A reworking of the 1961-62 budget for Michigan State is being hampered by delay in the state legislature, according to Philip Nye, vice president for finance.

The university requested \$12,000,000 for the 1961-62 fiscal year, a 10 percent increase over the 1960-61 budget of \$10,900,000.

The Board of Trustees voted in November for specific allocations to the various MSU departments.

WE HAVE some additional information regarding the budget. The Board of Trustees will meet in March to consider the budget for the next fiscal year. It is expected that the budget will be approved by the legislature in May.

Last year the legislature cut the budget the Governor recommended \$1 million. In view of the cut already proposed by Governor Swenson, they can't cut this year's," May said.

Last year it was estimated that expenditures would increase to 21,000 in the fall of 1960. This year the total of 230 students is expected to increase to 272.

THE LEGISLATURE has not yet passed the budget for the fiscal year beginning in July. The Board of Trustees is expected to meet in March to consider the budget for the next fiscal year. It is expected that the budget will be approved by the legislature in May.

Redevelopment Embraced In Souvenir of Old West

SACRAMENTO, (AP)—There is a bitter controversy in California's capital city today about a plan for the future and a battered souvenir of the Old West.

As a motorist fights through heavy traffic into the west end of the city, he sees block after block in which ancient buildings have been leveled. New apartment houses are rising.

Sacramento, like cities all over the United States, has embraced redevelopment. Work has already started on 15 blocks and the federal government has tentatively given the city more than \$5 million for slum clearance on another 18 1/2 blocks.

The area was old and run-down. Shopping centers in outlying areas were attracting the customers and something had to be done to save downtown Sacramento.

Of all the slums, the worst is an eight-block section of the central city called Old Sacramento, the home of derelicts, farm hands looking for work, aged pensioners and others who find their way to riverfront skid rows.

It wasn't always like that. In the 1850s, Old Sacramento was the gateway to the rich mother lode gold mines and headquarters of some of the most powerful men in the west.

"The greatest concentration of historical buildings in California is located in Old Sacramento," says V. Aubrey Neasham, former state historian.

The wealth of California funneled through its narrow streets in gold rush days. Those tough tycoons known as the big four—Collis Huntington, Charles Crocker, Leland Stanford and Mark Hopkins—met in a room over a hardware store on K street and planned the first transcontinental railroad.

And in 1860, a tired horseback rider galloped up to the B. F. Hastings building at Second and K streets, completing the first cross-country trip of the pony express.

Until the telegraph lines across the country were finished seven months later, Old Sacramento was the western terminus for the legendary horseback link with the east.

Niagara Power Plant to Open Following Years of Setbacks

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP)—A rainstorm in Minnesota, a spring in a Wisconsin meadow, a rivulet of melting snow in Michigan, nature taps these and a thousand other sources for the crushing torrent she hurls over the brink of Niagara Falls.

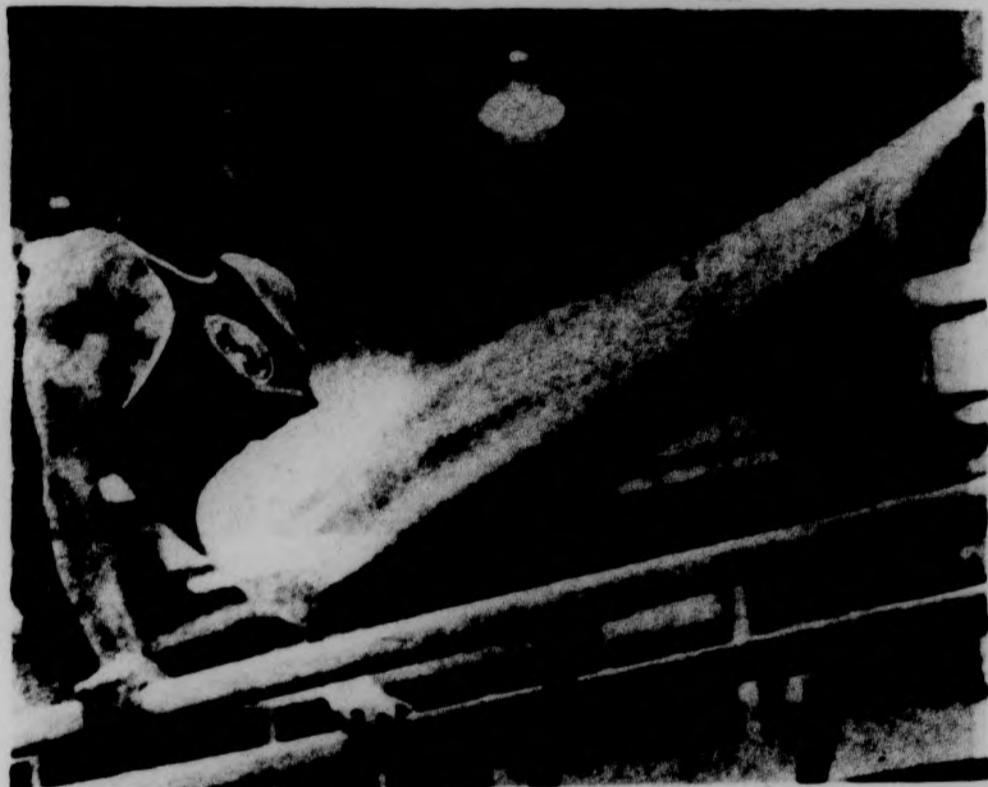
Next week in Spartan sports (Feb. 8-11) will be highlighted by four Michigan State teams engaging in contests with a like number of national colleges.

