Arab Nationalism owes its existence to the West, said Fawaz Saareh, principal counselor for the Middle East in the U. S. in a lecture on Arab Nationalism and the Middle East held in the University of Michigan on Tuesday night in the University Club.

The lecture of the West to Arab nationalism is a source of the unity between the West and the Arab Nationalists today, he said.

"If America means anything to the Arabs, it means the sponsorship of freedom and justice," he said.

Saareh cited the example of the Arab League, which was formed in 1945, and the Arab League of Nations, which was formed in 1945, as evidence of the Arab Nationalist movement today.

UAW Reudies For Showdown On AMC Pact

DETROIT (AP)—The United Auto Workers served 10-day notices to the American Motors Corporation on Tuesday, Oct. 7, in a move toward a showdown on the pact between the two organizations.

The UAW, which reached a settlement with General Motors last Thursday, had gotten back only about 11,000 of its 23,000 employees staying out over local-level grievances.

A UAW spokesman said the settlement reached on an auto industry-wide basis by the UAW and the American Motors Corporation on Tuesday was a "partial" settlement. He said the UAW is still out on strike at the Detroit plant.

Planes Strain Red Cease-Fire Truce

TAIPEI (AP)—Communist planes swooped over Quemoy and touched off a hail of Nationalist antiaircraft fire Tuesday, straining the Red-proclaimed cease-fire in the Formosa Strait.

The Nationalist firing was the first since Red China proclaimed a week-long halt in its artillery pounding of the offshore island effective early Monday. No further clashes were reported, and the Nationalists took advantage of the truce to load in more supplies by air and sea.

Eight planes in three formations approached Quemoy at 4:35 p.m., the Nationalist defense ministry said. They streaked over the island, then rained for the mainland with antiaircraft shells bursting around them and machine gun tracers probing the sky. Maj. Gen. Fu-Ken, Nationalist Air Force intelligence chief, said both jets and propeller planes may have been involved. This raised speculation the slower propeller craft may have taken photographs while MIG fighters provided cover.

The Red fight did not necessarily violate the truce pledge. Peking's original announcement said only that artillery shelling of Quemoy would be suspended for seven days.

One condition, however, was that the United States cease conveying Nationalist supply ships to Quemoy.

Air drops were carried out at Quemoy Monday night and Tuesday. Six Nationalist cargo planes landed in quick succession Tuesday morning.

Political Upheaval In Pakistan

KARACHI (AP)—In a major political upheaval, Pakistan's President Iskander Mirza Tuesday night dissolved the central and provincial governments, outlawed political parties and declared martial law.

The drastic seizure of power came after six ministers of the cabinet government resigned and Premier Feroz Khan Noon urged their colleagues to other cabinet members.

Vatican Reports Pope in Delirium

CASTEL GONDOLEO, Italy (AP)—Pope Pius XII was reported in worsened condition but still clinging to life early today. He was reported in a delirium Tuesday night.

In answer to an erroneous report that he had died, the Vatican spokesman said at 2:30 a.m. Tuesday that the Pope is still alive.

He called remarkably through Monday night after the stroke Monday morning.

The condition of the 82-year-old leader of Roman Catholicism improved in a way late Tuesday night.

The last medical bulletin at 6 p.m. Tuesday said the Pope had recovered from a coma and partial paralysis that attended the stroke.

Several hours later, however, officials said that the condition of the Pope had worsened. He was reported to be in a coma.

This source said the Pontiff actually was still afflicted with partial paralysis affecting his upper body face and speech.

The Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano announced he expressed gratitude for the prayers being said all over the world for his recovery and for the hundreds of thousands of good wishes streaming in from all over the world.

Faubus Aims Another Blast

LITTLE ROCK (AP)—Gov. Orval Faubus accused the U. S. Government Tuesday of attempting to pressure him through extra personal tax demands and "pressure in other ways" for his fight for state's rights.

Federal tax and education agencies are being told to persecute those who oppose the national administration, he added.

"We now find them (the agencies) acting as political arms of the national administration," he said, "and used to persecute and plant the seeds of fear in the hearts of those who disagree with the policies of the administration."

This was Faubus' second blast in the desegregation battle over the Little Rock schools.

He had contributions for the proposed private school system had reached \$6,000 and other contributions of money had been received but not counted.

Faubus said he expects the Little Rock Private School Corporation to still be asking for money. He said he expects to open segregated private schools by about Oct. 15.

Campus 'Y's Periled By Lack of Support

NEARING ITS 60TH anniversary, the MSU YMCA-YWCA suddenly finds itself cast into dire financial straits...

