Frenchmen Interviewed In Film Series

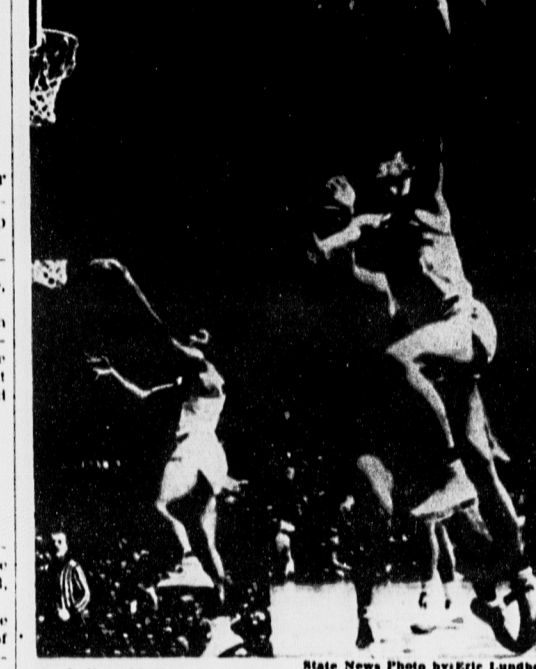

As Seen in 'Life'

Photo Exhibit Depicts Late Middle Ages

Two shows for the price of one walk over to the South Campus Art Building, A-7, opened to students this week. Both are photographic exhibitions reaching into man's past—one to the Roman Empire for the history of "The Roman Letter" and one to "The Medieval World."

Late magazine editors prepared the photographs of medieval life in the exhibition for a two-part pictorial essay in their April 7 and May 26, 1947, issues.

Now circulated by the American Federation of Arts, the exhibition contains many pictures left out of the published essay for lack of space.

Pictures of the world-famous Cathedral at Chartres and other medieval churches help to show the effects of the church, the town and the castle in the medieval man's daily life.

Panel depicts town life during the late Middle Ages. Finally, the feudal world around the lord's castle is shown in tapestries and scenes of the Crusades.

"The Roman Letter" carries the western alphabet to the middle of the medieval world. Starting with the Latin adaptation of the Greek alphabet, the panels trace the classic Roman Capital until it is fixed in type at the end of the fifteenth century.

Both exhibitions will be open during office hours at A7 until Feb. 3.

Foreign Students Compare No Drive-Ins in Norway

Blind dates, Bermuda shorts, and drive-in movies amazed Otto Grundtvig when he came to America from Norway this year. Otto came to MSC from Trondheim, Norway, to finish his major, mechanical engineering, after finding out about the courses at Michigan State through a friend. "We don't have any drive-in movies or restaurants back home, and not too many of the girls go to college," he said while discussing American dating customs. A liking for jazz and social dancing is just as evident in Norway as it is in the United States, according to Otto. For those students suffering through basics, the college system Otto left behind him in Trondheim might hold special appeal. Basic colleges do not exist in Norwegian schools. There's one catch, however, which is a five-year high school set-up. All such basic courses are taken care of before college, and then more specialized courses are offered for particular fields of study. Otto has little trouble speaking English. He studied it in high school for five years. But in Finland the college programs are quite similar to ours. Lea Kurki, a graduate student in horticulture who came to MSC from Helsinki, says basic courses are given according to students' majors. Pleased with America, Lea commented on how informal and helpful the students and teachers were, adding "in Finland we are more conservative." As for fashion and dating habits, there seems to be just a few differences. Bermuda shorts are accepted by both boys and girls, but no jewelry is worn and the clothes are not as colorful as those in America, Lea says.

Increases Fall Term Fees by \$5

\$2 Million Addition Planned for Olin

An additional five dollars will be needed by students when paying fees at registration in September, but the increase will result in a two million dollar addition to Olin Memorial Health Center.

