AUSG Fight Over, Or Just Beginning?

CONGRATULATIONS, Mr. Walther, and a note of warning. As AUSG President Elect, you inherit a seat of honor, but a seat which has traditionally been faced with weighty problems and problems call for decisions,

In spite of the "game" which AUSG's "honest players" have been so occupied in lately, Student Government still stands. But the score in said game is posted—the respect which AUSG lost through its harv application of its own election code must be regained through the policies of your administration.

This respect, may already have been redeemed in part by the smooth manner in which Thursday's final election was handled. The lesson to be learned here is that if one changes horses in the middle of the stream, one must be aware of the simsequence. When AUSG took this risk, it opened itself to a barrage of criticism. That the elections, for the most part, were run off successfully Thursday helped AUSG lift itself off the floor, but those points lost in the early rounds will long be remembered by the dissat-

One task which your administration faces, that of taking positive steps to insure that a repetition of this year's preprimary fiasco does not occur, may be a headache.

The election procedure itself presents no problems especially-at least, there are no major flaws in organization. The ironic point is that election procedure was so highly organized that it seemed foolproof. Then, after almost a year of planning for this election, things went awry when a red-faced Elections Commission admitted that it had neglected to place one candidate's name on the primary

From here on in, you will be confronted with the prob-lem of seeing a workable code established. The present code, after being submitted to serious scrutiny, shows signs of loopholes when interpreted strictly. This was evidenced by the manner in which campaigning was "con-

If the code is rewritten, it will be necessary for the authors to work toward a replacement which in its appli-cation will eliminate the frequent petty violations that often led to an arbitrary interpretational decision by the all-powerful Elections Review Board.

The elections code problem is just one of many that your administration will be facing next year. Mr. Walther, and we're all hoping that the decisions you will have to

The Positive Approach

Not too many people worry whether or not they accomplish any good purpose. Quite obviously they do.

The reaction to International Festivals-from the moderate number of people who attend—is generally increasing interest in foreign countries.

In this is the first valuable step toward the high ideals International Festival proponents aspire to-a world-wide understanding among peoples and cultivation of good will toward neighbors.

The festival is, we think, a fine way to go about laying groundwork for these distant goals. It is a positive approach to a problem which can too often be handled in a

Rather than preach the evils of intolerance, insist on closing away with prejudice and ignorance, the festival acts as a healthy example of what such practices can yield

We hope no one gets so anxious to do good they destroy what is valuable in the whole concept of an International
