## Ohio, U of M Top State Golfers Lose Two

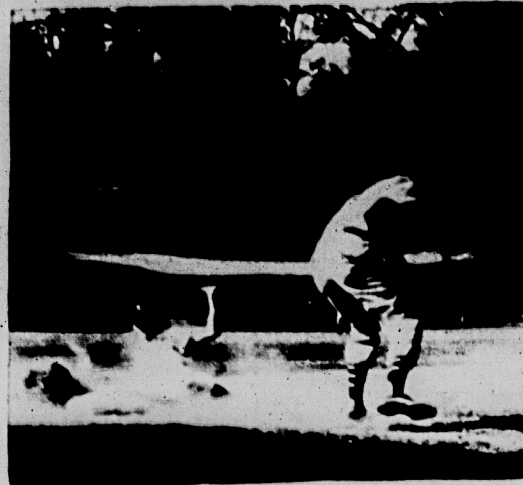
Ohio State ran off with a lopsided win Saturday in a triangular golf meet which included the University of Michigan and Michigan State at the Ann Arbor fairways.

Johnny Matsock, Spartan shortstop slides safely into third in Friday's game with the U of M. Don Eddy is the third baseman.



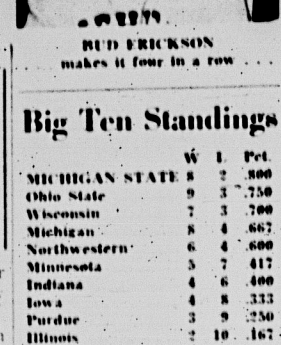
Chuck Mathews connects for a double in the fourth inning of Friday's contest. Mathews also got a single in that game.

## Spartans Win Two, Retain League Lead

This year's Big 10 baseball champion will likely be crowned Saturday, the last day of the conference season, at Old College Field.

The possibility of this rather dramatic ending appeared distinct after Michigan State's Spartans, clinging to a slim league lead with two wins in three games with Michigan, and Ohio State's Buckeyes, climbed into second place with a three-game sweep over the weekend.

Friday, the Spartans will host Indiana, while the Buckeyes take on the fourth-place Wolverines at Ann Arbor.

Rain, both days in both places, would give the Spartans the championship, since the Big 10 does not re-schedule rained-out games.

The conference leader is expected solely on won-lost percentage. Here, the Spartans have a .800 point edge, .800 to the Buckeyes' .750.

After beating the Wolverines 6-4, Friday at Old College Field, the Spartans won Saturday's game at Ann Arbor, 8-4.

Sophomore Ed Hobaugh, seven hit pitching and clutch hitting by Bob Powell, John Matsock, and Chuck Mathews, Friday, started Michigan defending NCAA and Big 10 championships, on its way out of this year's collegiate baseball picture.

In the first inning, after Matsock beat out a bunt, Hobaugh led a 250-foot homer over the centerfield fence, to give the Spartans a quick two-run lead.

Michigan State added another run in the second on four hits, then made it 6-0 with a three-run fourth.

Michigan blanked by Hobaugh for four and two thirds, scored three runs after two were out in the fifth on an error, two singles, and a triple.

Hobaugh struck out three and walked three, as he tallied his third consecutive Big 10 victory.

Michigan's Dick Peterson, southpaw, held the Spartans' only one hit, after relieving starter Jack Ritter in the fourth.

Powell, Matsock, and Mathews each collected two of the Spartans' 11 hits.

A home run put Michigan State in a winning groove again in Saturday's first game with Indiana, and Tom Yewic, on the mound with the first of his three Big 10 centerfielder Jack Risch, connected with a towering 375-foot homer that cleared the centerfield fence.

Fred Erickson, in getting his fourth conference win, gave the seven hits before being relieved by Dick Idzkowski in the sixth.

Spartan Coach John Kous put 21 players to advantage in the second game, but Michigan was not to be denied the victory.

The Wolverines jumped out with a 3-0 lead with two runs in the first and one in the third. The Spartans tied it up on Mathews' clutch double in the fifth. Michigan made it 4-3 in the half of the fifth.

Five big runs put the Spartans ahead 8-4, in the seventh. Michigan countered again in the half, scoring five runs on five hits.

Howie Tommelein, Wolverine left fielder, who had but one hit in the series, ended it all with a three-run homer over the right field fence.

## Snead's Sub-Par 65 Takes Round Robin

WESTBURY, N. Y. (AP)—Sam Snead, his confidence buoyed by a new putter, closed with a brilliant five under-par 65 Sunday to win his third Round Robin Golf Championship by a record margin.

The victory, worth \$3,000, came 16 years after the West Virginian, a raw rookie on the trail, won the inaugural tournament, in a playoff, with Gene Sarazen. Snead, also with a 65, won in 1938.

Snead had a round of 69, 72, 68, and 65 and a total of 274. He was 12 under par for the tournament.

