

... Badgers Favored in Spartan Homecoming ...

Michigan State's football team will be the underdog for the first time in three years Saturday as it meets Wisconsin in the Spartans' nationally-televised Homecoming game.

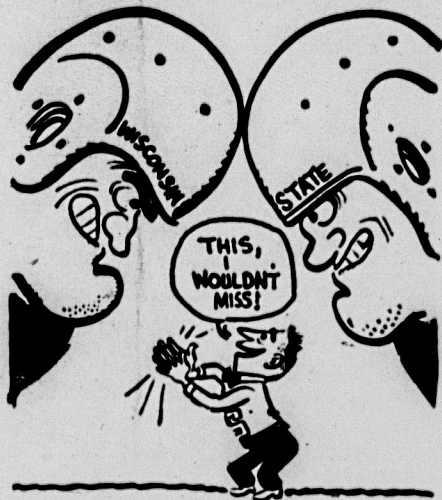
The Spartans, still looking for their first Big 10 victory, face a Badger team which has lost just one game this year. In a series that began back in 1913, Wisconsin holds an edge over Michigan State with five wins and four losses. State's success has come in recent years, having beaten the Badgers in their last three meetings. Last year, MSU was pressed to win, 21-7, in a game that was much closer than the score indicates.

Wisconsin started the season off with a bang by rolling up three decisive victories.

The Badgers stopped Miami, 20-0, Marquette, 50-0, and Purdue, 31-6. They were jolted from the unbeaten ranks by powerful Iowa, 20-9, two weeks ago but tied Ohio State, 7-7 last Saturday.

Spartan coach Duffy Daugherty plans to go with last week's lineup with one change. Fran O'Brien returns to the first string at left tackle. The backfield includes Greg Montgomery at quarterback, Dean Look at left half, Herb Adderley at right half and Bob Bereich at fullback.

Daugherty has said an important shortcoming this year has been the lack of a real power runner. He says he hopes



Adderley can supply that needed power against the Badgers.

He has also hinted that there may be some surprises in store for Wisconsin, as well as personnel changes.

"We aren't sparing anything for this game," he said. "If we lose this one, it won't be because we're not shooting the works."

Wisconsin coach Milt Bruhn admits this is a "must" game for the Badgers if they hope to stay in the conference race.

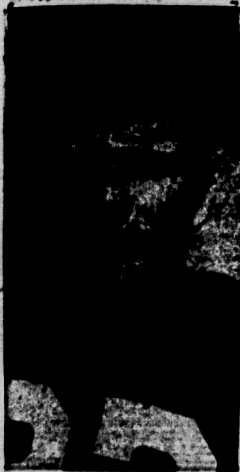
"We're going after them," he says, "and we expect a real rugged battle."

The Badgers came through the Ohio State game with an assortment of bumps and bruises, but no serious injuries. The team will be in good shape for Saturday's encounter with Michigan State.

The only lineup change contemplated is Lowell "Gooch" Jenkins starting at left tackle in place of Dan Lanphear, whose performance was not up to par in the Ohio State game.

The Badgers are considered to have a good line, both on offense and defense, but have no really outstanding men in the backfield.

They have rushed for 1064 yards in five games while holding the opposition to 730.

Oxford, MSU Teams Debate On Socialism

Although an immense amount of politicking took place, the International Debaters were received well by a large audience in the Union Ballroom last evening.

Speakers for the affirmative, Stuart Griffiths, Oxford University, and Charles Herbert, MSU, believed that when the State is versus the individual, the State is on top, thus socialism in both Great Britain and America would infringe upon the rights of the people.

The negative side, composed of Brian Walden of Oxford and Steven Gronner of MSU, stated that socialism is a concept of equality and can aid or add to the rights of the individual.

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Nobel Prizes Prove Problem for Reds

IN NAMING BORIS PASTERNAK as the winner of the 1958 Nobel Prize for Literature, the Swedish Academy cited him for "his important achievement in the field of the great Russian epic tradition." Pasternak is an excellent choice for this high honor.

By refusing to let Pasternak accept this coveted award, at the same time giving a happy nod of approval to three Russian scientists to collect the award for physics, the Communist Party in Russia has afforded the free world an unusual insight into their domestic problems.

Proud as they may be of their scientific accomplishments—and well they might be—the Russian Communists evidently would like to hide from the free world the fact that not all of her artists are willing to buy the party line.

IT IS SIGNIFICANT that the internationally famous novel, "Doctor Zhivago," is officially suppressed in the author's own homeland.

It is significant, also, that the novel does not deal with the present regime in Russia. Rather it is concerned with the story of a doctor's life through the First World War, the Russian Revolution, and the following decades.

Why, then, should the government of Russia be so concerned about the author receiving international recognition for this book?

THERE IS A SIMPLE answer. Throughout the novel the author responds to the dehumanizing effect of a system that began for the novel's characters as a time of hope and joy.

