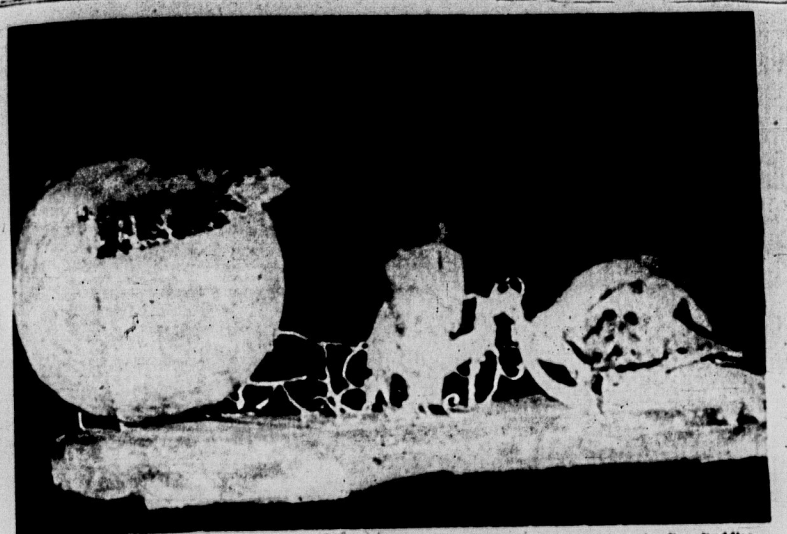

Five to Receive Honorary Degrees

At Commencement Exercises Sunday for Class of 1958

MSU will confer honorary degrees upon five prominent persons in commencement exercises at 4 p.m. Sunday in Spartan Stadium.

Honorary Doctor of Laws degrees will go to Adlai Stevenson, the commencement speaker; Forest Akers, former member of the State Board of Agriculture; Prentiss Brown, chairman of the Mackinac Bridge Authority and former U. S. senator and congressman; and Walter Heston, geneticist and biology section head of the National Cancer Institute.

The degree of Doctor of Engineering will be awarded to William Uhl, board chairman and managing partner in two Boston engineering firms.

Stevenson, former Illinois governor and twice Democratic candidate for the U. S. presidency, graduated from Princeton University, where he edited the student newspaper, and received his law degree at Northwestern University in 1925.

He was U. S. minister and head of the American delegation to the London Preparatory Conference on United Nations organization in 1945, later serving as a senior advisor at the U. S. General Assembly.

Elected to the first of two terms as governor of Illinois in 1948, Stevenson became Democratic presidential candidate in 1952 and 1956.

Akers, a student at Michigan State for three years, served three six-year terms as a member of the Michigan State Board of Agriculture.

Recession 'Worst' Dip In 13 Years

WASHINGTON (AP)—Several of the nation's top business executives agreed Thursday that the current recession is the worst of the post-World War II economic slumps.

Fifteen industrial and financial leaders, responding to a Senate Finance Committee questionnaire, gave more support to a tax cut as an anti-recession measure than to public works.

But most of them urged caution in applying any government remedies, citing a continued risk of more inflation and contending it is impossible to spoon out all economic ups-and-downs.

Elsewhere on the economic front:

1. The House with some reluctance snubbed approval of another year's extension of corporate income and general excise or sales taxes at their present rates. The Senate is almost certain to go along. The Eisenhower Administration says it cannot afford to have the taxes reduced as scheduled June 30. The revenue involved is about \$2,600,000,000 a year.

2. The government reported a rise in new construction activity last month. It said all types of public and private construction totaled \$4,100,000,000 in May, 10 percent above April's figures.

3. William Levitt, one of the country's leading real estate developers, said in a Washington interview "business is bad. I don't think there will be a substantial recovery in either business or housing in 1958."

Break-in Suspect Finds Only Grief In Opposite Lane

Things were looking worse than ever Thursday to Steve Pazar, charged with burglarizing the Alpha Chi Omega sorority house Feb. 14.

The former MSU employe was arrested while driving on the left side of West Grand River in East Lansing early Thursday morning after he almost hit a squad car, police said.

Pazar, 28, of East Lansing, was sentenced to 90 days in Ingham County Jail and was ordered to pay \$94.50 fine and costs Thursday after he pleaded guilty to a drunk driving charge.

Justice William Wise, in pronouncing the sentence, ordered the sentence to be increased 45 days if Pazar doesn't pay the fine and costs.

Pazar, along with MSU students David Scott, Kenneth Garrity and Harold Titus, was charged with the sorority break-in. Arraignment is slated for this morning in County Circuit Court.

