## Reds Jail American Airmen

### Chinese Charge 13 With Spying

LONDON (AP) — Thirteen Americans who dropped out of sight on aerial missions against the Communists in the Korean War were sentenced by a Red Chinese military court Tuesday to prison terms ranging up to life on spy charges, the Peiping radio announced.

The U. S. State Department quickly ordered its consul general in Switzerland—only point of diplomatic contact between the United States and Red China—to lodge "the strongest possible protest" against the sentences.

A spokesman in Washington said the Communists charged the "trumped up" and "unsubstantiated" spy charges. The Defense Department issued a statement saying the Red accusations were "unsubstantiated."

Contact with Peiping was cut off in Geneva during the Far East conference last spring.

Nine Chinese, called "former officers of the Chiang Kai-shek gang," also were sentenced to death, four to life imprisonment and one to 15 years' imprisonment on a charge of jeopardizing Red China's security.

Col. John Edgar Smith Jr. of Silver Spring, Md., was the highest ranking of the prisoners listed in broadcasts by the spokesman of Mao Tse-tung's Red government. The commander of a B-29 shot down Jan. 31, 1953, he drew 10 years.

The second in command of the B-29, Maj. William H. Baumer, 32, of Lewisburg, Pa., was sentenced to eight years. And nine others of the crew—Peiping said three died in the 1953 crash—were given terms ranging from four to six years.

Heavier sentences fell on two young New Englanders who the Chinese declared were captured Nov. 29, 1952, while dropping supplies to "American espionage agents in northeast China."

John Thomas Downey, 24, of New Britain, Conn., a cousin of the nationally known singer Morton Downey, was sentenced to life imprisonment, and Richard George Poston, 27, of Lynn, Mass., a former Boston University football player, got 20 years.

Chinese defense counsel was reported provided for the Americans in the hearing before the military branch of the Supreme People's Court. Details of the trial, including the location, were lacking.

The 11 men captured with the B-29 are among 18 long missing American airmen who Washington announced Aug. 29 were known to be alive in Red China.

## Committee Wants Study Of Finances

### Abundance of Aid Ripped by Senator

A legislative committee Tuesday opposed the idea that the state should provide a free college education to any one who wants it.

The current tuition rates at Michigan universities and colleges should be raised, said the Interim Committee on Higher Education in preliminary drafts of recommendations for the 1955 Legislature.

"A free college education for everyone regardless of ability to pay" should not be recommended by the interim group, Sen. Creighton K. Coleman (R-Battle Creek) told the committee.

But, added Coleman, a member of the 1953-54 Senate's appropriations committee, inability to pay for higher education shouldn't be the basis for keeping people out of colleges and universities.

The committee's decision was an endorsement of a recent widely-publicized statement that free public education through the college level tended toward socialism.

The statement was made by the Rev. Fr. Celestin J. Steiner, president of the University of Detroit.

Using college classrooms in two shifts was one suggestion by the committee, which urged Michigan schools to make better use of their facilities.

The committee recommended the legislature build more classrooms with state funds, instead of appropriating the money for auditoriums and physical education gymnasiums.

Seeking ways to meet an expected influx of college students at state institutions, the interim group also touched on ways to teach the students at home.

Presidents of Michigan universities and colleges were asked to report on the chances of granting a year of college credit by off-campus television, radio and extension courses.

Expanding Michigan's four teacher-training institutions to general liberal arts colleges would make room for another 10,000 students, the committee said.

The four schools are Western Michigan at Kalamazoo, Central Michigan at Mt. Pleasant, Northern Michigan at Marquette and Michigan Normal at Ypsilanti.

Legislation allowing local governmental units to pool resources to support a junior or community college was also proposed by the committee.

Under the proposal, a local unit would contribute taxes to a neighboring school district which provides a school serving youths of the entire area.

But general financial aid by the state for the junior colleges was frowned on by the committee. But it said it would support contribution to the "higher educational features of such institutions.

The committee also recommended that Ferris Institute at Big Rapids be expanded to meet any needs. But the institute's basic character as an "opportunity" school should not be changed, the committee said.

Many would say that we should be thankful for our prosperity and our high standard of living—an abundance of food, clothing, shelter, transportation, material necessities and luxuries. Others mention our good government, and our freedom from insecurity and want.

These things are good reasons for our gratitude. They are American reasons for an American day of happiness, security and peace.

Many Americans Thursday will be stating their thanks for these things. But too many of them will be just saying common, nice-sounding phrases. They won't really be thinking about their blessings.

A thought of the thousands starving in Korea or the homeless in war-torn Indochina might make Americans appreciate their warm houses and stuffed turkeys, their free government and economic security, a little bit more.

Then they'd know the real meaning of Thanksgiving.

Interpreting the News Andrei Vishinsky-- A Man Out of Place

You could never listen to Andrei Vishinsky under any circumstances without wondering what was actually going on in the mind behind the words.

Vishinsky was an educated man. Yet he parroted some of the most unintelligible drivel at times.

When questioning became too pointed, however, he was inclined to resort to angry personalities. I have seen him break up a news conference in red-faced confusion when pressed too hard by reporters.

He did his best to conceal the fact that, even as deputy foreign minister and chief of the Russian delegation to the United Nations, he could not comment on even the most innocuous news matter without consulting the Kremlin. (He was not, of course, the only delegate who had such trouble.)

He was one of Russia's greatest lawyers, both in knowledge of law, on which he wrote probably that nation's most famous book, and adroitness of procedure.

He conducted some of the most notorious purge trials before the war, yet concealed their true nature for a long time even from experienced foreign observers.

He was not one of the old revolutionaries. In fact, he was almost caught off base politically when Stalin came to full power. But he managed to catch the bandwagon and never let go, although he appeared to be skating on thin ice at times.

All of this points to very high intelligence, regardless of what you may think of the character that went with it. He was thoroughly capable of absorbing what he saw and thinking things out in his own mind.

He lived here too long to doubt the nation's will for peace. But he was required, to protect his job and perhaps his life, to testify against all these things despite his obvious personal understanding.

He must have lived a very unhappy life.

## Football Ratings Remain Unchanged

Ohio State, ruler of the Big Ten, heads The Associated Press weekly football poll Tuesday for the second straight week.

If the Buckeyes can remain No. 1 in the final poll next week, they'll become the mythical national champions for the second time since the AP rankings were inaugurated in 1936.

On the basis of 10 points for first, nine for second and one for third, Ohio State rolled up 2,350 points, just 97 more than for UCLA, champions of the Pacific Coast Conference.

UCLA received 85 first place votes and 2,162 points.

A week ago Coach Woodrow Hayes' Bucks topped the Uclans by the slim margin of only 7 points.

A third major undefeated and untied team, Oklahoma, drew the No. 3 spot with 21 first place ballots and 1,953 points.

The only other Ohio State team to be voted No. 1 at season end was the Buckeyes of 1942, during the dynasty of Paul Brown, who moved on to establish the mighty Cleveland Browns of professional football.