Reasons for this Community Chest action are quite interesting, we think.

"There is no longer a need for the 'Y,' the Chest states in a letter of explanation.

In answer the 'Y' pointed out its Freshman Orientation Camp, annual United Nations Seminar, service in handling the University's religious preference cards...

"The community," the report went on, "should not support non-local organizations such as the MSU 'Y' because members come from all over the world."

WITH THIS POINT of view the Chest opposes the efforts of nearly all other Lansing area forces. The students are considered members of the community when it is to the community's advantage.

Is it fair not to consider as citizens students who live here for four years and spend millions of dollars in community stores? Is the president of the United States no less a citizen of Washington, D. C. because he was born in the mid-west or has a farm in Pennsylvania?

"The 'Y' has inadequate facilities and not enough members to serve such a large campus," the chest states. Surely cutting off well over half of its income will do little to help this situation.

"The program of the 'Y' is not closely enough related to the total community needs of Ingham County."

This county has a great many other agencies that serve downtown and other parts of the community. The MSU campus is not only a part of Ingham County but, population-wise, quite a large part.

"AGENCIES WHICH COULD support themselves from other than Chest sources," the letter continues, "should do so to free Chest funds for other applicant agencies."

The implication is that the university should support the "Y." They do. But the university is a state institution run by state money with the policy and budget limitations of that status.

Agencies such as Campus Chest have given the "Y" support in the past and will, in all probability continue to do so, possibly to a larger degree.

The organizations themselves have fund-raising projects but the effect on the program is disastrous when all possible time must be spent on raising funds.

When the Community Chest grant was terminated, both the YMCA and the YWCA dropped their staff advisors. Enough money remains from the Chest grant to carry the two organizations with an office secretary and a part time advisor until December.

A fund raising drive was launched in an attempt to raise the \$5000 needed to carry on a successful program. Letters were sent out to Y alumni, previous contributors and all university staff to notify them that contributions earmarked for the Y given through the Community Chest would not reach them.

The State News urges that everyone support the YMCA-YWCA so that our university community may continue to benefit from their valuable services.

Dr. Favez Sayegh Arab Views Aired By Nasserite Visitor

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is an interview with Dr. Favez A. Sayegh, one of the foremost Arab spokesmen in the United States, at a press conference held Tuesday in the Union Mural Room.)

By LIL NALBANDIAN Q. Are there significant differences in the philosophies of Pan-Arabism between President Nasser of the United Arab Republic and President Qassem of Iraq?

A. They are fundamentally the same. That is, they have the same objective—that every Arab-speaking sector of the Arab world must eventually find its place within a unified Arab state, whether through federation or merger.

Q. In your opinion, why does the West appear to be accepting Arab Nationalism gradually, while at the same time opposing Nasser?

A. I would not say that the West is accepting Arab Nationalism, but rather that its foreign policy has gone through a progression of three phases.

Q. What is the Arab view of Israel? A. The Arab states are ready for peaceful settlement of the Arab-Israeli conflict, according to the UN resolution of 1947, which states the following:

1. The state of Israel shall be created from one-half the area of Palestine. 2. The remainder shall belong to the Arabs. 3. An international state shall be established between these two states around the city of Jerusalem, and shall be given UN trusteeship.

Q. But why does the United States oppose Nasser? A. Perhaps it is because he has been too successful. And, it may be due to a personal conflict between Nasser and Dulles.

Q. What is the reason behind the recent resignation of Mr. Assali, former Vice-President of Syria? A. It is Nasser apparently centralizing the government of the UAR.

A. No. My guess is that another Syrian Vice-President will replace Mr. Assali, and that he resigned because he represents the older type of leader, and the old feudalism. He cannot readily accept the rapid changes taking place in the national movement.

Q. Why is there some doubt that the Lebanese Parliament will approve the appointment of Premier Karami? A. The Lebanese Parliament elected in 1957 was pro-Chamoun. (In Lebanon, the Parliament elects the president, who then appoints the premier.)

Troubled by Dissension All Term Spartan Spirit Settles Domestic Problems

AUSG's faction-frenzy Spartan Spirit Committee nullified itself together late Tuesday, confidently predicting that the personality conflicts that have plagued it since the term began are a thing of the past.

But while Spartan Spirit Director Wayne Regan laid plans for Friday night's Pittsburgh game pep rally and Spartan Assembly Speaker Bill Voiers presided over the second meeting of the former Spartan Senate, the third member of the unhappy triangle, former Spartan Spirit Director Arnie Roberts remained unhappy.

