14 Nation Meeting In Geneva

GENEVA, P-The United States gave way Monday on a procedural tangle in hope of testing the sincerity of Soviet Premier Khrushchev's peaceful pronouncements on Laos. A 14-nation conference on the future of Laos now is scheduled to start here today four days late.

On instructions from President Kennedy, Secretary of State Dean Rusk reluctantly agreed to a new big-power compromise on who would speak for Laos at the meeting after earlier agreements had been rejected by the Laotians themselves.

The representatives of Laos' pro-western government still objected to the compromise, but Britain and the Soviet Union, co-chairmen of the conference, announced it will start this evening anyway.

The announcement said the co-chairmen would seat "representatives from Laos" proposed by other delegates.

Pro-U.S. Group In Charge

SEOUL. Korea (P)--An army revolutionary group headed by the chief of staff seized Korean public buildings before dawn Monday and announced-amid flurries of gunfire—that it had taken over the Korean government. The revolutionaries emphasized in their broadcasts that they are pro-American.

(The revolt apparently came as a surprise to officials in Washington and neither the state department nor the defense department had an comment.)

Informants at the revolutionary committee headquarters said most members of Prime Minister John M. Chang's cabinet had been arrested, but the report lacked immediate confirmation

THE REVOLUTIONARIES led by Lt. Gen. Chang Do-Young took the capital by surprise with the pre-dawn broadcast that they had seized power from Chang, who succeeded Syngman Rhee.

They broadcast reassurances to the people but did not immediately explain what prompted two periods of heavy gunfire during the morning— the first lasting 40 minutes and the second only a few minutes.

The first announcement of the action by the military revolutionary committee came aft er the 40-minute shooting spell in downtown Seoul. After that heavy firing only

That quickly died down and again only an occasional lone shot was heard.

REPORTS SAID only units of the Army and Marine Corps were involved. Several battalions appeared to be involved. The broadcasts of the com-

mittee over Seoul radio furnished the only actual information on the situation. The revolutionary committee established its headquarters in the offices of the Korean ath-

letic association across from

city hall in downtown Seoul. Military units took over most of the major government agencies, including the Presidential palace, National Police headquarters and the Bando hotel.

CHANG and his wife were reported staying in the Bando. The hotel was heavily guarded by troops and no communications with the building were permitted. The U.S. armed forces radio

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Park System Growing Fast In Turkey

The people of modern Turkey share an important pastime— the picnic—with Americans. Outsiders who haven't visited

Turkey often think of it as a quaint land out of a past age. But nothing could be further from the truth, says Zekai Bayer, head of the Turkish National Park service and a park management student in the university's Department of Resource Development.
Today, 25 national recrea-

tional areas and hundreds of local parks provide a chance to get away from bustling cities. Two national parks and a bird paradise open rural beauty to tourists. The national park system has existed only two years.

"Turkey's park growth has paralleled that in America many years ago," said Bayer and Louis Twardzik, MSU park management professor.

"FOR EXAMPLE, Central Park was once outside the ur-ban area of Manhattan Island. The city eventually grew out to it, and the same thing may someday happen in Istanbul."