The boost in fees resulted when the State Board of Agriculture, MSC's governing body, raised tuition to \$65 per term at its monthly meeting Friday. A bond issue will be drafted to provide the necessary funds for the expansion and then will be paid for through the increased fees. Philip J. May, college controller said.

After the expanded health services are paid, the tuition boost will go for "student services," President John A. Hannah said.

Student services may include an expanded Union, more parking space or additional tennis courts, according to May.

Students with full tuition scholarships will still have their tuition fees paid in full, he said. The board requested a \$1,000,000 supplemental appropriation from the Legislature for construction on the \$4,000,000 library. The "fast pace" of construction this year prompted the request, Dr. Hannah said.

For the library project, \$243,000 of the \$2,500,000 is all that is left of the appropriation, he said. The supplemental appropriation was asked for the fiscal year ending July 1.

Pointing toward an enrollment of 30,000 by 1970, Dr. Hannah warned the board it must take a new look at the university's physical requirements.

The board was reminded of Dr. Hannah's earlier recommendations to Gov. G. Mennen Williams that MSC will need \$40,000,000 worth of construction in the next five years to meet increasing enrollment.

Hearing Starts Today on Fate Of TV Channel

MSC will compete with four other concerns for permission to build a VHF television station in the Parma-Onondaga area at a Federal Communications Commission hearing starting today in Washington, D.C.

The State Board of Agriculture, representing the college, has asked for the very-high-frequency channel 10, assigned to Parma-Onondaga. If the college gets it, it would give up the ultra-high-frequency station, WKAR-TV, which it now operates in East Lansing.

Other applicants are Triad Television Corporation, Both Radio and Television Stations, Inc., Television Corporation of Michigan, Inc., and the Jackson Broadcasting and Television Corporation.

The hearing is expected to last several weeks. No decision is expected from the FCC until several months after the hearing.

Appointing of Dr. LeRoy C. Ferguson as head of the governmental research bureau. This bureau is being expanded to include a Vietnam project. The bureau was formerly headed by Edward W. Weidner, head of the department of political science. Weidner said the change was necessary because of the press of other activities of the political science department.

The board was told that negotiations are still under way with the Foreign Operations Administration on a proposal to have MSC send a mission to help organization of the South Vietnam government.

FOA will underwrite the cost of the mission which will take about 30 staff men and will cost \$2,685,000 over a three year period.

The board also announced bids will be taken on a \$6,500,000 dormitory addition Feb. 2. The addition includes the three new units which are to be built as part of the Harrison Road project.

The board accepted \$234,354 in gifts and grants.

Students Can Help Ease It Traffic Jam in Berkey

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first in a series of three articles dealing with the classroom shortage at MSC and explaining future plans to solve the problem.

It's a pretty sad situation when you have to fight your way to class.

But that's been the story at Berkey Hall so far this term in some of the worst jams in the history of MSC's largest classroom building.

Registrar Robert Linton points out that Berkey has 53 classrooms which are available 2,120 hours per five-day class week.

As of now, Berkey is in use 2,020 hours per week. That's a 95.3 percentage.

Linton estimates that, on the average, 2,000 students are in Berkey every hour, and possibly as many as 2,500 during some hours.

Adding to the difficulty is the fact that few classrooms have been added to the pool by buildings erected recently.

"Believe me, we're using it," Linton exclaimed.

And the worst is yet to come. Much additional need lies ahead as the college faces a doubled enrollment of 30,000 by 1970. And as the enrollment figure doubles, so must the number of classrooms.

Besides, more students mean more faculty, who need office space.

"But what we need right now is more classrooms," Linton said.

In the meantime, however, the congestion goes on. Students themselves can help ease the pressure.

They seem to forget that they can get in or out of Berkey on four sides—including four doors on the south entrance opposite the Horticulture Building.

Just about everybody crowds in and out of the narrow, one-door west opening, however.

