GM Presents Aid Plan to U.S. Schools

MSC and fifteen other Michigan colleges will share in a financial aid plan announced Tuesday by General Motors.

Harlow H. Curtice, G.M. president disclosed that the company has started a new two million dollar annual program of four-year scholarships to students and grants to 306 colleges and universities throughout the country.

In September, 350 students are expected to begin the new program. Eventually, 1,400 of the nation's students will be assisted annually.

Funds will be allotted on a college plan, national plan, and foundation plan.

Publisher To Run for Ag Board

Fale Stafford, publisher of the Greenville Daily News, Wednesday said he will be a candidate for the Republican nomination for the State Board of Agriculture.

Stafford, a native of St. Louis, Mich., is an MSC graduate and as a student in 1926 was the college's first athletic publicity director.

He served for three terms as the alumni member of the MSC Athletic Board, completing his last term in 1954.

Prior to purchasing the Greenville newspaper in 1951, Stafford was managing editor of the Detroit Free Press.

He has held numerous newspaper posts, including chairman-ship of the Michigan Associated Press and represented the Michigan Press Association in negotiations with the State Board of Agriculture to open its meetings to newsmen.

He favors continuation of the open meeting policy, of course, he said.

Saturday's ticket sales are lagging behind, with only about 300 gone so far. 1,500 tickets were available for each night.

Wednesday's sales were limited to juniors, but today tickets will be sold to any student.

Don Stewart, co-chairman of the dance, said the tickets for this year's Hop have been designed so that only a small portion of each will be destroyed at the door.

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Urges UN Intervene for Cease-Fire

Hammaraskjold, Dulles Confer

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP)—Fresh Chinese Red troops landed today on Yikiangshan Island after a heavy Communist shelling and the Nationalist Defense Ministry said fighting had reached the "life or death" stage.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower proposed Wednesday that the United Nations "take a look" at the possibility of halting the shooting between Nationalist and Communist Chinese.

At the same time, Eisenhower discounted at a news conference the military importance of Yikiangshan, the little island which apparently has fallen to the Chinese Reds.

The President said he can't force "what is going to be the development there," so "I won't try to speculate on exactly what we should do in that area."

But he did say he knows of no military authority who has tried to take the islands under assault as an essential part of the defenses of Formosa and of the Pescadores, which the United States is committed to defend under a treaty with the Chinese Nationalists now awaiting Senate ratification.

The cease-fire talk seemed to leave a sour taste in the mouths of Chinese Nationalists—and of Senate Republican Leader Knowland of California, advocate of stronger measures against the Red Chinese.

The Chinese Nationalist minister, George Yeh, emerged in seeming anger from a conference with Secretary Dulles. He said he was going back to Formosa "where I belong."

At the Capitol, Knowland had no direct comment on Eisenhower's call for a U.S. cease-fire attempt but he said:

"On Nov. 15 of last year, I pointed out the danger of a co-existence policy which might lead the Communist world into open nibbling. The first nibble has taken place, small though it may be, and a series of small nibbles, will amount to a big bite."

Eisenhower and his chief lieutenant in the Senate also were at odds on what the senator contends is the failure of efforts of U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold to obtain the release of American fliers held as "spies" by the Chinese Reds.

President Eisenhower discussed the situation at a news conference and Secretary of State Dulles met for 90 minutes with U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold at the State Department.

Dulles told Hammarskjold there is a strong sentiment in this country for "direct action" to obtain release of the fliers but that "for the time being" President Eisenhower will leave the handling of the case up to the United Nations.

Eisenhower, who had breakfasted with Senate Republican Leader Knowland for a discussion of the Red China problem, made clear to reporters that he disagreed with Knowland's estimates that Hammarskjold's mission to Peking earlier this month had proved a failure.

# Rintz to Perform With Swedes

Carl Rintz, captain of the State gymnastic team, has been chosen to participate with the Swedish Men's and Women's Olympic Gymnastic Team in their appearance here Wednesday.

Rintz will perform in an apparatus exhibition with the Swedish team on the parallel bars and the high bar.

Among the Swedish stars will be Ann-Sofi Pettersson, who, at 23, ranks as the most successful Swedish woman gymnast.

She won the world's flying rings championship in 1930, and the 1934 horse vaulting championship.

One of Sweden's flashiest gymnasts is 20 year old Evy Berggren. She finished second in the all-around championship and third in horse vaulting at the 1934 World's Championships.

