### French Assembly Dissolved

**Cabinet Decides To Hold Elections**

PARIS (AP)—The French cabinet decided Wednesday night to dissolve the National Assembly and hold new elections.

At this stage, Premier Edgar Faure appeared to have turned a losing defeat into victory. He has been campaigning all along for early elections, but the decisive approach to them was a surprise even in French politics.

Tuesday the Assembly gave Faure a vote of no confidence, usually the signal for the government's immediate resignation. But the size of the Assembly vote against him brought into play an obscure constitutional provision permitting the Cabinet to order dissolution.

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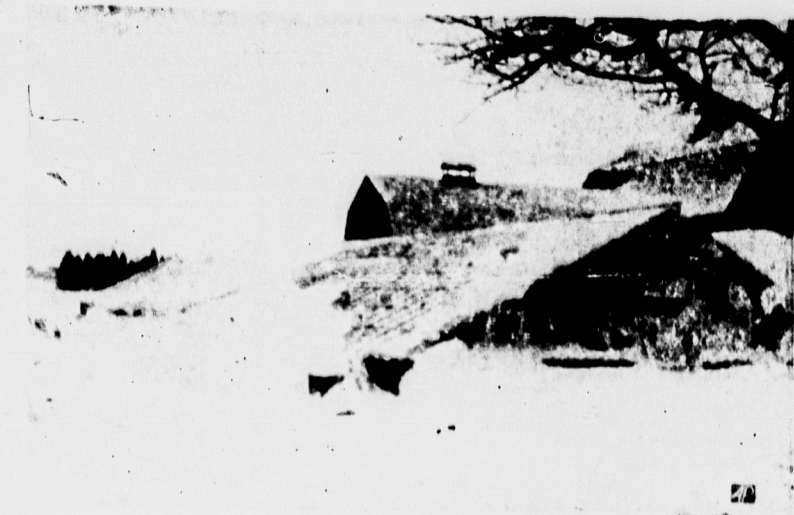

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# Safety Is Everyone's Job

The car in the picture was not involved in a mass smash-up on the New York Turnpike, or some other busy superhighway. It was photographed soon after a collision with a railroad locomotive, on MSU's own Farm Lane.

It may come as a shock to some that an accident of this sort can occur on Michigan State's campus. Yet it is not an exception.

Although there have been no fatalities on the university grounds for the past four years, there have been many accidents resulting in injuries and considerable property damage. Most of these could have been prevented by observing a few simple rules for safe and courteous driving.

Today, as we celebrate the second annual Safe Driving Day proclaimed by President Eisenhower, would be a good time to look at the Spartan safety record.

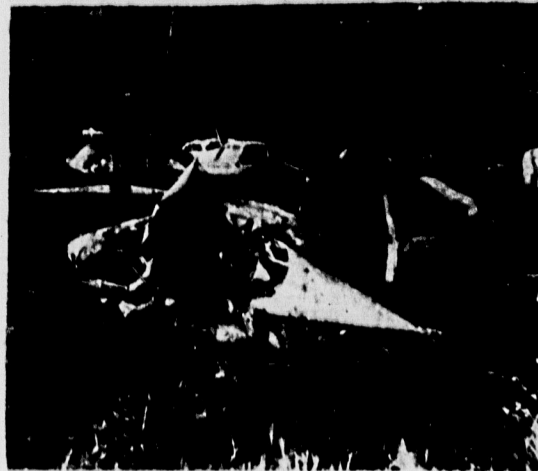
In 1954, the Campus Police reported a total of 133 auto accidents on campus. By the middle of November of this year, with a month and a half still to go in 1955, the figure stood at 127, making 1955 the worst driving year in State's history.

The police also recorded violations of traffic laws which were responsible for the accidents. In the order of their importance, these driving faults were: failure to grant the right of way; improper starts from a parked position; improper turns; speeding; following too closely; improper parking locations; and improper passing.

This situation is being repeated on a national scale. Last year found 36,000 people killed and 1,250,000 injured in nearly 10 million auto accidents.

To cut down on the vicious traffic toll, and to make the nation more safety-conscious, the President instituted Dec. 1 as Safe Driving Day last year. On that day, the efforts of safety-minded citizens actually succeeded in reducing the daily accident figure.

Today's celebration, it is hoped, will lead to an even greater reduction in the traffic toll. If it does, responsibility for the success will rest in the hands of Spartan students and all the rest of the nation's drivers.



## First Red Conquest Mongolia Is UN's Bone of Contention

Outer Mongolia, which is causing such a hassle in the United Nations, was the first part of revolutionary Russia's expansionist policy. It is almost as much a part of Russia as is the Ukraine.

Russian agents staged a revolution in Outer Mongolia 21 years ago and the Reds have held it ever since.

Admittedly Outer Mongolia to the UN would be very much like the separate representation allowed the Ukraine. Pao-tai Hsiang has greater autonomy for all intents and purposes a part of China. Inner Mongolia into which the Reds also infiltrated, is now being reincorporated into the Red China.

During the war Chiang Kai-shek wrote a book outlining his demands for return of territories lost by China over the long years. He wanted Hong Kong, part of Burma and, among other things, all of Mongolia. It

Chinese, he said, stretching things a little.

Put the objective has always been part of Chinese policy, until the Reds made their deal with Moscow. Now Chiang is refusing to admit, by permitting UN membership, that the area is independent.