Roberts, whose spring term point average cost him the Spirit directorship, declared his grievances to the State News Tuesday after quitting both Spartan Spirit and Spartan Assembly.

No Recognition The son of a booking agent who wants to be himself, Roberts feels he lost out recognition-wise after putting on "the best pep rally since the Rose Bowl."

The split between Roberts and Regan began when the latter decided to take the active leadership in Spartan Spirit affairs. "I decided I wasn't going to be the front man for anybody," Regan said.

When Roberts broke with Regan, the "idea group," Spartan Assembly was born. Originally the brainchild of Stan Starr, another former Spartan Spirit Director, the assembly was put into motion by Roberts who named himself president.

Triangle Forms The triangle formed before classes started this term when Roberts, no longer Spartan Spirit director, asked Voiers to act as Speaker of the Assembly, then called Spartan Senate. Voiers accepted. When Roberts

decided Spartan Assembly would operate independently of Spartan Spirit, Voiers gave him back-

Then the question of constitutionality confronted Roberts and Voiers. The change of organization title strengthened their case.

But Roberts was still pep rally chairman with Spartan Spirit. Reganall, as director, told Roberts he could give up

plans to emcee the rally or else leave the committee. Roberts Quits Roberts decided to leave Spartan Spirit Tuesday to devote full time to the assembly. Tuesday afternoon, Roberts found the rug had been pulled out from beneath him as Spartan Assembly president when Voiers switched sides and brought the assembly under Spartan Spirit and Reganall.

With Reganall's committee solidly behind him and Voiers on his side, Roberts is definitely out for the time being (things change fast at Spartan Spirit). Spartan Spirit will miss Roberts' booking contacts and his cut-rate entertainment acts, but apparently the domestic problems are over.

Voiers says his Spartan Assembly decided to work a bonfire and all-university parade dance into its Pittsburgh pep rally plans. The snake dance will form at Brody, wease to the eastern women's dorm and arrive at Jensen at 7:30 p.m.

Three Prof's Say Russians Like Status Quo; Revolution Only in Classes

The Russian people like their way of life and their "revolution" probably will be those occurring in the classroom, three MSU professors agree after visiting the Soviet Union.

"I think we Americans should stop deluding ourselves about a people's revolution in the Soviet Union," said Dr. Lincoln Pettit of the department of natural science.

"Russians obviously like things the way they are. Conditions in Russia are improving and the unrest, if any, grows less."

Dr. Herbert Rudman, another in a group of American educators who spent five weeks in Russia under auspices of America's Comparative Education Society, found the Russian people most friendly but "ignorant of what America is really like."

"The Russians are not entirely satisfied with their present system of education," Dr. Rudman believes.

"Although they still are emphasizing science and engineering in their schools, they are developing an even greater concern for the development of needed skilled labor in many areas of production."

Dr. George Borgstrom, an internationally-recognized authority on world food problems, found the technician-run Soviet Union reminiscent of the United States at the turn of the century.

"Like Americans at the beginning of this century," he said, "the Russians are not entirely satisfied with their present system of education."

Persons, a long-time close associate and personal friend of Eisenhower, served with him in the army. A member of the White House staff since Eisenhower took office in 1953, he has been deputy assistant to the president.

The White House said Adams will stay on until there has been an orderly transition. Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said he did not know how long that would be.

Eisenhower Appoints Supreme Court Justice

WASHINGTON (AP) — Potter Stewart, a native of Jackson, Michigan, was named to the Supreme Court Tuesday by President Eisenhower.

Stewart, a 43-year-old Cincinnati Circuit Judge, was Eisenhower's fifth appointment to the nine-man court.

He will take the place of Harold Burton, a fellow Ohioan and fellow Republican, immediately upon the 70-year-old Burton's retirement next Monday.

The Stewart appointment will be subject to Senate confirmation when Congress returns in January. It is likely to be given close study, in view of controversies that have swirled around the court in recent years.

Here's a quick sum-up of the new Justice: Michigan-born, Yale-educated, a Naval lieutenant in World War II, a judge for four years with a background of law practice in New York and Cincinnati, an Episcopalian, married and the father of three young children.

There was a considerable element of surprise in the appointment.

Burton's impending retirement was announced only Monday. It was learned, however, that Burton sent in his resignation some weeks ago.

Stewart, a handsome man whose black hair has only begun to turn gray, met reporters in the office of White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerity, and gave them this account in reply to questions.

