Board to Decide On Election Rules

Illegal Campaigns to Draw Suspension for Candidates

LANSING (AP) — Ingham county was disqualified from participating in the Salk polio vaccine tests Monday, but they started on schedule in four Michigan counties.

Dr. Albert E. Heustis, state health commissioner, sought to allay fears of some parents with a special statement in which he said that the vaccine "is safe beyond any reasonable doubt."

He announced that Ingham county, due to start the test today, was disqualified under rules laid down by the National Advisory Committee of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Any county which had a case of polio within two weeks before the start of the test would be ruled out, the committee said.

Ingham authorities discovered their third case of the year which struck April 29.

The tests are scheduled to begin today in Strosch, Calhoun, Kent, Ottawa and Monroe counties and on Wednesday in Bay county.

In Lenawee county, where tests started Monday, Health Director Richard Hofstra reported "higher participation than anticipated."

Under the terms of the ordinance candidates may use posters for campaigns only on certain sidewalks near the Union and in front of Beaumont Tower or within 10 feet of those sidewalks.

Augustine said that any campaign will be held May 6. Campaign rules have been distributed to petitioners.

Final elections are scheduled for May 13, Miss Dempsey said.

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Hearings Stirred By Uproar

Important Witness Promised Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — An open hint that Secretary of the Army Stevens might have tried to "buy off" an investigation by Sen. McCarthy brought a shouted denial by McCarthy Monday that he ever has been "bought off" by anybody or ever will be.

Some spectators burst into applause. Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), who touched off the exchange, shouted back at McCarthy.

The uproar was the sharpest and noisiest to date in three days of televised public hearings in McCarthy's dispute with high Pentagon officials.

It came after Secretary Stevens, on the witness stand, acknowledged asking McCarthy to "suspend" hearings on alleged espionage at Ft. Monmouth, N. J., but branded as "an unequivocal lie" McCarthy's charge that he tried to switch the investigation to the Air Force and the Navy.

When Stevens said it was an "unequivocal lie" to represent him as trying to switch McCarthy's investigation from the Army to the other services, the Subcommittee's special counsel, Ray H. Jenkins, cocked his head and inquired:

"Your memory hasn't deserted you?"

"It certainly has not," replied Stevens with vigor.

He testified at another point that keeping racial secrets wasn't a job for Ft. Monmouth alone but one for the whole defense establishment.

McClellan, cross-examining Stevens, said the Army secretary could have granted a direct commission to McCarthy aide G. David Schine but refused to do so.

"The implication is here," said the stern-voiced McClellan, "that you were trying to buy off this committee—the Senate investigations subcommittee—from investigating the Army."

Before Stevens could reply, McClellan said:

Boat Capsizes Convict Beats Raging Seas To Save Two

Rescued were Carl Bieniewski, 26, and Frank Zugel, 45, both of White Pine.

ONTONAGON, Mich. (AP)—A 40-year-old convict battled towering waves for 40 minutes alone in a bobbing rowboat to rescue two men from Union Bay Sunday. But heavy seas tore two others from their capsized craft and drowned them.

The convict was George Cardinal, a former Great Lakes seaman, whom a dozen fellow convicts finally succeeded in launching in the rowboat after several unsuccessful attempts to get it into the rough water.

Drowned were Andrew Jackovic, 45, of nearby White Pine, and Raymond Martin, 60, of Columbus, Ohio, who had been working in newly developed copper mines at White Pine.

Rescued were Carl Bieniewski, 26, and Frank Zugel, 45, both of White Pine.

The four were en route home from opening the trout season on Carp River in the Porcupine Mountains.

Cardinal and fellow convict at the state's Porcupine Mountain Prison Camp near the waves, slip the outboard-powered boat and pull the four fishermen a quarter-mile off shore.

Fearful an attempt to take Bieniewski and Zugel aboard might upset his own small craft, Cardinal had them cling to the sides of his laboriously towed them ashore.

Ike Expresses Geneva Hope

President Eisenhower solemnly expressed hope Monday that the great powers meeting in Geneva will "see the futility of depending upon war, or the threat of war" as a means of settling international disputes.

In addressing the 42nd annual convolve of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, the President said Indochina is "the cork in the bottle" whose loss to the Communists would affect the fate of hundreds of millions "in the surrounding areas of Asia, Indonesia, Burma and Thailand."

"No matter how the struggle may have started, it has long since become one of the testing places between a free form of government and dictatorship," he said.

"Its outcome is going to have the greatest significance for us, and possibly for a long time into the future."

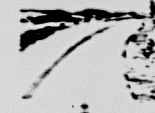

Britain Offers Aid to France

Churchill Says No Troops

GENEVA (AP)—Britain is offering France in an effort to obtain a cease fire as first step at the Geneva conference toward solving the impasse in Indochina, a source said Tuesday night. The 15-nation conference opened Tuesday but the insurgents foreshadowed the efforts to unite and pacify the country.

In Indochina, Prime Minister Churchill said Britain had refused to commit troops to fight there while the conference progresses. In the House of Commons at London, he held the hope that the conference would work out a cease fire.

A widely circulated report here that Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov and Red China's Premier Mao Tse Tung had agreed to propose a cease fire within the next few days was dismissed as untrue. A French spokesman said the conference source said he was prepared to back up French in seeking quickly a cease fire to be followed by negotiations with the communist-led north.

The position of the United States is that while a halt in fighting is desirable, it should not be at the price of a cease fire which would ultimately prove of high cost to the other powers.

French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault met Sunday at Bidault's lakeside villa and reached a measure of agreement on invitations to be issued for the coming talks in Indochina. Molotov again took part in further discussions. A French spokesman said they did not take up a cease fire at their meeting.

The situation on the South Korean's Pusan front was called for free elections in Korea under the supervision of the United Nations. The South Koreans, since the Communist domination of the atmosphere there appeared to be little likelihood that 19 elections could come to any fruition of uniting Korea. Edouard Azaña of Colombia, during the visit of N. menendez, said that N. menendez would correspond to real-ize the situation.

South Korea's Gen. Nam Il, after the South Korean, issued a formula for "free elections" which was along the lines of Soviet proposals for free elections in Germany. These have been rejected by the West on the grounds that they would pave the way for Communist domination.