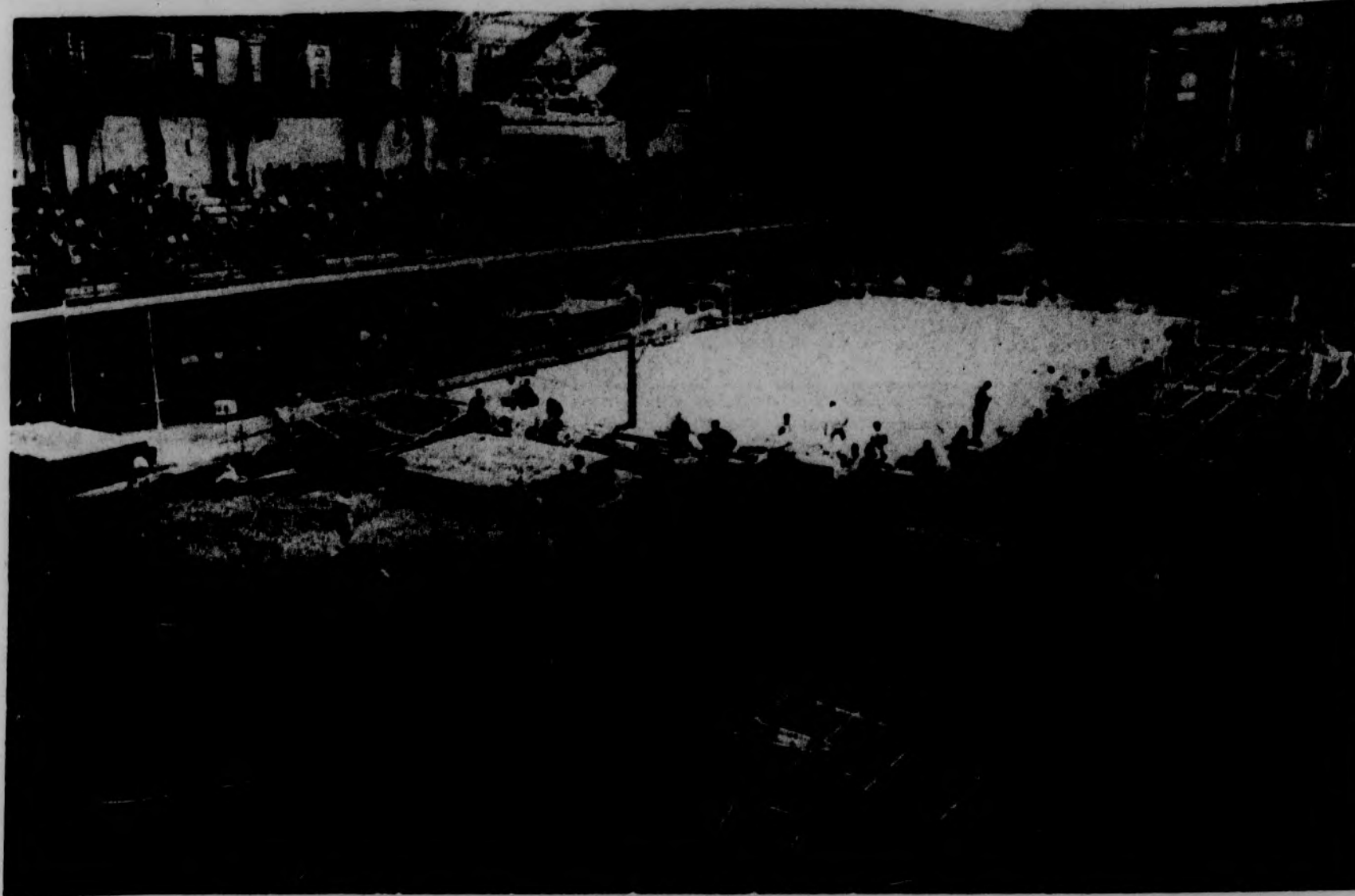

The 38th running of the Michigan State Relays was action packed as 400 