An anonymous phone call to The State News Thursday said the statue would show up Saturday night.

Campus police said Sunday they have no information regarding Paul's whereabouts.

## Group to Pick Candidate for Big 10 Contest

### MSC to Seek Third Straight Win

MSC's Blue Key chapter will be shooting for a third straight selection of a Miss Big 10 on Sunday.

They'll select a Miss Michigan State at a meeting Sunday with queens of the past year's all-college events.

In both previous Big 10 contests, MSC coeds have been chosen for the top honors—Jan Somers in 1954 and Dee Means in 1953.

Under the honorary fraternity's bylaws, candidates for the campus "queen of queens" honor must meet one of two criteria.

They must be crowned at an all-college event after being named through nominations open to all coeds' living units.

Or they must represent one of the men's living unit associations: InterDorm Council, InterFraternity Council or the men's Inter-Coop Council.

The Big 10 queen will be announced Feb. 5, during the inauguration of MSC's J-Hop. The two previous contests were held at Northwestern.

Finalists in the MSC contest are: Joyce Cosmann, Jackson sophomore, Homecoming Queen; Judy Bradley, Pontiac sophomore, Harvest Ball Queen; Jeanne Warrington, Bethesda, Md., sophomore, Air Force Honorary Colonel; Della Daniels, Murphysboro, Ill., senior, Porpoise Queen; and Amy Kuipke, Charlevoix sophomore, Co-op Queen.

The Army's honorary colonel, Miss Somers, is not eligible because contest rules bar previous winners from entering.

## Ordinance Fight Denied By Hurst

### Calls 'Anti-Bias' Rule Unworkable

Student Government President Bill Hurst denied Sunday there was any "five-year-old battle" raging in the Student Congress over the so-called "discrimination ordinance," as was reported Friday.

Hurst said he proposed at the last meeting of Congress the controversial ordinance be changed because "parts of it are completely unworkable and other parts are unconstitutional."

He recommended the ordinance be amended or revised "for next year's president will face an almost impossible task."

The controversial ordinance, passed by the Student Congress in 1951, states in part "All campus organizations and living units which have national and or local constitutional structures which contain discriminatory clauses which limit or prohibit membership because of race or religion, must eliminate such clauses by Oct. 15, 1956 as a condition of recognition by MSC."

The ruling did not apply to religious groups. It was aimed chiefly at fraternities and sororities, and these groups were given five years to have their national constitutions revised to comply with the MSC ruling.

Hurst said the ordinance as it now stands is unenforceable, and should be changed. He said the student government does not have the constitutional power to revoke fraternity or sorority charters.

Hurst has scheduled a meeting Tuesday with Interfraternity Council president Curt Leckler and Phi Kappa Psi president Judy Strong to discuss the matter.

Leckler was not available last night for comment. Miss Strong said she would not make any statement concerning the proposal until she had a chance to look into it more thoroughly.



## Costa Rican Fighting Breaks Out Again

### Possible Decisive Battle Expected Within 24 Hours

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP)—Fighting broke out again Sunday between government forces and rebels near Santa Rosa in northwestern Costa Rica, where the possibility of a decisive battle within the next 24 hours was shaping up.

The renewed fighting in the northwest, only front in the five-day old revolt, came less than 24 hours after government forces, estimated unofficially at about 1,000, had claimed victory in a major skirmish.

President Jose Figueres, an old-time fighter in Costa Rica's wars, was under rebel bombardment Saturday night and again Sunday in the war area near Liberia, about 20 miles southeast of Santa Rosa. Reports from the front said the President had to seek cover quickly when two dud shells nearby.

A communique said three persons were killed, Oscar Calderon, correspondent for the San Jose newspaper La Prensa Libre, and two soldiers.

Six foreign correspondents covering the fighting in Costa Rica returned safely to government units after failing to return to a base in Liberia last night, the U. S. ambassador said.

## Slim Majority Favors Spring Term Banquet

### Senior Vote Split On New Activity

A hair-line majority favoring a senior banquet for spring term was announced Sunday by Bill Thistle. But further approval is still needed.

Ballots handed out during winter term registration drew 1,355 senior votes, with 690 favoring a banquet and 665 opposing it.

Thistle said the Senior Council will meet Tuesday to decide whether or not to go through with the banquet.

Tentatively scheduled for Senior Week, the banquet would be held in Kellogg Center in the midst of many other senior activities.

Thistle said that the banquet would cost about \$2.50 per person instead of the \$1.25 quoted on the ballot. He called the lower figure an "understatement."

Passing by a convincing majority on the same ballot was a proposal to initiate a "Great Issues of the Day" course for seniors during spring term.

Of the 1,376 voting, 989 favored the course with 381 in opposition.

Final council approval on the course is almost certain, Thistle predicted.

The "Great Issues" course would be offered for one credit and would be held one hour each week.

## Spartans Tied for 4th Place

### Peterson to Resume Duel With Schlundt

With their most enjoyable win of the year behind them, Michigan State's basketball team is in Bloomington to tangle with the Hoosiers of Indiana tonight at 8:30.

The Spartans will be trying to break a seven-year losing streak at the hands of the Hoosiers.

Indiana has beaten the Spartans 11 times in 12 meetings, the lone MSC win coming seven long years ago.

Although they still have All-American center Don Schlundt, the Hoosiers have been having their troubles. They have a poor 3-11 mark and are residing in the Big 10 cellar with a 1-3 mark.