An average of 2,000 leaving Berkey when classes change and an average of 2,000 entering at the same time makes an almost unbearable total of 4,000 students at one time.

Figuring conservatively that 60 per cent of the students use

the west entrance, it is reasonable to assume that at least 2,400 persons are trying to jam their way through an opening less than six feet wide within a time span of 10 minutes.

This is unnecessary.

It's up to you students to use the south entrance. At present, you're causing dangerous congestion just to save yourself a few steps.

Another thing you can do is to get out of there when your class is over. Don't stand around talking and smoking. You're clogging up the hallways and making other students stand out in the cold.

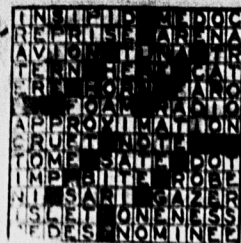
Besides, there's a no-smoking rule in Berkey that they've been pretty lenient about, but if this congestion keeps up, the fire department is likely to make things rough.

Granted, the college needs more classrooms, but college administrators are working overtime with building plans.

In the meantime, it's up to the students to stop making a bad situation worse.

Terms It 'Excellent'

Hannah Praises Ike's Program for Reserves

Dr. John A. Hannah, MSC president, praised President Eisenhower's program for a reactivated reserve force as "an excellent one," in a speech to central Michigan Air Force reservists last Friday night.

"The President's program is a well thought out one, and it has my wholehearted support," he said.

Dr. Hannah, who served as assistant secretary of defense in 1952 and 1953, said the reserve program is necessary because of the expense of keeping up a completely active fighting-strength army.

"He said that the small re-enlistment percentage is particularly hard on the Air Force. "Very often some of the more technical jobs take better than a year to train the man who is lost shortly afterward because his year of duty is up," he explained. "I believe that Congress will buy the program without too many changes," Dr. Hannah said, "because a number of congressmen of both parties expressed great interest in this type of program when I was in Washington a year ago."

Falk Foundation of Pittsburgh, Pa., gave a grant of \$71,600 for a graduate fellowship program in the department of political science.

The second largest grant, \$51,920, was accepted from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek for new construction and alterations at the Kellogg biological station at Gull Lake.

The departments of journalism and botany received grants of \$12,000 each for research projects.

The journalism grant, for a project in communications, was from the midwest administration center of the University of Chicago.

The botany grant, for a study of plants, was given by the National Science Foundation of Washington, D.C.

A gift of a rare collection of Chinese silk textiles to the museum by Dr. and Mrs. Shao Chang Lee was formally accepted. Lee, a native of China, is head of the department of foreign studies.

The collection, dating from the Chang Period (1644-1911), will remain on display in the main lobby of the library until the end of winter term, March 23.

The board also let contracts to four local firms.

A contract to install steam lines to the new married student apartment area was given to the R. L. Spitzley Heating Co. of Lansing. The low bid, \$61,483.

Construction of a men's dormitory at the biological station will be done by the Murray Construction company of Battle Creek. They were low bidders with a bid of \$39,420.

Water services for the new Animal Industries Buildings will be installed by Angell Construction company of Lansing. Their low bid was \$81,346.25.

The service dock at the Union Building will be altered by the Haussman Construction company of Lansing. They won the contract with a bid of \$4,542.

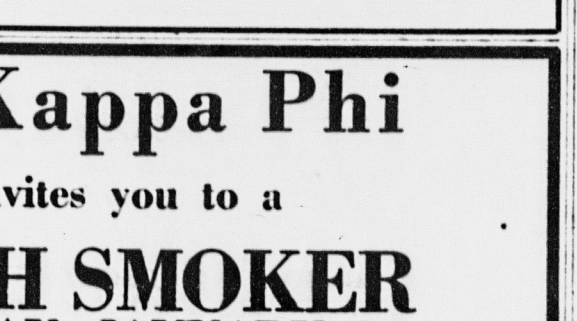
