Special UN Session Urges to Cease-Fire

Dalles Presents Resolution Asking for Immediate Action

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles yesterday urged an emergency session of the UN General Assembly to call for an immediate cease-fire in Egypt.

In the Assembly a resolution drafted by President Eisenhower and the Soviet Union supports his resolution. That is a first step toward a truce.

It was withdrawn behind the attorney general's desk.

Many numbers refrain from intruding in the area. This applied to Britain and France, who had been involved with preparation of the original resolution.

It was a cease-fire taking effect yesterday and the passage of ships.

which points of the U.S. resolution were the same as contained in a resolution vetoed by Britain and France Tuesday in a split with the United States.

Secretary Omar Souleimani was the chief speaker. He got down to business. Britain and France termed "condemn" the Anglo-French aggression.

United States funds it to Egypt, with whom it has to do, and that would soon constitute "an illegal occupation."

He recited what he called the "long and sad" history of the Middle East. He said the United States must come to the conclusion that past provocations as they have been, "could not justify the armed force which has occurred on the last two days and is going on tonight."

In instances, he said, the reason for an unarmed attack by Israel has been "not to be treated as other aggressions, but with the principles and purposes of the United Nations in view."

He derided British and French aggression as "the consider means of ending the conflict." He cast the two negative votes.

Person Dixon of Britain told the Assembly that Britain and France had acted in the Middle East because of effective power by the Security Council to end the emergency.

He also flouted the UN by maintaining that Israel and denying passage to British and French ships.

He took a stand for an end to the conflict by foreign troops from Egypt. After Dimitri Shepelyak said in Moscow that he would ask the Assembly for an immediate withdrawal of Egyptian troops.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—Prime Minister Eden, acting Conservative leader, yesterday called a vote of confidence in his leadership and gave his supporters a majority of 111 to 101 in the House of Commons.

Eden's speech was the first of the three rapid fire votes in the House of Commons followed one of the shortest debates in parliamentary history.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—Hungary's Foreign Minister, Dr. Gheorghe Gheorghiu-Dej, said yesterday that the Hungarian government had accepted the Soviet demand for a blockade of the country.

Mark the ballot the way you see fit, fill out the information on the envelope, stick on a cent worth of stamp, and drop it in the mail box. Tomorrow could be too late.



Explodes Caves-in Nova Scotia Mine Killed, 118 Trapped Gas-Filled Coal Shaft

HALIFAX, N.S. (AP)—An explosion smashed a coal mine shaft yesterday night, trapping 118 men 3,200 feet underground. Five others were killed.

A man at the pithead told a reporter he believed it was impossible of getting the trapped men out.

Five hours after the explosion, miners had rapped through the coal seam to the surface. Railway and coast guard rescue teams stopped rescuers who wanted to go into the pit.

One man, a miner, had already been brought up twice and two others were sent to a hospital.

One man was killed in the first explosion and died later. Ten other gassed men were also killed.

Volunteers were sent to get to the trapped miners in the mine shafts, but another explosion and absence of gas forced them to withdraw.

The men were buried by the explosion, 3,200 feet down the slope of No. 4 seam.

The coal mine is considered one of the most hazardous because of its proximity with an active fault line.

Crews all over Canada and Britain have been called in by the Royal Navy and Royal Canadian Air Force to help search for the gas pocket.



To loud cheering from the Conservative benches, Eden said he would be pleased to see the United Nations take over the "physical task" of maintaining peace after peace is restored.





Negro stay Democratic.

It is on this economic front, of course, that the Republicans appear to have scored most heavily. The memory of the depression, once the sorest GOP liability, has faded. "The business man—with whom American voters still identify the Republicans—stands in higher political repute than at any time since 1932."

Still, the anger of so many farmers and the quickness with which people swing to the Dem-

ocrats, if squeezed economically, indicate that any serious economic downturn would topple the Republicans.

One paradox of this election is that the Republicans, who traditionally have assailed "too much government," now find that they have taken on the responsibility of managing the economy to keep a high level of prosperity or lose political office.

The second paradox of this

election will be found in the success that Eisenhower, who symbolizes the international GOP wing, has had in winning