The United States feels much the same way, but is willing to admit Outer Mongolia and four other Red nations as part of a package deal under which Russia would withdraw the veto on admission of 13 non-Communist nations, some of them of considerable importance.

A noted university president (who will remain anonymous here) was reported by the Associated Press Tuesday as "deriving pre-season raptures of teams and players, and emphasis on post-season bowl bids."

# Plane Crash Death Toll Reaches 14

### 8 Others Injured By Veering Jet

FARMERS, Alaska (AP)—The death toll had reached 14 in the explosive crash of a jet airplane into housing units at an Air Force Base.

Six children in two houses and three women were known dead.

Eight others were injured as the veering plane demolished an eight-family building and caused flames to five others at the base 26 miles southeast of the interior Alaska city.

Announcing 14 as the known death toll, Maj. John Orr, the information officer, said it was almost certain there were others.

Several planes continued to fly in the wreckage of a shed, but no other victims and injuries to the tragedy.

Among the dead were 11-month-old triplets of an Air Force sergeant.

One of the 14 died early Wednesday of injuries received in the crash.

One of the injured reportedly suffered burns.

After the crash some five miles away, the casualties might have been increased by the arrival of children for lunch in their classrooms.

Some of the men suffered frostbite fighting the wild fire for four hours.

# Another GI Turncoat On His Way to U. S.

HONG KONG (AP)—Richard R. Tennesson, American GI who elected to go to Red China after the Korean War, has been allowed to leave that country, it was reported Wednesday.

The British Red Cross received word from the Chinese Red Cross of Tennesson's release. He is expected here Thursday.

Tennesson was one of 31 turncoat GIs who denounced conditions in the United States and asked to be accepted in Red China as "free men." Peiping agreed to this on Jan. 27, 1954.

Earlier he had written his mother, Mrs. Portia Howe of Alden, Minn., that he was staying with communists because "I love peace, I love mankind."

His mother, convinced her son by a previous marriage had been thoroughly brainwashed by his Red captors, flew to Tokyo, hopeful of meeting him face to face but the Army would not let her go to Korea. Richard, now 27, was captured in May 1951.

In a letter to Mrs. Howe last September, the soldier said he would be returning home soon. He said one of the reasons he wanted to leave China rested on "certain weaknesses in my character" that make it "very uncomfortable and impossible to stay."

Last January, he wrote his mother saying, "I have never had a thought of disloyalty. I am the same," he said. The girl who was at home at the time of his capture said she had never loved the country, the people and

## No Book Shelves Yet

# Library Use Delayed to March

Full use of Michigan State University's handsome new library will be delayed by failure to receive new book shelves.

The Art Metal Construction company of Jamestown, N.Y., the firm contracting to supply metal stacks for the MSU library, has announced that its deliveries will be delayed until the second week in January, Librarian Jackson F. Towne reported.

University officials had hoped that the \$4 million structure, nation's fifth largest collegiate library in floor space, could be opened for full use by Jan. 6, 1956, starting date for winter quarter classes.

Late delivery and installation of the book shelves means that transfer of some 150,000 books to the new library, previously scheduled for the three-week Christmas vacation period must be moved forward to the spring recess period late in March, Towne explained.

We may not have our entire collection out of the old building

until summer, particularly if we run into any confusion or difficulties during the move," he said.

Official reason for the delay, according to the company, is a five week strike which occurred last summer at the Jamestown plant. Production schedules fell behind while workers were idle.

Towne believes that the worst bottleneck in the old library, the freshman investigative paper in communication skills, may still be averted if new stacks are installed by mid-January, as planned now.

We are confident that we can transfer the business, social

science and literature collections by the first of February. That should give us some dispersal when the more than 4,000 freshmen descend upon us all at once," he pointed out.

Towne said the delay, while a disappointment, may prove "a blessing in disguise."

We might have had trouble trying to transfer the bulk of our collection in less than one month. Now we plan to move various sections piecemeal, and if difficulties arise the collections can be held static until the new arrangements are worked out.

# Meet for First Time Varsity-Frosh Cage Tilt Today

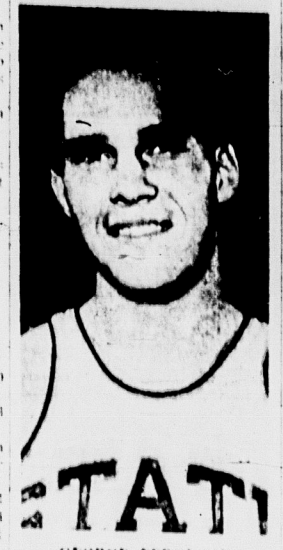

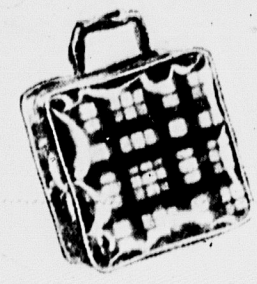

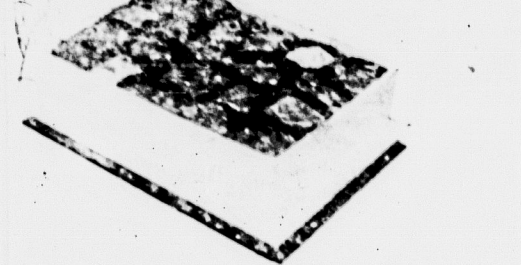
