Perhaps our distinguished governor is making an attempt to have himself better known in the State of New York for purposes of the presidential nomination, to which he purportedly aspires.

Perhaps the heir to the Williams shaving fortune needs money. Whatever it may be, and the answer seems obvious, he has seriously injured the prestige of his high office, one at least sacred to people in Michigan if not New Yorkers.

A public official he is. Not a Madison Avenue ad man. No matter how dignified the publication, the governorship of the State of Michigan should not be for rent.

November Elections Draw Near Know Your Political Candidates

Many Republicans agree that Paul Bagwell has given the Republican party its hardest working candidate for governor in 10 years. He is the first GOP gubernatorial candidate to stump all counties in Michigan in many years.

Neither his alleged under-dog role nor political nor personal handicaps slowed this 45-year-old professor from MSU in his second bid for statewide elective office.

If he overcomes the odds, Bagwell will turn in one of the most notable individual political triumphs in Michigan history.

Bagwell, who was born on a

His initial look down the rocky campaign trail and his decision to take it, recall the comeback he made from a dark personal misfortune that struck 27 years ago.

In 1931, Bagwell suffered a football injury that brought on pain and partial paralysis in both legs. He still walks with a cane.

His conquest of this adversity stamped him with a sense of confidence and optimism that became one of his trademarks in nearly 20 years on the MSU faculty.

The quality helped boost him to command of the MSU department of communications arts, one of the largest at MSU.

It helped propel him to national presidency of the Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1945-49 and served him well as state

North Carolina farm Aug. 26, 1913, earned a masters degree in rhetoric and public address at the University of Wisconsin, and came to MSU in the fall of 1938 as an instructor. He worked up to the rank of full professor and department head in four years.

Former President Truman appointed him in 1948 as a member of the U. S. Commission on UNESCO, and reappointed him in 1951.

Williams Carries Democrats Hopes

Gov. G. Mennen Williams, "the man with the polka dot tie," is almost certainly the best known governor in Michigan history.

The chief executive has occupied the governor's chair four years longer than any other man. Now he's gunning for a sixth straight term, unprecedented in Michigan or any other state in modern history.

Now 47, Williams came to Lansing nearly 10 years ago as "the boy wonder" of the Democratic party in Michigan. In the years since, he has become its top vote getter and acknowledged leader. And he has become well known, not only in Michigan, but in political circles throughout the country.

Perhaps most astounding, he created a political revolution that put all the state's top administrative offices in Democratic hands—this in a state which has been strongly Republican for most of a century.

Williams won the state's main post on his first try, and as a political newcomer.

In 1948, he won an upset victory in the Democratic primary, then beat Governor Sifer by a whopping majority.

In four succeeding elections, he took on four different candidates, winning by narrow margins in 1950 and 1952 and by landslides in 1954 and 1956.

There is widespread speculation he will seek the Presidency in 1959 if he is successful in his bid for a sixth term as Governor of Michigan.

A native Detroit, Williams graduated with top scholastic honors from Princeton and the University of Michigan Law School.

A Navy veteran, he served in various appointive posts and started a private law practice before running for governor.

g Board Accepts \$43,000 Grant

A grant of \$43,000 from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation Battle Creek was accepted by MSU's governing board today for additional facilities at the university's Kellogg Biological Station.

Milton Mueller of the Department of Arts and Science said he hoped that construction would be completed in time for the 1959 summer term.

The new facilities were listed as follows: Research Laboratory building. This unit will contain a laboratory as well as laboratory space for the major biological disciplines at the station. Married Housing. Approximately 30 apartments are planned for married graduate students and faculty.

Research Annex. This will be adjacent to the greenhouse, and year-round research office and teaching laboratory.

Lecture and Dining Hall. This building will contain kitchen facilities, a dining room for 100 persons, a large conference room and a "field" room for exhibits of specimens collected by students and faculty.

Service Offers Jobs Abroad Next Summer

A summer in Europe—with a job—is offered by the American Student Information Service (ASIS), a non-profit organization serving students.

Students who wish to take advantage of the facilities offered by the ASIS must become members of the organization at a cost of \$12.

This membership is good for four years; the following information is required for membership and application in any of the European countries participating in this program: 1. name, university address, age, sex, course of study, previous work experience; 2. dates student wishes to work; 3. first and second choices of country and employment.

England, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Germany, Holland, Finland, France, Spain, Switzerland, Israel, Ireland and Austria are the participating countries in this European summer work program.

Team Welcomed at Airport By Small Group of Students

Less than 100 students turned out to greet the football team at Capital City Airport Saturday night.

