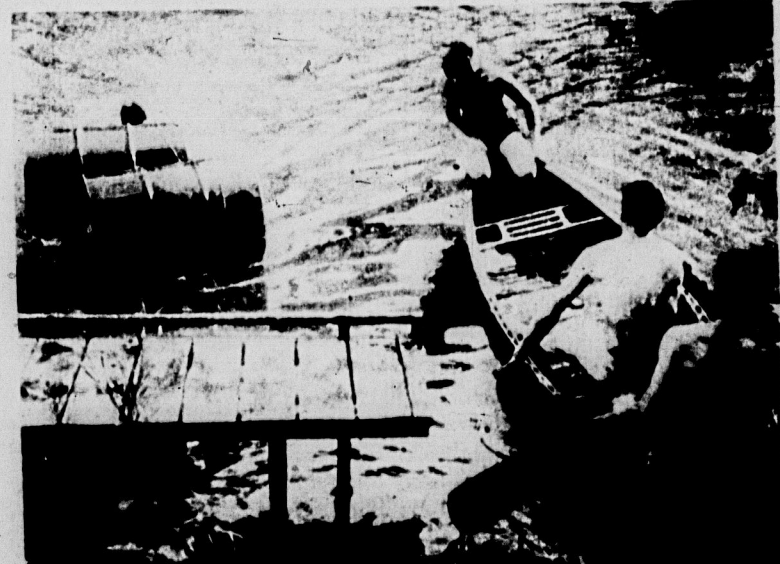

LOGAN TRIAL JURY STILL OUT

Undecided Following Six Hours

Prosecutor Tears Defense Witness

An undecided jury was sent home at 9:45 Tuesday night and ordered to return to County Court and the Claude Logan trial in Mason to resume deliberations at 9:30 this morning, by presiding Judge Louis Conash.
The six-man, six-woman jury began deliberating at 3:45 p.m. Tuesday after hearing the judge charge them with responsibility of bringing in one of three possible verdicts.
They can name Logan, charged with assault and intent to rape Mrs. Carolyn Brown Feb. 7, innocent, guilty as charged, or guilty of assault and battery, the judge said.
Into session for the second day, the trial was twice punctuated with threats of mistrial, once each by defense and prosecuting attorneys. Judge Conash refused each motion, denying sufficient cause.
Prosecuting attorney Jack Warren worked toward destruction of testimony from the defense's only solid witness, Arnold Shaffer, MSU senior who

East Shaw Picks Executives In Mock Political Convention

Jerry Fichtner, Anchorville junior, and Mike Price, Chicago, Ill., sophomore, were elected president and vice president respectively of the mock political convention at East Shaw Tuesday.
Others elected are: secretary, Bob Burnett, Saginaw sophomore; and treasurer, George Sner, Spokane, Wash., freshman.
East Shaw originated this election last year as a variation to the plan used in most men's halls, where voting is conducted at a regular general council meeting without much fanfare.
The main features of the mock convention resemble those of its national counterpart.
Convention delegates are the fifty representatives, five from each of 10 precincts, elected at the beginning of spring term. They form the hall's general council for 1958-59.
The night before the delegates meet, each precinct takes a vote to indicate the men it would prefer in the two top executive posts.
The delegates are bound for the first two convention ballots to follow the voting pattern of the precincts they represent. The five votes may be divided proportionately according to the difference in votes. They may even be broken into halves or quarters to insure a representative vote for all.
At the convention an average of three or four candidates are nominated for each office, though the number is not limited. Candidates have usually entered the race unofficially through posters and campaigning within the precincts.
Following national procedure candidates are nominated through formal nominating speeches and must then make official acceptance replies.
After these public demonstrations are organized by the supporters, including appropriate housemakers and placards.
To win office a man must draw an absolute majority (26) of convention votes. In a manner similar to national convention caucusing, the number of nominees narrows as bartering increases between delegates until one candidate is able to pull the winning majority.
Objectives of this bartering are such choice political plums as the offices of secretary and treasurer, which are chosen by the executive board made up of a governor from each of the precincts, plus the president and vice-president, is also responsible for handling out non-elected residence hall jobs.

