

# ... Spartans Oppose Gophers in Final Big 10 Game ...

With another surge of lineup changes, the Michigan State Spartans stepped aboard their chartered plane Thursday evening en route to Minneapolis, Minn., in search of their first Big 10 victory.

In the final battle of the Big 10 season, the Spartans will meet Minnesota's Gophers Saturday at Memorial Stadium before some 55,000 spectators.

The Spartans of Coach Duffy Daugherty, stung with four consecutive league losses, will go up against a winless Gopher squad in what stacks up as a battle for the league cellar position.

If there's any advantage in Saturday's game, it should go to Michigan State. In comparative play, the Spartans have beaten Pittsburgh and tied Michigan while the Gophers lost to both. Against Indiana, both teams were beaten 6-0.

The latest disappointment for the Spartans was the loss to Indiana. Minnesota took its seventh straight loss last Saturday, a 28-6 defeat administered by newly-crowned Big 10 champion Iowa.

There are some close parallels in the misfortunes that have befallen these one-time Big 10 powerhouses. Both have been plagued by injuries to key men and both lack a quarterback who can move the club consistently.



Halfback Henny Young and quarterback Tom Wilson will draw their first starting assignments Saturday as Daugherty once again revamped his lineup in an attempt to come up with a winner.

Young, one of the most popular members of the Spartans, is the smallest on the squad at 5'4" and 142 pounds.

Wilson is the third quarterback to direct the starting unit this season. Previously, Mike Panitch and Greg Montgomery received chances.

Wilson was promoted to the first team for his performance against Indiana last weekend. Panitch, senior signal-caller who has moved up and down the ladder this season, will direct the second team.

Another switch in the backfield is Montgomery, starting quarterback two weeks ago. This time he'll be at left halfback to spell off starter Dean Look and Al Luplow. Throughout the season, Montgomery has been shuffled between first and second team quarterback.

Fullback Park Baker, State's leading ground gainer against the Hoosiers with 52 yards in seven carries, will alternate with Bob Berlich.

On the line, first string right guard Ellison Kelly and tackle Larry Cundiff are doubtful starters. Both received injuries in the Indiana game which have not responded to treatment.

## Prof. Speaks On Education

Dr. G. Tenny, professor of special education at Wayne State University, spoke Thursday night on "Special Education in Russia."

Children in Russia begin their formal education in the seventh grade, but are placed in nurseries when they are two months old and remain there until they are three.

According to Tenny, Russians do not believe in innate mental retardation. If the retardation cannot be accounted for by a brain injury the child's family history is traced for mental deficiencies.

Slides showing Russian schools and the facilities for the blind, deaf, and mentally retarded were shown while Tenny explained the type of training received in these schools.

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# Tunisia Asks Reds for Arms

## 150 NSA Leaders Visit State

7 Mich. Colleges Represented

Student Government officials prepare today for the early afternoon arrival of an estimated 150 Michigan college student leaders at the National Student Assn. Regional Assembly opens its three-day session on campus.

Students, administration and faculty have been invited to observe the assembly discussion groups which will meet in the Student Services third floor Student Government wing.

Member colleges and universities including MSU, the University of Michigan, Wayne State University, Ferris Institute, Flint Junior College, Marygrove and Central Michigan will be centering discussion topics around the convention theme, "Student Government—Preparing Today for Tomorrow."

Discussion groups will consider leadership, scholarship, maturity, foresight and training (parliamentary procedure and regional goals).

Following registration and a staff meeting, delegates from junior colleges will meet with MSU's Herb Ashley, director of junior-college relations and orientation, at 7 p.m. for a special two-hour discussion on the role of junior colleges. Representatives are expected from Bay City, Alpena, Grand Rapids, Traverse City, Muskegon and Flint junior colleges.

The executive committee for the Michigan region will meet at 7:30 tonight. Director of Organizations Don Brungard, regional student government vice chairman, will represent MSU.

A plenary constitution will be held from 8-12 a.m. Saturday for the entire delegation. At 1:30 p.m. Dr. Ernest Melby, distinguished visiting professor in the College of Education, will deliver the keynote address, "Student Government—Preparing Today for Tomorrow" in the Music Aud.

The Melachrino Orchestra presented a sparkling, varied program Thursday night to an enthusiastic full auditorium. Opening with a medley of Italian tunes, the program moved through a colorful range of popular and classic numbers, demonstrating high musical luster and polish.