Pasternak, a deeply religious man who has lived near Moscow all his life, reveals himself as a great humanitarian author. Only a government afraid to permit the honest study of humanity would suppress such a book.

Pasternak serves to remind the free world that while the Communists are all powerful in Russia today, politically speaking, they are still a minority among their own people.

THE NOVEL ALSO serves to remind us that while Russia has experienced several long periods of harsh autocracy in many forms, she has not forgotten her equally old democratic tradition.

That this democratic tradition is still cherished by many is evident in the refusal of the award by the author. The free world can not believe anything except that Pasternak withdrew his original acceptance to preserve for other Russian writers a minimum of expression.

There is still hope when a creative artist dares to stand upright before political force. It is encouraging to all people when an artist can survive the restrictions of a rigid political system and still maintain his own sense of values.

Boris Pasternak will not be with the three Russian scientists when they travel to Sweden to collect their prizes for physics in December, but the free world will award him the honor in absentia.

A dummy, with a name "Homer" painted on it, was found in a large oak tree on the campus.

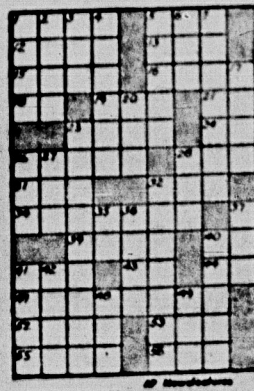
Homer was the author of the "Iliad," one of the great books being studied by Parsons students.

Honors Group Hit

To the Editor:
I noted in the State News (Oct. 24) that Mr. R. K. Narayan, India's eminent novelist "during his stay at MSU plans to meet with students of the Honors College."

It seems, indeed, inconceivable that in stirring days of literary and cultural significance, pedagogues are the ones who determine who is qualified to have an audience with an acc-

In looking through the literati files, we find that F. Scott Fitzgerald was chucked out of Princeton because of grades. Eugene O'Neill, at Old Nassau, flunked all his freshman English at O' Mass. And that great paragon of American satirists, Ring Lardner, left Arthur Institute in his freshman year, only passing in rhetoric.

Singularly, it has come to pass that the university exists the honors college students like they were so many sacred cows. O'Neill, Faulkner, F. Scott, and Ring wouldn't have traffic with the vapid gang. They couldn't stomach their maddening sobriety and orthodoxy.

If you were to place a monetary value on their knowledge of abstract thought you wouldn't have enough kale to buy a Dutch Masters cigar.

Admittedly, they have textbook knowledge, but then texts are written by the biggest horse behind the wooden one of the Trojan War, and to be a thrill to this pedagogically sterile, socially vulgar, and morally bankrupt, incessant reading of texts makes you so narrow minded that if you fell on a pin it would blind you in both eyes.

Placing students according to IQ or achievement is not only undemocratic, but in many cases, somewhat inhumane. Pre-determined classifying of students, especially in junior high school, creates irreparable damage, both morally and mentally, to the students destined to occupy the lower achievement high school that I attended, putting up with wretched teachers that had the physiognomy, finesse, and foul smell of a chimpanzee was, in itself, stultifying. But when they threatened to renege the students to the "dummy" section, whenever they failed to support themselves in the obvious manner, it became soul-crushing.

Educational caste systems in the universities, such as the honors college employed at MSU, can be of value, but when they cater solely to the exclusive, it is done, I feel, at the expense of those who haven't attained that sacrosanct 3-plus point average.

To maintain that accomplishment in college is necessarily the criterion for accomplishment outside the pale of higher learning is as foolish as to maintain that the State of Michigan won't be governed by a mountebank for the next four years.

Singling out students as unique because of mental aptitude, is contrary to the nature of the last vestige of honest-to-gosh learning in America—the little red school house. When they uttered in educational theory and teacher methodology, learning was swept out the back door.

Categorizing students on the basis of intelligence came on the American scene with the advent of the consolidated school. The Honors College is MSU's baby. We cannot but doubt its legitimacy.

'Unknown' Coach Pilots Baltimore to NFL Lead

BALTIMORE (AP)—A little man in a crumpled brown suit will be noticed by only a few on the sidelines of Sundays football game between the Baltimore Colts and Green Bay Packers.

Many in the stands wouldn't be too sure about his correct name. And most people outside of Baltimore wouldn't even know who he is if you told them.

Yet after you get through mentioning the likes of quarterback Johnny Unitas, fullback Alan Ameche, halfback Lennie Moore or owner Carroll Rosenbloom, the short fellow is more responsible than any for the undefeated Colts.

He's the coach. By name, Weeb Ewbank, far from a household word in the world of sports.

Ewbank was pulled out of virtual obscurity by the Colts in 1954. Although he'd been coaching sports for 26 years, he was head man only once. That was at Washington University in St. Louis.

Prior to being picked by the Colts he toiled in the big shadow of Paul Brown for five years as an assistant with the Cleveland Browns.

