For Probation Violation College Suspends Quinlan

Bill Quinlan, Michigan State football end, told the State News Thursday he has been suspended from school for the term.

He said the official reason given by the college for his suspension was "violation of probation," and defined the violation as involvement in a fracas in front of the Sigma Kappa sorority house Monday night.

The scuffle occurred while members of Delta Chi fraternity were serenading the Sigma Kappas. Witnesses previously told the State News that a car with a noisy muffler pulled up in front of the house and interrupted the singing. Quinlan said he was in the car.

Charles McCabe, East Lansing senior, also was involved in the incident. He said he was placed on disciplinary probation by the college until his graduation in June.

Dean of Students Tom King, following a policy of the college, withheld comment on the case.

High (Duffy) Daugherty, head football coach, also declined to comment.

Quinlan, North Andover, Mass., sophomore, said he planned to apply for re-entrance for summer term. If admitted, he would be eligible to play football next fall by maintaining a 2-point scholastic average this summer.

As a member of the Big 10, MSC stipulates that athletes must maintain 2.0-point "term previous" to participating in a sport.

East Lansing police repeated Thursday that no charges have been made in the case. Sgt. Charles Wbert said that no further investigation is planned and that as far as the department is concerned the case is now a "dead end."

William Frank, Grand Haven junior who was injured in the grenade scuffle, was re-admitted for observation Thursday to Olin Memorial Health Center.

Dr. Clifford G. Menzies, director of the center, said Frank was re-admitted because he complained of headaches. His condition was reported as "good."

Second Trophy Psi U Takes Sixth Sing Win

Psi Upsilon sang its way to permanent possession of another Fraternity Sing trophy Thursday night. Directed by Bill Wedemeyer, Ann Arbor junior, the men of Psi U won their award for choral treatment of the fraternity's "Russian Picnic."

Winning the Sing trophy for the third straight year, Psi Upsilon became the only MSC fraternity to win two consecutive permanent awards. Psi Upsilon groups have taken top Sing honors for the past six years.

Second place in the annual Alpha Phi Omega-sponsored Sing was won by Sigma Chi. The runners-up sang their sweetest song and "The Halls of Ivy." Bob Rasmussen, Portland, Ore., junior, directed the Sigma Chi.

Lambda Chi Alpha, singing "Johnny Peel" and a Lambda Chi medley, was awarded third place. Walter Cronson, Pleasant Ridge junior, directed the group.

Honorable mention went to Delta Sigma Phi for its singing of "Happy Wanderer" and a Delta Sig medley. Leader of the group was Verlyn Wheat, Walled Lake junior.

Awards were made by Robb Gardner, assistant to the dean of students.

Judges of the Sing were Mrs. Lloyd R. Sholl, music teacher and former organist at Peoples Church; David Machiel, voice teacher and former director of the MSC Glee Club; and George V. Cripps, director of vocal music at Jackson High School.

Members of Alpha Phi Omega, the sponsoring group, estimated that between 2,500 and 3,000 Spartans were present at the Band Shell for the Sing.

Sixteen fraternities participated. All gathered on stage following the announcement of winners to sing "MSC Shadows," led by Wedemeyer.

Thistle To Head Seniors

Junior class presidential candidate Bob Brubaker was disqualified from the election race by the All-College Elections Board Tuesday night.

Election officers stopped tabulating votes in the subject contest as soon as the board's decision was announced.

Final tabulation gave the senior class presidency to Bill Thistle with 186 votes to Tom Payette's 165.

After an extra count, Thistle's margin of victory went to 197 votes to Howard Payne's 160. Payne has been for secretary.

John Walters, 44, East Lansing, won the senior secretaryship with 245 votes to Van Ouchterloup's 205.

George Brown, 209, East Lansing, won the senior treasurer post with 144 to Sue Baileys' 64.

Decision of the junior presidency will be held off until next week, since Brubaker will have a chance to appeal his case to the All-College Judiciary.

Brubaker was accused of campaigning with a band and a large banner in areas outside of the designated 10 feet from certain campus sidewalks Wednesday night.

The complaint was registered by Jean Watson, Douglas Arnold, James Petcher and Thomas Dandaneau, all of West Shaw.

Brubaker contended that he carried a banner or flag while the elections rules pertained only to posters. But the board interpreted the rule to apply to all forms of campaign material.

If an appeal to the all-college court is to be made, it must be registered by 8 tonight, Don Hadden, chairman of the elections board, said.

If no appeal is made, Jack Strasser will become class president.

Brubaker said Thursday night that he does intend to appeal his case. He said that one of his supporters called Janice Dempsy, elections commissioner, to check on the legality of the band which serenaded women's dorms.

President Signs Seaway Bill WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower signed the St. Lawrence Seaway bill Thursday, authorizing the United States to join Canada in digging the great new waterway.

Laniel Given Confidence Vote PARIS (AP)—The French National Assembly Thursday night gave Premier Joseph Laniel a slim vote of confidence, 289 to 287. The closeness of the vote left Laniel's prestige and position sharply reduced despite the nominal victory.

French Suffer 'Serious Losses' HANOI, Indochina (AP)—Vietminh troops Thursday hurled their heaviest attack of the year in the vital Red River Delta against French forces near Phuly, 30 miles south of Hanoi. The French said their battalions smashed the assault but suffered "serious losses."

New Anti-Red Talks Begun WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States, it was learned Thursday, is opening conversations with several South Asian countries, including India, to give them an opportunity to join a united front against Communist power.

U. S. Explodes Fifth H-Bomb WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States exploded its fourth—and perhaps its fifth—hydrogen bomb of the year during the past few days, it was reported Thursday night.

The clearly edited of the House Un-American Activities Committee has been and come as far as the Lansing area is concerned and it might be well now to take a look back at the hearings.

The results of the hearings, if any, will apparently have no effect in this vicinity since only one local resident was called and he was pretty well known before the subcommittee arrived.

But he, Richard Fox, a former MSU student, did generate a little life into the hearings when he called Clara "a damned hog." This woke up the proceedings, from the time repetition of "I decline to answer" on the grounds previously stated.

The latter was the statement heard over and over again in Lansing from many of the witnesses called before the committee.

For those who could not understand why people don't like to tell all before a Congressional committee, the spectacle of college professors refusing to answer questions such as "Do you know President Harlan Hatcher (I of M President)" was unusual to say the least.

Most of these were University of Michigan people in Lansing. Three faculty members, all of whom received stipends from the university, after the silence act on the stand, had two exceptions who presumably are going to be allowed to continue their quest for liberal education.