Monday afternoon — before Burton's retirement plans were announced — Atty. Gen. William Rogers telephoned Stewart in Cincinnati and asked if he could come to Washington immediately.

At 8:30 Tuesday morning, Stewart and Rogers conferred at the White House with Eisenhower. By the time this meeting opened, Stewart surmised he was being offered the Supreme Court post.

Stewart told reporters that

even as late as Tuesday afternoon he hadn't had time to telephone his big news to Mrs. Stewart, the former Mary Anne Bertles of Grand Rapids — but she probably had "a sneaking suspicion—she has a pretty good intuition."

What about his own feelings? "I just never thought in my fondest thoughts that this opportunity and honor would ever come to me."

What is his legal philosophy? "I like to be thought of as a lawyer," he replied, after commenting it was hard to put a philosophy in specific words.

Had he, in Ohio, ever been affiliated in the Republican party with the late Sen. Robert A. Taft?

Stewart replied that he had known Taft for years, and was a very great admirer.

He added he was also a great admirer of Eisenhower since he first met the President. That was in 1954, when Eisenhower appointed him to the circuit court bench from private life as a lawyer.

This court, the sixth Circuit Court of Appeals, has jurisdiction over cases from Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky and Tennessee.

Stewart told questioners the school integration controversy at Clinton, Tenn., has been before this court since he has been on the bench. He added he was not on the panel of judges which handled that matter, however.

Norman Steere, assistant director of the Department of Public Safety, used increased fire safety during National Fire Safety Week. He stated that last year, the total fire loss at MSU was \$305,935. The total Residence Hall fire loss was \$771,841.

The greatest single fire loss in the residence halls were caused by a towel on a light fixture (\$106,307), an arson fire in a practice locker (\$200), and a "backpacker" fire which spread rapidly (\$50,000).

In the latter case the fire alarm system was not used. Students quenched the fire with a half of water instead of the fire hose. The Fire Department arrived before the manager or resident advisor knew about the fire, and the person who called the fire department could not be located.

Steeve also noted in one case a student attempted to extinguish the fire by filling

a coke bottle at a drinking fountain, rather than using the fire hose.

Of the 26 fire calls on campus, 12 were caused by arson, seven of which occurred in Men's Residence Halls.

America Gains New Prestige

Problems Exhibited at Brussels

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the last in a series of three articles by Chuck Butterworth, MSU senior, currently a student guide at the Brussels Fair.

"You must be a wonderful nation; anyone who can admit his faults and invite our candid criticism has nothing to fear."

"This is a marvelous idea, I didn't realize that America had made so much progress with the slums."

"You mean Negroes are really allowed to vote? Why I thought that you only kept them as servants."

These are a few of the many comments which I hear during my work as a guide at the Unfinished Business exhibit in Brussels with the American Pavilion. (This exhibit presents problems from three sides of American life: Racial, Environmental, and Natural. It explores these problems, presenting the complete framework of each, and explains what is being done to solve these problems.)

Belgians refer to Le Palais de Justice. Near this large law court (the architectural masterpiece of Brussels) are to be found the city's worst slums. It is readily admitted that slum clearance is a universal problem.

English citizens wryly comment on the unequal status of colored people in South Africa. Belgians confess that the Congolese only recently gained a relatively integrated society. Naturally, many others are quick to avow their incomprehension concerning the necessity of giving all peoples equal rights.

The exhibit has done much to strengthen America's prestige on the international scene. The guides are constantly being reminded that the beauty of the American pavilion is its relaxed atmosphere.

They claim that they don't want ideas forced upon them. This is the cardinal rule guiding the design of the American pavilion: no propaganda is to be displayed in a pompous fashion. No placards are to be found proclaiming America's greatness or size.

After passing through an exhibit such as Unfinished Business, visitors often decide that it is only a truly great and free nation which can display its shortcomings with such absolute candor.

A decision such as this, entirely self-realized undoubtedly builds stronger binding ties amongst these people than would a forced decision. Thus, the complete honesty of America as portrayed in Unfinished Business wins us many friendships.

People are genuinely impressed by the fact that America would so openly present her problems. Many admit they had harbored false impressions about these questions and are ready to consider a fresh evaluation of the contemporary scene.

They have good questions to ask and are interested in what we are doing. Some express feelings of shame and disgust that a country as great as ours should be plagued with petty problems like racial prejudice. But it is tactfully presented to them that pretenses of this and other types follow a man through history and he is only now beginning to take a firm stand against them.

The visitors are anxious to compare American life with their own. Upon learning that we too have a slum question, they are very happy to point out their own slums.
