## Oklahoma Gains Back No. 1 Rating

## State Drops to 4th, Tech Runner-up

The powerful Oklahoma Sooners, with a 35-game winning streak, again reign as No. 1 college football team in the nation after a 40-0 rout of battle-weary Notre Dame.

Oklahoma's eye-popping performance in full view of a national television audience Saturday won Michigan State a 20-point drop in the Associated Press poll.

Stevenson's nationally telecast speech climaxed a busy day in Boston. The Democratic presidential candidate earlier combined an attack on Eisenhower's stand on the hydrogen bomb with a confident prediction of victory next Tuesday.

Repeatedly Monday Stevenson stressed that he thinks the Democratic tide is rising.

Monday night he put it this way:

"Nobody could have been with me in my recent travels without realizing that America has awakened from its sleep, that the fires are burning—and that it's going to be a hot time in Democratic Boston and in Democratic America a week from tomorrow."

And Stevenson again hammered away at the theme he used Saturday—both in San Francisco and Los Angeles.

There he called Eisenhower a "part time" and a "shadow" president who was "golfing, fishing or hunting during critical moments in this nation's history."

VIENNA (AP)—The Hungarian army high command announced Monday night that Russian troops have begun to withdraw from Budapest.

The battle of Budapest appeared to be ending, but rebellion still blazed in the countryside.

## 'Vote Day' Planned By Clubs

## Wednesday Set For Promotion

Wednesday will be "Vote Day" on the Michigan State campus.

Thirty thousand buttons urging "Let's All Vote" are being distributed to MSU students and East Lansing residents by members of the Circle K Club and the East Lansing Kiwanis Club.

The Circle K members are giving them to the social chairman of fraternities, sororities and dormitories, who will in turn distribute them to their members.

Other buttons will be passed out by Circle K members in the Union and other campus buildings. Faculty members who are Kiwanians will distribute them to other staffers in their departments.

Don Douglas, Detroit sophomore and chairman of the event, said it is designed to place importance on the idea and the privilege of voting.

If it succeeds this year, he said it may become a group tradition with the quad.

The idea for a get-out-the-vote campaign came from Kiwanis International, which sponsors Circle K Club at a number of American universities.

East Lansing Kiwanians will pass out the buttons in their stores, and distribute them in public and parochial schools.

Mayor Max R. Strother has proclaimed Wednesday as "Vote Day" throughout East Lansing.

## Petitioning Starts For Vacant Seat On Traffic Court

Petitioning begins Thursday for one male undergraduate seat on the Student Traffic Appeal Court which will become vacant at the end of this term.

Petitions may be obtained in the student government office, ground floor of the Union. All petitions must be returned by 5 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 7.

Each applicant will be interviewed and the nominating committee will make its recommendation to student congress on Nov. 14.

Budapest radio carried an announcement by the army command saying the defiant young rebels in the capital will surrender their arms by 9 a.m. Tuesday as the Russians carry out their evacuation.

This followed earlier word from Premier Imre Nagy's government that the rebels had agreed to turn in their arms and the Russians would leave within 24 hours.

But the high command announcement said Hungarian troops were already replacing Russian troops in the industrial section of southern Budapest and that the evacuation of that area would be completed by dawn.

The high command added that replacement of Soviet troops by Hungarians and "unmolested withdrawal from Budapest of the Russians were conditions for additional evacuation of Hungarian forces."

"Withdrawal of Soviet troops will be continued throughout tomorrow in agreement with the pact with the rebels," the high command declared.

Revolutionaries in control of the countryside urged that the rebels disregard the agreement in Budapest.

In London, Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd told Parliament the Russians were pouring more troops into Hungary. "Western diplomats in London received reports of severe fighting in Budapest at noon Monday, with Soviet attacking rebel-held barracks with tanks and self-propelled artillery."

Nagy's shaky regime was trying desperately to restore order and get some control over the country.