Olin Staff Physician Succumbs

Life of Service Ends for Dr. Keim

Dr. Cameron Keim, staff physician at Olin Memorial Health Center, died Tuesday morning at a local hospital. Dr. Keim had been ill from a kidney condition for several weeks.
The 61-year-old physician, of 1413 W. Kalamazoo St., joined the Olin staff Sept. 1, 1955. He had been in private practice in Lansing from 1929 to 1955.
Born in Middletown, Pa., Dec. 31, 1896, Dr. Keim received his B.A. degree from Dickinson college at Carlisle, Pa., in 1921. He graduated from the Medical School at the University of Michigan in 1927.
Dr. Keim was a member of the Ingham County, Michigan State and American Medical Societies; Sigma Chi; Nu Sigma Nu, a merical honorary fraternity; and the Elks club.
Surviving are the widow, Kathryn, a son, 2nd Lt. Cameron Keim, Jr., of Quantico, Va.; two daughters, Mrs. Robert White, of San Francisco, Calif., and Mrs. Jerome Lorenz, of Minneapolis, Minn.; three grandchildren, a brother, Dr. H. L. Keim, of Detroit, and two sisters, Mrs. N. A. Kline and Mrs. E. Z. Smith, of Harrisburg, Pa.
Funeral services will be held at the Gorsline-Runciman Funeral Home Thursday at 4 p.m. Burial will be in Deepdale Cemetery.

Ke Signs Bill, OK's Postal Hike

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower Tuesday signed the bill raising postal rates to \$1.10 a year. Effective Aug. 1, it means a new 4-cent rate on letters, 7 cents on air-mail.
Postage on unsealed Christmas cards will be three cents instead of the present two cents under the postal rate hike. The change also will be effective Aug. 1 for all unsealed third class mail.
This is the biggest rate increase bill ever passed by Congress. It makes substantial gains in all classes including books on newspapers, magazines and advertising circulars.
The measure also carries the largest pay increase ever granted postal workers. The 520,000 carriers would get \$265 million in raises, with most receiving 10 percent. The pay raises are retroactive to Jan. 1.
Waiting behind the postal legislation is a bill to give one million other federal employees a general pay increase.
The President asked for \$700 million in rate increases and \$1.160 billion in postal pay raises, an across-the-board 6 percent raise.
The administration also strongly opposed other features of the bill while it was before Congress, including the retroactive feature.
In a statement announcing he had signed the measure, Eisenhower said:
"I have taken this action because it is clear that those provisions which are in the public interest outweigh the objectionable provisions of the bill."

De Gaulle's Bid Ousted

Pflimlin Given Confidence Vote

PARIS (AP) — Premier Pierre Pflimlin offered his resignation early this morning but withdrew it after an insistence of President Rene Coty.
Coty said a new government should be ready to take over before Pflimlin's resignation could be accepted.
PARIS (AP) — Premier Pierre Pflimlin won a vote of confidence in the French National Assembly early Tuesday.
The vote was on Pflimlin's bill to give the executive more power to deal with crises.
It shut the door for the present on Gen. Charles de Gaulle's bid to take over power in France by parliamentary means.
The vote was 468-165.
This gave Pflimlin a majority of 90 after subtracting the Communist votes. Pflimlin had said he would resign if not given a clear majority of the non-Communist vote.
He rejected the Communist votes outright.
But three of his cabinet ministers resigned before the vote was counted, declaring they could not hold office with Communist support.
After the vote was counted and Communist support was discarded by Pflimlin, the three said they probably would withdraw their resignations and stay on with Pflimlin.

Cardinal Stritch's Funeral Service Slated Thursday

ROME (AP) — The body of Cardinal Stritch, who died last night, will be buried in the church he served all his life, lay in state Tuesday night in the church, overlooking Rome and the Vatican.
All day long cardinals, archbishops, bishops, priests and student priests of the Roman Catholic church, members of the diplomatic corps to the Vatican and many others called to pay last respects.
Funeral services will be held Thursday morning in Rome's church of St. Ignatius. Members of the College of Cardinals in Rome will attend.
Thursday afternoon, Cardinal Stritch's body will be flown to Chicago for final services.

