Integrity Boosted by Symposium Speaker

Malcolm Johnson Stresses Publisher's Responsibility

Integrity was boosted to a prominent position in the publishers' profession Wednesday at the first evening session of the tenth and last symposium at MSU.

A WKAR radio and Fairchild Theater audience heard Malcolm Johnson, executive vice-president of The Van Nostrand Co., outline the publisher's role "to defend integrity in communications in the twentieth century."

Johnson asserted that every publisher had the responsibility "to see that his books reflect truth and integrity and do not lend themselves to distortion of the facts."

Acknowledging that books claim a lasting influence since the invention of printing in the fifteenth century as a permanent repository of ideas, the veteran editor and publisher stressed the serious responsibility of the publisher.

"Ideas can be dangerous but suppression of ideas in publications can be even more dangerous to the maintenance of a democratic society," he declared.

As an intermediary between the author and the outside world, the publisher is answerable to his stockholders, authors and society, Johnson said in describing the dilemma of communication.

Referring to censorship from pressure groups, the symposium speaker asked, "How far should a manuscript be revised to placate a prejudice?" In reply Johnson contends "the reader has as much right for accurate details as he has to correct spelling and punctuation."

"To defend the integrity of his publications, a publisher has only his heart and conscience to guide him," Johnson stated.

A poet and critic searched for a definition of integrity in their respective field during the afternoon sessions.

Yankees Take Series Opener

Poll Shows Uncertainty About Ike

Nixon Favored As Successor

WASHINGTON (AP)—Most Republican leaders are reluctant to concede that President Eisenhower may retire to private life because of his heart attack. But at least a dozen are resigned to a belief he will do so.

Out of 115 GOP leaders reached by The Associated Press Wednesday, only a handful were willing to express a firm opinion whether the President should or should not run for a second term.

The vast majority said it is too early to tell, and that the decision is one for Eisenhower himself and his doctors and family.

Few took note of reports from Denver that the consensus of those around Eisenhower is that he will seek to serve out his present term but that it is highly unlikely he will be a candidate again.

The AP polled GOP state chairmen, national committeemen and national committeewomen. They were asked: "Do you believe Eisenhower should run again?" They were asked also to name the strongest candidate the GOP could nominate in the event he does not, as well as second and third choices. The officials were told their names would not be used if they so desired. Even under those circumstances, many chose not to comment.

Vice President Nixon was the man mentioned most frequently as the strongest candidate next to Eisenhower. Some of those naming Nixon refrained from endorsing him personally, but termed him the best-known possibility. A number said they wanted to see who Eisenhower favors if he does not run himself.

Others mentioned as the "strongest candidate" if Eisenhower does not run were Chief Justice Earl Warren, Secretary of the Treasury George M. Humphrey and Milton E. Eisenhower, the President's brother who heads Pennsylvania State University. Warren has said he has made an irrevocable decision not to seek elective office again.

There was a scattering of sentiment for almost a score of other GOP figures. Many of the officials reached declined to name a second choice, but mentioned three or four persons as good possibilities.

Several unspoken factors may have contributed to the reluctance on the part of many of those reached to express firm opinions, even anonymously.

Those polled are working politicians, who might not want to name possible successors to the head of their party at this stage even if they were confident that he would not seek re-election.

State GOP Chairman Don Pierson of Iowa said, "No good American would want him deliberately to sacrifice his life in public service."

Among those named after Nixon or bracketed with him and others by officials declining to rank the possibilities were Chief Justice Warren, Secretary Humphrey, Sen. William F. Knowland of California, Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, Gov. Christian Herter of Massachusetts, Gov. Goodwin J. Knight of California and Harold E. Stassen, special assistant to Eisenhower for disarmament.

Collins Hits 2 Homers in 6-5 Win

NEW YORK (AP)—Joe Collins, part time first baseman, bench warmer and pinch hitter, smashed two home runs today to give the New York Yankees first blood over the Brooklyn Dodgers, 6-5, in the opener of their sixth world series.

The 33-year-old infielder, who showed a puny 148 batting average for five previous world series, ripped into Don Newcombe, the Brooks' 20-game winner, for the two homers, and drove in three runs.

