U. S. Flies French to Indochina

France Requests Aid, Says Wilson

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Wilson confirmed Wednesday that U. S. Air Force planes are flying French paratroops from France to Indochina to reinforce the Communist-besieged fortress of Dien Bien Phu.

Wilson said the move is being undertaken "at the request of the French government" and is "in line with present United States policy" of providing military aid to America's allies.

He emphasized that the planes will land at airfields outside the combat zone to unload the French troops who will then be dropped into Dien Bien Phu from other planes piloted by French or American fly-by-night civilian pilots.

Officials here also confirmed that U. S. Air Force planes will fly additional French reinforcements—possibly including famous Moroccan Goum fighters—from North Africa to the Indochina theater.

Senate Hearings Begin Today McCarthy Accuses Wilson's Assistant

WASHINGTON (AP)—The ready-to-go public investigation of the McCarthy-Army row broadened at the last minute Wednesday to include new charges leveled against—and denied by—Asst. Secretary of Defense H. Strobe Hensel.

The Senate investigations subcommittee named Hensel a top aide to Secretary of Defense Wilson, "a principal" in the long-heralded hearings which will open at 10 a.m. E. S. T. today in a blaze of television lights and worldwide publicity.

Sen. McCarthy charged Tuesday Hensel masterminded an Army report blasting him, and tried in other ways to "discredit" the committee, so as to head off a probe of Hensel's own "misconduct" and "possible law violations."

Hensel called these charges "bare-faced lies" and dared McCarthy to repeat them when senatorial immunity wouldn't protect him from a lawsuit. The controversy is over Hensel's connection with a ship supply firm while he held high posts in the Navy Department during World War II.

Lekenta Trial Adjourned Until Tuesday

The trial of Eugene Lekenta and Thomas B. Svingen, former MSC students charged with assault with intent to do great bodily harm, less than murder, has been adjourned until Tuesday.

Motions for dismissal were entered by William Wise, attorney for Svingen, and Leland W. Carr, Jr., attorney for Lekenta. Jerrold H. Keyworth of the prosecutors' office entered a motion to bind the Circuit Court.

The motions were taken under advisement by Justice Henry L. Schram, of East Lansing Justice Court, who adjourned the examination.

Charged with assaulting Gerald Cunningham, MSC graduate student, on the night of Feb. 28 following an argument in a tavern, the two were not allowed to re-enter school this term.

Red China Attacks U.S. Indo Policy

Red Daily Makes Resistance Claims

TOKYO (AP)—Communist China Wednesday savagely attacked U. S. policy on Indochina and declared "we certainly will not take it lying down" if "armed aggression is directed against us."

People's Daily, official organ of the Red regime, asserted Red China now was one of "the five big powers" with a "soaring international prestige and position."

"The rulers of the United States, however, are trying to blind themselves to the existence and might of the People's Republic of China," said a Peiping broadcast version of the editorial board here.

De Voto Gives Fable On National Fantasy

Bernard De Voto satirized the Red-hunting, book-burning problem of the national scene with a fable of American culture—"the national fantasy"—in his lecture last night.

About 600 people heard De Voto, noted historian, author, and critic at his appearance for A and B series of the MSC lecture-concert program.

De Voto began by calling Americans "the most poetic people in history." He illustrated this with the poetry found in our magazines, on radio and TV, and in the advertisements.

The key in this world of fantasy is "the word for each in the case of Aladdin." The cost of jewels is unlocked in the story, you will remember, was also the case of the 40 thieves," he said.

Sometimes, "the science of word-meanings is important in this looking glass land. Scientists assume male Powers' models in whitecoats."

Democracy exists in the elective polls, De Voto said.

From the field of advertising he turned to government.

Americans have two concepts of themselves," De Voto said. "The Davy Crockett don't tread on the picture of a rough and ready people, and the Currier and Ives America of the barefoot boy, expressing the simplicity and tranquility of pre-industrial society."

He then cited a "province of fantasyland Indiana." Taking the Indiana teacher who wanted to censor Indiana school libraries, he posed fun at the adjectiveness of Indiana no longer being safe from Moscow because the children read Robin Hood's man who, in legend, took from the rich and gave to the poor.

He followed by satirizing the action proposed in Texas, "a province almost completely fancy," of requiring all books to be labeled. The labels would be put on books after the author or publisher had certified that "the author did not bring to the Communist party or an organization listed on the Attorney General's list in Washington."

