WILLIAMS RUNNING AWAY

Democrats Pushing GOP From Senatorial Seats

Sweep in House Seems Certain From Trend

Butler Predicts 47 Seat Gain In House; 11 or 12 in Senate

WASHINGTON (AP)—In a big victory surge, Democrats clinched command of the Senate Tuesday night and seemed certain to widen their margin of control in the House also.

The rate at which Republican seats fell to Democrats pointed to a big increase in the Democratic majorities in the next Congress—two in the Senate and 35 in the House.

Only a few hours after the polls closed, Democrats had taken 51 seats in the Senate from the GOP, assuring control. They were threatening at least five more.

In the House, Democrats clinched 12 formerly GOP-held seats and were leading in races for 35 more. Republicans had taken the seats from Democrats in other chambers and were not leading in any contests for seats now Democratic-held.

Among dramatic Democratic gains were a sweep across the board in Connecticut. They captured the only Senate seat contested there and all six House seats. All had been held by Republicans.

Both GOP-held West Virginia Senate seats fell to Democrats. A Republican candidate conceded loss of a House seat in Vermont, which had not elected a Democrat to major office since 1852. Democrats were seeking for four seats in normally heavily Republican Ohio.

An estimated 48 million voters chose 33 Senators and 422 Representatives who—along with 36 Senators and 36 Representatives elected Sept. 8 in Maine and two Senators and one Representative to be elected Nov. 25 in Alaska—will serve in the 86th Congress.

In that Congress, which convenes in January, there will be 41 holdover Senators, 26 Democrats and 28 Republicans. Democrats went into the election with a 49-47 edge in Senate seats and a 235-209 margin in the House. In the new Congress, a majority will be 50 Senators and 219 Representatives.

Paul M. Butler, Democratic national chairman, predicted gains of 46 House and 11 or 12 Senate seats. The Republican counterpart, Charles McNamara, forecast "some very startling upsets" which would give the GOP control of the House. But he was not so sure.

Solid South Stays Solid Democratic

Gain 6 Governorships; Faubus Returns in Ark.

Democrats of the solid south in Tuesday's voting held tightly to their complete control of governorships and Senate seats and apparently whittled a little from the Republicans' already meager possessions in the House.

The 11 "confederate" states elected six Democratic governors, either to succeed themselves or to take over from fellow party members. The other five, plus border Kentucky, did not have executive chairs at stake but Democrats occupy all of them.

Six Senate seats also were retained by incumbent Democrats. Neither of Kentucky's two Republican Senators came up this year. The other 16 holdover Senate seats in the 12-state block are in Democratic hands.

The 85th Congress saw the 12 states' 116 House seats held by 108 Democrats and nine Republicans.

Tennessee returned its two Republican incumbents and Florida voted its lone GOP representative back into office. In Virginia, two Republicans were re-elected.

But in Kentucky one of two Republicans lost while the other led. In North Carolina, the lone GOP House member trailed slightly. And in Texas the lone Republican representative was in a very close race.

Arkansas—Gov. Orval Faubus, embattled leader of the Little Rock segregationists, rolled to a landslide re-election victory over Republican George W. Johnson.

The Nationalists said the Communists might be making the charge to lay the basis for themselves using gas against Quemoy. But Lose Big One

Democrats Sweep In Governor Races

WASHINGTON (AP)—Democrats elected 12 governors and led in 11 of the remaining 21 races at 11:30 p.m., EST, Tuesday—but they lost the big one, New York State.

Nelson Rockefeller, the Republican millionaire with voter appeal, knocked New York's Democratic Governor Averell Harriman out of the state house in Albany—and most likely out of a possible presidential nomination in 1960.

The New York counting seemed in thrilling fashion for two hours after the polls closed. Then Rockefeller, making his first bid for public office, swept ahead and soon was a clear-cut winner of the nation's No. 2 political plum.

But by that time the Democrats had elected 11 governors and in one state, Maryland, installed a Democrat in a Republican-held gubernatorial chair. J. Millard Tawes had almost a 2 to 1 lead when supporters of Republican James P. Devereux threw in the towel.

Early returns from California showed Sen. William F. Knowland, who gave up the GOP Senate leadership to fight for his state's governorship, trailing the popular Edmund G. (Pat) Brown, state attorney general.

Soapy Leads By 100,000

60% of Votes Counted; Bagwell's Bid Close

DETROIT (AP)—Gov. G. Mennen Williams today clung to a lead of better than 100,000 with 60 percent of the vote counted in his tightest re-election race in six years.

The five-term Democratic chief executive was running behind his running mate, Lt. Gov. Philip Hart, who appeared headed for success in his bid to upset Republican U. S. Sen. Charles Potter.

In his challenge to Williams, his predecessor Republican nominee of two and four years ago.

