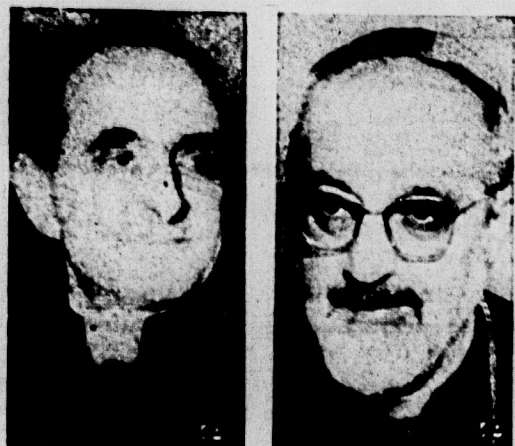

Cardinals Seeking 'Transition' Pope

VATICAN CITY (P)—A conviction grows in Rome Tuesday that the next Pope will come from the ranks of the elderly, conservative Italian members of the college of Cardinals. A number of the members of the college now are near or beyond the age of 70, and they are in a position to engage in a steady exchange of ideas before they begin voting Saturday for a successor to Pius XII. There is little doubt that among them there will be several soundings of opinions in what part of the 100-member college is expected to be elected. More and more talk is heard among qualified observers of a "transition" Pope. Such a man would continue the policies of Pius XII but would be unlikely to introduce any startling precedents.

There is no doubt that the church of Rome probably will be taking part in the convocation. Four convocations have been held since their average age is 73. Most are over 70 and in this convocation the average age may well be 75. This is particularly true if the church actually is in quest of a transition period.

The idea that the next pope will be an Italian has been a long-held conviction. There has been no non-Italian pope for 400 years, but the church has seen against election of a non-Italian pope. Most convocations of a non-Italian pope have failed. The last non-Italian pope was Gregory XVI, Cardinal Agagianian, Patriarch of Cilicia of the Armenian Church, the aged of Cardinals in the college of Cardinals in the Vatican.

Dem Speaker Centers Blast On Bagwell

Does Paul Bagwell support the Republican Legislature's action in cutting \$1 million from the MSU appropriation? This was the question posed by Thomas Walsh, Democratic candidate for State Representative from Lansing and Lewistown Township speaking to the Young Democrats Club at the Union Monday night.

Walsh noted that the budget slash was made by a solid Republican vote in the House of Representatives with the two incumbent GOP legislators from Lansing making possible the one-vote margin. The loss of 119 positions for non-teaching staff members and the closing up of the MSU Oakland project were cited as some of the effects of the reduction. "It is too easy to blame the reputation of the state of Michigan backwards about how many good faculty members MSU is going to lose because it can't compete financially with schools like Ohio, Indiana and Illinois," Walsh said.

Eisenhower Assails Dems Labor Program

President Eisenhower assailed the Democrats in the bare-knuckled GOP campaign talks Tuesday, but his flying trip to California apparently failed to patch up the split between Gov. Goodwin Knight and Sen. William Knowland, Republicans running for each other's office.

Conservative Wanted

Gov. Knight said he would never support the Democratic nominee for governor, state Atty. Gen. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown, but shrugged and walked away when reporters asked if he would vote for Knowland for governor.

Knowland announced he was running for governor. Then Knight was forced to run for the Senate seat which Knowland is vacating. Both won the Republican nomination handsily but trailed their Democratic opponents in total primary votes.

