize rather than curtail them.

It would appear, that in our desire for national security, our Congressmen have decided that long-range educational cooperation are too expensive and slow. If so, we feel that there have lost a sense of perspective.

It is our hope that this letter will add one more voice to the five that MSC is putting under the national Congressmen who are responsible for the proposal in question.

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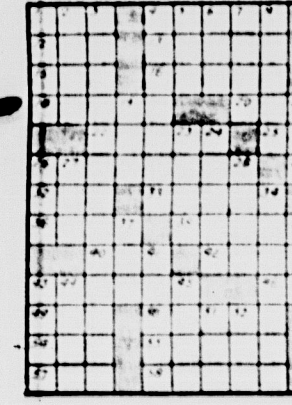
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Crossword Puzzle

Go Tigers... Don't everyone look at once, but the Tigers have come to life.

After two dismal seasons in which they finished last for the first time and lost the distinction of being the only club in both leagues to evade the cellar, and sixth in '53, the Bengals have a "new look" and things are looking up.

In 1950, in the Trucks, Wertz, Kell, Evers and Groth era, it looked like a pennant for Briggs Stadium until the last few games of the season—but they didn't quite make it and ended up second.

Then came the plummet. With ridiculous ease, the Tigers slid into the cellar, feet first.

Red Rolfe gave up and Fred Hutchinson was flaged in from the bull pen to take over as task master. He got results—a little bit, and the Tigers jumped to sixth, with the aid of a cast-off utility infielder from Cleveland, Ray Boone.

In my books, this boy should have won the "MVP" award hands down. As far as individual help to a team, no one in the league did more for his team than did Boone.

Now, with newly appointed general manager Muddy Ruel looking around the league for "washed-up" players like Ned Garver and Steve Gromek, who turned in a win each over the weekend in Baltimore, and the appearance of some young blood in the lineup, the Tigers are on the way back.

Al Kaline, Frank Bolling and Bill Tuttle are names that meant little to Tiger fans last year, but these kids (Kaline is only 19) could supply the spark to supplement the experience of the veterans and make the Tigers real pennant contenders.

The Tigers have nearly matched last year's entire output in stolen bases already, and they have equaled last year's shutout mark (2).

It's still early—very early, but maybe there is a championship spirit running around Detroit.

The Lions started it off last December when they edged the Browns, 17-16 for their second straight NFL title.

Last year the Red Wings, after winning the Prince of Wales trophy, symbolizing supremacy of the National Hockey League during the regular season, for the fifth straight time, folded in the playoffs.

This year it was different and they added the Stanley Cup to the Prince of Wales.

Back in 1935 Detroit was called the "City of Champions" with the Tigers, Lions and Red Wings winning titles and Joe Louis reigning over the heavies.

Detroit fans have always been tops. (Example: the Tigers drew nearly a million fans into Briggs Stadium in 1951 when they finished last) so its time they were rewarded during the summer months.

# Chorus, Orchestra Perform 'Requiem'

A joint concert of the MSC Mixed Chorus and Symphony Orchestra was held Friday night at 8:15 in the Auditorium as a special Good Friday observance.

Prof. Louis A. Potter, Jr., opened the concert by conducting the orchestra in a massive transcription of an anonymous Baroque toccata, erroneously attributed to the 17th century Roman organist, Frescobaldi.

The toccata was followed by the principal work of the program, the seven-movement "German Requiem" by Brahms. The 50-piece orchestra and 80-voice chorus were directed by Dr. Joseph Burns.

In the performance here, the complete work was given, except for a small cut in the third movement.

Soloist for the third movement was Richard Haan, Grand Rapids graduate student. Haan also soloed in the opening of the sixth movement which closes with the mighty double fugue, "Worthy Art Thou."

The difficult soprano solo of the fifth movement was sung by Monnie Anderson, Norway Junior.

The Requiem was first performed in Vienna in 1867, in a three-movement work.

The following year, Brahms added three movements for a Good Friday performance in the Bremen cathedral. A month later he finished what is now the fifth movement.

A non-secular work, the Requiem is unusual not only because it replaces the Latin liturgical text with a German one selected by Brahms, but because it is considered a consolation to the living rather than a prayer for the dead.

It is a work of profound symmetry and balance. Nearly every movement is in three-part form and the first and last movements correspond in theme and feeling, to some extent, the third and fifth.

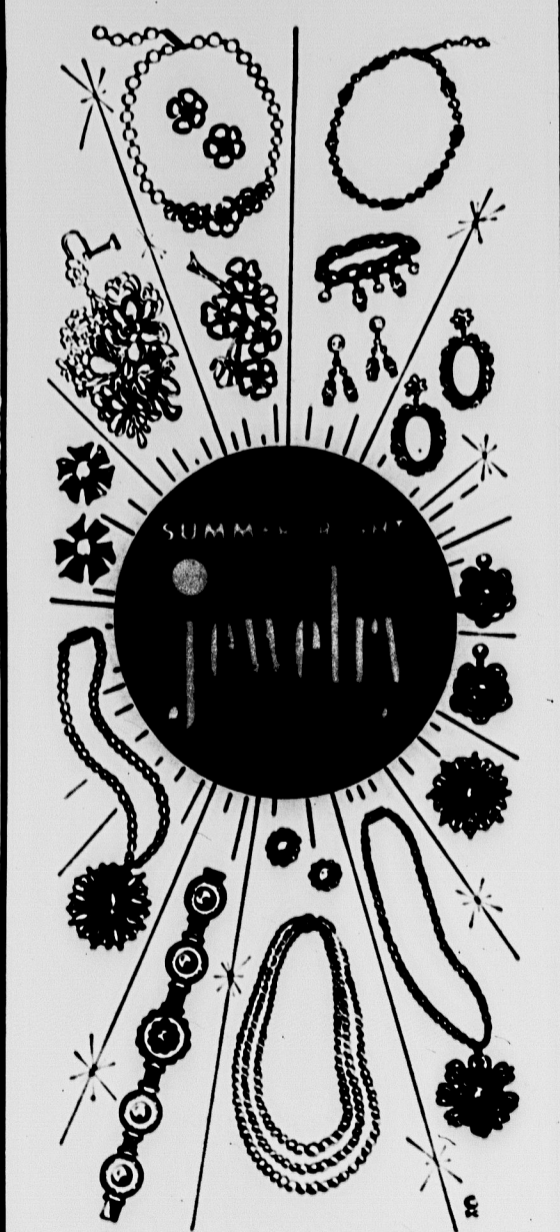