As usual, Democrats gave Williams—and this time Hart—a rousing sendoff in the party stronghold of Detroit and Wayne county. But the Wayne county vote was a little lighter than the comparable year of 1954.

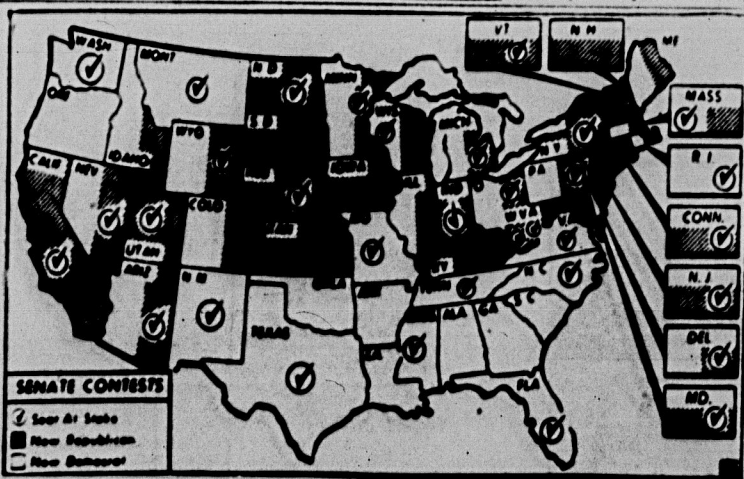

Statistically, the Democrats went into the election with a numerical advantage over Republicans. Democratic candidates for House seats were unopposed in 89 districts, mainly in the South. Another Democrat was unopposed for election to the Senate. Only one Republican, running for the House, had no contest, although several had only token opposition.

Rockefeller Wins NY Governorship

NEW YORK (AP)—Republican Nelson A. Rockefeller was elected governor by an emphatic margin over Democratic Gov. Averell Harriman Tuesday in the state's "battle of the millionaires."

Harriman conceded defeat at 10:45 p.m.

"I congratulate Mr. Rockefeller and extend to him my best wishes," Harriman said at his campaign headquarters.

"I am deeply grateful to all the men and women throughout the state who worked so devotedly for the Democratic cause."

Paul Brown Wins California Race

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Atty. Gen. Edmund (Pat) Brown was elected California's second Democratic Governor of this century Tuesday.

The tide of Democratic votes upset the political career of his Republican opponent, Sen. William Knowland, who conceded at 12:42 a.m. Democratic Rep. Clair Engle apparently also swept into the U. S. Senate over Gov. Goodwin Knight.

AF Vehicle Reaches 2853 Miles an Hour

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force disclosed Tuesday it has sent a rocket-powered test vehicle along a New Mexico research track at a peak speed of 2,853 miles an hour. That is about 4.8 times the speed of sound.

A spokesman for the air research and development command said this was believed to be the fastest a man-made device ever traveled on the earth's surface.

Assigned Reading System Inadequate

ON JULY 1, it was reported that 1,500 books were taken from the university library assigned reading room. This unreasonable sum was taken from a total of 12,000 volumes. From a total of 55,600 volumes in the department of Social Science and Literature there were only 267 reported missing.

In the department of Education there are 25,000 books—only 529 were missing. From the Biological and Applied Science reading room's total of 67,000 books, there were 1,178 reports stolen.

THE QUESTION which results from this list of statistics is why there is such an out-of-proportion number of books missing from the assigned reading room in comparison with the other departments.

Maybe the termite have had an especially heavy load of assigned readings. Could be kleptomaniacs prefer this room.

Of course it's ridiculous. Last spring the library committee was advised to discontinue its system of closely searching students leaving the assigned reading room.

THEY DISCARDED the system temporarily but were forced to return to it this fall because of losses incurred last term.

There has also been a recommendation that an arrangement of turnstiles should be installed in the lobby. This plan, which would start possibly during winter term, is the same system followed by the University of Michigan and Wayne State University.

Before initiating another "Big Brother" regulation at MSU, however, it might be better to determine if there is any real need for an Assigned Reading Room at all.

It's possible that the reason so many books are missing from Assigned Reading is that it is so difficult to obtain materials needed that students don't want to relinquish them.

EVEN THE MOST conscientious student can sometimes be driven to pilfer when he is constantly frustrated in his efforts to find a book being used by some 30 or 40 people in the same class.

Increasing the size of this section, which already houses 12,000 volumes, would not help matters much, since these books are not allowed to circulate outside the library.

We feel that if a better plan were initiated to make books in Assigned Reading more easily accessible to students the number of books stolen would drop drastically.

We appreciate the vast problem involved, but as it stands now, the Assigned Reading room policy is inadequate.