North American Exhibit Calls for Talent

"We and God build trees," museum director Dr. Rollin H. Baker remarked last week as he stood beside the white plaster trunk of a towering tree. During this year the museum staff will produce over 50,000 leaves, make spruces, staves and twigs. They have already made a tree. All of this will go into the "Tropics" exhibit, the first permanent display in the museum's spacious North American Room. Main feature of the "Tropics" display will be a tropical animal common to the tropical climate of North America: the toucan. Toucans, parrots, tucanos, and the most beautiful bird will be included in the display. MSU museum staff members are busy in southern Mexico on a six week expedition this summer to find a typical tropical habitat and to collect plants and animals. They also gathered litter from the jungle floor. They brought a lot of litter with them to increase the authenticity of the display. "Museum staff and student assistants will begin making the 50,000 leaves necessary for the display. They will take most of the year, for it is a long process. First the museum will make plaster casts from the many picked leaves they brought back with them. Then they will make a metal mold from which the leaves will be pressed and cut. The tropics display is the first of the permanent exhibits for the North American Room. When completed, the room will represent the seven national habitats of North America. Displays will be the tropics, the desert of Southwestern United States, the Rocky Mountains, the Great Plains, the Northern spruce-birch forest, the hardwood forests of the East, and the far northern tundra. Each exhibit will feature a hooded animal. But because it is necessary for the museum staff to visit each habitat before beginning work on it, it will take many years before the North American Room is completed. At present only six exhibits are on display in the large North American room: a tiger from Africa, and the deer from Michigan forests. Of course the tiger must go, but museum officials display it now in the unfinished room because it is such a "fine specimen." As for the deer, Dr. Baker says the present setting is only typical of the Gaylord area. The exhibit will be added to and the background will be changed to that of a "typical beech forest glade."

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (P)—Gov. Orval E. Faubus said he would not believe a private white high school which opened here Tuesday morning could operate indefinitely through court injunctions. Some critics, however, would have to be deceived to support the school, the governor said in a news conference. But he declined to say what he had in mind.

HAVANA (P)—Two American and seven Cuban employees of a Texaco refinery were kidnaped Monday and carried off to the rebels' jungled mountain strongholds of eastern Cuba.

U. S.-Taipei Solidarity Anticipated

Military, Political Situation Reviewed

TAIPEI, Formosa, Oct. 22 (P)—Secretary of State Dulles and President Chiang Kai-Shek Tuesday opened talks made more urgent by rising Red military action across Formosa Strait. White Red artillery rained more than 3,000 shells on Quemoy and its tangled off-shore strait. Dulles and Chiang held three meetings totaling more than 2 1/2 hours. They met again today.

A spokesman said the whole political and military situation was reviewed. In reply to a question, he said it was possible the two discussed a resumption of U. S. warship operations to supply ships to Quemoy. Joint communique after the end of the conference is expected to express continued U. S.-Nationalist solidarity in the face of Peiping's campaign to split the two allies and force U. S. armed might out of the Western Pacific.

Freedom of Press Periled in Lawsuit

UNLESS A RECENT DECISION of the U. S. Court of Appeals is reversed by the Supreme Court, it will set a precedent that a reporter must identify his source of information to a court of law if the name is considered material and relevant to a trial.

Marie Torre, TV columnist for the New York Herald Tribune, has refused to name the "CBS spokesman" she quoted in a statement about singer Rudy Garland's failure to appear on a CBS show.

The movie star and singer filed a \$1,393,333 suit against the network for defamation and breach of contract. When a New York federal court asked Marie Torre to name the CBS source she refused. Upon her refusal, Federal Judge Sylvester Ryan imposed a 10-day sentence on the reporter for criminal contempt.

The sentence was appealed on the basic issue of freedom of the press and on an auxiliary question of compelling a reporter to reveal a source of information, at the risk of losing news contacts.

THE THREE-MAN COURT of Appeals unanimously ruled that the information was material and relevant in Miss Torre's suit. Ogden Reid, president and editor of the Herald Tribune, announced that the paper will appeal to the Supreme Court.

Judge Potter Stewart, who was appointed to the Supreme Court Oct. 7, in writing the appellate court decision acknowledged that "compulsory disclosure of a journalist's confidential sources may entail an abridgment of press freedom by imposing some limitation on the availability of news." But "the duty of a witness to testify in a court of law has roots as deep as the guarantee of a free press," which justifies "some impairment" of the First Amendment.