Soviet Foreign Minister Dmitri Shepilov announced in Moscow that no Russian troops would leave Budapest until rebel arms were surrendered.

Marshal Georgi Zhukov, the Soviet defense minister, said withdrawal of troops from all of Hungary could be decided upon only by common agreement of all Warsaw Pact members.

AP Correspondent Endre Marton, in a dispatch from Budapest, said Nagy's regime had virtually capitulated to the revolt led by only a few thousand young men.

## 'Flexible Artist'

## Hines' Voice Captures Enthusiastic Audience

Monday night Metropolitan Opera basso Jerome Hines, tall, personable and handsome, presented a concert before an enthusiastically appreciative audience in the Aud.

Hines is the possessor of an enormously powerful, yet perfectly controlled and beautiful voice. But the success of his concert was due to much more than just a beautiful voice.

Hines is an extremely flexible artist. Beginning with the stern majesty of Beethoven's "Die Ehre Gottes," Hines proceeded with perfect ease through the elaborate farce of Mozart's "All You Lovely Women," the restrained bitterness of Schubert's "Der Doppelgänger," the lyrical romanticism of Strauss' "Zueignung," the outlandish buffoonery of Rossini's "La Calzanova," the good-natured satire of Ibert's "Chanson de Sancho," and the happy sermonizing of the negro spiritual, "He's Got the Whole World in His Hands."

Hines, being primarily an opera singer, is quite naturally at his best when rendering an operatic selection. In Verdi's aria "Ella Giunghi Mamo" from "Don Carlos," Hines' talents as an actor-singer reproduced perfectly the heartbroken despair of the king who realizes that his wife does not love him.

As is usually the case with opera singers, Hines tends to perform an art-song in the same manner in which he would perform an operatic aria. The best case in point was his performance of Schubert's "Der Doppelgänger," in which he used all the exaggerated gestures and facial expressions more appropriate to a Verdi aria.

In an art song one looks for a greater emphasis on intimacy and poetic subtleties, because here the poetry stands on an equal basis with the music.

## Advance to Within 18 Miles of Suez

## Egyptians Stunned by Attack But Report No Armed Clashes

JERUSALEM (Tuesday) (AP)—Israeli forces made a big lunge across Egypt's Sinai Desert and Tuesday were reported advancing only 18½ miles short of the Suez Canal.

All available indications were that no armed clash had occurred yet between Israeli and Egyptian army headquarters.

(News analyst J. M. Roberts calls the Israeli-Egyptian situation "the most explosive since the Berlin blockade and the Korean War." See his column on today's editorial page.)

In Cairo, apparently stunned by the audacity of the blow, acknowledged that Egypt had been invaded.

But the Egyptians said in an official communique, the second within an hour, that no clash had taken place up to Monday midnight.

Cairo's big U.S.-built international airport was closed suddenly to commercial planes. It can handle the jet planes of Egypt's air force.

U.S. women and children, trying to flee ahead of a major war scare, were stranded by the airport shutdown Tuesday morning.

The scare spread around the world. Cairo's government-backed newspaper Al-Gumhuriya bannered "Israel Begins War." Other Cairo newspapers carried similar headlines.

Both Al-Gumhuriya and army headquarters insisted the Israelis struck at a relatively unimportant point.

The newspaper said no Egyptian troops were stationed there. The army said the point "is a barren desert region where there is only one frontier check post."

In Washington, the White House announced the United States will honor its pledges to assist the victim of any aggression in the Middle East.

Britain early Tuesday was reported ready to force Israeli troops out of Egypt if their thrust is proved to be an all-out invasion designed to seize some of Egypt's territory.

An authoritative government source said the Eden government is in a position to strike at Israel, or any aggressor in the Middle East, within 24 hours with air, land and sea forces now assembled in the eastern Mediterranean.

The informant said Britain fully stands by the letter and spirit of the 1950 American-British-French declaration on the Middle East and is prepared to join the United States and France in implementing it.

