State Capitol Results In Big Legislative Joke

Lansing, a little place in the woods, became the capitol of Michigan as a result of a "legislative joke."

The very amused senate sud-denly found the joke lying in

So it was in that year of decision that the representatives met at the 12th legislative session at the temporary capitol in Detroit. It was a cold day, but the tempers and noise were to rise regardless of the chills.

Bill No. 18 was to come up again. It was a bill that had come close to wrecking friend-ships, political alliances and campaign promises. It was to settle the permanent location of the state capitol.

One man steed up on that celd winter merning and requested that the bill be considered.

But when he rose, he was to toss a verbal bombshell into the angry indignant house.

He proposed that the bill be amended to insert the words "in the township of Lansing."

Fellow representatives broke down and laughed. It was just the kind of joke to break the tension that had gathered that merning.

People who wanted the capitol in Ann Arbor, Jackson and other towns joined in the merriment and siapped the man on the back for being such a joker.

But it was only two montis later when Governor William Greenley affixed his name to the act of the legislature which fixed the state capitol "in the township of Lansing in the country of Ingham."

Michigan's greatest joke was fast becoming law.

Surveyors prepared to mere to the little defined place called Lansing somewhere in the township of Ingham. But where was it?

There was at that time no Lansing. There was less than 20 neoole in the whole township.

Every town in the state of Michigan was determined to have the capitol in its own town, everyone from Detroit to Cadillac. They all banded together against Detroit, but split nopolessly against each other.

A hundred years ago, MSU's only dorm was a square, three storied, mud brick building which housed 132 students.

In 1860, the first and only MSU boarding house, Saints Rest, was just four years old, It was a far ery from the modern, well-equipped, multi-million dollar dorms of today.

It stood very near MSU's present museum. There is a plaque 100 feet east of the museum that reads, "N. E. Corner, Saints Rest, Built 1856, Burned Dec. 9, 1876."

The building was plain and

Rest, Built 1856, Burned Dec. 9, 1876."

The building was plain and square, surrounded by stumps, tall grass, and mud. It housed both students and faculty, four in a room.

There was no off-campus housing in 1856, as Lansing was too far away to travel everyday, the only road being offen muddy and "unnavigable."

In 1863, a campus publication, the "Bubble," was still to refer to Lansing as being surrounded by "illimitable mud, the Big Marsh, and infinite swamp."

Besides studying and attending classes, "Salinis Rest" residents helped clear brush, drive horse and ozen teams, and pull stumps.

One of the highly competitive intranural sports of that day was a stump-clearing contest. Students divided into teams often spent hours trying to "outclear" other teams.

That was 100 years ago, and today the MSU dormitories are landscaped by maintenance men and groundskeepers, and student are left to their studies and leisure.