But they tried hard to make it a warm welcome for a down-beat squad shut out for the first time since 1954.

A large banner read "Win or Lose, We're Still With You." Everybody clapped hard to make up for their lack of numbers as the team filed off the plane. Somebody started singing the

Spartan Fight Song. Others joined in, but it sounded off key and weak in the vastness of the airport. More clapping followed as Duffy Daugherty stepped off the plane.

Then everybody went home.

Congress Examines Driver Improvement

Severe methods of disciplining problem drivers produce less improvement in driver behavior than milder measures, Milo Chalfant, lecturer in the School of Police Administration and Public Safety, told delegates at the National Safety Congress in Chicago recently.

Chalfant spoke before a general session of the Safety Congress devoted to recent traffic safety research reporting on a study of the "Effectiveness of Driver Improvement Procedures."

The study produced some revealing data about certain characteristics of Michigan's problem drivers, according to Chalfant.

Nearly half (48 percent) of the 4,218 problem driver samples were single.

Only four percent of the problem drivers were women although it is estimated that 30.8 percent of Michigan's drivers are women.

Sixty-two percent of the problem drivers had less than a twelfth grade education.

Woes of Soccer

nal said they had been flooded with inquiries, but there had been no reports.

The wire services and Sunday papers failed to carry the news. The score was not even announced on stations beaming the football game back to Michigan State.

Drub Illini For No. 18 In String

Michigan State's soccer team just about ran previously-unbeaten Illinois out of Champaign Saturday.

The fabulous booters dumped the Illini, 10-5, in what was supposed to be the toughest game of the season.

It was an unusual game. Here are some of the things that happened:

1. Six players scored the 10 goals. Eric Stredler led with three, and Art Southan scored twice. Al Sarria, Bernie Cook, Neil Butler, George Sepetya and John Southan each tallied once.

2. Goalie Noel Drago had 10 goals to two goals in the first three periods, but was taken out of the game in the last quarter when he hit his head on the goal post diving at the ball. Gerhart Greitz and George Sepetya shared the goalie job in the fourth quarter. Neither half ended goal before at 10-0.

3. Despite the lopsided score, the Illini got the first goal in the game after just three minutes of play and was the first ever allowed by goalie Drago. Almost lost in the excitement was the fact that it ended a six-game shutout streak for the Spartans. It was No. 18 without defeat and State's ninth straight victory.

4. The 10 goals were the most ever scored by the Spartans in their three-year varsity history. And the five by Illinois were the most ever scored against the Spartans. But it wasn't the highest point spread. State defeated Indiana, 7-0, in the final game last year.

5. Coach Kenney took out the whole first team in the fourth quarter. He used all 19-man traveling squad.

One reason for the unusually high scoring was because the field was short. "It was pretty hard to put up much of a defense on such a short field," Kenney said. "And the ground was so hard it was difficult to control the ball."

Illinois scored first. Drago caught the ball but came down in the net. Stredler evened the score from 18 yards out moments later.

Art Southan scored on a head shot after a setup by Bruce Okine and added another before the first quarter ended.

Sarria scored after about 10 minutes of the second period. Neil Butler scored on a free shot 10 minutes later. The scrappy fullback booted the ball 40 yards and it bounced off an Illini fullback's head and into the net. Because Butler is a deft man and plays close to his goal, it was his first score in three years of play.

Illinois got its second goal in a scramble in front of the goal to open the second half, but Stredler added two more for the Spartans.

After five minutes of the fourth period, Cook took the fullback and made it 8-2. A few minutes later Kenney pulled the first team, and at about the same time, Drago was dazed when he dived at the ball.

Sepetya switched from fullback-goalie to center half and scored his first varsity goal with seconds left in the game. Like Butler, Sepetya had played fullback for three years before getting his scoring chance.

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Illini Hand Spartans Second Loss, 16-0

Look Only Offensive Threat for State

The Spartan gridders gave a repeat performance to a crowd of over 70,000 Illinois Homecoming fans Saturday as they refused to take advantage of numerous scoring opportunities and were humbled by a Fighting Illini team, 16-0.

It was the first shutout inflicted upon the Spartans since the second game of the 1954 season when the Wisconsin Badgers won a close 6-0 affair. Saturday's game was a re-enactment of the one played against Purdue last weekend, the score wasn't the same (State dropped the 14-6 verdict to the Spartans), the opposing team wasn't the same, but the type of play was.

Last week it was Purdue who tried vainly to hand State a victory. This week it was Illinois.