Egypt has been staging military maneuvers in the Sinai Desert. Its strength there is not known.

A high Israeli government source said the operation was designed to wipe out Egyptian commando nests in Sinai.

The Israeli forces were remaining in the area, not withdrawing as in reprisal raids.

que said frontier forces reported the Israeli forces Monday night reached the road junction of El Kuntilla, four miles inside Egypt.

The communique made no mention of deeper penetrations reported by Israeli sources.

The unofficial reports would indicate that the Israelis were dashing across the desert peninsula straight for the international waterway.

Fighting flared up along Egypt's Gaza strip, about 80 miles north of where the north-eastmost of two Israeli prongs crossed into Egypt.

Egypt said Israeli artillery opened fire on the Gaza strip. Israeli quarters said Egyptian forces attacked an Israeli patrol with small arms and mortars, but there were no casualties.

## Hungary May Not Field Olympic Team

LONDON (AP) — Hungary's bloody revolt Monday appeared to have hamstrung the little country's hopes of Olympic glory — even if the Hungarian team with its many stars ever gets to Melbourne.

A London report said that Tati, the country's Olympic training camp, has been the scene of heavy fighting. Ferenc Puskas, Hungary's world-famed soccer captain was reported killed.

There have been contradictory reports whether Hungary, which won 16 gold medals in the 1952 Olympics, still would take part in the 1956 games.

The first radio reports indicated the team had been withdrawn, but a late news broadcast from Radio Budapest quoted the Hungarian Communist party newspaper, Szabad Nep, as saying the team will take part in the games although its start may be delayed.

This agreed with the cable word received by Hungarian Olympic officials who already

are in Melbourne. They said the team would arrive Nov. 10 instead of Nov. 3. The games start Nov. 22.

Thomas de Marffy-Mantuano, captain of the Hungarian Olympic team before World War II and now living in London, said his reports indicated the Hungarian athletes were fighting on the rebel side.

That left outside athletic officials wondering how many Hungarian stars, such as runners Sandor Iharos, Istvan Rozsavolgyi and Sandor Rozsvolgyi were uninjured and fit for the Olympics.

In Lausanne, Switzerland, the International Olympic Committee Monday called for an "Olympic truce" such as existed in ancient Greece during the games, to permit the Hungarian team to leave for the Melbourne games.

Otto Mayer, chairman of the international committee, said the Hungarian team was assembled on an island in the Danube and "nothing is known of its fate."

## Big 10 Group Works On New Athletic Code

CHICAGO (AP) — A special six-man committee labored Monday on a new recruiting and subsidizing Big 10 athletic code.

It will take at least two days to draw up and no announcement will be made until late today.

The new code is in answer to a recent report on Big 10 athletics which revealed abuses and called for a change to curb them or leave the conference open to all kinds of charges and criticisms.

The main part of the new set of rules ties all aid to athletes to proven need calculated by formula. The plan will be presented to the conference at its winter

meetings in December and will become law if it receives unanimous approval.

There are indications that there will be some opposition. This will be mainly from alumni, particularly those of the smaller and less powerful Big 10 universities who think iron-clad restrictions would be an even larger disadvantage than they are now.

Athletic directors and coaches for the most part are expected to back the new plan.

Members of the special committee working on the code are faculty representatives Dean V. C. Freeman of Purdue, Prof. George H. Young of Wisconsin and Prof. Robert F. Ray of Iowa; and athletic directors H. O. Crisler of Michigan, Richard Larkins of Ohio State and Ivan Williamson of Wisconsin.

Sophomore prospect Blanche Martin replaced Mendyk on the second team.

Les Rutledge filled in for Joel Jones at starting left tackle, although Jones is expected to recover from a foot infection in time to start against Wisconsin this weekend.

Reserve tackle Bob Sanders became the fifth Spartan to be sidelined for the remainder of the year when the ligament in his left knee was torn completely.
