Writers Under Pressure Says Harvard Prof

Composer's Talk Ends Symposium

Hanson, Fuller Speak Tonight

Dr. Douglas Bush, Harvard English professor, made this point when he addressed Michigan State's Science and Art's Centennial symposium, on "The New View of Man," in Kellogg Center Thursday evening.

The great heritage of experience, wisdom and beauty, the great sources of strength and guidance, he continued, are still there to be drawn upon "if we will but turn to them and not be misled by the fallacy that they are obsolete or inadequate."

Today's writers and readers have been "too much attracted to those writers who embody or encourage confusion and despair and too little to those who have sought for order and fortitude and humility," Bush declared.

"In spite of endless talk about complexities of the modern world," he said, "I would maintain that nine-tenths of the moral problems that confront the modern individual are not complex but those that confronted individuals in the past but are, on the contrary, very much the same."

"The cases are very few in which we do not know the difference between good and evil."

While grateful for the help that science can give about the nature of man and society and the universe, he said, "it is in literature . . . in the richest insights of the richest minds that we have the most direct and powerful illumination."

Bush contended there is actually no real difference between the "new use" of the word and the old use of it.

"The word is a timeless whole," he said, "and is changing in changing lights and continually augmented, but always concerned with the same ends."

"From the literary humanist's standpoint," he said, "the new view of man, must be in very large measure the old view that we have never realized but that remains always before us, not behind."

The symposium will close today with programs devoted to art and music, at 2 p.m. and 8 p.m.


The entertainment will be from 7:15 to 8 p.m. Master of Ceremonies will be Tom Fishes, Mt. Pleasant sophomore.

Michigan State's hopes of repeating as Big 10 baseball champions will be decided this weekend as the Spartans journey to Ohio State and Indiana for the final games of the conference season.

Not only must the Spartans sweep their three games but they must also get a powerful assist from Wisconsin and Northwestern, league-leading Minnesota's opponents.

State's record stands at 8-4. Minnesota has a 9-3 mark. Ohio State, tied with State for second percentage-wise has won six and lost three. Three of the Buckeyes' games were rained out.

Walt Godfrey will pitch this afternoon at Ohio State and Dick Idzkowski and Eddie Hebaugh will face Indiana Saturday.

Hal Northrup, leading OSU pitcher is scheduled to go against State. Northrup has a 3-1 record this season and has allowed 3.1 earned runs per game. He posted an 0.95 ERA while winning four Big 10 games last season.

The Hoosiers, tied with Iowa in the conference cellar, will probably use Jerry Clark and Eddie French. Clark has a 1-1 record and French has lost two while

Spartan trackmen have been invited to run at the annual Coliseum Relays at Los Angeles this evening. The select group will be the 800-yard relay team composed of Julius McCoy, Ron Sues, Ed Brabham and Capt. Kevan Gosper.

Trackers Face Wisconsin

Gosper will also run in the invitational 440-yard run. The relays, one of the nation's top track attractions, will feature the best in both collegiate and AAU competition.

The half-mile relay team won easily at both the Ohio and Big 10 Relays while Houston beat them by inches at the Drake Relays.

The team was clocked in 1:26.4 at both Ohio and Drake while the squad posted a 1:26.7 in their Big 10 win.

Among the teams that will meet the Spartans will be Houston, which has done 1:25.3 this season. Oklahoma A & M has the fastest time of the year with 1:25.1.

The West Coast entry, Stanford, won the Fresno Relays in 1:26.6.

Gosper, the British Empire quarter-mile champion, has been chosen to run in a field that will include the world's 400-meter record holder Lou Jones; Jim Lea, two-time NCAA champion; Oklahoma A & M's J. W. Mashburn and Ralph Pessenden, Illinois' Big 10 outdoor champion.

Gosper has run a .47.1 in a flat race while the smooth-striding Australian has been timed in .46.3 while running anchor leg on the mile relay team.

Herb McKenley set the present world record of .46.0 in 1958.

Track Coach Karl Schlademan, who has done much to bring the Michigan State Relays into national prominence, is the founder of the Kansas Relays.

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Red Cross Blood Drive Ends Today

The annual ROTC blood drive, which ends today, hit the low mark of the week with 329 pints donated Thursday. For the fourth straight day the Army out-donated its Air Force opponents.

The Army chalked up 218 donors to the Air Force's 70. In all, 368 donors made the trip to Demonstration Hall, 60 of them civilians. There were 19 rejects for the day.

Yesterday's donations brought the four-day total to 1,400 pints. The drive will end today at 2 p.m.

Mrs. Kenneth E. Kolka, Red Cross chief nurse, stressed that the drive is not limited to ROTC personnel and that students do not need an appointment to donate.

The last ROTC unit will go through today from 10 a.m. until closing time at 2 p.m. They will be able to put student through in 45 minutes to an hour, Mrs. Kolka said.

"Most of the students rejected have recently been ill," she reported. She said that one fourth of the students donating in this drive are doing it for the first time.

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
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