Illinois thrilled its Homecoming audience early in the first period by opening the scoring with a field goal and a first offensive surge. The Fighting Illini marched unopposed after receiving the opening kickoff, picking up four first downs before being halted with a fourth down and nine yards to go situation on the Spartans' 17-yard line.

Illinois left tackle Don Yearzel stepped back to the 29-yard line and booted a perfect field goal to make it 3-0.

The Illini threatened to add another quick tally soon after the following kickoff. With fourth down and a yard to go for a first down, Michigan state fullback Bob Berich moved into punt formation.

But Illinois' Bill Burnell crashed through the forward wall to block it, with Illinois recovering on State's 32-yard line.

Disaster was spared two plays later, however, as Berich moved in to intercept a pass from Illinois quarterback Bob Hickey intended for L. T. Bonner on the Spartans' five.

Unable to penetrate a stubborn Illinois forward wall, State found itself with fourth down and one yard to go on its own seven-yard line.

Dean Look faced a punt perfectly and sped 29 yards to a first down on MSU's 39-yard marker. This sparked the Spartans to an 81-yard march which was halted on the Illinois 17.

But four downs later the Spartans still had nine yards to go. Dan Folio tried his toe at kicking a field goal, but it fell short.

Early in the second quarter Illinois again threatened, but Spartan Oscar Hahn was the lifesaver, recovering an Illini fumble on State's 30-yard line.

After an exchange of the football, the Spartans received another break when William Hickey intercepted one of Larry Healy's passes and ran unopposed for a 38-yard touchdown to put victory out of reach for State.

Bolden Stars As Browns Win, 38-24

CHICAGO (AP)—Leroy Bolden, former Michigan State gridiron star, faced 192 yards with a kickoff return for a touchdown in Sunday's 38-24 blasting of the Chicago Cardinals. It was the longest scoring play in Cleveland's history.

Fullback Jimmy Brown, one of the most exciting players in the National Football League, scored four more of the Browns' touchdowns on runs of 62, 41, 7 and 2 yards.

The 228-pound second-year star from Syracuse rolled up 180 yards on 24 rushes and topped his season total to 815 for five games. Brown's four touchdowns gave him a total of 14.

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Lions Stop Ram Rally, Win 41-24

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Champion Detroit Lions, registering their first victory in the National Football League, plastered the scoreboard with five touchdowns and two field goals to defeat the favored Los Angeles Rams 41-24.

A tremendous crowd of 81,703 watched the local heroes make a stirring threat in the third quarter but the Lions came back to squelch the hopes with 13 points in the final quarter and saw up the game.

Veteran quarterback Tobin Rote connected with three touchdowns passes to lead the Lions to the triumph, one that was propelled early in the game when Detroit unleashed a sensational 104-yard touchdown play.

It came after the Rams' Del Sholner had kicked a 16-yard field goal. On the kickoff Gene Gedman took the ball four yards inside the end zone, returned it 14 yards, handed it off to Terry Barr, who raced 86 yards for the score.

It sent the Lions into the front and they never relinquished the lead.

Kennedy Sets Record

Harriers Race Past Penn State, 23-32

Capt. Foddy Kennedy set a course record on Penn State's five-mile course Saturday, racing across the finish line 390 yards in front to record a 24:55 time and lead Michigan State to a 23-32 victory over the Nittany Lions.

Taking first, third, fourth, seventh and eighth places, the Spartans defeated an eastern power which has beaten Cornell, Navy and Pittsburgh by commanding scores.

It was the second straight win for Kennedy, who placed first with a 19:57.3 time in last week's loss to Western Michigan.

Kennedy's performance eclipsed a record previously held by Henry Kennedy, Foddy's brother, set in 1956 at 25:20.

At the mile mark, Kennedy and the rest of the field were bunched together being clocked at 4:50. Kennedy began to move out and at the two-mile mark the Spartan runner and Penn State's Ed Moran were timed at 9:40, followed closely by Ben Lake and Bill Reynolds of Michigan State at 9:48.

At the four-mile mark Kennedy was all alone and timed in 19:52—one second faster than

his brother was clocked two years ago.

With one entire mile remaining, the Spartan began to try for the record. Running the last mile in 5:03—even faster than he ran the third mile of the race—Kennedy raced across the finish line nearly 300 yards ahead of Penn State's Ed Moran.

Bob Lake, a veteran cross country runner turned in his usual good performance posting a 25:40 time, while newcomer Bill Reynolds placed fourth with a 25:49 performance.

Jim Moran, who posted a 26:42 time and Tony Smith with a 26:45, filled out the remainder of Michigan State's scoring.