Not even an electrifying steal of home by Jackie Robinson in the eighth and homers by Carl Furillo and Duke Snider could save the Dodgers who never have won a series. Once again they opened the series on the same frustrating note of defeat.

After Whitey Ford, the chunky left-hander, appeared to tire in the two-run eighth inning manager Casey Stengel brought in Bob Grim to pitch the ninth.

The fast-balling right-hander struck out Pee Wee Reese, yielded a single to Snider, got Roy Campanella on a deep fly to Hankauer and flipped a third strike past Furillo's swinging bat to nail it down.

It was Ford's victory and another auspicious start for the Yanks who own a fabulous 16-4 record in series competition. The winner of the opener has captured 32 of 51 previous series. Grim deserved his share of praise and so did Eiston Howard who tied the score with a two-run home run in the second inning.

But the big man was Collins from the coal fields of Scranton, Pa. His first homer, lined into the lower right field seats in the fourth sent the Yanks out front 4-3, and his second smash, a 400-foot wallop into the bleachers in right center with Yogi Berra on base in the sixth provided the late inning insurance the Yanks needed.

Brooklyn rocked Ford, the lefty who dared to face the heavy right-handed slugger of the Dodgers, and scored two runs in the second inning on Furillo's homer off the top of the four-foot wall.

His latest book, "The Egypt of the Pharaohs," was awarded the "Ateneo" prize of Chile, as the best book of 1954. Some of his books are on display at the MSU Library.

He traveled extensively in the Orient for several years as Chile's ambassador to India.

MSU Professor To Arbitrate for Ford, UAW-CIO

Prof. Charles C. Killingsworth, head of the department of economics, has been appointed by the Ford Motor Co. and the UAW-CIO to serve as a standing arbitrator under their national agreement, effective Saturday.

He will render final decisions in cases of contract interpretation and application arising under the agreement.

The MSU professor will continue his work as head of the economics department and as co-director of the Vietnam Technical Assistance project.

Killingsworth, author of numerous articles and books on labor relations, has previously served as national umpire under several other labor-management contracts.

Reds Free Germans

MOSCOW (AP)—The Presidium of the Supreme Soviet Wednesday adopted a decree releasing 8,577 Germans war prisoners.

The decree declared the Presidium found it impossible to release 746 other Germans because of the "special gravity" of their offenses against the Soviet people.

The figure mentioned in the decree tallied exactly with the 9,323 total that Premier Nikolai Bulganin gave West German Chancellor Adenauer during their Moscow conference as the number of Germans still held by the Soviets.

Included in the numbers to be sung by the Phi Kap Quartet will be "It's a Blue World" and "Moments to Remember." Members of the group are Jim Cooper, Detroit Junior; Bob Whipple, Lansing senior; Dave Roberts, Dearborn graduate student; and Don Childs, Wilmette, Ill., junior.

Ike's Condition Better

DENVER (AP)—Mounting hopes that President Eisenhower may return to the helm of government within a month were strengthened Wednesday. The oxygen tent was removed from his hospital room.

Marcus Child Returned

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A childless housewife who "just had to have a baby" remorsefully surrendered Robert Marcus to a priest in Stockton early Wednesday nine days after the newborn boy was kidnapped in San Francisco. Recovery of the healthy baby, now 11 days old, ended a nationwide hunt.

U. S. Leads in Atoms for Peace

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission said Wednesday night the Geneva atoms-for-peace conference showed the United States "well ahead" in peaceful uses of the atom but with Russia "seriously challenging" its leadership.

Hurricane Kills 200

NEW YORK (AP)—Hurricane Janet, packing winds of 110 mph an hour and apparently growing, roared toward the eastern coast of southern Mexico Wednesday night, leaving an estimated 200 people dead on the Yucatan peninsula.

Students Can Help Course Needs One Last Push

A great deal of work by a number of people has almost reached the pay-off stage.

A faculty committee has been formed to start setting up a Great Issues course for seniors.

A year ago, the senior class of 1955 presented the administration with a request for such a course. It was felt that in these times of tension, graduating seniors needed a practical understanding of the great issues of the day.