Highlights of the evening were selections from "My Fair Lady" and "South Pacific" balanced by Strauss' "De Flodermaus" and Paganini's "Campanella," a piano solo performed by Herman Arminski.

Most typical of the Melachrino "Road Show" style were "Lobos at Twilight" and a highly accurate portrait of "San Francisco."

The distinctive Melachrino sound in all his arrangements comes from an over-balance of string instruments, giving them a romantic air. This was especially evident in already-romantic numbers, such as his "Autumn Leaves" and "Starlight Fantasy."

Although the sequence of arrangements tended, at times, to sound like movie background music, the whole evening was most enjoyable and relaxing.

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## Bourguiba Quiet on Outcome

U.S.-France Talk Miffs Tunisians

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP)—Tunisia has approached Communist Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia about buying arms, President Habib Bourguiba announced Thursday.

He did not say, in his weekly radio address to the nation, whether the contacts had been successful, but his disclosure was a jolt to the West.

The announcement followed on the heels of a diplomatic fuss with the United States over a shipment of arms. The Tunisians were angered by a report last week that the United States had sought French approval before agreeing to ship arms to this nation, which won freedom from France three years ago.

The U. S. State Department said Wednesday the French had been informed about the shipment—4,800 rifles, pistols and other small weapons—but that no approval was sought. A U.S. spokesman said arms talks are going ahead with Tunisia.

In Washington Thursday the State Department's press officer, Lincoln White, emphasized the United States is ready to sell arms to Tunisia without clearing the deal in advance with the French government. White said France had no veto in this.

## Strike Halts Auto Output

DETROIT (AP)—Chrysler Corp.'s production of 1959 model cars was halted again Thursday because of a strike of 8,000 white collar workers.

Picket lines set up by the office workers and engineers forced the closing for the second day of all of Chrysler's car and truck assembly plants and most of its parts factories.

About 48,800 workers were idled, 40,800 of them in the Detroit area. The strike began Tuesday when Chrysler and the United Auto Workers union were unable to agree on terms of a new contract for the white collar workers.

## U. S. Bids Soviets to Join Double-Header Testing Ban

GENEVA (AP)—The United States Thursday called on Russia to join the U. S. and British governments in a double-header project to suspend nuclear tests and co-operate with an international control organization.

The American proposal was introduced in the three-power talks by Ambassador James Wadsworth.

It was designed to free the delegates from the disagreement over the order of business that has bogged down their discussions since they convened two weeks ago.

Soviet delegate Semyon Tsarapkin's reaction to the American plan was negative. The West still hoped, however, that the Russians would give the proposal careful study.

## Rides Clarified For Rush Teas

Sorority rushers are permitted to ride in cars from house to house for rush teas this weekend, PanHel President Karen Fox said Thursday, although fraternity groups cannot escort guests.

# MSU Weighs Role Of NSA, Stagnation

A RAY OF SUNSHINE appears to have arisen on AUSG's generally-cloudy horizon in the form of the National Student Assn., the regional convention of which starts a three-day session today on our campus.

Why the optimism over NSA? Has the time-worn objection to the organization—"what can NSA contribute to MSU and its Student Government that we haven't already got?"—changed since Student Government delegates to the NSA national convention answered, "not much," this summer?

No, NSA is pretty much what it always has been—an idealistic group which sees the student as more than a mere four-year customer in the nation's higher education boarding houses, content to spend his vocational apprenticeship during this period in docile subordination to a system in which he has little voice.

THE STUDENT, claims NSA, has a higher role than this. In underdeveloped countries, in particular, students assume a guiding hand in the policy-making role of their governments on matters of national and student concern alike. The NSA believes more of this influence should be wielded by United States students.

Michigan State officials have had a tendency to shrug off NSA pressure group aspirations because, unlike the professional and trade unions, students cannot organize and probably would not if they could. National questions cannot be agreed upon by students who represent a spectrum of backgrounds and social ideology, they say.

Student Government officials have at times pointed to their own Student Services offices, all non-NSA concessions to the student, and asked, "Why become a member of NSA when we get all this with arms folded?" Such arguments are valid. They have not been effectively refuted. They can't be.

