Freshman Clinics Counseling Enters into Varied Fields

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the conclusion of a five-part series explaining the activities and assistance offered by the Counseling Center.

IN ADDITION to its regular counseling functions, the staff of the Counseling Center engages in a number of special activities and projects in service of students and the university.

At the annual high school junior college follow-up conference, counselors confer with high school principals and college directors on the academic and emotional adjustments of freshmen.

Examinations are administered and interpreted to university applicants who are referred by the registrar's office to the Counseling Center, to work cooperatively in assisting these students with their plans.

A number of research projects are carried on within the center with the aims of improving and evaluating the service of the Counseling Center. It also participates with other departments of the university in various research projects.

SPECIAL WORK with students of superior ability is done on by the Counseling Center provided information is useful in starting the Honors College.

Members of the Counseling Center staff are responsible for planning and coordinating the Welcome Week programs for new students each term.

The summer counseling clinics provide a combined orientation and counseling experience for students planning to enter MSU.

This summer will mark the tenth session of the counseling clinics, which are open to all students tentatively admitted to the university. Ten or eleven clinics are held during the summer, each one lasting for three and a half hours.

DURING THIS program students live in dormitories, on the campus, confer with faculty members, are introduced to the registration procedure, learn campus rules, traditions, customs and college songs, and attend a get-acquainted party.

These students also take a battery of orientation tests, talk to a counselor who helps them plan their academic programs on the basis of high school records and test results.

When students leave the counseling clinic, they have made out their tentative enrollments for the coming fall term.

Although this program is entirely voluntary, approximately 45 percent of incoming freshmen attend the summer counseling clinics.

Two experienced directors will present "Altar in the Hills," the fifth student-produced television play of the season, on WKAR-TV Sunday at 12:30 p.m.

Donald Baumgardner, Pontiac senior, will be the dramatic director, while the television director will be handled by Carl Sorenson, East Lansing senior.

Baumgardner, student drama director from Theta Alpha Phi, the national dramatic honorary, has worked on eight major and five minor MSU theatrical productions as a member of the technical crew, an actor, and a director.

The television director, Carl Sorenson, of Alpha Epsilon Rho, the national radio television honorary, has previously directed "Deception," the first in this series of student television plays and a Studio Theater one-act at MSU.

Sunday's WKAR-TV presentation, "Altar in the Hills," is an original script written by R. D. McElroy, an MSU graduate. The story is concerned with a Pennsylvania farming family in the 1930's.

One of their two sons has been gored to death by a prize bull causing the farmer's wife to plead with him to destroy the bull before it kills someone else. The father's reluctance to part with the bull results in tragedy.

The cast includes Janice Freeman, Plant senior; Jerry Coles, Iron Mountain junior; Thomas Leomis, West Junior high school in Lansing; and Richard Westerman, East Lansing Junior high school.

Election Returns Show Walther AUSG Head

18 Elected To AUSG Congress

Small Turnout Marks Balloting

In the elections for seats on the All-University Student Congress, 18 candidates from 13 districts were elected on the basis of small turnouts.

Surprise guest occurred in a district where incumbent Jim Walther lost to Barbara Gault and Beverly Parker.

The closest race occurred in West Yackley where Ann Conroy won over her opponent by three votes.

The three fraternity representatives on the incoming congress will be Dave Hartill, Evan Hensinger and Dave Koster. Seven votes separated Hensinger from Koster and Koster from the lower Jim Kaylor.

In the single men's dorm holding a congressional election, Jerry Perry and Ray Puffer won seats as representatives of Buttrick Hall.

Other Congressmen elect are: South Williams, Helen Hubs; North Williams, Nancy Brown; Snyder, Nancy Howell; West Yackley, Marilyn Nesselt; Gilchrist, Ellen Strong.

Albert Merced, Maxwell and Joseph Lindley, West Yackley; Lina Bowler, South Campbell; Hensinger and East Yackley; Sharon Haines.

All other candidates were seated automatically.

In last year's Congressional election, 51 people were elected at this time. Four districts were forced to hold re-balloting because of failure at the election chairman to comply with the regulations.

According to a count by Harold B. Tukey, chairman of MSU's athletic council and its conference representative, has submitted his resignation from both jobs because of differences on MSU athletic policies.

Reportedly, Tukey, head of the recreation department, has been in conflict with Athletic Director Eugene Munn and President John A. Hahn.

However, Munn had no knowledge or information as to Tukey's possible resignation.

It is a complete surprise to me to hear of such an action by Tukey. Personally, I don't believe he has resigned his post, Munn said.

The Detroit News said Tukey has submitted his resignation to Dr. Hahn, who is due back Sunday from a government-sponsored trip to Nigeria.

But Hahn's secretary commented she had seen no letter of resignation.

The Detroit paper quoted Tukey as saying, "If I do drop out of the athletic job, it will be a clear indication that I don't like the way things are functioning at Michigan State. I can see why newspapers are critical about college athletics."

Munn said that at the last athletic council meeting on April 23, everything was in perfect shape and no atmosphere of a possible breach existed.

Munn pointed out it is Tukey's job to determine policy, and his to carry it out.

A close observer said some controversy existed because Tukey wasn't fully in favor of the new grant-in-aid athletic policy which will be discussed at the Western Conference meeting May 23-24 at Lafayette, Ind.

Tukey could not be reached for comment. He is attending a weekend conference on nuclear energy at the University of Wisconsin. His office expects him to return Monday.

3 Spanish Novelists**

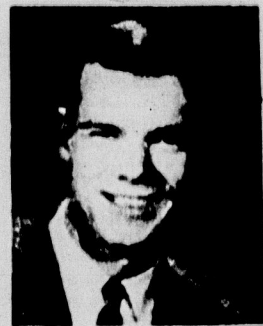

Closing a drawn-out AUSG election night, poll results showed Chuck Walther, Dave Ball, Bill Hampton and Gil Cox, winners of campus presidencies.