Representative Velde's proposition that all subversive passages in books be marked, and described on an outside label, was also ridiculed. All groups, including police chiefs, who condoned or participated in these activities were condemned.

"This is a picture of the most powerful nation in the world scared stiff," he said. "A picture of an America too weak-minded to read books, afraid of ideas, freedom and each other."

He concluded, "I expect the Americans to grow tired of this fantasyland. Someday they will look at it and say, 'Sesame? I say it's corn, and I say, the hell with it.'"

Truman Actions Called 'Weakness'

DES MOINES (AP)—The Eisenhower administration believes that a position of strength in Asia and Indochina is the only way to avoid war, Vice President Nixon declared Wednesday night.

"America will not keep its boys out of Indochina by simply telling the Communists they can come in there," he said.

"The purpose of our policy," the vice president added in an address delivered at a state Republican party gathering "is to avoid sending our boys to Indochina or anywhere else to fight."

He told newsmen that he wasn't surprised at the stir his remarks at the American Society of Newspaper Editors last Friday kicked up "when it became known" he was the speaker. He said then the United States might have to send troops to Indochina in the unlikely event that the French withdrew.

Public discussion of the policy is one of the main goals of the Eisenhower program, he added.

During the evening, the Truman administration's Vietnam policy was defended by the speaker, who said the policy was "based on strength, firmness, consistency and non-reversibility," he added.

"We are convinced that the policy is one which has the best chance to lead to peace and to avoid war. We have learned in the past that in dealing with the Communists a policy of weakness leads to war."

That is why, the administration has reversed previous policy and is building a study of a policy of strength.

America's foreign policy recognizes that the war in Indochina is a war to save the people of that country from "Communist colonialism," the speaker said. The nation's policy further is to give maximum aid to France and the Associated States of Indochina and "work for united action among all."

Study Hubby's Profession Vet Wives 'Keep Up'

How often would you go to a night class (8 to 9:30) where attendance is never taken and no credit is given? Between 35 and 40 veterinary students' wives do attend just such a class every two weeks in Giltner Hall. They asked for it. They wanted to know more about their husband's work and they are finding out.

Recently Mrs. Donald McWade, whose husband graduated in 1950, told some of the things a veterinarian's wife might learn.

One of the first things a veterinarian's wife learns, says Mrs. McWade, is to get as accurate and complete information as possible over the phone when her husband is out. Then he can have some idea about what's wrong with the animals and what instruments and medicine to take on his call.

A veterinarian's wife is often his secretary, bookkeeper, office nurse and operating assistant.

The wives have had lectures and demonstrations on cats, medical terminology, care of instruments, dairy and beef cattle and practical clinical pathology. And this spring they'll learn about anesthetic administration, types of horses and federal and state disease control.

Also this spring, they will meet under their formal title of American Junior Veterinary Medicine Association Auxiliary for "graduation exercises." At this time, wives of graduating seniors will get their PHT (Pushing Hubby Through) degree, with an appropriate diploma.

"That is why," added the vice president, "at Geneva we shall work together with our Allies for an honorable, peaceful settlement and against any settlement which would surrender Indochina to the Communists and destroy forever the chance of the people of the Associated States to have independence."

To the Iowa Republicans attending the \$25 per plate centennial fund-raising dinner, Nixon said the Eisenhower program was the best guarantee against a recession and told the Iowans the administration was dedicated to developing a farm program which will be in the best interests of the farmers and all Americans.

"We believe it is good for the country for the farmer to have 100 per cent of parity in the market place for the product he grows," Nixon stated.

OCD Head Asks for Highways

Fast Exits Urged Against A-Broads

By The Associated Press. The Federal Civil Defense administrator told a Lansing group Wednesday a massive series of expressways...

Val Peterson told the Michigan Civil Defense Advisory Council he plans to recommend a system of express highways...

"There is an alternative to evacuation," Peterson said. "I have three choices: to go underground, to get out or to stay and die."

"How are you going to get people out of the cities in those unquarantined, horse-and-buggy highways?" Peterson asked. He advocated an immediate national expressway construction program...

Peterson told the council that if a hydrogen bomb hit Detroit, "Detroit will be gutted."

"The one real risk," he said, "is that the most vulnerable people in our country are not protected by a program of the American people."

Predicting that if war comes, will come with a Russian attack on American territory...

"How can you have over 10 million Americans?" he asked. "How can you have 15 million Indians?" Peterson asked...

Some European nations have built immense underground shelters, Peterson said. He explained that conditions in the United States are deplorable for similar structures...