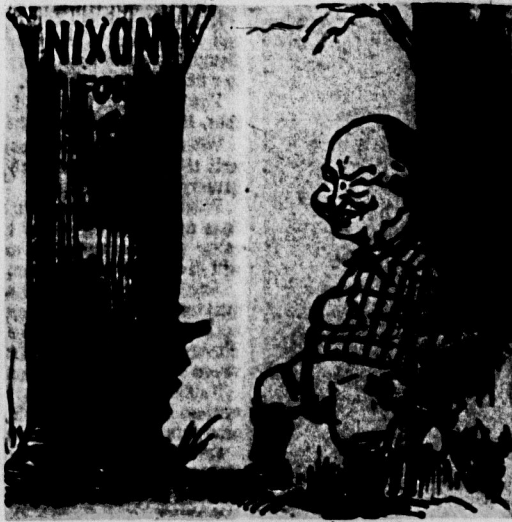
BUT NSA CAN HELP MSU in one area that has been generally overlooked. After some reflection, it seems to us that this area may outweigh NSA's objectionable points.

As noted earlier, NSA is an idealistic group, a fact that has prompted raised eye-lids from some AUSG people who are in the habit of solving problems in student relations via good old down-to-earth, level-headed practicality.

The problem is that AUSG has run out of new lands to conquer and is doing next to nothing of an original nature this year as a result. Practically has run its course. Student Government cannot continue this "thus far and no further" attitude if it hopes to expand its services to students. A little more idealism and independent thinking are needed. NSA can provide this through its "exchange of ideas" role.

Student Government leaders are right when they conclude we will be giving considerably more than we are taking as members of NSA. Still, starting with the regional convention, MSU can play a leading part in solidifying the goals of the Michigan area in a way that can benefit both the university and other member schools. As a sidelight, maybe our "advanced thinkers" will pick up a few pointers on what appears to be a new concept in AUSG thought—preparing today for tomorrow.

## Geneva Delegates Must Realize Russian Tactics

Nikita Khrushchev, with his unilateral declaration that the Potsdam Agreement is obsolete, has waved a red flag of danger in the faces of delegates to the two disarmament conferences in Geneva.

The fundamental Berlin situation itself is another warning of the same type.

**Two-Fold Warning**

1. Any agreement with the Communists remains valid only as long as they consider it advantageous to themselves. 2. Any agreement with the Communists must be nailed down, spelled out, and must anticipate all sorts of future situations after a fashion that is almost humanly impossible.

Soviet Russia obviously wants to make propaganda through talking about banning nuclear tests and guarantees against surprise attack. Just as obviously, she doesn't want to do any-

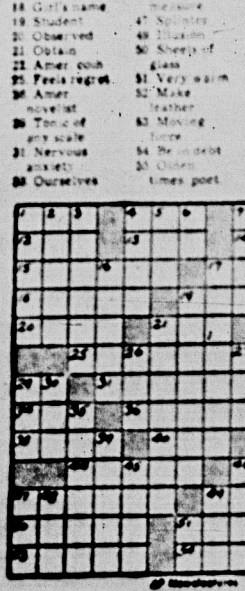

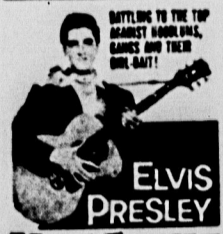

# Harriers Vie In Big 10 Meet

## Seek 4th Straight Conference Title

Michigan State will be seeking its fourth straight title in today's 44th Annual Big 10 Championships at Chicago over the four-mile Washington Park course.

Following the meet, the Spartans will leave Midway Airport and fly to New York to compete in the 30th Annual IC4A Cross Country Championships on Monday.

Before the harrier squad left Thursday, Head Coach Fran Dittrich reported that all the members of the seven-man team were in top physical condition and ready for the Spartans' hardest and most important weekend of the season.

Besides Forddy Kennedy, the team captain Bob Lake, Bill Reynolds, Dave Lean, Tony Smith, Jim Horan and George Tatu will accompany Coach Dittrich on the trip, which will cover nearly two thousand miles.

At Chicago the Spartans will be attempting to continue a winning tradition that previous Michigan State teams have built throughout the last few years. This will be the seventh title in eight tries for MSU if the harrier squad succeeds today.

