Reds Warn Against U. S. Plans

French Defend Seizure To Take Any Arms Cargoes

PARIS (AP)—France Tuesday served notice on the world's maritime nations it will seize any arms cargoes in Algerian waters that appear headed for rebels fighting the French Army. A spokesman for the foreign ministry made the statement at a news conference in a defense of the seizure Saturday of 150 tons of arms and munitions from the Yugoslav ship Slovija.

Cheaper Oral Polio Vaccine To Be Tested

ST. PAUL (AP)—An oral polio vaccine used by a state medical authority to be cheaper to produce than bulk vaccine will be tested on more than 1,000 persons here starting Monday.

Yugopress did not say what the consequences might be but declared the Yugoslav government is firm in its demand for damage and satisfaction. It called the seizure "pirate action" by a friendly country.

The French claimed the arms had been purchased in Czechoslovakia and were destined for the Algerian rebels via a well-known agent operating in Casablanca. The Yugoslavs claimed the arms were consigned to Morocco for later shipment to the Yemen. Moroccan official sources claimed they knew nothing of the consignment.

The Slovenia was seized in the Mediterranean en route to Casablanca. She was taken to the Algerian port of Oran and her arms cargo unloaded. Later the vessel was allowed to resume its voyage.

French sources in Oran said French ships had previously had brushes with gun running ships off the coast, including one Yugoslav vessel identified only as the "M."

The French met official Yugoslav protests that the seizure was made on the high seas by claiming they intercepted the ship within the 30-kilometer (19-mile) limit they claimed as protection against gun running.

"It was a special situation," the foreign ministry spokesman said. "We received no protests when we published the decree."

You have a specific French way of explaining international law," said a Yugoslav radio correspondent. "You don't seem to stop American ships carrying arms."

We discuss these things with our American friends in advance," the spokesman replied tactily.

Addressing Men's Club Baly Says Student Spiritual Level 'Low'

Denis Baly, on campus as the lecturer for the University Under God series, told the Men's Club at their noon luncheon Tuesday that the spiritual level of students today is "frighteningly low."

Baly addressed an audience of 150 Men's Club members on the topic, "The Encounter of Church and University Today."

Pointing out that the Christian church and education is a necessary one from both sides, he spoke of charges which the church must make against the failure of the university to adequately fulfill its role today, and on parallel charges the university must make against the church.

In response to the question whether the Bible should be taught in public grade schools and universities, Baly said, "Sincerely, yes; because students should have the chance to accept or reject the Christian faith on the basis of their own knowledge of its source book."

But in the practical situation in the United States, perhaps the church must do a better job on its own in basic religious education.

Reuther Challenges Curtice

DETROIT (AP)—Walter P. Reuther Tuesday challenged General Motors President Harold H. Curtice to tell the United Auto Workers' convention how he believes it should shape its 1958 bargaining demands.

Reuther telegraphed Curtice for the UAW's executive board wanted to give him an opportunity to provide the delegates with whatever information you believe will be helpful to them in drafting a collective bargaining program that is sound and realistic.

In keynoting the convention later, Reuther will ask the delegates to endorse a bargaining program that calls for profit sharing, a general wage increase, an extension of the layoff pay plan improved pensions, and other benefits.

The union noted that Curtice, in commenting last week on the UAW's profit sharing proposal, had voiced hope that the company would recognize the economic realities and adopt a sound policy regarding collective bargaining objectives for 1958.

The invitation to Curtice said, "If there is anything unrealistic or unsound about the collective bargaining program that has been recommended to them by the UAW International Execu-

tive Board, the delegates are entitled to know so that they may act accordingly."

Reuther is expected to have no trouble persuading the delegates to ratify his bargaining program which was announced Jan. 13 in a dramatic shift of emphasis on bargaining goals.

The union leadership is confident for the time being Reuther's goal of a shorter work week.

with increased take home pay. Besides Curtice, top executives of Ford Motor Co, Chrysler Corp and American Motors Corp attended Reuther's front stage plan.

Reuther's profit sharing plan would give workers one-fourth of a company's profits before taxes above 10 percent of net capital.

The union also will devote attention to the special assignments to build up the union's strike fund which now has a reserve of \$4 million dollars.

The union leadership is expected to have leveling monthly payments of \$6, in addition to those of \$2, until the fund has been doubled.

Current UAW contracts at GM, Ford and Chrysler expire about June 1. Face-to-face bargaining will begin about April 1.

Hammarskjold Says UN to Remain Arena For East-West Disarmament Controversies

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold declared Tuesday the UN will remain "in one way or another" the main arena for working the East-West deadlock on disarmament.

He indicated he is considering a trip to Moscow for talks with the Russians, who have announced they will boycott any negotiations in the newly-organized UN Disarmament Commission.

Asked if a trip to Moscow was in the works, Hammarskjold said he planned to attend a UN meeting in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, in early March, and that his route "may very well take me to this or that capital which comes now heavily into the picture politically."

Hammarskjold made his views known at a news conference—his first since he returned from talks in London with British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd. He has met also since the first of the year with U.S. Secretary of State Dulles and French Foreign Minister Christian Pineau.

The Secretary General said the UN remains the main framework for disarmament talks, and

that he knows of no government which has taken an opposite view.

He said there were four ways in which UN machinery could be used in the disarmament picture. He listed them as his own office, the Security Council, the General Assembly and the Disarmament Commission.

He welcomed President Eisenhower's suggestion for international cooperation on a science-for-peace program. He called it a sound and hopeful development.

Hammarskjold said also that an agreement for a zone in central Europe free of atomic weapons "might contribute" to progress toward general disarmament. But he said an "atmosphere of confidence" would be the determining factor.

A New Champion Crowned . . .

NEW YORK (AP)—A champion was crowned Tuesday—reluctantly—as the tops in breaking the city's traffic laws. His award was a \$6,550 fine, the highest ever tacked up in the long-standing drive against errant motorists.

The chief magistrate was outraged and said if J. Phillip Cahill, 54, Fairlawn, N.J., doesn't pay the fine by next Tuesday, he'll go to jail for 393 days.

Cahill admitted 131 traffic sins, including parking on the sidewalk.

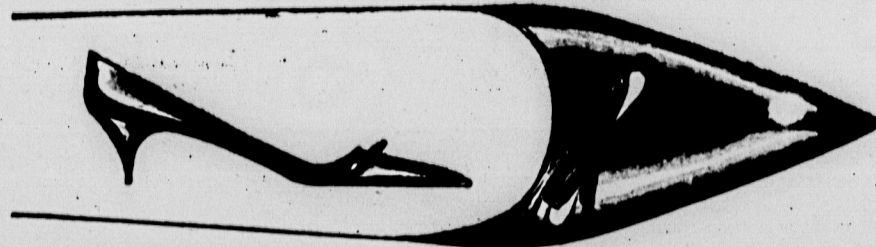
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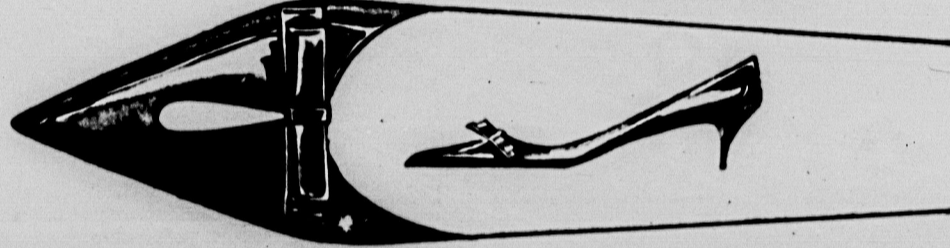
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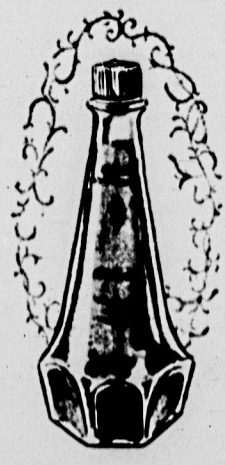
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Leonard Rose Plays Tonight in Aud

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Pettit Stars, But East Wins NBA All-Star Tilt

130-118 Win Aided By Cousy

Pettit Sets Two Individual Records

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Despite Pettit's great double-double performance of 28 points and 26 rebounds, the East took a 130-118 victory in the NBA All-Star game Wednesday night, guided by the old pro of Boston Celtics, Bob Cousy.

Playing with a cast on his injured left arm, Pettit did his best before a partisan crowd of 12,000 at the St. Louis arena. Cousy, and his 6-foot-10 partner, Bill Russell, came through with the stretch. The East pulled away after a close, evenly-contested battle for two quarters.

Cousy, hawking the ball and passing brilliantly, put in 28 points, 16 of them in the last half. Russell had 10 of his 11 points in the last half.

Cousy, driving for the goal, was fouled by Dick McGuire of Detroit as he attempted a twisting pass. He made both free throws, then popped in two more goals and a free throw for a 24-18 lead. The West was without Cousy.

Pettit's game—the best in NBA All-Star games—earned him the Most Valuable Player award for the second time. He also was named MVP in 1956 when he led the West to one of two victories in a two-game series.

Cousy's Boston teammate, Bill Russell, led New York's Ken Keselove and the East a quick 6-point lead at the outset of the all-star game.

The West then battled back to get out ahead before Cousy, a 6-foot-7-inch, valuable pick guard, shot the West out of it.

The East was down 10 points at the third period, but got back quickly to tie the score seven times before pushing ahead 92-91 after three quarters.

"We certainly have our work cut out for us now," said Coach Fordy Anderson Tuesday night.

During the weekend the Michigan State eagles split a two-game road series, triumphing over Northwestern on Saturday afternoon, 83-78, and losing to Wisconsin Monday night, 66-52.

The Spartans returned to the campus five and a half hours later than scheduled Tuesday. The airplane, the Purdue special, was forced to ground at the Grand Rapids airport because of poor visibility and a snow-fall. The team then waited for a school bus to transport the squad the final 60-odd miles.

"Naturally, we were disappointed in losing the Wisconsin game," said Anderson. "My personal opinion was that the team wanted to win badly because they were aware that a win would put them in a first place tie with Michigan.

Faced by this terrific pressure we were unable to get the ball off the basket. There wasn't any lack of effort on any individual's part. We just couldn't get the job done.

"It's no time to sit around and complain. More confidence and determination will be needed and we feel that all the students will come out to back us this Saturday like they did for the Purdue game."