This case is not in itself of great importance nor was the statement about Miss Torre particularly earth-shaking. It is, however, worth arguing as a matter of principle and precedent.

WHAT IS STARTLING about the decision is Judge Stewart's justification of "some impairment" of the Constitutional protection of press freedom. We feel that Constitutional rights should not be treated quite so lightly.

Some is a vague term. If a federal judge can arbitrarily disregard freedom of the press to "some" extent, where will such impairment stop? Who will draw the line?

Whenever the question of freedom of the press (sometimes expressed as right-to-know) arises, a common attitude is to ask why anyone but the newspapermen should be concerned.

Only about half of the peoples of the world now enjoy political freedom. The others are either prohibited or restricted from reading what they please, speaking what they please, speaking against government policies they dislike, worshipping as they choose or even inquiring into the actions and affairs of their governments.

EVEN IN THE United States, where informed voters are considered to be the primary force for democracy, there are many public officials who feel that government discussions and actions should be conducted in secrecy.

It is regrettable that in 20th century America there should be any need to assert that the public has the unquestionable right to know what its elected representatives are doing. Yet this basic right-to-know is questioned daily, both directly and indirectly.

Such indirect restrictions on freedom of information as the Marie Torre case are more subtle than the outright refusal of some officials to reveal what is going on behind the doors of government. They are, therefore, in our opinion, more dangerous forms of withholding information, and represent silence through intimidation.

If the Supreme Court upholds the ruling, Marie Torre must comply or go to jail—and sources for many stories which should be told will disappear.

Letter to the Editor 'Packaging' Strikes Back

To the Editor: Messrs Gross and Keen are to be congratulated for their perceptive analysis of the function and future of the School of Packaging here at MSU.

Their letter, headed "Students View Packaging" is particularly revealing of packaging's role in the general scheme of things. Their examples, such as the balloon case, are neatly drawn to illustrate the point they make.

Obviously, the flip top box and roll-on deodorant are significantly greater achievements in the field of product protection and feeding of urban populations than are other developments such as those which allow man to overcome chemical and bacteriological deterioration of food, drugs and other essential, personable commodities, in his continual struggle for existence. Irradiation, freezing, barrier and inert-gas packing, therefore, need not even be considered.

The statement regarding balloon ends was indeed lucid. "Multiply the weight of these wasted ends by the number of people who consume balloons and you come up with the units 'pounds of balloon... people' and this should be clearly recognized as a significant mathematical unit in the packaging field.

Most people would agree that G & K speak pure truth when they say that we must keep up with the Russians in packaging dogs for "distant consignment" (the moon). Clearly the packaging man is not qualified for this activity. This worries him greatly in the odd moments when he is not busy designing, building, testing and improving methods for safe, dry, vibration-free shipment of missile components to all parts of this country and overseas.

It appears that Gross and Keen object to the justification of the packaging man by the establishment of a university curriculum for his needs. We can extrapolate from this their necessarily similar strong objection to curricula for Business Administration, Secretarial

Science, Police Administration and Hotel Management as well as Engineering, Teaching and other application oriented curricula as opposed to theoretical-ly oriented curricula.

We do not wish to argue the point at this time since the argument is an ancient one and its outcome depends entirely upon the value judgments of the participants.

However, we would agree that the packaging man is limited to the veterinarian is limited to doctoring horses; the social scientist is limited to the activities of a starchy-eyed ivory tower visionary, and the accountant is limited to the rote methods of double entry book-keeping.

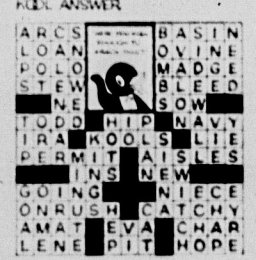

Michigan State Ranks No. 20

Army Retains No. 1 Spot Ohio State Voiced Second

Michigan State's Spartans, ranked number five in the nation in last week's Associated Press poll, fell to the bottom of the ladder in this week's poll, ranking 20th.

