S. Must Resist' Hannah Speaks at Detroit Club

Meeting the threat of Communist aggression, the United States has only two alternatives open to it—to resist or to surrender, President John A. Hannah told the Economic Club Monday.

SC Drive for Hospital and Slated

A drive will be included in Lansing United Hospital's annual fund drive, Jack Hannah announced today. The drive will be headed by Hannah, president of the Economic Club.

From this and other drives conducted in the Lansing area will be used to expand St. Joseph's hospital and three hospitals serving an estimated 20 mile radius of Greater Lansing Area, Hannah said.

But in a world of tension, we must also consider the Hitler-Nazi pact, our lend-lease agreements with Russia, Russian insistence on keeping troops in satellite nations and Russian refusal to negotiate an Austrian treaty, he said.

"We have ample reason," Dr. Hannah declared, "to doubt whether any agreement with the Communists would be worth anything if it suited the selfish purposes of our adversaries to break it."

U. S. Entry In Indochina 'Unlikely'

Dulles Announces After Ike Meeting

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles evaluated "the menace of Soviet communism" Monday, and the Cabinet officers later declared it is "unlikely" American troops will be sent to Indochina.

The secretary was referring to United States efforts to build a Pacific defense alliance against the spread of communism.

Newsmen's questioning of Dulles about whether there is any "serious possibility" of American troops being sent into Indochina was prompted by Vice President Nixon's statement last Friday.

The vice president spoke with the understanding his remarks would not be attributed him, but what he said was traced quickly to him.

His remarks touched off a storm of controversy in Congress and brought demands that Eisenhower say whether Nixon's views represented administration policy.

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Editorially Exchange Funds Shouldn't Be Cut

The national House of Representatives has given its approval to a 40 per cent cut in the State Department's recommendations for the international student exchange program.

The cut would also seriously curtail a program designed to create international understanding at a time when U. S. foreign policy intentions are being questioned by strong minority groups among U. S. allies throughout the world.

British Laborite Aneurin Bevan's proposal last week that the United States should "go it alone" is only one example of the increasing need for a program to effectively interpret the people and policies of the U. S. to other nations.

The international exchange student program was developed as part of the Fulbright Act in 1946. It authorized the Secretary of State to use foreign currencies not convertible into dollars to finance study abroad for Americans, and to help bring foreign students to the U. S.

Although transportation to the U. S. has been paid with the foreign currencies, the program has been limited in the past by lack of U. S. funds to support foreign students while they are in this country.

The program, which expands inter-cultural relations, and offers educational services and technical assistance to foreign nations, has been an effective means of achieving international understanding.

As a means of combatting Russian propaganda and distortions about the U. S., the program has cost little compared to the billions of dollars in other foreign aid. The House action in cutting the exchange student funds seems definitely penny wise and dollar foolish.

the Spartans event saw Harold Ware complete a hole-in-one for the Spartans. Ware's hole-in-one was the only one of the day.

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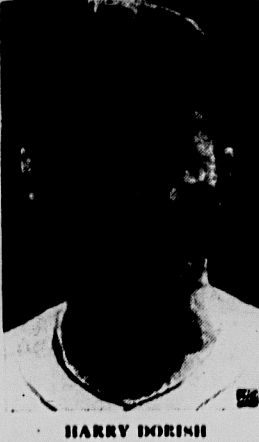

DETROIT (AP) — Manager Paul Richards of the Chicago White Sox called on his "righthand man," Harry Dorish, and the veteran relief ace responded with a strong four-hit effort in the last six and two thirds innings for a 5-1 victory over the Detroit Tigers Monday.

The loss snapped a two-game Tiger winning streak, but left the Bengals in first place as the New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox split a twin bill.

The White Sox jumped on southpaw Billy Hofer for five runs in as many innings including a home run by ex-Tiger Johnny Groth.

Jack Harshman started on the mound for the White Sox, but the Tiger's chased him to the showers with a rally in the third that was promptly put out by Chicago's fireman, Dorish.

The righthander limited the Tigers to only four hits the rest of the way and was never in trouble.

The Tigers will try to get back to their winning ways as they send Ted Gray, another lefty, against Chicago in the second game of the series. Virgil Trucks, another former Tiger, is scheduled to hurl for the White Sox.

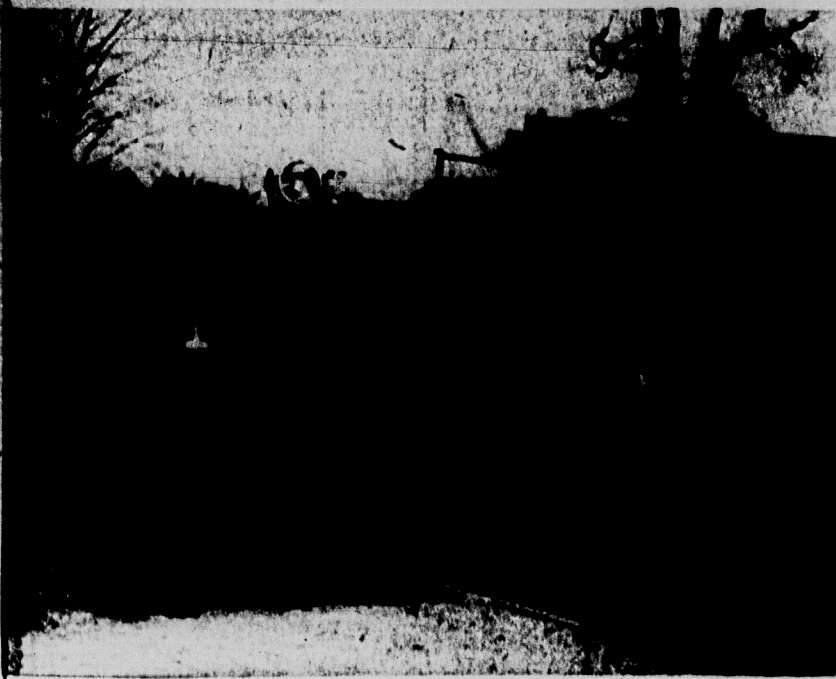
Under the guidance of Bob Callahan, has ten returning lettermen, including an infield nucleus of Sam Ursini at second and co-captain Jim Handloser at third base.

Although admitting the place of literary indexes and bibliographies, Prof. Bishop spoke out for the attainment of pure intellectual delight evoked by literary experience.