Last year, for the second straight season there was talk of firing him. This was after the Colts won their first three games and then lost the next three.

"I know football and I know what I am doing is right," Ewbank asserted. "We still are building and I feel I'm doing my job."

"But if I don't have this job, I'll have another in football."

With their goal well established and only four steps away, Michigan State's never-beaten booters will take on Ohio State at 10 Saturday morning on the Soccer Field.

A win would lengthen the Spartans' undefeated string to 19 straight since soccer went varsity here in 1936. It would be their fifth consecutive win this season and the 11th since their last loss early in 1957.

Moreover, it would put them within one win of a new goal, the recently-established Big 10 soccer trophy. Michigan State has already topped two conference opponents, Purdue and Illinois, and has only Indiana to play after the Buckeyes.

OSU, by no means easy game for any team, has compiled a 2-2 record this year against tough Ohio opponents. The Bucks and Spartans have faced no common foes this year.

The Spartans starting lineup is basically the same used in recent weeks. John Southan, alternating weeks as starter with Bruce Okins, will open at left wing. George Sepety, a former fullback who took over the center halfback spot when Pete McKinnon dropped from the team, will start for the second time in his new assignment. Al Louigno will be at Sepety's old right full position.

An especially impressive performance among an already-impressive crew of newcomers is being turned in by right wingman Bernie Cook. The sophomore transfer from Union College (N.Y.) has scored twice in this season and is, in Coach Gene Kenney's words, "one of the best men at his position in the Midwest, perhaps in the nation."

Other nifty showings have been turned in by sophomore sub Gerhardt Greitz, Horace Hamilton and Paul Winther as well as the "green" starting trio of Okins, John Southan and Erich Stredler.

All have forecast a bright future for the formerly-undermanned team with their keen play, Kenney.

This announcement heralds a fanfare introduction as the strutting drum major leads the 135-piece band onto the field.

At each home game and at many away contests, Spartan fans are treated to pre-game and half-time shows of music and precision drilling.

This week's Homecoming show promises to provide appropriate entertainment with a "Do You Remember?" theme dedicated to the returning alumnus.

The band and Block S will combine forces to present a sweeping survey of the past 30 years in music, fads, and fashions.

A swinging version of "Varsity Drag" from the band, accompanied by a straw hat and striped blazer in the Block S section, will symbolize the Roaring 20's.

Benny Goodman was King of Swing in the 30's and the band will acknowledge the swing era with "Sing, Sing, Sing."

The show rolls on through the years with a selection from "South Pacific," a Latin-American number featuring the drum section, and even a visit from Walt Disney's "Zorro" as Block S writes out his famous "Z" insignia.

Keeping the band at top performance and the shows keyed to the latest collegiate capers is a year-around job for Conductor Leonard Falcone and Asst. Conductor Oscar Stover.

Passing the audition means reporting to school a week before registration in the fall. This extra time plus Registration Week itself is used in drilling on the basic fundamentals of marching and formations.

Once classes begin, rehearsals are held from 5 to 6 p.m., Monday thru Friday, on the practice field west of the Music Building.

An extra practice in Jenison Fieldhouse on Wednesday nights and dress rehearsal just before the game rounds out the practice schedule at approximately eight hours weekly.

Once a theme is chosen for a particular week, the music must be selected. The band has 930 titles on file, providing a wide range of tempos and rhythms.

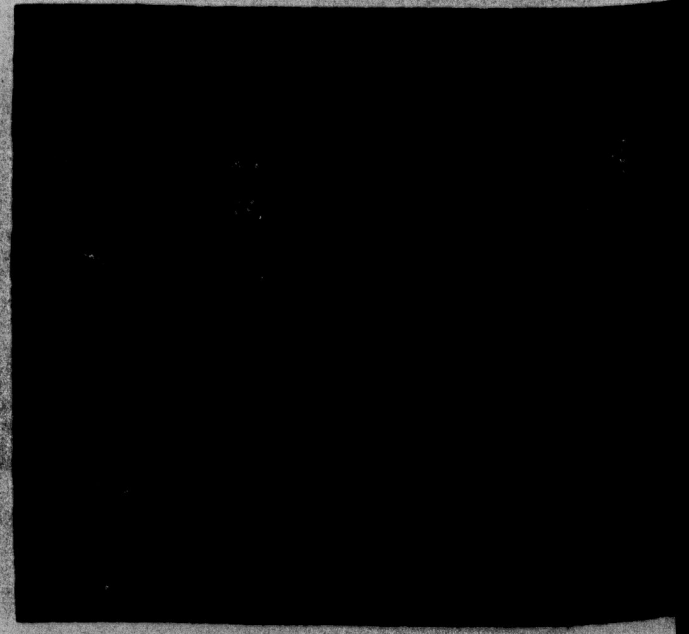
At the end of fall term, the marching band packs away its traveling shoes and settles down into concert band formation.