The Spartans had jumped from ninth to fifth last week as a result of their 22-8 win over the University of Pittsburgh. But because of their 14-6 loss to Purdue last Saturday, they fell completely out of the top 10 teams.

Texas, Auburn and Mississippi, voted into the fourth, fifth and sixth spots in the Associated Press college football poll this week, had better have a care. These spots are exceedingly vulnerable.

As the unbeaten Army powerhouse again was voted the No. 1 spot by the sportswriters and sportscasters, the previous holders of these three positions dropped from the top ten entirely, all victims in games last Saturday.

Wisconsin lost to Iowa, Michigan State to Purdue, and Navy was upset by Tulane.

On the strength of its victory, Iowa jumped from 13th place to 7th this week. Northwestern moved from 17th to 8th as a result of its tremendous showing in triumphing Michigan, and always-dangerous Oklahoma moved up from 11th to 9th, the voters obviously impressed by the Sooners' lopsided victory over Kansas.

Army received 90 first place votes, 68 more than Louisiana State, which climbed from ninth position to third and was second in the number of votes for the No. 1 position.

Ohio State moving from third to second, received only 14 votes for the No. 1 spot, but it had

Still Unbeaten

There are hopes for a Big 10 football title and a Christmas vacation in Pasadena, Calif. But, if it's any consolation, the Spartan team still has a chance for national attention.

Michigan State's soccer team doesn't rate much space in metropolitan newspapers. But that is only because soccer is a "fast sport" when it has to compete with big-time football for space. This is unfortunate because the booters year have what could be the best team in the country, whether or not they will have a chance to prove it is a question. Soccer is just beginning to organize on a national level and an attempt is being made to hold a national tournament at the end of the season. But perhaps the journey will have to wait until next year. The final goal will be made in several weeks.

The history at State has been reviewed often, but here is a capsule of the booters' fabulous record: Soccer is a varsity sport in the fall of 1956, and since that time the booters have been undefeated in 17 games. (If you include three straight victories in the spring of '56, the team went varsity, the unbeaten string is now 20. There have been three ties, one in '56 and two in '57. The booters have won eight straight since they defeated Chicago Navy Pier in the second game of last season and the last six have been shutouts.

Other papers are more appreciative of Coach Gene Kenney's great team than big-city dailies. Here is what the *Purdue Exponent* said before Saturday's game: "The Ballmakers (will host) one of the most powerful teams in the country as they meet Michigan State today. The Spartans will bring to town one of the most powerful teams ever to take the field."

Kenney has a tremendous team to work with, but he constantly guards against over-confidence. The Spartans know they are good, and that knowledge may ultimately lead to their downfall.

The big hurdle will come Saturday when State meets the *Illinois* at Champaign. If the Spartans beat the *Illinois*, they should be well on their way to another unbeaten season.

The team grows in prestige with each victory, the more mounts. Seven veterans of every varsity season are on the team, and three—Art Southan, Al Sarria and Vander Horst—have been around since pre-varsity.

But the booters are a stable group, and seem nearly immune to pressure.

There are two home games left on the schedule and the Spartans deserve more support from students. Ohio State is at 10 a.m. Homecoming day. The game offers a good chance for old grads to see the new Spartan sport.

The biggest crowd, however, is expected for the Slippery Rock game here Nov. 8. The football team is at Indiana, the booters will play an hour later—at 11 a.m.

The later starting time, added to the magic name of Slippery Rock, should make the game a good drawing card. It will be the last home game of the season, and the final appearance for such greats as Southan, Sarria, Vander Horst and Neil Butler.

A large crowd would be a tribute to these fine players and a psychological boost to the team in any national tournament.

Cleveland's Brown May Set New NFL Rushing Record

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Statistics are proving what many opposing football players already accept as fact—that Jim Brown may be the greatest rusher in the history of the National Football League.

