

## 15,000 Attend Annual Festival

### All Continents Represented At International Show

It was a small world in Demonstration Hall Saturday as 15,000 people witnessed the colorful pageantry of the 11th annual International Festival.

Under the direction of Mrs. Louise Carpenter, foreign student adviser, and with the support of student government and campus service groups, the festival materialized another outstanding event in State's international program.

The cultures of six continents mingled in a display of universal goodwill under the theme "It's a Small World."  
During the evening program, Professor Shao Chang Lee, head of the foreign studies department, and his wife were presented with a scroll by President John A. Hannah honoring them for their efforts in beginning the first International Festival and founding the International Center on campus.

Students from 50 countries participated in the event. The national flag of each country decorated the booths, which were pointed in the Spartan green and white.  
The students working in the booths wore native costumes and signed autographs in the country's language.

Among the elegant costumes worn by the foreign students was the gay Ukrainian dress. The head piece for women consists of a spray of flowers on velvet with many wide ribbons falling below the waist.  
The kempen shoe maker attracted a steady crowd of people interested in how the traditional wooden shoes were made.

A 10-foot boa constrictor snake skin was featured at the Brazilian booth.  
Foreign traditions in the form of folk dances were featured at the stage shows.  
A Japanese Cherry Blossom dance was reenacted by Shinko Yayahawa, Japanese freshman, Tsuru Nakatani, Japanese graduate student, Hiroko Nashiro, Okinawan senior and Nobuko Ishigaki, Okinawan junior.  
The skillful Philippine Bamboo dance was performed by Maria C. Rodona and Dr. Cipriano de los Reyes, both from Toledo, Ohio.  
The festival fervor reached a climax when the festival participants marched in a parade before each show.

# Suspension of Salk Anti-Polio Vaccine Urged by Government

## Diem Seeks Rejection Of Bao Dai

### Premier Appeals To Free World

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Anti-Communist Premier Ngo Dinh Diem appealed to the United States, France and Britain Sunday night to reject Chief of State Bao Dai's efforts to re-establish himself in Viet Nam.

Diem warned in a broadcast addressed to the free world that it would be impossible to deceive the Vietnamese people with any government system designed to revive the colonial regime in one form or another.  
Soon after he spoke almost the last vestige of armed opposition in Saigon to Diem's leadership was eliminated. A unit of the rebel Binh Xuyen Society surrendered its stronghold in the National Police Headquarters without a fight. This society of ex-mercenary pirates plunged Saigon into five days of strife.

A spokesman at the premier's office said his broadcast warning Sunday was a direct reference to the reported plan of Bao Dai to obtain his powers again for his return to Viet Nam as constitutional monarch.

The French-appointed chief of state, former emperor of Annam, has been away more than a year, living in his chateau on the French Riviera and exercising his powers by remote control. He now is in Paris where foreign ministers of the Big Three Western Powers are conferring, trying to mold a joint policy on Viet Nam.

It is understood here that Bao Dai's plan includes an appointed high council and an assembly of Vietnamese notables to which both the chief of state and the premier would surrender their powers—ignoring Diem's project for an elected national assembly.

Diem regards this scheme as inspired by the French and adopted by Bao Dai in a desperate attempt to avoid being deposed, his aides said.

It appears now that Diem would not object to leaving Bao Dai as chief of state for the time being if the ex-emperor gives up his powers to name governments and choose military commanders and promises to keep hands off the elections.

## Reappraisal Of Serum Underway

### Manufacturers To be Checked

WASHINGTON (AP)—Another few days' suspension of the nationwide Salk anti-polio vaccination program was urged by the government Sunday.

Surgeon Gen. Leonard A. Scheele predicted it will be rolling again—perhaps by the end of this week—on a double-checked-for-safety basis.

Scheele reiterated his faith that, "within the ever-narrowing limits of human fallibility" the Salk vaccine is safe and effective.

After an intensive round of conferences with Dr. Jonas Salk, developer of the vaccine, and other top medical and scientific experts, Scheele said the government is making a reappraisal of all tests and processes by which the vaccine is manufactured.

