

Indonesia Remains United

Situation Threatens Civil War

Sukarno Returns, Ignores Agitators

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — President Sukarno returned Sunday from his long tour abroad with a declaration that Indonesia remains united. He publicly ignored the establishment of a rebel government in central Sumatra which others fear may lead to war.

"When I left this country 40 days ago," Sukarno told a well-known crowd on his arrival in Tokyo, "I called on the entire people of Indonesia to keep the country united. When I return I find this still true. I am really moved by all that has happened here. But there was action behind the scenes."

One of Sukarno's top lieutenants, Deputy Premier Hardi, said the situation is serious.

"I am convinced that if a satisfactory settlement is not reached with regard to the dissatisfaction of the central Sumatran people, the situation may become explosive and turn into what may be called a civil war," Hardi said.

The military chief of staff, Maj. Gen. Abdul Harris Nasution, said the rebel leaders' traitors and evaded their arrest.

The Army intelligence chief, Lt. Col. Sukendri, said Indonesian military forces are proceeding with caution. "But he added:

"As far as we are concerned we want to avoid violence or use of military force."

Spartan Women's League and Junior Pan-Hellenic Council are also cooperating in the drive. They will finance the packaging and shipping of the books and clothing to the University of Manila, according to Walton.

Wolverine Ice Jinx Erased by State

Pucksters Win Two, Take Press Trophy

Michigan State's icers broke two monopolies of the University of Michigan as they downed the Wolverines twice during the weekend. State stopped Michigan Friday night at Spartan Arena, 3-1, and was victorious in the Michigan Arena Saturday night, 2-1. Saturday night's game was won in sudden death overtime.

First State broke a 30-year jinx on Michigan's ice. The State hockey team to win at Michigan was the 1928 team. Second, they won the Michigan Press Trophy which was originated in 1930 and has been the property of the Wolverines since then.

The pucksters started at a big clip Friday night as they went at 7:16 of the first period. Keith Christofferson flipped the puck past Ross Childs, Michigan goalie, with Joe Pagan and Bob Jasson getting assists. Fred DeVuono added another goal at 16:22 in the second period with assists being awarded to Ross Parke and Bob Armstrong.

Michigan spoiled goalie Joe Wagner's bid for a shutout at 19:10 of the second period. Gary Sawyer cooled the puck in after a scramble in front of the State goal. State outshot the Wolverines in this period, but was unable to score.

Bill MacKenzie, unassisted, pipped the puck past Childs at 21:11 of the third period to seal the victory. Michigan never threatened during the rest of the game.

Michigan's plans for revenge went up in smoke as State routed the Wolverines on their home ice, 2-1, in overtime. Michigan State outshotted, outplayed, outscored, and thus dominated the play throughout. The only goal in which Michigan excelled was the shots on net. Michigan outshot State 46-31.

The icers did everything except put the puck past Childs in the first period. Parke had a couple of golden opportunities, but was plagued by bad luck on each try. The teams went to their dressing rooms with a scoreless tie.

DeVuono, scoring his second goal of the series, put the Spartans ahead at 7:20 of the second period. Parke and MacKenzie picked up assists on this goal. Both teams had other good opportunities to score in this period, but Selinger and Childs held them at bay.

The third stanza saw Michigan tie the game with one minute to play. A half minute later Michigan shot at the State goal and the red light went on. It seemed that Michigan had scored a goal, but the officials overruled and the goal was not counted. Selinger had made a terrific save and had the puck in his glove.

Terry Moroney, in a beautifully executed maneuver, faked a shot to the left of Childs and skated to the right corner of the net and pushed the puck between Childs' legs at 6:33 of the overtime period.

Amos Bessone, State coach, said, "It was a terrific team effort and we deserved to win." He also commented, "Selinger was great and Red (Mel Christofferson) did a good job of tying up Michigan's high scorer, Bob White."

Swordsmen Win and Lose In Triangular

In a triangular meet Saturday at Jensen Gym, Coach Charles Schindler's fencing team won one and lost one to bring its season's record to five wins and two losses.

In the first meet State's fencers lost to the University of Wisconsin, 18-9. State's sabre team lost, 5-4, with Harold McCalla winning three and John Kalasky winning the other one. The foil team lost, 7-2, with St. Simons winning both of the victories. The epee team lost, 6-3, with Roger Jiran winning two and Ed Hildebrandt winning one.

In the second meet, the University of Wisconsin defeated the University of Iowa by the identical score of 18-9.

In the third meet, State's fencing team defeated the University of Iowa, 21-8. The foil team defeated its opponents, 7-2, with St. Simons winning three while Forrest Mark and Terry Glimm both won two.

In Sabre State won, 6-3, with John Kalasky and Truman Schragg both winning two while Harold McCalla and Roger Noon each won one.