Official NFL figures released today show that the bruising fullback of the eastern division-leading Cleveland Browns is well on his way to setting a rushing record for one season and also has a good shot at a scoring record.

The former Syracuse star has accounted for 635 yards on 94 rushing attempts in the Browns' four winning efforts this year. That figures out to a 6.8 yard average per carry and a game average of almost 159 yards.

The game figure is about 64 yards more than Steve Van Buren averaged when he set the present NFL league rushing record with 1,146 yards for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1949.

Another big reason for the Browns' success is rookie Bob Mitchell whose season total of 370 yards rushing is second best in the league. Mitchell has averaged 8.8 yards for each of his 42 runs. Tom Wilson of Los Angeles is a distant third with 302 yards by running.

Lions Need Encouragement

DETROIT (AP)—A belligerent George Wilson said Tuesday his Detroit Lions could do with more encouragement and less criticism for their poor start in the National Football League race.

"If we can get the front-runners off our backs, we'll be in far better shape," said the bitter coach. "We have enough trouble winning without having to put up with that kind of stuff."

Wilson, his aides and the players have been criticized for the Lions' failure to win in four starts after capturing the World Championship a season ago.

The Lions lost their last three games on the pre-season schedule and have only a tie with Green Bay in four regular season games.

"I don't have to make excuses for my club," Wilson growled. "Anybody halfway smart knows we lost two top men, Steve Jurkiewicz and Jerry Rechow, with injuries before the season ever started. And our regular fullback, John Henry Johnson, hasn't even played in the last two games."

There are 10 new faces on this year's team including eight

rookies. Wilson defended the heavy turnover by saying: "A lot of other teams—the Browns, the Bears, in fact, practically every team in the league—they have fallen apart because they hung on to guys too long. We've had good reasons for making our moves."

Wilson said he has been shocked by the sudden hostility. "It's amazing how quickly things change," he said. "Already they have the Lions dead and buried. These front runners are funny ducks."

Revolution Put Down In Bolivia

Socialists Lead Small Uprising

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — Army troops smashed a small revolt by anti-government elements in La Paz Tuesday. Three persons were killed and two wounded in five hours of street fighting.

A large number of dissidents were reported captured, but officials declined to give a figure. Activity had returned to normal by noon and the government said it was in complete control of the situation.

First official reports said the uprising was led by the Rightist Falange Socialists, but Government Minister Walter Guevara later said other opposition parties were involved.

The rebels struck at 4:30 a.m. in residential suburbs of this two-mile-high capital. Apparently they aimed to seize high government officials and leaders of the Ruling National Revolutionary movement. They stormed homes but succeeded in seizing only Gov. Humberto Villar of La Paz province.

One insurgent band attacked the city prison and a militia headquarters but failed to overpower their defenders.

Guevara said the rebels left behind them a number of vehicles loaded with arms and ammunition.

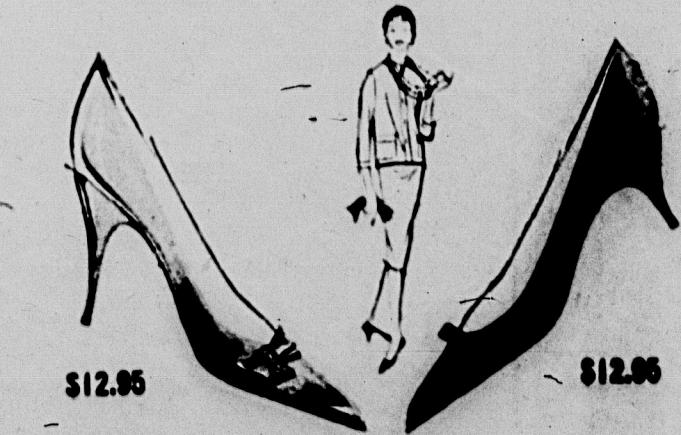