"We plan to make this reappraisal on a manufacturer-by-manufacturer basis, and just as rapidly as possible, to release the vaccine to availability beginning in the latter part of the current week."

"Until that check is completed, we are repeating our recommendation that the vaccine program be temporarily postponed. This will cause some delay in the program. But we believe—and I am sure that the American people join us in believing—that in dealing with the lives of our children, it is impossible to be too cautious."

He added, "I believe that this reappraisal will demonstrate that fact and that within a few days, all of us will be able to move forward in the fight against polio with renewed confidence."

Scheele stressed that the reappraisal program does not necessarily mean any of the vaccine already distributed will have to be rechecked.

The idea, he said, is that an inspection team will visit each of the plants, investigate safety procedures, talk with the men who do the processing and, in general, convince themselves that the greatest possible safety precautions are being taken.

## Michigan To Continue Inoculations

DETROIT (AP) — Michigan will continue with the polio vaccination program despite the government's recommendation for further postponement.

Dr. Albert Heustia, state health commissioner, reiterated today—after learning of the Washington recommendation—that Michigan wouldn't halt inoculations unless it gets a "direct order" to do so.

Michigan already has inoculated more than 300,000 school children.

"I believe, Dr. Heustia said, "We have ample evidence that the vaccine we have used is safe and effective."  
So far in Michigan only one possible case of polio among inoculated children has turned up. That one, in Detroit, was not confirmed as an actual case.  
In Michigan individual health department units have been urged to act on their own responsibility if they wished to hold off on inoculations.  
Oakland County was the first to do so. The county recently suspended the inoculation of school children.

Saturday, the net squad will play Purdue, 6-2, in a rain-shortened match.

The Spartans won four singles matches and both of the doubles matches, with the No. 2 doubles called off because of rain.

Dave Brogan won the No. 1 doubles spot over Charles Carabell, 6-4, 7-5.

Dick Menzel won his match by two 6-3 decisions and John Brogan took three sets to win his match, 6-4, 4-6, 7-5.

The basic philosophy of Michigan State was presented by President John A. Hannah for parents and students in Kellogg Auditorium Saturday afternoon as part of the annual Parents Day weekend.

In reviewing the founding and development of the university, Pres. Hannah said that Michigan State was the first college to be based on the ideal that scholarships should be put to use in solving every day problems.

"Michigan State works on the theory that there is no problem not fit for research and study on the highest level," he said.

"The common objective of all education is to give students what they need to make full use of their potential," he added. He said that education in general had contributed to a higher standard of living, a classless society, and political stability for Americans.

Members of the Parents Weekend committee greeted parents in flapper outfits in keeping with the theme of "Collegiate Comeback" dance held for parents and students Saturday evening.

Other activities which attracted parents Saturday afternoon were the Green and White football game at Macklin Stadium, a showing of the Centennial Movie, a tea and open house at the Home Economics building and an ROTC training exhibit.

As it was, Hoffman offered very little in the way of a constructive proposal; rather, he confused the issue by using the Congress as a warring wall and misrepresented the fact that I was trying to shut him up and take away his job because he dared speak.

The Congress, few members of which have formal knowledge of legislative jurisdiction overruled the speaker and very nearly turned itself into a Kangaroo Court.

Had Hurst been censured (much less impeached) in such a confused, "mock court," the Congress would have been the laughing stock of the campus.

Too many, including Bill Reid and Diane Broersma, were dupes of a party who was seemingly more interested in his "personal martyrdom" than an objective contribution to the work of the student government.

As for the other charges, it is bald distortion for anyone to claim that the censure vote was "close." No minority in Congress has ever let a close vote on a controversial subject go uncontested.

Are you sure, Mr. Ritzinger, that you weren't influenced by the sound of your own voice when the vote for censure was cast?

In conclusion, I wish to agree with Ritzinger that the "special session" was a farce full of

shenanigans and confusion... a black eye to the All-College Student Government, but I disagree as to who caused it and why.

I suggest that the cause is not so much "glib politics," but rather, hasty assumptions, overripe dramatics and some half-baked journalism.