In epee State easily defeated Iowa, 8-1, with Roger Jiran and Ed Hildebrandt both getting three aims while Randy Hippler accounted for the other two.

Wisconsin, Illinois Bow to Gymnasts

The Michigan State gymnasts Saturday turned back Wisconsin, 75-35, and Illinois Navy Pier, 66-46, to win the triangular meet at Madison, Wis.

The Spartans took firsts in six events, capturing the free exercise, trampoline, side horse, horizontal bar, still rings and tumbling events.

Dick Becker captured first place in the free exercise to remain undefeated in that event. The trampoline event went to Tom Temple.

Cal Girard, high point man for the Spartans, placed first in the side horse event.

Stan Tardibis, State's horizontal bar expert who has scored 290 points on numerous occasions, placed first in his event.

Angie Festa's performance on the still rings rated him a first in that event.

Spartan George Hopely grabbed a first in the tumbling event against Wisconsin competition and a second against Illinois Navy Pier.

Although winning handily Coach George Szypula thought the team looked ragged. "We will have to improve for Michigan," he said.

The Spartans run into their arch rivals Feb. 28 at Jensen. But Northwestern will invade the field house next Saturday for a duel meet.

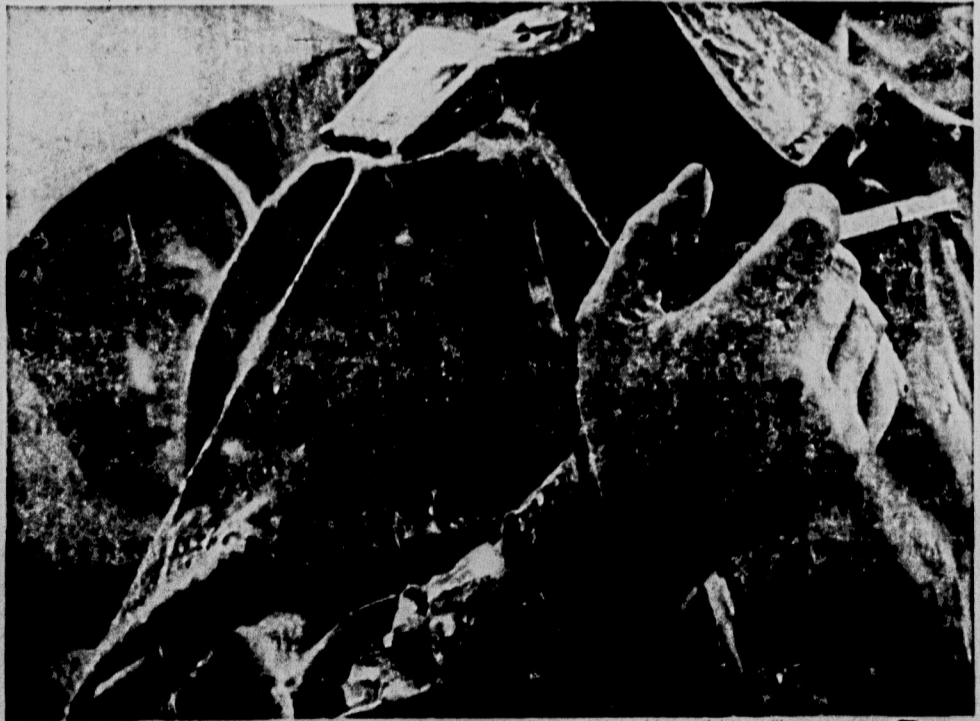

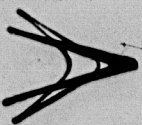

Speaking in the MSU series, "Current Issues in Industrial Relations," Dr. Reynolds said wages

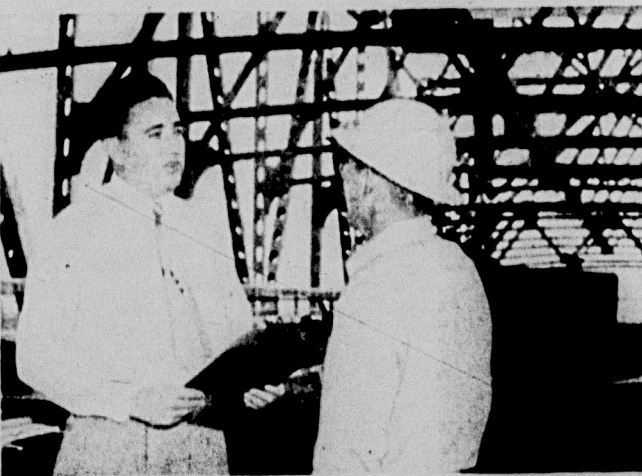

Rebound totals had the Spartans capturing 70 to Illinois' 40. Andregg, 12 points, Healy, 10 points, Olson, seven points, and Lance Olson, seven points, and Quiggle, five points and a field goal, shared in the Spartan blitz.
