## Fall Enrollment Reaches Highest Figure in History

#### But Budget **Cuts Down** Fall Flood

Enrollment this fall will reach a total of 25,044, the highest figure in the university's history, Registrar Kermit Smith announced Thursday at the close of the regular registration period.

This figure is 7 per cent above last year's comparable total of 23,373.

However the East Lansing campus enrollment was only 22,637. This is 77 more than the 22,500 students to which the Board of Trustees directed the enrollment restricted after last years legislative cut in requested appropriations.

More than 24,600 students had been planned for when the request for appropriations was submitted to the state legis-

The budget limitations most heavily affected the number of new students admitted. In keeping with last May's trustee directive, the number of new freshman enrolled totalled 4,-740, only 1 per cent higher than last year's freshman enrollment of 4,690.

As a result of this restriction, many qualified freshmen had

STOCKHOLM &-Dag Hammarskjold, United Nations secretary - general who lost his life in quest of peace, will be buried Friday near his home town.

Hammarskjold's body arrived Thursday at the same airport from which he departed eight years ago to assume the leadership of the United Nations.

With his body came 14 others—those of three Americans, Canadian, an Irishman, a Haitian and eight Swedes. Their lives were snuffed out Sept. 18 as Hammarskjold flew on a mission to try to settle the trouble in Katanga, the secessionist

Hammarskjold's body was taken by hearse to Uppsala where he was once a student. Hundreds lined the highway to pay silent tribute to the leader, although people had been barred from the scene. Some placed flowers before the hearse.

The caskets of the Americans and other foreigners were removed to a hanger to be watched over by a guard of honor until their removal to their home countries.

At Friday's rites President Kennedy will be represented by several in New York this week and made available to Frondi in Berlin, where new evacuations of East Berliners in border areas were reported.

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Syrian army officers revolted today and defied President Nasser's attempts from Cairo to stifle their uprising against his United Arab Republic. The rebellion began in the Syrian capital of Damascus and was reported to have spread tonight to to the key northern city of Aleppo.

Calling themselves the Higher Arab Revolutionary Command of the armed forces, the insurgents claimed in a Damascus broadcast that the north Syrian armed forces including an armored division had joined the rebellion.

Aleppo Radio, loyal to Nasser during the day, suddenly switched at night and said a commando division and a second military training center garrison had joined the insurgents and seized control of

Aleppo.







WOODS HOLE, Mass. (2)—Plans for a fantastic oceanbottom research submarine-like something out of science fiction — were made public recently by officials of the Woods Hole Oceanographic In-

Described as the world's first Described as the world's first aluminum submarine, the 50-foot craft resembling an underwater belicopter will be able to prowl the ocean bottom to a depth of almost three miles. It will have TV cameras and robot "hands" to pick up seabottom sediment along with sonar equipment. Sonar detects underwater objects by sending underwater objects by sending out a stream of inaudible vibrations which are bounced

back to detectors on the ship. Dr. Paul M. Fye, director of the institution, said the craft, to be known as the "Alumin-aut," will be built by the General Dynamics Corp.