For a year now, a class committee has been studying the idea, and with the change of classes the information was passed on in brief form to the class of 1956.

During the summer, the study received a go-ahead from the administration. Deans Sabine of Communication Arts, Muelder of Engineering and Hamilton of the Basic College were appointed as a faculty group to implement the study as soon as they can meet with the seniors.

The course will be built around lectures by eminent business and professional men about problems in their particular fields. It will embrace all fields and should prove as valuable to Ag majors and engineers as to social workers and teachers.

Even with a four-year emphasis on "a broad liberal education," as is the policy at this university, the need for pertinent, up-to-date information on the significance of world events remains.

To build a better world we must be better informed. A course such as this can do a great deal toward clearing up the confusion that exists about changes in our life, both subtle and sudden.

The Great Issues course is now within the grasp of the student body. All that is needed is their co-operation. The groundwork is completed, there is no reason to hesitate now.



And although they lost they weren't too discouraged. "They just beat us, that's all," said Manager Walt Alton.

Most of the Dodger talk was about that big eighth inning when the score was narrowed down to 6-5.

"Robby and Furillo were bunting on their own," said Alton. The Yankee defense was playing deep and both tried bunts. Both failed. Eventually Furillo singled and Robinson was safe on an error.

Furillo came home on Don Zimmer's fly to center and Robinson advanced to third. That set the stage for Robinson's steal of home.

"Here's how it happened," said Robinson. "Ford wasn't giving me too much of a look. I suppose he figured I wouldn't do it, being two runs behind."

"A steal of home like that in the eighth is usually not a good play."

"I was safe—no doubt in my mind at all. I could see the plate when I slid in."

Bill Martin's attempted steal of home in the sixth caught the Dodger catcher Roy Campanella to burst out laughing after the game.

"Man oh man, you just can't do that. When you try to steal home with a left-handed hitter up there, and a right-handed pitcher, man oh man. No batter to get in your way. Now when Robby did it, it was with a left-handed pitcher and a right-handed batter."

Collins said he didn't know he had a chance to the Babe Ruth's record of three homers in a series game. Babe did it twice in 1926 and 1928. "I was going for a third homer in that eighth," he said. Ohio State 28, Stanford 14 — After being terrorized before beating Nebraska, the Buckeyes


White Sox Seek Cubs' GM?



Molotov Walks Out On UN Assembly

Chinese Foreign Minister Denounces Red 'Tyranny'

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Russia's V. M. Molotov walked out of the U. N. Assembly Wednesday as Nationalist China's Foreign Minister George Yeh denounced Moscow's peace drive and Red "tyranny" over the Chinese mainland.

Yeh, making a policy speech to the Assembly in flawless Mandarin Chinese, said that the Communists in their six years of domination of the Chinese mainland have spawned a gigantic system of repression and terrorism, the like of which has never been known in Chinese history.

He said the current peace campaign by the Reds actually is a form of war between communism and capitalism and the "softer words" do not mean the Communists have given up the fight.

Molotov was joined in his walk by Vaclav David, Czechoslovak foreign minister, and Marian Naszkowski, deputy foreign minister of Poland. Kuzma Kiselev, foreign minister of White Russia, remained. At the afternoon session, Kiselev in his policy address attacked Yeh for making what Kiselev called "slandering remarks."

V. K. Krishna Menon, India's chief delegate who has joined Molotov in advocating a U. N. seat for Red China, left at the same time Molotov departed. A spokesman said Krishna Menon had a medical appointment but added: "Our position is well known."

Asked for a comment on Molotov's action, a member of the Chinese Nationalist delegation said: "We don't care."

Group Plans Homecoming Program

Plans for a Homecoming program were outlined at the term's first meeting of the All-University Homecoming Committee Tuesday.

The program will emphasize the Homecoming activities, Oct. 22, as the final event of the Centennial year, Starr Keesler, director of alumni relations and chairman of the committee, said.

In addition to listing the parade, the alumni banquet and dance, the Homecoming souvenir will include activities of campus organizations over the weekend. Interested groups who wish to publicize Homecoming activities should notify the Alumni Office by Oct. 4.

The program will be distributed to living units prior and during the Homecoming festivities.