Red Chinese Look to Friday

Full Curricula Set For Summer School 9,000 Students Expected For Total 10-Week Session

This summer MSU will offer a full term curriculum to its students, according to Mr. C. L. Taylor, director of summer school. In previous summers the courses offered were in a six-week and a nine-week program. Beginning with the summer of 1959 a five-week and a full ten-week program will be in the offering.

Registration date for the first of the two five-week courses and for the 10-week courses will begin June 24, 1959. July 31 begins registration for the second five-week program.

MSU summer staff will include approximately 500 faculty members. The summer school students will also have the opportunity to attend classes under several distinguished visiting professors from throughout the world. The summer of 1958 MSU had a total enrollment of 8,066 students. According to Taylor, it is reasonable to assume that the enrollment for the total 10 weeks of summer school in 1959 should be in excess of 9,000.

Foreign Studies Opportunities Up

TV Case May Return To FCC

MSU, still awaiting word on the circuit court decision of the television injunction filed against it, may have to take the case back to Federal Communications Commission (FCC) for an extension of time. Circuit Judge John Simpson had promised to "act as quickly as possible" on the temporary injunction and then to hear further arguments on the merits of dismissing the bill of complaint at a later date. No information was available at the court house Tuesday.

Attorney Leland Carr, Jr., urged quick action on the temporary injunction against his client, MSU, in view of the Nov. 3 deadline date for starting construction. If Judge Simpson lifts the injunction it might be found later that the project was illegal and a great deal of money was wasted. On the other hand, the judge faces arbitrarily forcing MSU into non-compliance with the FCC order to start construction by Nov. 3.

3 Students To Attend Conference

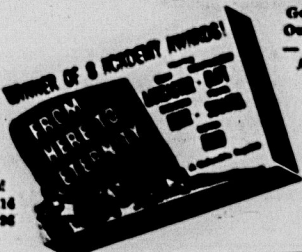
Three students will represent Michigan State at the Alabama Discussion Conference at the University of Alabama, Thursday-Saturday.

Jet Bomber Crashes With Nuclear Weapon

WASHINGTON (AP)—A B47 jet bomber which crashed near Abilene, Kan., Tuesday carried a nuclear weapon, the Air Force said.

There was no atomic explosion, but danger of one, the Air Force said, and no radioactive contamination occurred.

One airman died in the crash and three others escaped by parachute. The bomber crashed as the result of a fire which occurred on takeoff when jet assisted takeoff bottles exploded shortly after the bomber left the runway.

When the B47 was about 1,500 feet high, the entire plane caught fire. The bomber crashed about five miles from the runway.

The Air Force statement said that "in the interest of safety all personnel were requested to stay out of the area."

Soccer Team Plays Wheaton

Victory Would Give State 20 Straight Without Loss

The Spartan soccer team goes after its 20th game without defeat today at Wheaton, Ill.

And it might be a tough one. Wheaton, after a slow start, has fought its way to the top of the Midwestern Soccer Conference, a fairly powerful circuit.

The team left East Lansing by bus at 4 p.m. Tuesday and will return early Thursday morning. Game time is 4 p.m. (EST).

The Spartans have met Wheaton twice before. In 1956, they defeated them, 4-0, at Wheaton. Last year, in a game played in two inches of snow here, State won, 2-1.

This is the second of three games the Spartans play in eight days. They defeated Ohio State Saturday, 8-1, and meet Slippery Rock this Saturday at the Soccer Field.

The pressure is on State's fabulous shooters, who have a 16-0-3 mark since joining the varsity program in 1958. They are also looking for their 12th straight victory, and sixth of the year.

Michigan State has outscored its opponents, 27 goals to six, in five games. Only in their 1-0 win over Pitt did they score less than four times or win by less than four.

Pete McKinnon, who dropped from the team several weeks ago, is back and played in the Ohio State game. He will not start, however. Art Southern is also back and may start at center forward.

The starting lineup includes: Goal Noel Drago.

Defender: Horace Hamilton, Neil Butler, Leo Vander Horst, George Soper and John Asmah.

Offense: Bernie Cook, Bruce Quinn, Al Smith, Frank Strider and Art or John Southern.

Coach Gene Kerner says he still has had no word on a possible national tournament, but will be informed within the next week. The Spartans moved only to beat work Indiana in the final Nov. 15 to win the Big 10 trophy.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Brown, who gained 100 yards and scored "touchdown Sunday against New York Giants, continued to lead the league in rushing and touchdowns by an individual.

NFL statistics released today showed the big fullback of the Cleveland Browns had led 928 yards running to him only 218 yards short of Steve Van Buren's league record in rushing.

His per game average is 158 yards, which if maintained would enable him to break record in his next two games.

His average for each of 131 rushes is a rushing yard. Brown's TD as he lost to the Giants brought season total to 15 and a total of 90 in six games. League record for touchdowns is 18, by Van Buren.

