Communist Seats Cut by 90 Percent

PARIS (AP)-Jacques Soustelle's right-wing Gaullist party emerged triumphantly today as France's biggest postwar political group.

The Communists took a shellacking in Sunday's windup election of a new National Assembly. sembly.

sembly.

Communist strength was reduced to ashes in the Assembly although the Reds retained roughly 20 per cent of the popular vote. Mere moderate opponents of Premier De Gaulle were all but wiped out.

Sent to defeat in the Gaullist weep was Jacques Duclos, britaint floor leaver of the robust ommunist Party bloe that numbered 149 in the last Assembly, the vote tabulations trimmed the Communist seats to less than 10 per cent of their former boidings.

Soustelle's grouping is the Union for the New Republic (UNR), a hodgepodge collection that tied itself to a reluctant De Gaulle. The greener had tried to keep out of the elections personally.

A collection of familiar faces on the French political scene disappeared in the elections.

All told, 338 former deputies were defeated and 142 were reelected. The average age in the new Assembly will be 49 compared with 52 in the outgoing house.

The higgest previous postwar party strength in a French par-liament was 174 seats held by the Communists in 1946. The Communists had the biggest blee in the last parliament.

Soustelle's new union contains some old political faces and a collection of newcomers, united on one basic point — continuation of French rule in Algeria under De Gaulle.

The UNR's position on France's grave economic problems and international policy has not been clearly defined. Some of the sentiment in the UNR is clearly less liberal than De Gaulle's thinking on the Algerian guessions.

Michigan Citizens Face Income Tax

WELL, IT FINALLY happened, Michigan citizens are

being faced with a state personal income tax.

Such is the basic principle proposed by the state tax study committee for revising Michigan's tax structure. The tax rates would vary from 3 to 8 percent after an exemption of \$1,000 in personal income.

No doubt feeling that a flat income tax plan, in addi-

No doubt feeling that a flat income tax plan, in addition to the present sales tax, would be unpopular, the committee also recommended a sales tax credit of \$40 per person, including all dependents, apply against the income tax.

In addition, a \$9 tax rebate per person is recommended y the committee. The theory is that this sum represents the sales taxes assessed against food. A \$9 rebate would be paid in cash to persons not liable for income tax payments to the state.

.CORPORATIONS COME IN for their share of the burden, also, according to the report. The committee recommends a corporation profits tax of 5 percent. This tax would be incorporated with the present corporation franchise tax.

Taxes now leveled by local governments against personal property, especially industrial machinery and equip-ment, would be eliminated, however.

This exemption is a direct aim to keep industries from

shifting locations. Inventories of businesses would not be

But local government units must make up this revenue loss in some manner. The study committee proposes that cities and school districts ride "piggyback" on the state income tax to the extent of one-half to one percent each. This would, of course, be in addition to the schedule for

AS CAN BE expected with tax proposals, the tax schedale currently proposed is aimed at wage earners in the middle and upper income brackets, but the rates for all groups would undoubtedly increase as the state's financial needs climb.

anyone doubts that higher tax rates could be ex pected in the future, one-needs only look at the develop ments in the federal income tax structure.

Unfortunately, the tax study committee evidently failed to recognize the fact that many of Michigan's present fi-nancial problems occur because much of the taxes now levied by the state are appropriated for expenditures beyond the control of the state legislature, the duly elected representatives of the people.

UNFORTUNATELY, WHILE finding a way to collect more taxes, there has been $n\bar{\nu}$ study of how we might economize in our state expenditures.

Certainly we realize the necessity of having enough money to support such state institutions as universities, schools, state mental hospitals and other functions which we have instructed the state to perform.

We also realize the heavy price that can be paid for in-

efficiency and duplication in government.

We would like to see a citizans' study commission, posbased on the Hoover Commission; appointed to survey ways and means of economizing in state and local

We suggest that while new ways must be sought to gain revenue for the state, a sharp, critical eye should be kept on all expenditures. It is not too late to eliminate unnecessary expense. There is no time like the present,