Peterson warned that if there were situations in which tanks "cannot be salvaged or repaired."

"The solution of Mr. and Mrs. Anderson," he said, "will have to be fought out by Mr. and Mrs. Anderson."

McCarthy stepped out of the subcommittee's jurisdiction for the inquiry and has given up his voting and other subcommittee privileges.
Reporting McCarthy on the subcommittee temporarily, will be Sen. Henry C. Dworshak (R-Ill.). The other Republican members are Mundt, Sen. Everett Macken, (Ill.) and Sen. Charles E. Potter (Ill.). The Democrats on the committee are Sen. McClellan (Ark.), Sen. Stuart Symington (Md.) and Sen. M. Jackson (Wash.).
McCarthy didn't, however, give up his right to cross-examine witnesses, so this same privilege will be extended to Stevens and other principals in the case. Most of them, including McCarthy, are expected to take the witness stand themselves at one time or another.

Plenty of Problems in Ann Arbor

Only Two Wolverine Regulars Return

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of articles dealing with spring football drills at each of the Big 10 schools.)

With only two starters returning from last year's Michigan team that finished seventh with a 3-3 record, the Maize and Blue is more apt to be black and blue, or just plain blue.

However, Wolverine coach Ben Osterhaan welcomed back 17 letter-winners when the spring grid drills opened last week in Ann Arbor.

But with only regulars righthalf Tony Branoff and quarterback Lou Baldacci returning, the prospects are far from bright, especially with the toughest schedules in Michigan history approaching.

The Wolves lost 14 seniors last year, 11 of whom were

linemen—including the entire starting line.

Gone also are Ted Kress, half back, and Dick Balzhiser and Bob Hurley, fullbacks.

Thus, with the problem of forging an entire line and filling two important backfield positions in Osterhaan and his aids have their work cut out for them. Candidates for the two vacant back field positions are Dan Cline, Ed Hickey, and Stan Kuekerbocker, halfbacks; and Fred Bauer, fullback.

Duncan McDonald and Ray Kenaga, will back up Baldacci at quarterback.

Both Branoff and Cline are playing baseball and are absent from football drills.

Finding a man to fill Kress' shoes presents the biggest and most important problem.

The falloff in the Wolverines' single-wing set-up is by far the key to success.

The position requires a real triple-threat and has been the object of most of Michigan's "player hunts."

To further complicate matters, Cline, Kress' chief replacement is not participating in the spring drills, which means emphasis must be placed on the development of new men.

At fullback, besides Bauer, Osterhaan has three reserve letter-winners returning. They are Earl Johnson, Perli Gagalis, and Jack Wheeler. Dave Hill, a Korean veteran who had to set out a year to gain the residence eligibility requirement, may be tried at fullback. He has experience at right half.

Branoff, who played 412 minutes last year, appears to be a fixture at right half.

With Baldacci, McDonald and Kenaga at quarterback, Michigan could not be at a loss for good signal-callers.

As if Osterhaan didn't have enough troubles in the backfield, his line presents even a greater problem.

Returning lettermen include end John Veselnak and Gerry Williams, tackles Art Walker, Bill Kolesar, Roy Geyer and Ed Meads, guards Jim Fox and

Capt. Ted Carney and centers John Morrow and John Peckham. End problems are chiefly concerned with experience since only Veselnak and Williams are back.

With Carney and Fox, both of whom were top replacements last year as a nucleus at guard, Osterhaan sees plenty of strength at this position with the backing of a pair of converted ends, John Kuchka and Dick Vorenkamp. Bob Marston and Joe Shomsky, two reserves last year, are also returning.

With the possibility of Morrow

returning to tackle, Peckham heads the list of center candidates. He saw little action last year, but developed rapidly towards the end of the season.

Jim Bates, a letterman who spent two years last year, also demands watching. After being converted to center last spring, he was named to the starting line-up in the fall opener when an injury prevented him from playing.

In the starting department, the Wolves have the 7-foot, 200-pounder center returning. Bates, 6-7, is a sophomore and has a record of 30 points on 17 goals and 10 touchdowns, while Peckham, 6-7, is a sophomore and has a record of 20 points on 10 goals and 10 touchdowns.