Rookie Bob Mitchell, an Cleveland flash, is second rushing with a total of 479 and Jon Arnett of the Los Angeles Rams moved into third with 381 yards.

Eddie LeBaron of the Washington Redskins has scored for an average of 9.8 with each pass he has thrown.

Pope John Enthroned Amidst Religious Pomp

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Roman Catholic church triumphantly crowned Pope John XXIII Tuesday as Supreme Pontiff and spiritual ruler. Two hundred thousand people under the gray, threatening skies let out a mighty roar as the 65-year-old pontiff, who is Catholicism's 261st successor to St. Peter, received the ponderous, three-tier tiara.

Nicola Cardinal Canali, 84-year-old Cardinal dean of the sacred college, placed the jeweled symbol of papal authority on the new Pope's head.

The crowning climaxed a 4½ hour ceremony that combined medieval splendor with equipment of the electronic age.

It was held on the outdoor balcony of St. Peter's Basilica, high over the heads of the cheering thousands.

Purple-laced chair bearers set the pontiff down near a temporary throne, placed in the portico of the Basilica just to the right of the Holy Door—the door Pope John opened and closed during the 1960 Holy Year.

Here, while special missions from five nations of the world

looked on, Cardinals of the church paid their homage. Then, again to the notes of silver trumpets, the pontiff remounted his portable throne, and a slow procession into the Basilica began.

Some 50,000 packed the church, including nobility of Rome and Europe, decked with jewels and medals, and 200 Bishops and Archbishops, all robed

in white and gold and wearing white miters.

On its slow way to the Papal altar, the procession paused several times while wax was burned before the pontiff's eyes as a reminder of the passing glory of the world.

At the altar the Pope again descended from his portable throne and began the high Pontifical Mass. Then, moving briskly with a swinging counterman's stride, he walked about one hundred yards over bright new green velvet to a white silk throne set before the altar of the Cathedral at the far end of the Basilica.

In a highlight of the long ceremony, the pontiff recited a Latin homily. His voice was firm and powerful.

He said that there were some who expected him to be a diplomat, a scholar or a statesman, but that he intended to try to be a good shepherd to his flock.

He appealed to the faithful of the Roman Catholic church to pray for him, to aid him in his heavy task.

Oregon Court Indicts Head Of Teamsters

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Federal Grand Jury Tuesday accused Clyde C. Crosby, Teamsters union chief in Oregon, of lying to the Senate Labor Rackets Investigating committee last year. Perjury indictments also were returned against two officials of the Bakery and Confectionery Workers union, who were charged with lying to the grand jury.

Frank H. Mykalo of Chicago, international vice president, and Frank D. Gardone of McKees Rock, Pa., international organizer.

Crosby's indictment was based on his testimony before the Senate committee in March last year. Much of that dealt with earlier testimony by James R. (Big Jim) Ekins of Portland, an admitted racketeer who told the committee that Teamsters officials from Seattle had attempted tampering in on vice and gambling in Portland.

The indictment of Mykalo and Gardone was based on their testimony before the Grand Jury when it was investigating perjury charges against the Bakery Workers' President James G. Cross of Bethesda, Md.

Wants Peace in Cuba Cuba's President-Elect Vows Clean-up of Castro's Rebels

HAVANA (AP)—Cuba's president-elect, Andres Bello Aguirre, said Tuesday he will try to bring peace to Cuba by ending the long and bloody rebellion led by Fidel Castro.

But any peace overtures face almost certain rejection. Castro had declared in advance that Bello Aguirre's election would mean only a continuation of the policies of President Fulgencio Batista. Castro tried to thwart Monday's election by boycott and threats, and apparently succeeded in scaring thousands away from the polls.

Rivero Aguirre, a soft-spoken lawyer and longtime protégé of Batista, is classified by Americans here as a good friend of the United States. He will take over Batista's job Feb. 24.

Latest unofficial returns gave him a 5-1 lead over his nearest opponent.

It looked as if about half the

2,570,000 voters shunned the polls. The rebels, in boycotting the election, had warned that anyone who voted ran the risk of being shot.

Aides of the 53-year-old president-elect said he has already launched a fresh search for a way to peace.

They did not elaborate but there were two likely roads.

One could be an offer of a general amnesty to Castro and his guerrillas if they lay down their arms.

A more likely alternative is a tougher military action in an attempt to capture or destroy Castro's forces operating from the Sierra Maestra in eastern-most Oriente Province.

Rivero Aguirre, the son of a farmer, knows the rebel territory well. He was born there in his youth, he roamed the area as a sugar cane cutter. He

began his political career as Batista's political secretary 18 years ago. He served as minister of agriculture, minister of education and ambassador to Peru. Batista last year made him prime minister.

His first statement as president-elect said:

"The people have voted against war and mourning and against pain in the Cuban family. They have voted against those who sow blood and violence."