Last year MSU scored 43 points to take the Western Conference crown, followed by Iowa with 74. Illinois earned third with 83. Indiana was close behind with a total of 86. Minnesota and Michigan took last place with a 103 total.

Michigan was a surprise entry last year, entering the meet for the first time. Iowa's challenge will be spearheaded by their top runner, Deacon Jones, who is undefeated this year. Just for the record, he is the Hawkeyes' having defeated Air Force, Wisconsin, the Chicago Track Club and Minnesota.

In the Minnesota meet last week Jones beat the Gophers' Bud Edeen, who edged out Kennedy in last year's Big 10 meet by mere feet with a time of 21:09.4.

Jones, who has always been a thorn in the side of the Spartans, also defeated Forddy's

brother, Henry Kennedy in a blinding snowstorm during the 1936 NCAA meet, which Michigan State won with a record low total of 28 points.

In the IC4A meet over the five-mile Van Cortlandt course, MSU will face its biggest challenge and prime obstacle in its quest in another successful season—an unbeaten Army team.

With nearly 30 teams and over 250 runners entered in this eastern meet, to predict a win for the Spartans would be like predicting the outcome of the Big 10 football race. Barring any accidents however, Michigan State should turn in a good performance.

Last year MSU won the meet with a total of 86 points and won permanent possession of an IC4A cup. Five wins or five "legs" are needed to retire one of these cups.

This was the second one for the Spartans, who also retired a cup in 1937. The only other team to retire a cup was Cornell.

### Hayes Denies He'll Quit OSU

COLUMBUS (AP)—Ohio State football coach Woody Hayes said Tuesday.

"I'm considering nothing except Saturday's game with Iowa."

The statement came in answer to a question of rumors that he is considering a job in industry and might leave the university and the coaching profession after the current campaign.

The rumors, rampant for the last three weeks, broke into publication Tuesday. Hayes had discussed the reports several times with sports writers, each time declaring there was no foundation for them.

If they're unable to start, Fred Boylen will fill in for Kelly and Palmer Pyle, the starting right tackle at the beginning of the season, will take over for Cundiff.

Capt. Sam Williams will remain at left end. Fran O'Brien at left tackle, either John Middleton or Mickey Walker at left guard and Don Wright at center.

Fred Arbanas, starting right end in the last three games, has been shifted back to his former position at the left flank behind Williams. It's still a question as to Arbanas' successor at the right flank: Either Dave Northcross or Dick Barker will draw the starting assignment.

Minnesota's hospital list is also high. Coach Murray Warmath lost each of the four experienced backs who started the season, and he's filled it with an all-sophomore unit of Larry Johnson at quarterback, Gary Milobert at left half, Bill Kauth at right half and Roger Haysbert at fullback.

One hope for the Gophers is the return of veteran Arlie Bomstad. A reserve back in 1957, Bomstad was a mainstay of Minnesota's backfield until injured three weeks ago. He's recovering from arm surgery.

Jim Reese, two-year veteran at quarterback, is still out with injuries and won't face the Spartans. Neither will Bob Solita, senior left halfback who was the starter until injured in the Michigan game Oct. 25.

Up front, the Gophers have a group which has been great offensively and defensively even in defeat. Rounding out the Minnesota line, Perry Gehring and Ken Schultz will be at the ends, Mike Wright and Jerry Wallin at tackles, Ev Gerths and Tom Brown at the guards and Mike Svendsen at center.

Daugherty, not a believer in past records, feels that Minnesota can rebound with a victory in any one game.

"They've got one of the toughest lines in the Big 10," exclaims the coach, "and with their offense, they're about due for a win."

Capt. Williams promises that the Spartans will make their most determined effort for their first Big 10 win.

"We're determined to bring home a victory," said Williams. "This is a good team. It's just been one thing or another that has kept us from winning more games."

The two teams will be meeting for the seventh time in a series that began in 1950. State won last year, 42-13, and holds the series edge by a 4-2 margin.

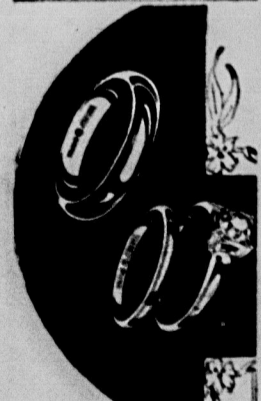
## Faith Groups Set Weekend Discussions