Final totals in the AUSG presidential race were: Chuck Walther, 2408; Dave Ball, 1461; Dan Fells, 1416; 450 junior class; Bill Hampton, 947; Eddie Durb, 461; for sophomore class; Gil Cox, 615; Todd Reuling, 359.

Vice-presidents are: senior class, Jack Lundstrum, 108; junior class, Jim Blasen, 803; sophomore class, Dan Riedel, 796.

The runner-up Tukey is, Jim Johnson, 384; Max Barrett, 392; and Ray Leary, 161.

The new class secretaries are: Under Secretary, 508; Ann Stoughton, 896; and Jack Rindholm, 839. Their runners-up: Judy Trever, 197; Dee Van Hala, 567; and Lucy Kelley, 723.

Class treasurers for next term are: senior, Joni Lysett, 424; junior, Judy Harper, 715; and sophomore, Sharon Rhodes, 811. The runners-up: Jim Ledinsky, 383; Lee Tusing, 682; and Yanny Baker, 749.

After an early evening postponement, the votes were tallied on the Administration Building's IBM machines. Barrie Aiken, election committee chairman, stated that he had never seen an election run so smoothly.

The delay was caused by a dispute about junior class campaigning, but the election review board ruled out a complaint against Bill Hampton.

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Bagwell Names Issues

Three-Pronged Campaign Stated

sense."

ly every tax in Michigan at pre-
sent," he claimed.

neglecting his duties and
incompetent administration.
"Go ahead that you are go-
ing to hear me singing a song
in this campaign—Where
Are We? Our Wandering
Bagwell concluded.

Jr. 500 Marks Decade

For the tenth year men's
housing units will build push-
carts to push around West Cir-
cle Drive in the Lambda Chi
Alpha Junior 500.
By May 12 the carts for the
Junior 500 will be completed
and the runners prepared to line
up at the starting line.
Things have changed consid-
erably from 1948 when the first
race was presented. It all started
after the Lambda Chi de-
cided that a Greek Feast at
their house would be too ex-
pensive, according to Dean
Ziegler, 49, originator of the
race.
"The first year they had trou-
ble getting permission but final-
ly the administration allowed
them to close off West Circle
Drive for an hour.
The first race was somewhat
hasty as a few of the cars went
off the course and crashed into
the crowd. This problem was
rectified the next year by a very
careful safety check of all the
cars before the race.
Since the first few races this
type of race has been started
elsewhere. San Jose, Uni-
versity of Kentucky and the Uni-
versity of Georgia are some of
the schools that have since
started such races.
Every year the race has had
a Queen. One of the 500 queens
(Jan. Sommers) later became
Miss Big 10 and then came in
second in the 1954 Miss Amer-
ica contest.

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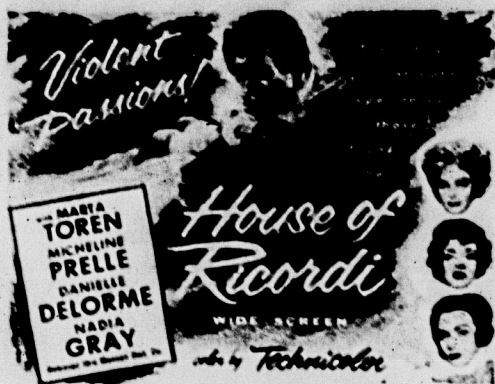

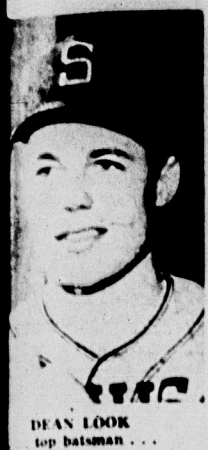

Seaway Statistics Told

"The Department of Commerce and the Government have a vital interest in the accomplishment of the St. Lawrence Seaway," said Bradley D. Nash, deputy under secretary of commerce for transportation.

Speaking at the Fifth Annual Michigan Traffic and Transportation conference Thursday, Nash said that with the completion of the improvements required in the 152 mile stretch between Montreal and Toronto Point and connecting Great Lakes channels, a uniform 27-foot channel will be available from the head of Lake Superior to the tip of Lake Superior.

The significance of the St. Lawrence Seaway is highlighted by the importance of the area that will be served. Within the eight states which border the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence River are 40 percent of the total population of the United States, boasting about 40 percent of the total gross income of the country, he pointed out.

Nash concluded that the opening of the enlarged seaway facilities will increase the water traffic over the St. Lawrence river about fourfold. It will provide cheaper water transportation, an alternate transportation route for many commodities, direct access to foreign markets, as a result of this, the seaway will bring about a complete and permanent adjustment in all markets.

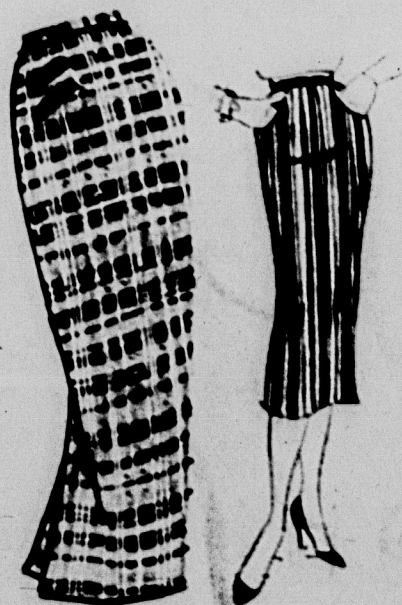