Don't Swear at That Traffic Director

A yellow helmet, silver whistle, white gloves, nerves of steel, and a great deal of courage, are all standard equipment for student traffic directors.

They are seen each morning and evening at the traffic congestion areas on the campus.

The directors' objective is to get driver and automobile to their destination in the shortest possible time with the least amount of traffic congestion.

This program was initiated two years ago, according to Richard Bernitt, assistant director of the department of public safety, who is responsible for the student traffic directors.

The students augment the limited personnel of the campus police who could not handle the increasing volume of traffic on campus without help.

The greatest volume of traffic seemed to occur between 7:45-8:15 a.m. and 4:45-5:15 p.m.

It was decided to experiment with student traffic directors for these short periods of time so uniformed officers could be utilized elsewhere.

Students were hired, trained by the campus police, and placed in traffic situations under close supervision of a uniformed officer. Supervision was relaxed as they became more confident.

At the present time 10 students direct traffic each morning and four each evening. In addition, a uniformed officer directs traffic at the point of heavy concentration of student pedestrian traffic, Kellogg Center at Harrison road, both in the morning and evening.

Bob Talbot, Cadillac freshman, is assigned to the intersection of Shaw Lane and Harrison road. As an example of the amount of traffic he controls, let us investigate some statistics.

On a Tuesday morning last March, between 7:30-8:30 a.m., a traffic count was held on Talbot's corner. 1134 cars passed through this intersection in that period.

Qualifications for being a student traffic director are not restrictive or rigid. They must be psychologically able to withstand the pressure of directing traffic, and have the necessary amount of free time to perform their duties.

Talbot said he felt that 100 students were the best drivers. He said that the faculty and transient drivers seemed to act as though they owned the highway.

"My biggest gripe about drivers is that some people just won't pay any attention to my signals, and won't give any signals themselves," he said. "If they don't signal, how can they expect me to direct them?"

Adds to Defense Funds

House Blocks Ike's Bid To Cut Army Personnel

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House balked Thursday at President Eisenhower's bid to cut army manpower by 30,000 and then whipped to unanimous passage a record peacetime defense fund of \$38,409,561,000.

House members insisted, too, on more money than Eisenhower asked for missile and anti-submarine warfare programs, and for a stronger Marine Corps, National Guard and Military Reserve.

For these purposes, the huge money bill for the fiscal year beginning July 1 went to the Senate carrying hundreds of millions more than Eisenhower requested.

The roll call vote on passage was 389-0.

Except on the size of the Army, the House went down the line with its appropriations committee on all items in the bill. Retired Five-Star General Eisenhower had urged that Army manpower be trimmed from 500,000 to 470,000 in the year ahead. The committee accepted that proposal, but not the House.

Reductions in such items as ship construction, funds for planes for Defense Department officials and cash for aircraft spare parts partly offset appropriations increases voted by the House.

So the total amount came out to only \$21,614,000 more than the administration sought.

As it went to the Senate, which often increases house figures, the defense money bill provided \$8,716,226,000 for the Army, \$11,042,210,000 for the Navy, \$17,317,775,000 for the Air Force, \$796,900,000 for interservice operations and \$536,650,000 for the office of the Secretary of Defense.

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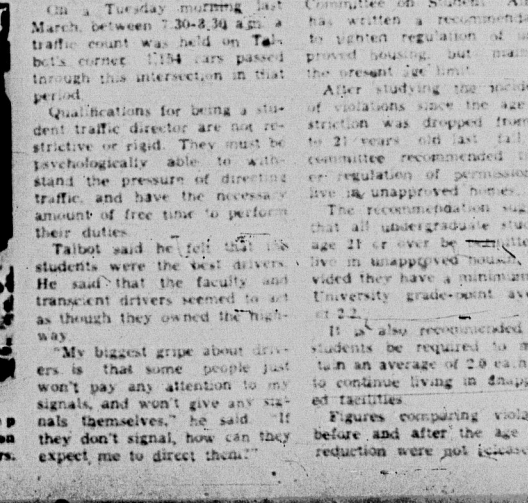
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STUDENT OFFICERS keep traffic from running afoul on campus during the "rush" hours.

Requests Algerian Cease-fire

Moslem Sources Predict Resistance

BONE, Algeria (AP)—Premier Charles de Gaulle appealed Thursday to Moslem Nationalist fighters to leave their mountain hide-outs and join ranks with "10 million Frenchmen of Algeria." But rebel spokesman abroad rejected the plea for unity and said the fighting will go on.