Anders Lindh, the best Swedish gymnast of all times, has the ability to make the most simple routines look fascinating. The 24 year old Swede became a member of the Swedish national team at the age of 16 and made the Olympic team in 1922.

The Swedes will also exhibit Staffan Carlsson, a terrific tumbler with the highest back layout in all Europe, and beautiful woman gymnast, Vanja Blomberg.

Other Olympic Team members include Hjordis Nordin, Arne Carlsson, Arne Lind, Kurt Wigartz, who is probably the best all-around performer in Sweden, and Karin Lindberg, the Olympic gold medal winner.

It was also learned that Jean Cronstedt, the National Collegiate all-around champion from Penn State is touring with the Swedes. Cronstedt is a pre-med student in Stockholm, Sweden at present.

The Swedish tour, which began January 7, and lasts through March 4, includes 32 engagements in the eastern half of the United States.

During the tour the Swedes will perform at Madison Square Garden, West Point Military Academy, Penn State, University of Pittsburgh, Ohio State, Notre Dame, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Southern Methodist, LSU, Miss. Southern, Florida State, Auburn, Georgia Tech, and North Carolina.

Tickets for the performance Wednesday may be purchased through the Jensen ticket office. Student tickets are 50 cents, \$1.00 for the general public.

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## Indiana Senate Considers TV Sports Laws

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Purdue and Indiana universities and the two state-supported teachers colleges would be required to make their sports events available for commercial television under a resolution introduced in the state Senate Wednesday.

The resolution, put in by Sen. Howard Steele (R-Knox), requires approval of both Senate and House. If passed, it would force Purdue and I.U. to withdraw from NCAA agreements limiting the televising of football games.

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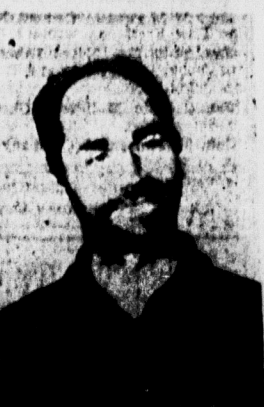

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# U of M Student Gets Complicity Sentence

## Egyptian Charge May Mean Concentration Camp

ANN ARBOR (AP)—A spectacled, young-looking Egyptian electrical engineer blinked with surprise Wednesday when he heard he had been sentenced for complicity against the Egyptian government.

Mohammed El-Moslimany, a graduate student at the University of Michigan, said, "It is unjust—unjust surely—to have a sentence without being heard."

Moslimany was sentenced to 18 years by an Egyptian military court which then suspended the sentence. He was convicted of complicity in a Muslim brotherhood attempt to overthrow the military government of Premier Naguib Nassir.

It was all news to Moslimany. He said he had received a telegram in Ann Arbor Jan. 12 telling him to return to Egypt for trial Jan. 18. He said the telegram did not tell him why.

Moslimany has on a student's visa to earn his doctor of philosophy in electrical engineering. He was a teaching fellow at the University of Alexandria. He said he came to the University of Michigan last fall to earn the degree that would allow him to become an instructor in Egypt.

New Moslimany doubts whether he will return. "I don't know," he said. "I haven't any full details about what's happening there."

Moslimany said it's a military government over there. There is no law.

Moslimany, whose parents and finances are still in Egypt, said that he hopes to return some day, adding, "I hope that the situation will be changed—at least so far as the Muslim brotherhood is concerned."

He admitted he belonged to the Muslim brotherhood for five years, ending his association six months before coming to the United States. He said, "people think we are fanatics. This is not true. There are very very few who are fanatics. The Muslim brotherhood gives their opinion plainly in every day politics. This, I believe, is their right."

As to his sentence, Moslimany asked, "What is complicity?" I was over here.

Moslimany said that a suspended sentence often means a concentration camp. He said he doesn't think the Egyptian government will release his passport, calling him home because he is out of the way in the United States.

His students visa, he said, will be good for four more years, so long as he continues his studies and his passport remains valid.

To get their names on the election ticket, candidates must have the signatures of 25 qualified voters from the district which they wish to represent in Congress. The petitions must be circulated by the candidates in person.

Deadline for the petitions to be mailed or turned in to the government office is 5 p.m., Jan. 27. At least two candidates must run for each post in the election. If only one petition is entered from a district, the petitioner is automatically elected.