Matsock Leads Spartans to 9-3 Win Over Detroit

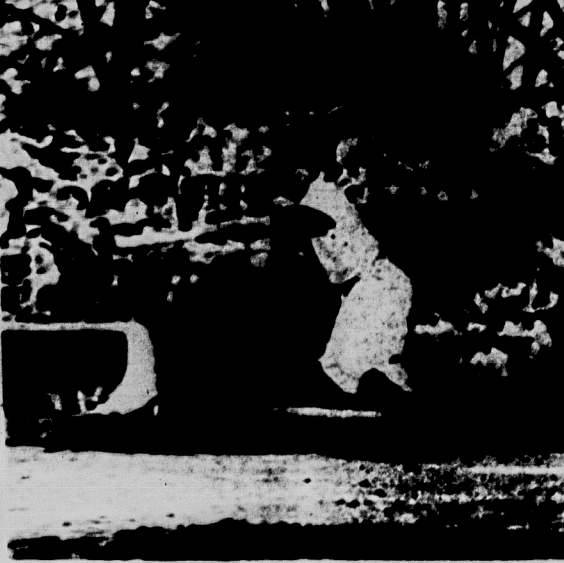
Jobs Uses Eighteen for Grand Win

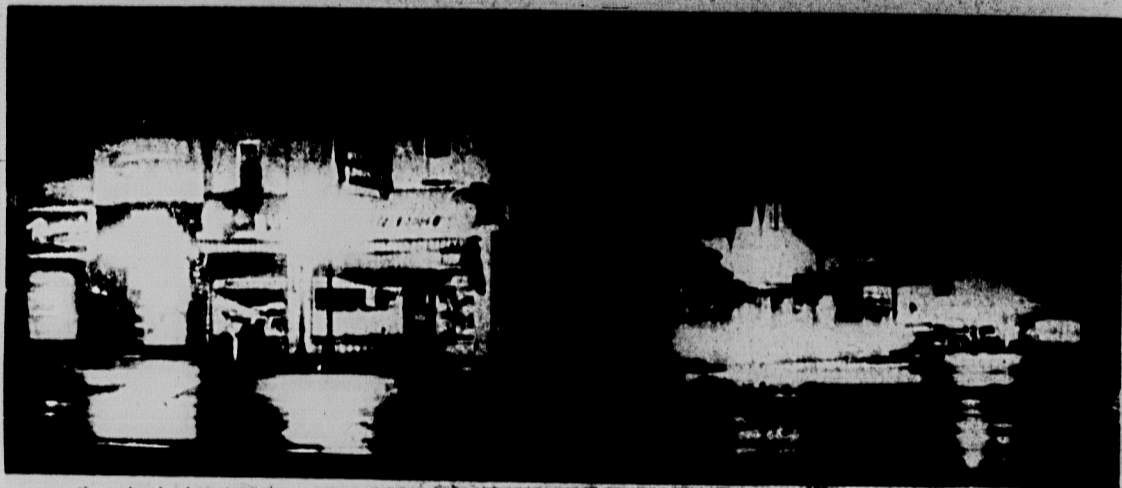

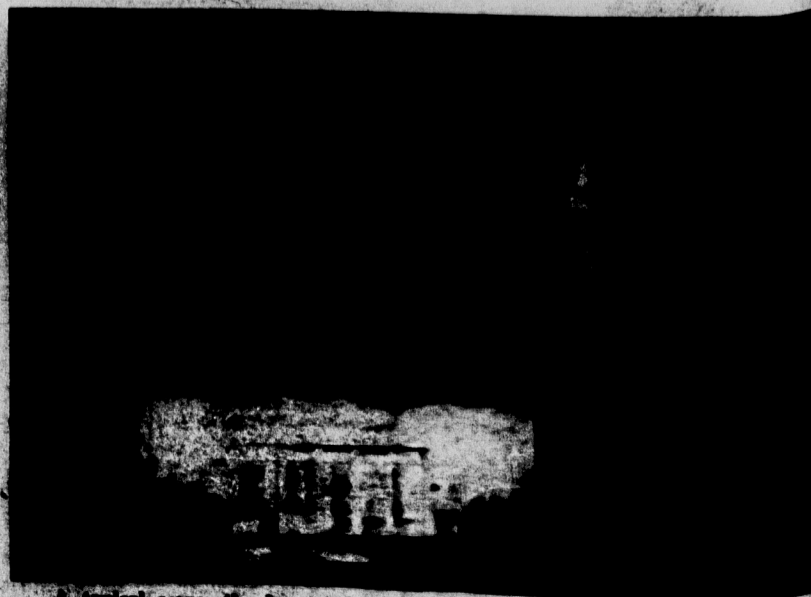