The Spartans vaulted into a tie for fourth place with Michigan and Northwestern following their 84-82 win over the Wolverines Saturday.

re at the forward spots, Schlundt at center and Burke Scott and Charley Hodson at the guard slots.

Spartan fans will remember Scott as the Hoosier who sank a jump shot with three seconds left, to beat MSC, 63-61, last year at Jensen Fieldhouse.

Schlundt continues to rank among the leading scorers in the conference but he isn't getting the help from his teammates that he got last year.

The Hoosiers are also weak in the rebounding department. They have a relatively short team, with Schlundt the only man over 6'5" among its regulars.

The game will probably develop into a continuation of the Schlundt-Duane Peterson rivalry that has marked their high school and college careers.

Peterson, the Spartan's high scoring center, bested Schlundt in an Indiana high school championship game and twice last year made the big Hoosier center look bad.

In last year's close loss at home, Peterson scored 15 points while holding Schlundt to well under his normal scoring pace.

Peterson was one of the stars of Saturday's win over Michigan, coming off the bench to score 24 points.

It was the third straight game that the Elkhart junior didn't start but scored more than 15 points.

The Spartans fell behind 8-0 at the start of the game, and it took them until halfway through the last half to go ahead.

After they got a small lead, the lead changed hands four times before the Spartans scored eight straight points to gain a seven point lead.

They then squashed a Wolverine rally by throwing up an impenetrable freeze for the whole last minute.

Al Ferrari was the night's high scorer with 27 points, followed by Peterson's 24.

## Spartan Forfeit Proves Costly Hoosiers Edge Matmen, 14-12

Winning four out of the five wrestled matches wasn't enough for Coach Fendley Collins' matmen, as they bowed to Indiana Friday night, 14-12.

The five points lost by forfeiture of the heavyweight division, due to an injury to Brian Harrison, provided Indiana with their margin of victory.

Leading the Spartan grapplers was Bob Gunner, who capped his second victory in as many starts in the 150-pound division. Gunner, who is improving with every match, had too many holds for the Hoosier's Robert Burns.

Don Phillips settled an old score with the Hoosier's Manuel Pihakis in the evening's opening encounter. Pihakis last year held Phillips to a draw and almost repeated his earlier feat.

The margin of victory came when Phillips was awarded the point for "riding time", to give him a 2-1 decision.

Looking impressive in his first intercollegiate competition, Bob Richardson, Spartan 137-

pounder lost to Indiana's undefeated star, Howard Fisher.

Richardson escaped several times from the bottom position, to gain his points, but was unable to hang onto the elusive and more experienced Fisher.

In the 147-pound class, Jim Sinadinos, Spartan ace who last year was runner-up in the Big 10 meet, showed signs of having regained his old form in trouncing Jo Badell, 12-6.

Sinadinos, trying desperately to pin Badell, came close but could not hold the powerful Hoosier to the mat long enough.

The most exciting dual of the evening was provided by State's Norm Gill and Indiana's Jim Bose in the 157-pound division. Gill put on a display of strategic wrestling in conquering the more experienced Bose, 3-2.

Going into the final minute on

the short end of a 3-2 score, Ted Lennox tried desperately to apply the take down to Indiana's 107-pound ace, Jerry Grummell.

The Hoosier had other ideas however and warded off Lennox's aggressive tactics to take the decision.

Indiana's undefeated 177-pound powerhouse, Dick Anthony, put another notch in his wrestling belt, when he decisively Dick Abraham to put the finishing touch to the Hoosier triumph.

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Atom Experts To Plan World Peace Agency

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Scientists from eight countries assembled here Sunday for a series of conferences to help set up a world congress for peace.

Ranking U.S., British and Soviet scientists were in the group, whose job is to advise U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold where and when the Congress should be held, what countries should be invited to send scientists, and what they should discuss.

The Congress is authorized by the unanimous General Assembly resolution adopted in December which also endorsed President Eisenhower's atom-for-peace plan first advanced here Dec. 8, 1953.

The United States and seven other countries are proceeding separately to set up an international peace-atom agency and the United States is also negotiating separately with the Soviet Union to join. The seven countries are Australia, Belgium, Canada, France, South Africa, Britain and Portugal.

Dr. Isidor I. Rabi, who helped build the first U.S. atom bomb and is now an advisor of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission, is the U.S. delegate to the closed sessions with Hammarskjold, who will make all final decisions about the Congress.

Rabi said he met briefly Saturday for the first time Dmitri V. Skobeltsyn, considered Russia's top atom expert.

Senate May Tighten Floor Debate Rules

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate rules, which Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) was accused of violating twice during floor debate last Friday, may be in for a little tougher enforcement.

Although there was no evidence of concerted action, several senators said they will back up the public assertion of Sen. Kuchel (R-Calif.) that he, for one, intends to see to it that "debate is conducted in accordance with the rules of decency."

Sen. Knowland of California, the Republican leader, said he expects stricter enforcement of the rules, and Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.) said he does too. Sen. Mundt (R-SD.), who voted with Knowland against condemning McCarthy last Dec. 2 for unbecoming conduct, said he hopes the rules will be applied impartially.

In the past, the Senate has not often enforced its Rule 19 which says that in debate no member shall "directly or indirectly, by any form of words impute to another senator or to other senators any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming to a senator."

Sen. Long (D-La.), presiding in the absence of Vice President Nixon Friday, ordered McCarthy to take his seat when Long said the Wisconsin senator had implied "insincerity" on the part of colleagues who signed an anti-Communist resolution, and again when McCarthy said they were trying "to remove the stench from their hands and the mud from their skirts."