De Gaulle was cheered wildly by European and Moslem crowds as huge rallies in Constantinople and Bone, both hotbeds of rebel resistance in turbulent Eastern Algeria. Strong French garrisons control the area at this point.

The Premier referred to the rebels as "those led by despair but who fought with courage a 1951 brother-against-brother fight."

"No French statesman ever has spoken in such terms to the Algerian rebels, undefeated in more than 1 1/2 years of fighting."

Rebel spokesmen in Cairo and Tunis said the appeal would fall on deaf ears.

A spokesman in Cairo for the Algerian National Movement (FLN), spearhead of the revolt, said it could not accept De Gaulle's offer.

Two MSU students were seriously injured about 2 a.m. today when their sportscar crashed into the rear of a fuel tanker and spun into the path of an oncoming car.

A witness tentatively identified the victims as Cray Searlett, Toronto, Ont., junior, driver, and Phil Lomprey, Lomprey was reported to be visiting on vacation from Pratt Institute, New York City. Both are Phi Kappa Psi's.

Sparrow Hospital officials listed Lomprey's condition as "fair" and that of Searlett as "critical."

The driver of the second car was tentatively identified as Peter Flatten, Royal Oak.

The accident occurred on west-bound Grand River, across from Morrill Hall.

Gaulle's program for integrating Algeria's European and Moslem populations with equal rights and equal votes for all.

The FLN's eight-man directorate issued a communique declaring De Gaulle's pronouncements remain in line with old French colonial policies. It noted he ignored the Nationalist demand for recognition of Algerian independence before there can be a cease-fire.

De Gaulle now must bear complete responsibility for the continuation of the Algerian war and its eventual extension to all North Africa, the communique said.

De Gaulle arrived Wednesday in Algeria from Paris to talk first hand with the leaders of the French Revolutionary Junta whose defiance of Paris unseated Premier Pierre Pflimlin and paved the way for De Gaulle's return to power.

De Gaulle told crowds in Bone a popular referendum in three months will be a grand national conference when France will decide on its destiny. "I hope all of you will take part in it."

Student Government Fills Various Roles

WHEN ANY GROUP attempts to represent such diverse interests as, say, married men, veterans, sororities, fraternities, dormitories, and independents, it becomes often subject to criticism.

Beyond noticing that there is a Student Government tax collected at registration each term, many students see nothing of the work of their government. It remains to them a vague group removed from their daily classroom and living routines.

Probably the first consideration in viewing the AUSG year's work, would be the Helot, the handbook which is given to every incoming freshman. This is partially paid for by the Student tax.

FURTHER ON in the term, the Activities Carnival is given. The tax pays for a portion of this. Each pep rally is backed by tax funds and Student Government people.

In times of increasing world tension, foreign relations become important. In an effort to stress this fact, the AUSG sponsored the sending of some MSU foreign students to the United Nations.

Tax funds go to support the mimeograph and silk screen services given to organizations, and last year, funds were provided to enter MSU into the National Students Assn.

THROUGH THE CONGRESS Resolutions, the AUSG has a method of bringing to the attention of the administration the wishes of the student body.

"Whether or not the resolutions effect any changes directly is not obvious," stated present Congress Speaker Lowell Brigham.

The traffic resolutions, and the opening of several parking areas to students are concrete example of the resolution at work.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT Academic Benefits committee was responsible for planning and holding the series of speeches, "Politics—1958," held here.

The AUSG maintains responsibility for the campus elections, and during the year, much time is devoted by all of the members to such work as distributing ballots, counting them, working on committees to help candidates with their problems and seeing that fair, legal elections are held.

These AUSG functions taken together, with those projects still in the planning stages, prove Student Government's role to be more than simply a "Mickey Mouse Organization," a term sometimes targeted to it by the unknowing outsider.

Layoffs, Strikes Mar Truce Between UAW-Auto Big 3

DETROIT (AP) — The truce which the Automotive Big Three and the United Auto Workers hoped would last during their contract period was broken Thursday as incidents developed at General Motors and Chrysler plants.

The Chrysler situation seemed the more serious. The UAW charged 200 union stewards and committeemen in plants across the country had been given disciplinary layoffs in "a deliberate attempt to provoke the workers into striking."

Chrysler said only 35 or 37 men were involved in the disciplinary action but said it could not immediately provide a breakdown of the plants and states involved. It said those suspended had been "flagrantly insubordinate."

The General Motors trouble developed at West Mifflin, Pa., a suburb of Pittsburgh. Union pickets ringed the plant and allowed only a few salaried employees to enter. The plant employs 2,000.

