# Great Need Stressed

Fifty years ago, the first Michigan board of nursing was appointed—and nursing achieved legal status in the state.

Today, observes Florence Kempf, R.N., director of the School of Nursing at MSU, more than 35,000 persons are registered as professional nurses in Michigan and more than 6,000 are licensed as practical nurses.

The registered professional nurse may observe and record symptoms of the patient. She may execute treatments and medications prescribed by a shysician She may apply such nursing procedures as involve understandinf of cause and effect in order to safeguard life and health."

The "R.N." may supervise other nurses and act as a nursing administrator in institutions and health agencies.