The West Virginian picked up 10 points Sunday in the toughest foursome on the course, Middlecott and Australia's Peter Thomson shot 68's at him and Martin Furgal came home with his best round of 69.

The match with Wisconsin was the first tennis match to be televised over the college station. The announcer for the matches was Stan Probaque, former State player.

In the batch with the Badgers, State won 7-1. The No. 1 doubles match between Jim Pore and Dick Menzel of the Spartans and Jack Vincent of the Badgers was called after each team had one set due to Wisconsin's having to catch a train back to Madison.

State's only defeat was registered by Capt. Jim Pore who was defeated by the Badger Captain, Jack Vincent, 3-6, 6-2, 6-4.

Vincent was runner-up to Dribble in last year's Big 10 Championship.

The doubles team of Dick Hobaugh and Jim Beauchamp has now gone undefeated, through State's seven matches.

The netters are undefeated on their home courts. They have won three straight matches with two to go.

The Spartans carry their 3-2 record into the last busy week of the season prior to the Big 10 Championships at Champaign.

Today they meet Wayne University at home in a rematch that was regularly scheduled for April 27. Rain forced its postponement.

Wednesday the Spartans traveled to Ann Arbor for a return match against the Wolverines. Friday they play their last home match of the season, as they entertain the University of Illinois.

Tennis scores to date seem to indicate that the teams are extremely close and that the Big 10 Championship could go to almost any team having a hot streak on the three days of the tournament.

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# Ted's Hits Fail To Stop Tigers

## Detroit Wins Two From Red Sox

Boston's Ted Williams returned to regular action Sunday and smothered out eight hits in nine times at bat, in leading a pair of towering home runs in a double-header against the Detroit Tigers.

Despite his terrific hitting, the Red Sox lost both games, 2-0 and 8-5, the second decided in the 14th inning on Ray Boone's home run.

Starting in left field in both games, the 35-year-old slugger who missed the first 18 games of the season with a fractured shoulder—awed a crowd of 47,000 by pounding out five singles, a double and two home runs.

Williams scored three times and knocked in seven runs.

There was doubt that Williams, who played for the first time in an outdoor stadium, would be able to play the second game. He had said, "I should have a lot of fun which he could say."

Williams hammered his first home run with nobody up in the third inning, the ball sailing into the right field upper deck, then, in a dramatic setting in the eighth inning, he drove a two-run homer off the front of the right field roof.

Williams suffered his fractured shoulder March 13 in the first day of spring training when he fell while running for a fly ball.

One of the outstanding performances of the day was sophomore Dave Hoke's brilliant triumph in the 880 over teammate Dick Jurett. The long striding Oklahoma was timed in 1:51, while Jurett was only a couple of feet behind in 1:53.

John Cook took the mile in a goal 4:13.9 and then placed second in the two mile. Cook ran his two miles in 9:27.7 while the Spartans finished third for the Spartans.

# 'It Really Hurts'

**Williams Gets Eight Hits Despite Sore Shoulder**

DETROIT (AP)—Ted Williams said "it really hurt" when he swung the slugging leftfielder of the Boston Red Sox was a worried man when he left Briggs Stadium Sunday, despite thrilling a crowd of 42,967 with a great display of hitting.

The 35-year-old outfielder, playing full time after undergoing a shoulder fracture, pounded out eight hits in nine times at bat and lifted his batting average to .277.

Williams had played in Baltimore Saturday, going hitless in two at bats.

After Saturday's game, Williams said he wasn't sure whether he would play in Detroit. But when the weather turned today with temperatures in the mid-50s, he decided to give it a try.

But despite his gutsy hitting, his shoulder pained him. A slender stainless steel pin holds the fracture in place and Williams said it really hurt when he swung.

Just before hitting his second home run in the second game, Williams swung and missed at a pitch from Tiger hurler Ray Herbert.

"It was that twing that really hurt," Williams said. "I'm going to decide in the next three days whether to have the pin taken out or not."

"He said it was the fan craze in Detroit which accounted for his sleepless night of the night."

Williams said the doctors want to leave the pin in his shoulder for a year to help the fracture knit together.

"But if it hurts like this, it'll never do, he said. "I'll play tomorrow if it doesn't hurt too much."

Classes will not be held Monday, May 31, according to the Student Union registrar.

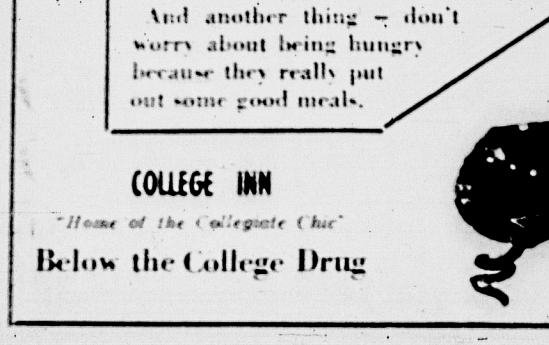