athletes representing over 23 colleges and universities competed for honors.

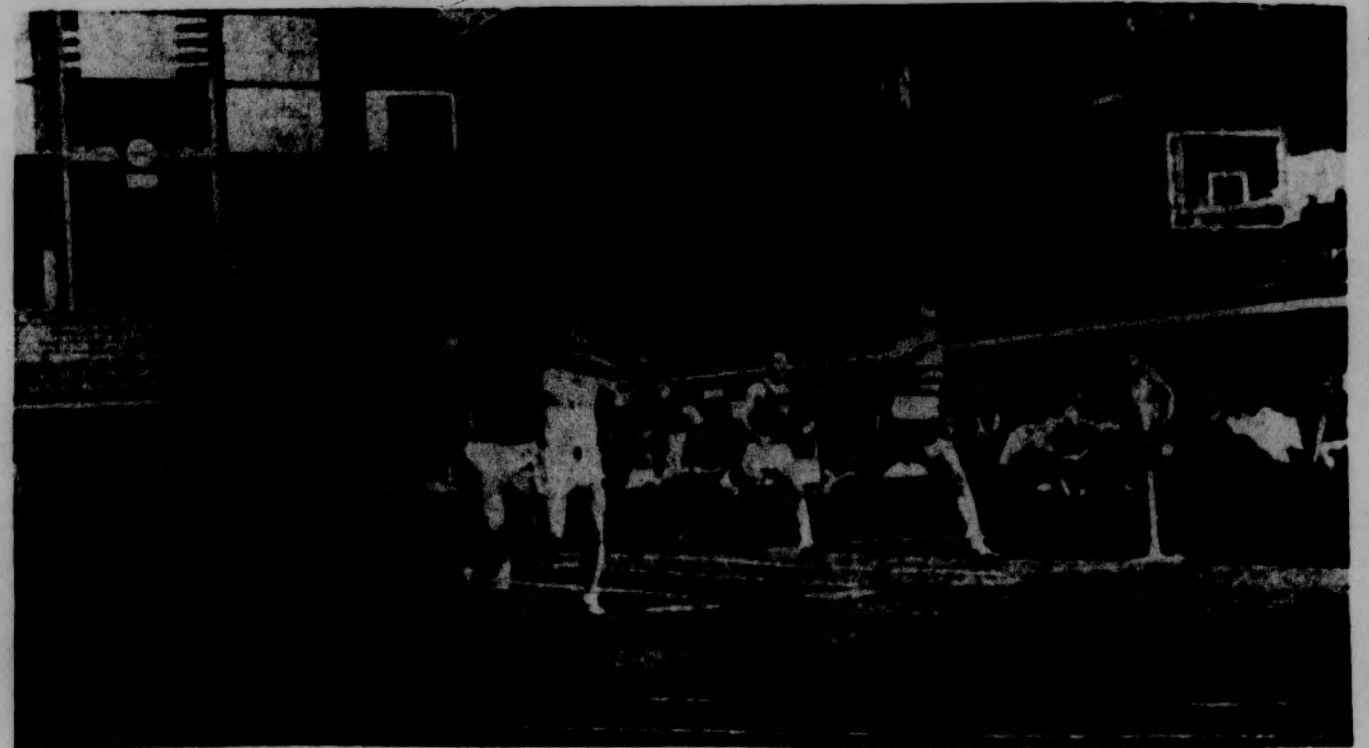