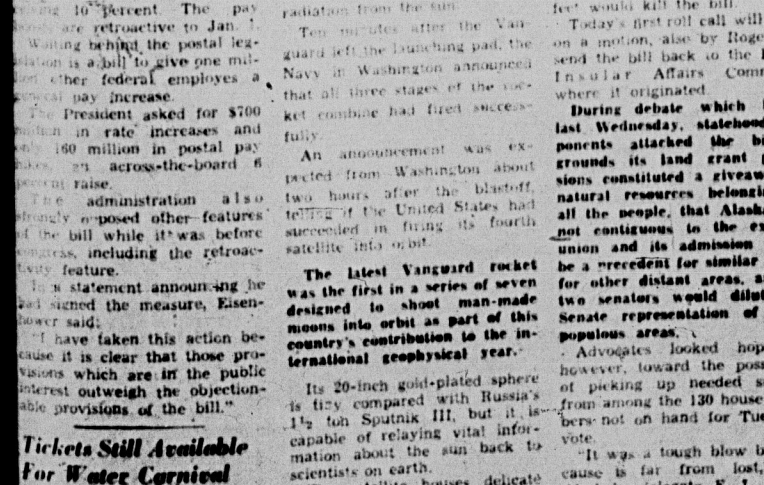
Alaska Statehood Bill Faces Knockout Blow

WASHINGTON (AP) — Opposition forces Tuesday maneuvered the Alaska statehood bill into position for a possible knockout blow.
On an unrecorded roll call vote, House members passed down the aisle and did not respond by name, the House voted 144-196 to strike out the bill's enacting clause.
Statehood forces, hurt but not out, had overnight to rally their forces for a roll call vote to stave off final defeat.
The motion to strike the enacting clause, made by Rep. Walter Rogers (D-Tex.), was a technical maneuver which in effect would kill the bill.
Today a first roll call will come on a motion, also by Rogers, to send the bill back to the House Interior Affairs Committee where it originated.
During debate which began last Wednesday, statehood opponents attacked the bill on grounds its land grant provisions constituted a giveaway of natural resources belonging to all the people, that Alaska was not contiguous to the existing union and its admission would be a precedent for similar action for other distant areas, and its two senators would dilute the Senate representation of more populous areas.
Advocates looked hopefully, however, toward the possibility of picking up needed support from among the 130 House members not on hand for Tuesday's vote.
"It was a tough blow but our cause is far from lost," said Alaska's delegate E. L. (Bob) Bartlett (D).
Rep. Leo O'Brien (D-N.Y.), territories subcommittee chairman, attributed the defeat to "absentees, not people changing their positions."

Vanguard Launched

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A Navy Vanguard rocket shot skyward Tuesday, carrying a 214 pound satellite equipped to solve the secrets of ultraviolet radiation from the sun.
Ten minutes after the Vanguard left the launching pad, the Navy in Washington announced that all three stages of the rocket combine had fired successfully.
An announcement was expected from Washington about two hours after the blastoff, telling if the United States had succeeded in firing its fourth satellite into orbit.
The latest Vanguard rocket was the first in a series of seven designed to shoot man-made moons into orbit as part of this country's contribution to the international geophysical year.
Its 20-inch gold-plated sphere is tiny compared with Russia's 1 1/2 ton Sputnik III, but it is capable of relaying vital information about the sun back to scientists on earth.
The satellite houses delicate instruments to measure ultraviolet hydrogen — known as violet alpha rays — shooting from the sun in solar flares.
The 12-foot Vanguard blasted off from a huge pool of white flame and smoke at 10:47 p.m.

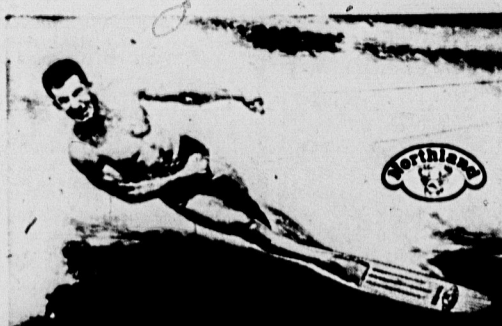
Professor to Speak At Owosso Banquet

Road Building Loans Hit Top

LANSING (AP)—Sale of \$100 million in bonds, largest borrowing in history for state highway construction purposes, was approved Tuesday by the state administrative board. The huge borrowing will permit a speedup in road work under the state's one and one-quarter billion, five year construction program. It will finance 245 miles of new highways to be placed under construction this year and next, including 180 miles of four lane divided construction. The board approved a single bid from a syndicate headed by Blyth and Co., and including six other bond houses. The bonds will carry an average interest rate of 3.30732 percent.

