DENVER (AP) - The State of Colorado Tuesday took over prosecution of John Gilbert Graham, charged with sabotage of a United Air Lines plane which killed 44 persons. Denver Dist. Atty. Bert M. Keating said he would ask for the death chamber for Graham

The federal government asked the state to handle the case after it was found there was no fed-eral statute of murder applicable. Graham, 23, baby-faced playforger, was arrested by FBI Monday on a charge of ing a dynamite bomb aboard a dynamite bomb aboard ne in the luggage of his Mrs. Daisie King, who the crash.

Graham, father of two young children, took out a \$37,500 in-surance policy on his mother before she boarded the plane. He also was an heir to his mother's estate valued at around \$159,000.

The tempo of activities at the 1955 convention of the Assn. of Land-Grant Colleges and Universities quickened Tuesday as delegates got down to business at the first general session, held in Brody Hall.

Calling such support "a necessity," he reaffirmed a pre-viously stated plan calling for federal expenditures of \$16,640,-006,000 for public education over the next five years. Of this, colleges and universi-

Subsidize Scholarships

According to Williams' plan, the federal government would subsidize 50.000 scholarships each year for needy undergraduates, and 10.000 each year for graduate students the tual potential of women of worth \$1,000,

Underscoring Williams' pro-nouncements was Dr. Lewis W. Jones, president of New Jersey's Rutgers University and retiring bead of the association.

Jones told the association it is clear the basis for doubled col-lege enrollments by 1965 or 1970 exists today due to increased population and the greater per-centage of the population want-



This change was more than just a change in the name of an organization. It was a complete reorganization prompted by the best intentions and realistic thinking. Under the old system. Michigan State vas set up as central headquarters, with in MSU student appointed to the post of

xecutive director. While it was never directly stated in the constitution or by the presidents, this post implied powers that could not be er orced-the power of making decisions afecting all students at Big 10 schools.

By setting up a new organization and a new constitution, subject to approval by each school, the presidents have taken cognizance of one very important fact. They tre a group of 10 students - recognized headers at their schools, but without the ower to decide policy for all the students hey represent.

Under the new, tentative constitution, the presidents have attempted to form an. ssociation to return to their original pur-These purposes are stated simply Article Two of the constitution:
