## Protestants Try Sunday Work Stop

### Bill Stated Today For Legislature

Protestant church leaders in Michigan joined Tuesday in an effort to halt the "rapidly growing trend to changing Sunday from a day of worship and family relaxation to a seventh day of retail selling."

The Michigan Council of Churches, composed of 17 Protestant denominations, endorsed a bill which will be filed in the Michigan Legislature to prohibit retail sales on Sunday, but which will make adequate provision for certain necessities and emergency services.

The church group said the bill incorporating the proposals will be filed today in the legislature by State Representative Alison Green (R), Kingston, House Majority Leader; Louis Mazzano (D), Wakefield, House Minority Leader; Representatives Frank D. Williams, (D), Detroit, Andrew Holt (R), Grand Rapids, Edwin Fitzpatrick (D), Detroit, and others.

"We believe a Sunday closing law in Michigan is the most satisfactory means of preserving the traditional meaning of Sunday and of ending this gross commercialization," said Harold C. McKinney, Jr., of the Michigan Council of Churches. McKinney, the Council's Director of Public Affairs, said church groups had for nearly a year endeavored to persuade the majority of establishments that were open on Sunday to agree to a close.

"Sale of food products would be limited under the proposal to bread, deli-cate-sses and dairy items employing not more than three persons. At least one of them shall be the proprietor or member of his or her immediate family."

The law would exempt the mail sale of drugs, medicines, milk, ice cream, books, newspapers, magazines, sporting supplies, souvenirs, athletic and recreational equipment, tobacco products, certain farm products and the wholesale sale of fresh fruits and vegetables in season. It would permit medical treatment of ill or injured persons and animals and emergency repair of transportation, cooking, heating and cooling facilities.

## Tunisia Set For Move By French

### Threatens to Blast Ships at Bizerte

TUNISIA — Tunisia threatened Tuesday night to fire on any French warships entering the big French naval base at Bizerte. It is on the northern-most headland of Tunisia, on the Mediterranean 37 miles north-northwest of Tunis.

A Tunisian government spokesman said the government's order of last weekend following French troop movements in that country also applies to naval units and hence to French warships at Bizerte.

As an alternative to shooting, the government said, ferriesboats may be sunk across the harbor channel to block it.

Warships in the harbor will be allowed to leave before any shooting begins.

The ferries are part of Tunisia's efforts to cut off French military forces from Tunisia. Tunisia renewed French demands after Saturday's French bombing of Soviet Sea Youngs in the Algerian frontier.

The Bizerte port and the area around it are controlled by the French.

The big port was used by the Nazis in World War II until it was almost destroyed by an earthquake and then seized by allied forces. In the more distant past it was used by the Barbary pirates and deeper in history by the ancient forces that resulted over North Africa.

The French retained the base under the agreement that gave Tunisia independence from colonial rule in 1956.

## Flight Approaching 60 Hour Mark

# Airman Now Undergoing Simulated Trip to Moon

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. — Airman Donald G. Farrell soared toward the 60 hour mark Tuesday night on his mythical trip to the moon.

Farrell, 31, entered the experimental sealed cabin — designed to duplicate conditions in cabins of space ships — at 9:31 a.m. Sunday. He plans to stay there until Sunday morning.

The flight is part of the George B. Moore space simulation study and is being held at the Air Force Research Laboratory at Brooks AFB, Texas. The flight is being held in a 14-day period of the usual 24 days.

Conformity by Itself Not the Big Danger

There have been so many editorials about conformity that it has almost become a joke.

Editorials dealing with conformity slam it as the cause of almost everything wrong with the world. However, in doing so they are forgetting one thing—conformity is the basis of our society.

The true aim of editorials on conformity is the checking of overemphasized conformity, in other words the person that is trying too hard to conform and in doing so is defeating his own purpose.

Conforming to a degree to the standards of the community in which one lives is usually necessary but overconforming can be extremely dangerous.

An example of overconformity is hero worship—when a person does only those things that his hero does without trying to evaluate their value.

Overconformity is dangerous to a society, because in a competitive society new ideas are needed to keep abreast of competition and it tends to retard their development.

The need of being an overconformist is a sign of psychological insecurity, false sense of security being found in dressing and thinking like someone else rather than thinking for one's self.

When it is realized that the only true security of man is his ability to think and make things, then man no longer craves this false sense of security.

The causes of conformity are hard to find. They are hidden within the maze of things a man does in the course of his life.

Not overconforming does not mean being an oddball. Not overconforming should not be a fetish. It means adapting ideas to your own use and then going on and developing them.

'Let 'em Live,' Objectors Say

To the Editor:

On this as on virtually all university campuses the rare instances of reading the Holy Bible are chiefly occasioned by an intent to substantiate either or both of two opposing viewpoints in a dispute hinging on the ethical relationship of man to the state.

Customarily, a verse is quoted which, taken alone and at face value, supports the petitioner's stand. Ripped out of context with remarkable disdain for its particular Biblical setting, the situation and persons for whom it is relevant and its relation to the rest of the Bible, the verse is foisted off as the "word of God" as that word speaks to the controversy at hand.

Thus it is that you have purported to show that Exodus 21:12 is God's answer to the question of judicial killing. But those verses immediately following 21:12 were rather conveniently disregarded. In them, quite as adamantly as in 21:12, death is decreed for those who strike too slaying, either parent, kidnapping, cursing either parent.

Elsewhere in Exodus and in the three books directly following it, all of which deal solely with the Israelites under Moses, like punishment is reiterated for those offenses and extended to punish the teaching of Mt. Sinai and the acts of adultery, sodomy and prostitution. And this by no means exhausts the list of capital offenses.

The Bible states (Romans 3:21-24 and Hebrews 8:6-13 among many others) that the ritual law of Moses or Old Covenant (Testament) of which those punitive declarations are a minor part, and those which the moral law comprising the 10 Commandments is a distinct entity, was never intended to do anything other than to keep pure from sin the Jews who had just been brought out of bondage and into a total, unique theocracy, until the time that Jesus' Christ came.

That the Jews, along with most of the Gentiles then and now, reject his self-given does not make the Old Covenant applicable now. It is really convenient with the Bible is probably asking too much of whoever will turn to it merely as an easily distasteful buttress to argumentation. But what about consistency, objectivity and intellectual honesty?

CONRAD H. BEHLER ED NOTE: We finished Exodus too, Conrad, and would assume that he who has no such sin should cast the first stone at the mother-cursers. How about you? And by the way, when you swear on the Bible, which Testament do you swear on?

To the Editor: Men in a society is familiar with the folkways and mores of his habitat. He knows right from wrong. If he commits a tort or felony he knows that he will be dealt with accordingly. This is a description of a normal man.

We have mental deranged people in our institutions today receiving endless treatment, because maybe eventually some will be cured and will be able to live and think like normal human beings. Fortunately those people have been committed to institutions before they became menaces to society.

Would you be able to imagine the destruction that would occur if there were no institutions of mental correction? We would

not be safe in the streets. Should we kill the helpless, or help the helpless help themselves?

There are many men who are mentally deranged and who are living outside the institutions of correction. How could these men think for themselves? They need our help. People with mental deficiencies who are left unguided are people with an uncoordinated balance who do not know right from wrong.

A person who kills people without knowing his victims cannot be in his right mind. We could kill this person because he killed others, which would make him worthless to society. In his present state of mind he is worthless to himself and society both. By killing him would this solve future crimes?

Men who are unbalanced are not to be subjected to violence. These men should be committed to mental institutions for proper treatment. Nobody thought there would be a cure for polio before the Salk vaccine came out. Through constant research of the brain of the mentally retarded we could find a cure.

Revenge is no way of solving problems. Corrections have to be incorporated systematically with thought and valid reasoning.

There is one point with which you will obviously agree. Our siblings, mothers, fathers, and friends, lives are worth protection.

Let us throw our biases and prejudices away and let us as a unit to help the helpless help themselves.

I see your editorial carried some comment and it is not surprising that some (you didn't say what percent) was favorable. When the editor indulges in fuzzy thinking it is not unexpected to find fuzzy thinking in your readers' agreeing. I think the good part is that on an emotional subject of this sort there were those who took time to write and present logic for not taking the life of a beast like Starkweather.

Since the dawn of human life the way and the only way has been the love for an ever-mathematical, not surprising that "Ex-act" also has this but to us as a Christian method is not in keeping with the facts—if we are going to use Christian logic alone as a basis for deciding this issue.

Christ agreed with and used the 10 Commandments but I do not recall ever reading an agreement in the New Testament

with the passage in Exodus that you gave as your authority. The entire Old Testament is filled with bloody and horrible happenings any part of which, if taken as the way of life for the Christian, would allow us to kill and murder with peace of mind. It just so happens that this is not the way of the New Testament, which must be your basis and therefore still comes back to the simple statement, "Thou shalt not kill."

Your thinking is even more undefined and fuzzy when it comes to psychology. It is an obvious fact that you are just not in on things. You are mixing up the facts about a cured person and one who has been discharged from a mental institution just because he is nearly or partly cured and there is no more room for him. You did say that no one who commits murder is in his right mind yet in the next sentence you condemn him for it rather than offer to cure him.

I do not have much sympathy for the statement that only society can be blamed for a person's troubles so therefore society should be punished, but there is some truth in the statement. Enough, though, so that we might say that society and the person are to blame and society should do what it can to help the man and should never give up. No person is hopeless. We may not say whether he will be hopeless in five, 10 or 20 years.

Your motive is still one of pure unadulterated revenge. You hate him because you fear him and because you do not understand him. I admit he is horrible. He is or was a beast! He should not be allowed to run around and drop in to see a psychiatrist once a week. No one, who wrote, I feel, advocated that.

No one would consider now that he could be cured in one or two years and then be fit to baby sit (although he might be). But in view of ethical reasoning based on the Christian religion and in view of the facts of the illnesses and cures of the mind, I feel that any man who saves "we should have capital punishment" is taking the short-sighted, easy, immoral, unethical and without any doubt wrong way out.

We will advise nothing this way, any more than warning countries have solved anything throughout centuries of war (a thing quite accepted in the Old Testament but which I think even you would object to).

# Chou Quits Post In Red Regime

HONG KONG (AP)—Chou En-Lai stepped down as Red China's Foreign Minister Tuesday and a close associate, Vice Premier Chen Yi, took his place. Chou remained Premier with his high standing in the government apparently as firm as ever.

Foreign Radio said the change was recommended by Chou himself as part of a shakeup in the Communist machinery for the next of the nation's second five-year plan.

Observers here felt the move would concentrate on the foreign problems and to bolster relations with the Communist party. At this stage, foreign news take a back seat to the task of making back to China an industrial power.

The 69-year-old Chou, Communist premier, has spent most of his life in international affairs but observers here noted that the Red Chinese government that he advocated through military post victory.

The step of Communist China at present does not seem to be foreign affairs but rather to concentrate on the task of building up his position in the party and government.

Red China now is launching a second five-year plan. The emphasis is on industrial development in the hope of putting millions to work at making the country one of the world's industrial powers.

There also is the possibility that health may have dictated the change of his duties. Although there are no indications of any major health defects, Chou at times appeared to be unwell during his visit to India and southeast Asia a year ago.

There has been in the past a rumor that Chou Yi, most active of the vice premiers, is being groomed as a successor to Chou's duties. His appointment as foreign minister is a major promotion. But at the same time it would take him out of the Communist international affairs, where he has been active for many years.

At the moment that Chou will manage a good part of his time in Red China.

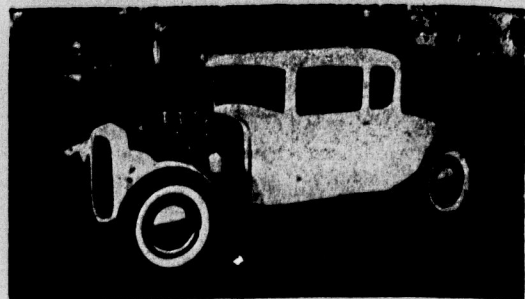

### In Defense

RECENTLY A WELL known Detroit sports writer charged that Big 10 track suffered its "worst blow in 25 years" in Saturday's Michigan State Relays.

I do not intend to dispute this fact—only point out that Michigan State's failure to grab any first place honors was the result of a gamble.

In all fairness to journalistic truth and Coach Karl Schlademann I would like to point out some of the factors overlooked in the story charging the downgrading of the 10 track.

I include Coach Schlademann—retiring this year after 17 years in his profession—because the performance of any team reflects its coaching.

The story pointed out that Big Eight schools won 17 of the 17 events in which they were pitted against Big 10 teams. Michigan and Michigan State—perennially strong track—both failed to win even one event.

Agreed. But it should be quite apparent to all critics that Coach Schlademann used both Capt. Ick' Levan, Olympic silver medal winner, and Sophomore Willie Atterberry, holder of the world's record for the 600-yard dash, in the two-mile and university mile relay.

LEAVAN, WHO HAS run the 1000-yard run in 2:14.4 more than once early this year, could easily have beaten Wisconsin's Dan McKinney, who won the event in 2:19.5.

Badger Jesse Nixon, winner of the 600 with a 1:12.3 time, would have had his hands full if Atterberry, who set a world record of 1:08.5 at the Ohio Relays in 1957, had run against him.

Atterberry also held the fastest times in the 440 and the 880 yard dashes of any frosh or junior college athlete in the nation in 1957.

Incidentally, State placed second in the two-mile relay. Sophomore Herb Fisher, who placed fourth in the 300, looked very impressive, finishing second to Purdue's Bill Ebertson in Saturday's preliminary heats.

Ebertson, who won the preliminary heat in 3:13, was on to win in the finals posting a fast 3:10 time.

**FORDDY KENNEDY EARNED** fourth out of a field of 15 runners in the mile run, behind Central Michigan's Ed Vanderhuel who raced to a 4:16.6 clocking.

Hugh Encks of Purdue topped second while a lone Big Eight entry placed third.

This article is not intended to be an alibi for Michigan State's track team or that of any Big 10 school—for neither one needs an alibi, each can stand on its own record in past years.

Of the three records set in Saturday's meet, ALL THREE were set by schools from the immediate midwestern area and two by Big 10 schools.

Wisconsin's Jesse Nixon set a new meet record of 1:12 in the 600. Ohio State's Glenn Davis set a new meet and fieldhouse record of 1:08.9 in the 75-yard high hurdles; he also tied the meet record of 1:08.3 in the lows—and Macquette's Ed Hoyle set a new meet and field house record of 14.6 in the pole vault.

If this isn't enough to convince critics of their error in thinking and still all voices of the ill-informed, then I can only hope for the best—and expect the worst.



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# Spartans on Top 2nd Time Big 10 Cage Lead Shifts

First one team than another that's the way the Big 10 basketball leadership has changed. Michigan, which is now in first place, was on top of the heap for the longest period—19 days. During this duration, the Spartans were idle because of weather exams and the other teams weren't able to take advantage of their fall.

But when Michigan returned to action it quickly gave up its position to first place. Michigan State's eagles were set in line to lead the closely-scheduled teams. They held the lead exactly a week. A Spartan victory over Indiana and a Michigan win over Illinois placed the Spartans back in the lead.

Monday night, however, Michigan slipped down as the Hoosiers by losing to Minnesota 30-29, and with State and Iowa winning they became favorites.

As the league's race begins to get its unpredictable pattern, the team could win the championship.

The Spartans could break the deadlock with Indiana Saturday if they defeat Illinois because the Hoosiers are idle until Monday.

A primary factor in this year's chase has been the home court.

The 42 conference games played to date, visiting clubs have been able to win but seven games and Iowa is the only

team to boast two foreign court triumphs.

In the second half of the campaign if the home squads continue to win as consistently as they did in the first half the schedule favors State, Indiana and Purdue.

The Spartans and Hoosiers, co-favorites last year, are even in the number of home and road games left. Both have to play three before local fans and three away contests.

Purdue, (5-4), has three games at home and two away. Michigan, (4-3), has a definite

disadvantage by hosting three teams and playing four games abroad.

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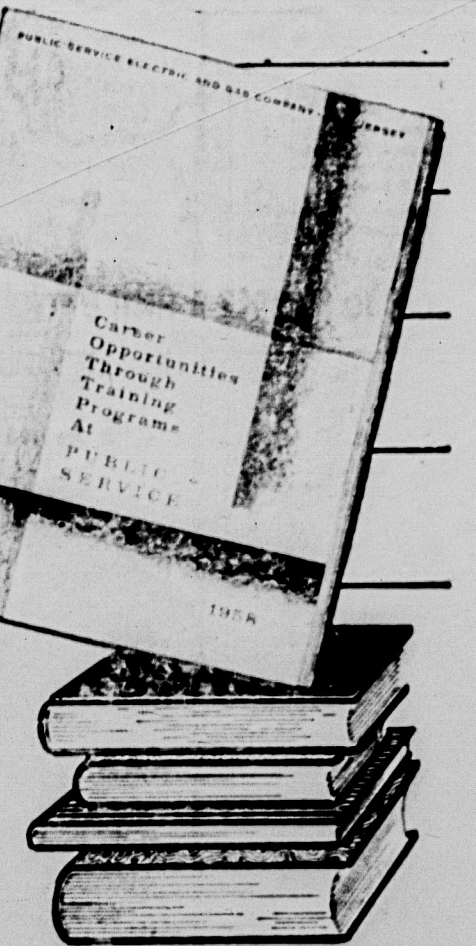