Alfred Lawrence, chief of the department's finance division, described the interest rate on the 25 year bonds as "very favorable under the circumstances."

He said the bond market had softened in recent days, largely because of reported plans of the federal government to re-

MSU Alumni Achievements Recognized

Dr. Lyndford Wickerham, one of MSU's outstanding alumni of the century, was honored Tuesday by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The department's "superior service award" went to Wickerham for his scientific achievements in the biology of yeasts. He is in charge of one of the foremost collections of yeasts in the world at the department's research center at Peoria, Ill. He is considered an international authority on the classification of yeasts. Recognized as a pioneer in the field, Wickerham's findings on classification and genetic behavior have been put to wide commercial use. He has also developed a theory of yeast evolution, tracing it from primitive yeasts originally dependent upon coniferous trees to the highly refined independent organisms of today. Wickerham received his bachelor's degree from MSU in 1934 and his master's in 1935.

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Norman Van Brocklin said Tuesday he was considering whether another few seasons of pro football would be worth giving up a business career.

"My wife and I are kicking it around," he said. "It pretty much boils down to a life in football or in business."

Van Brocklin, veteran quarterback with the Los Angeles Rams, was traded Monday to the Philadelphia Eagles. He had announced his retirement from football but this was generally believed to have stemmed from clashes with Ram coach Sid Gillman.

Will he play with the Eagles? "I don't know," Buck Shaw is coming up here I think and we'll talk it over. It means moving back to Philadelphia, a long move that's an imposition on my wife."

Shaw is coach of the Eagles. "He'd be a great fellow to play for," said Van Brocklin.

Van Brocklin is now Northwest manager for a pipe coating company. The job would have to go if he returned to football.

"If I play again," he said, "I must make up my mind to stay in football, turning to coaching when I'm through playing."

For The Record Race Fans' Utopia

WHAT ANNUAL SPORTING EVENT is greater than the World Series, the Kentucky Derby and a heavyweight title fight rolled into one? To the thousands of big car racing fans whose undivided attention will be directed at a 2 1/2-mile brick oval in the center of Indiana this Friday, there can be no answer but the Indianapolis '500'.

The qualifying trials of the past few days have provided an exciting preview to the 200-lap feature, with top average time for the 25-mile run being a record-breaking 145.974 m.p.h. and competition running keen throughout the 33-car starting field. It took better than 142 m.p.h. to qualify.

Juan Manuel Fangio, internationally-famous road racing champion, dropped out as a prospective driver after taking test runs in a handful of cars. His action has been labeled by some as an indication of the highly-specialized skill—obtainable only through years of behind-the-wheel experience—required of a '500' pilot.

A host of veteran Indianapolis competitors will be on hand, while others like 1952 winner Troy Ruttman have been bumped by first-year men. The machinery, as usual, represents some of the world's most expert craftsmanship, with the name "Zink Special" seemed destined to participate.

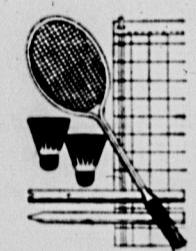

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Foreign Relations Committee urged an economic aid program for Russia's European satellites Tuesday to widen cracks it said had appeared in the Iron Curtain.

Featured speaker for the evening was Ruth Jameson, secretary to President John A. Hannah, who spoke of "My Job as Secretary to President Hannah."

Miss Jacqueline Britten, under whose guidance the Phi Gamma Nu chapter was founded, was a special guest.

Sen. William Knowland, of California, announced he would lead a fight against the proposal on the Senate floor.

"I do not think the granting of mutual aid to the Communist countries can be justified," he declared.

The issue took shape as the committee reported a \$3,712,000,000 foreign aid bill to the Senate. The measure authorizes \$235 million less than President Eisenhower asked for the fiscal year starting July 1.

Unprecedented authority is proposed for President Eisenhower to give financial help to Yugoslavia, Poland, East Germany or any other country except Russia and Red China.
