



Who Controls Pursestrings?

A jangling act, with \$500 of student government money, was brought to the attention of Student Congress Wednesday night.

It came as something of a shock to Congress members, who had innocently assumed that they held the purse-strings where large sums of government money were concerned.

Roger Augustine, government treasurer, reported that president Bill Mansfield had ordered him to take \$500 from the General Unappropriated Fund to pay for Centennial parade trophies.

Most student government money is allocated to particular agencies for their use during the term. The regular agencies for their use during the term. The re-used, when needed for special purposes, with the consent of Congress.

Mansfield did not have the consent of Congress, however. Nor was that body ever notified of the fund transfer until it was brought out at Wednesday's meeting.

To Mansfield's credit, it must be said that he had some provocation for his action. It was the first week of the term, Congress was not functioning, the Student Centennial Commission did not have the funds to pay for the trophies, which had to be ordered immediately if they were to arrive for the parade.

Yet that cannot excuse Mansfield for what was a serious error of executive judgment.

The legislative and executive branches of government are traditionally separate, with separate duties and powers; and the legislative branch has final say over the finances. In failing to get Congress approval for the expenditure, Mansfield was setting a dangerous precedent, one which could lead to more serious violations of executive power.

It might also be asked why Congress never was informed of the move until a member forced the question; and why Augustine, although naturally fearful for his job if he disobeyed orders, could not have offered some protest to such an obviously improper procedure.

Dishonesty was not involved, Mansfield simply assumed that his post gave him the power to do with government funds as he pleased.

He assumed too much.

Gym Title Still Within Grasp

This year's Spartan gymnastics team, despite the loss of several valuable members, can still provide a strong Big 10 title contender as it has in the past, according to Coach George Szypula.

The team's greatest loss came when Carlton Rintz, holder of several league and NCAA championships, completed his four years of eligibility last season. Other key losses were Jerry Gillemeter, who graduated, and Dick Phillips, who suffered a polo attack last spring.

"However," Szypula commented, "our present team has better depth than any other recent State squad." He points to senior captain Ben Gunning, juniors Don Leas and Dick O'Brien, and sophomore Mike Coco as top performers in the apparatus stunts, and considers them all tough men to beat.

Such a specialist, Herb Jucker, in Szypula's opinion ranks among the best in the country, and is a good bet to capture Rintz' vacated Big 10 title in the event. In fact, a pair of juniors, Richard Brown and Jim Brown, is expected to stand out while Leas and Rintz rate as top trampolining artists in the Big 10.

In the recently introduced free-exercise event, which includes both balance and tumbling stunts done without the aid of mats, Szypula ranks Brown as hard to beat.

Szypula, who established gym as a competitive sport at Michigan State in 1947, is also proud of his promising freshmen team, headed by all-around performer Cal Grant and George Hinkle. "This year, a lot of work is being done to get the team ready for next year," he commented.

The varsity gymnasts open their Big 10 season Dec. 10 at Chicago, Michigan Open Championship, and will compete in the championship event at the team to beat with Iowa, Michigan and Minnesota all providing stiff competition.

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Depth Puzzle Boxers Face Rough Slate

Other Spartans dotting the AP's select lists were: Norm Masters nominated to the third team; Dave Kainer, Buck Nystrom, Gerry Planulis, and Walt Kowalezyk named to the honorable mention group.

The team, selected on the recommendations of AP regional boards on the basis of the full season, avoids pre-season publicity and high pressure publicity campaigns.

For that precise reason, such name combatants as Michigan end Ron Kramer, Notre Dame quarterback Paul Horung, Auburn fullback Joe Childress, and Mississippi State halfback Art Davis did not make the "dream team."

In addition to the talented Morrall, the backfield included such stars as other State's Howard (Hapalong) Cassidy, Texas Chris (The Iron Horse) and Oklahoma's Tommy McDonald.

The team includes Howard Schuller, quarterback of Kentucky, and Don Douglas, son of Navy, at end, Frank D. Austin, of Auburn, and

Paul Wiggon of Stanford at tackle, Jim Brown of UCLA and Basquale Bisceglia of Notre Dame at guard, and Bob Pellegrino of Maryland at center.

Michigan's brilliant right flanker, Tom Marentz, was named to the second team.

According to the AP, Morrall, the nation's leading punter, ran the Spartans' intricate, multiple offense with rare genius. He was equally proficient as a runner, passer, blocker, and was terrific on defense.

Cassidy, the recipient of the Heisman memorial trophy, was the clutch runner of the year, despite the fact that he had to overcome the special defenses that were set for him each week.

Classed as the most exciting runner of the season, was that loyal son of Texas, Jim Nantz. From virtual obscurity, Nantz became one of the most prolific scorers with 125 points.

A "maybe" year is what Coach Charles Schmitter sees for his fencing squad in the coming season.

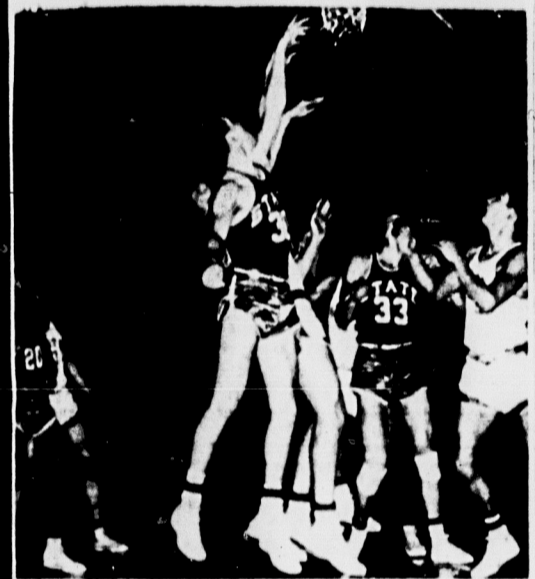
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Letter winner Gerry Breen will probably head the foil team, backed up by transfer student Bill Kester and seniors Fred Sholak and Gary Goep.
