### Committee Wants Study Of Finances

Abundance of Aid Ripped by Senator

A legislative committee Tuesday opposed the idea that the state should provide a free college education to any one who wants it.

The current tuition rates at Michigan universities and col-leges should be raised, said the Interim Committee on Higher Education in preliminary drafts endations for the 1955

"A free college education for everyone regardless of ability to pay" should not be recom-mended by the interim group,

But, added Coleman, a member of the 1953-54 Senate's appropritions committee, inability to pay of colleges and universities

public education through the

Using college classrooms in two shifts was one suggestion by the committee, which urged Michi-gan schools to make better use

The committee recommended of appropriating the money for auditoriums and physical educa-tion gymnasiums.

Seeking ways to meet an ex-pected influx of college stu-dents at state institutions, the interim group also touched on ways to teach the students at-home,

Presidents of Michigan univer-sities and colleges were asked to report on the chances of granting a year of college credit by off-campus television, radio and

off-campus television, the committee extension courses.

Expanding Michigan's four teacher-training institutions to general liberal arts colleges would make room for another 10,000 students, the committee

The four schools are Wes-tern Michigan at Kalamason, Central Michigan at Mt. Pleaount, Northern Michigan a Marquette and Michigan Nor mal at Ypallanti,

Legislation allowing local governmental units to pool resources to support a junior or community college was also proposed by the

Committee.

Under the proposal, a local unit would contribute taxes to a neighboring school district which provides a school serving youths of the entire area.

### Title Roles Praised In 'Rigoletto' Opera

A jester who had no chance to be funny received an ova-tion for his tautly drawn tragedy from the capacity audience that filled the Auditorium to see the opera Tuesday night.

Baritone Cornell MacNeil sang Children The opera gives jester Rigoletto an ironic situation: that of a father whose plans for a beloved daughter, Gilda, go far astray, fi-

nally ending in her death because of his unwitting plot. In an opera where frony runs as a steel thread threughout, the New York City Opera Company's easting added even more frony. For over a half-century Eigoletto has been a "tener opera," its tener arise made famous by Enrice Caruso.

Yet in Tuesday night's performly constructed chain of artists. Petrak, even in the vigorous "Donna e Mobile" of the last act, seemed to lack the ability to car-

Eva Likova as Gilda was a Eva Likova as Gilda was a touching and tragic heroine. Her coloratura voice was particularly stunning in the aria "Caro Nome Che II Mio Cor" in the second act. Miss Likova had the added advantage of looking the youthful part she enacted.







Ohio State, ruler of the Big Ten, heads The Associated Press weekly football poll Tuesday for the second straight

If the Buckeyes can remain No. 1 in the final poll next week, they'll become the mythical natthey'll become the mythical national champions for the second Calls Clinic time since The AP rankings were inaugurated in 1936.

On the basis of 10 points for first, nine for second and on down, Ohio State rolled up 2,250 points, just 97 more than for UCLA, champions of the Pacific Coast Conference,

UCLA received 85 first place rotes and 2,162 points.

A week ago Coach Woodrow Hayes' Bucks topped the Uclans by the slim margin of only 7

It was discovered that the scoreboard clock, which set up for the old 10 minute quarters, would have to be changed to al-low for the new 20 minute hal-



The latest accident happened while Szypula was doing some very complicated and difficult tricks for the benefit of a photograher taking photos for a new book authored by Szypula on the art of






