Avereit Harriman out of the state house in Albany—and most likely out of a possible presidential nomination in 1960. DETROIT (P)—Gov. G. Mennen Williams today clung to a lead of better than 100,000 with 60 percent of the vote counted in his tightest re-election race in six years.

Republican Paul Bagwell was showing up stronger outstate than the GOP nominees Williams crushed in 1954 and 1956.

The tide of Democratic votes upset the political career of his Republican opponent, Sen. William Knowland, who conceded at 12:42 a.m. Democratic Rep. Clair Engle apparently also swept into the U. S. Senate over Gov. Goodwin Knight.

The balloting of sports writers and broadcasters gave Louisiana State, the unbeaten, untied SC leader, the edge over once-tied lowa, the Big Ten paceretier lowal by the low continues the continues of the low continues the low lower lower

The five conferences virtually monopolited the top ten places in the ratings, leaving room only for Army (No. 2). Oklahoma (No. 6) and the Air Force Acadomy (No. 10).

For the second straight week LSU, Iowa and Army ran 1-2-3 in the balloting, with not too many points separating them. Then came the implausible horthwestern team, which lost its top ten rating after a defeat by Iowa and regained it by anoning Ohio State its first-conference defeat in two seasons.

Louisiana State was given the No. 1 position on 82 of the 165 ballots and drew 1,443 points on the usual 10-9-8 etc. point system. Iowa drew 54 first place votes and 1,379 points and Army drew 1,105 points. Northwesterd, without a single vote for first, piled up 815 points.

Anhurn, in fifth place, trailed Northwestern by only three points. Then came Ohlahoma, Wisconsin; Purdue, Mississippi and Air Porce to round out the tep ten.