UAW headquarters in Detroit moved quickly to get the GM workers back on their jobs. UAW President Walter Reuther sent two union officers from headquarters here to the Pittsburgh area to straighten out the dispute, which the UAW called "strictly a local matter having nothing to do with national GM negotiations."

Norman Matthews, UAW vice president and director of its Chrysler department, said reports received from Chrysler local unions across the country "indicate that Chrysler, acting by pre-determined signal, began carrying out disciplinary action" against UAW leaders.

The Chrysler dispute was centered at the big Dodge main plant in suburban Detroit, where

30 stewards and five plant committeemen were sent home by management. Officials of Dodge local 3 urged other workers to stay on the job despite the disciplinary action given their leaders.

There were no disputes at Ford, which like GM and Chrysler, joined the UAW Sunday in voting hope that work conditions would remain normal and peaceful until a new contract could be worked out. GM's contract ran out Thursday, Chrysler's and Ford's on Sunday.

The council will hold its first meeting with the elected senior officers at 8 p.m. in Old College Hall, Sunday.

Reuther warned union members Sunday night against any unauthorized strikes and said they might give the companies an excuse to close the plants and lock workers out. In this event, he said, workers would not get any government unemployment checks or supplemental layoff pay provided for in the old union contract.

The breaks in harmonious relations came as the big three automakers and the UAW sat down at the bargaining table again in efforts to work out a new agreement. There were no reports of bargaining progress.

The old three-year pacts expired after the Union rejected offers from all three companies to extend it for two years with a 16-cent hourly increase spread over that period.

Three U. S. Coeds Hitch Hike Through Communist East Germany

BERLIN (AP) — Three American college girls defied diplomatic red tape Thursday and hitch-hiked into West Berlin through Communist East Germany.

"The East German police thought we were the funniest things they ever saw," said Susan Sloman, 19, of San Francisco. "We don't talk politics and so the police were not East Germans to us—but just people. We amused them and they amused us. And they gave us transit visas."

Consular officials said as far as they knew the three coeds were the first Americans to hitch-hike to Berlin through East Germany.

The girls, spending a semester at the University of Vienna, left the Austrian capital Wednesday morning and hitch-hiked to the East German border crossing near Hof, West Germany.

Near the Communist checkpoint they were let aboard a German freight truck bound for West Berlin, and later took another ride into town.

"At first the East German police wouldn't believe that we were hitch-hiking," Joan said. "But when we started counting our money to declare it, they began to laugh and said never mind."

Joan was carrying \$12, Susan \$18 and Mary \$10.

1st Tiger Negro

DETROIT (AP)—The Detroit Tigers Thursday promoted their first Negro player to their major league roster. In a four-player switch the Tigers brought up Negro third baseman Ossie Virgil from their Charleston, W. Va., farm in the American Assn. The Tigers also promoted Herb Moford, a 29-year-old right-hander with a 6-0 record at Charleston.

In return they farmed out pitcher Bob Shaw, 1-2 with the Tigers, and infielder Lou Skizas, obtained during the winter from Kansas City. The Tigers have had numerous Negro players in their farm system but have remained with Boston the only two American League teams never to field a Negro.

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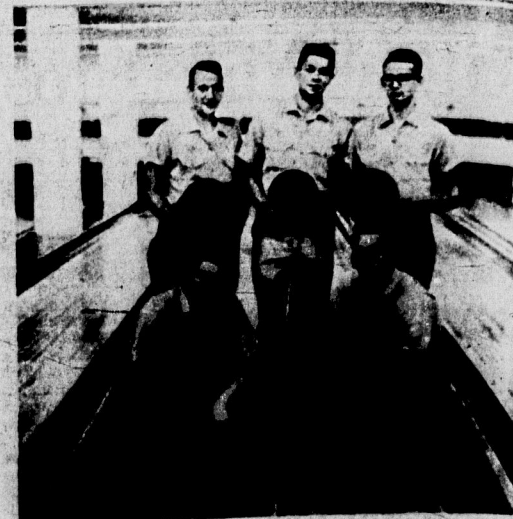

Carl Gables Vets' 2,550-2,153 victory over Bower in the IM bowling finals Wednesday secured on the 1957-58 independent all-sports trophy for Vets I.

The retired warriors won five of the eight events which counted toward all-sports and totaled 589 points to second place Evans Scholars' 390.

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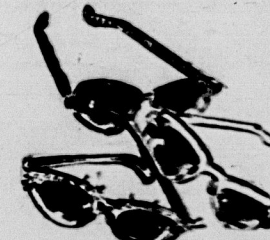
