YWCA Celebrates 100th Anniversary

Another centennial celebration is tabbed for 1955 in addition to MSC's Centennial.

The Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) is commemorating 100 years of activity among women throughout the United States. YWCA membership boasts of 3,000,000 young women, and a program that includes education and recreation classes.

Founded in 1855 in London, England, by a group of women who wished to pray for "women everywhere—working girls and princesses"—it now offers a wide expanse of activities from personal counseling to gymnastic train-

On campus the YWCA works in conjunction with the YMCA in offering to students a permanent meeting place

MSC first organized the YWCA in 1896 and arranged a meeting place in People's Church. Later the expanding group moved to 315 Evergreen.

In 1953 the YW joined forces with the YM and bought their own house at 314 Evergreen. The Building Fund Drive conducted in the past two years has succeeded in clearing half of the building's cost.

With an active membership of 100 students the YW and the YM served over 5,000 students last year. Programs of study groups and open houses have proved to be a readily-accepted pastime for college students.

The biggest event of the year for the College Y is the United Nations trip in the spring. Students travel to New York for a week to view the procedure of this international body and engage in some active sightseeing.

With an account of 59 years at MSC, this century-old organization has grown to tremendous magnitude. Women all over the nation will unite to observe this anniversary. In February, MSC coeds will join this celebration to honor an organization that has helped make college life fuller.
