Migyanka To Start Saturday

Grid fans can expect a new look in the Spartans when they take the field 1:30 p.m. Saturday in the home opener with North Carolina.

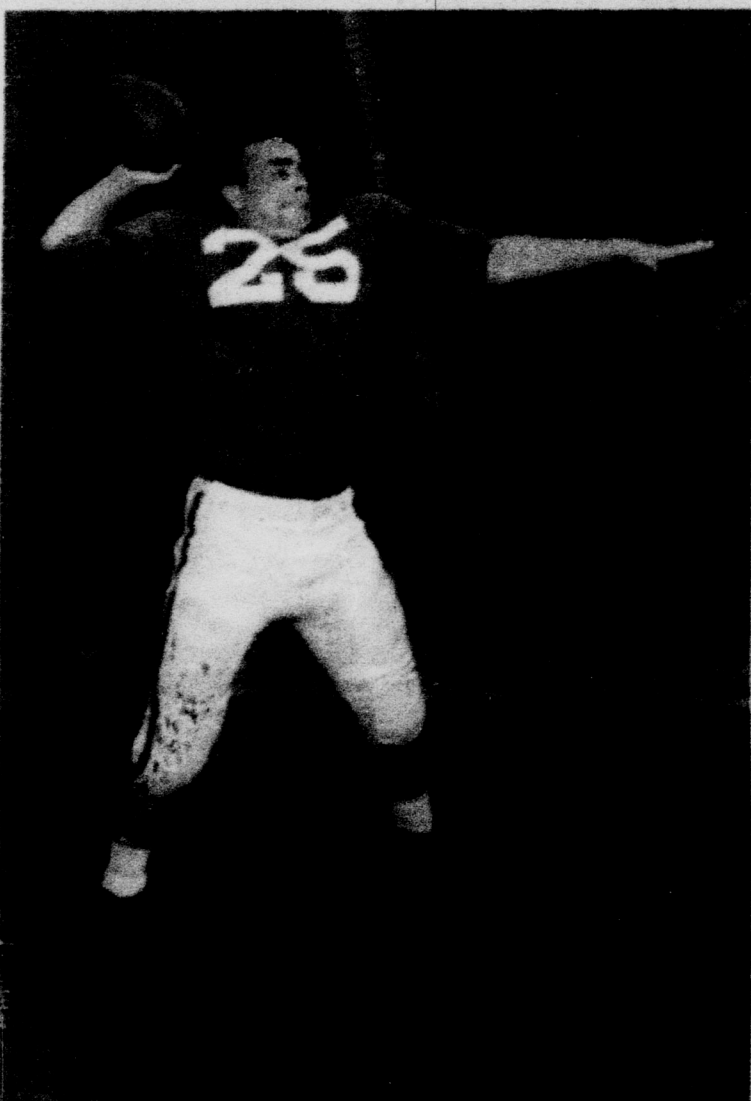
In addition to a major shuffle in the starting lineup there has been indication of new hustle in the Spartan camp.

Duffy Daugherty's forces appear to have buried the sorrows of the Stanford loss with new spirit and desire for the North Carolina game.

Charlie Migyanka, a sophomore from East Conemough, Pa., will be the starter at quarterback. Migyanka made a fast recovery from a side injury suffered earlier in the week. He was hurt in a fall during a track and field class Monday. Apparently spurred by his battle with Pete Smith for the starting role at quarterback, the husky sophomore shook off his injury and was ready for action at Wednesday's practice.

The rest of the starting backfield will remain intact from last week's game. George Saines, usually the workhorse in the Spartan backfield, will be at fullback. Dewey Lincoln, a steady performer in the Stanford game will

North Carolina II Aims for Victory

The Tar Heels of North Carolina, playing the Spartans for the first time in football Saturday, have copied LSU's famous platoon system this year. In addition to this privilege not enjoyed by Duffy Daugherty's team, coach Jim Hickey changed to the wing-T formation on offense.

Forming a nucleus for the new formations is a group of 16 returning lettermen. Center-linebacker Joe Craver, who shares the co-captain duties with halfback Ward Marslander, has been tabbed as an All-America candidate.

The two-way starting team for the Tar Heels in their platoon system is the "Blue or Carolina Blues". The "Rams" are the offensive or "Go" team. The defensive group is called the "Tar Heels." By platooning, more boys are able to play and morale and competition for positions is boosted.

The preseason predictions included prospects for a much speedier team than the Tar Heels have produced in a long time. But against long-time rival North Carolina State and the top team in the nation, Ohio State, their speed was not unleashed.

Probable starters for Saturday's game besides the co-captains Craver and Marslander are: Bob Lacey, left end; Jim Alderman, left tackle; Jack Tillery, left guard; Jerry Cane, right guard; Vic Esposito, right tackle; John Runco, right end; Roger Smith, right half; Ken Willard, fullback, and Junior Edge, quarterback.

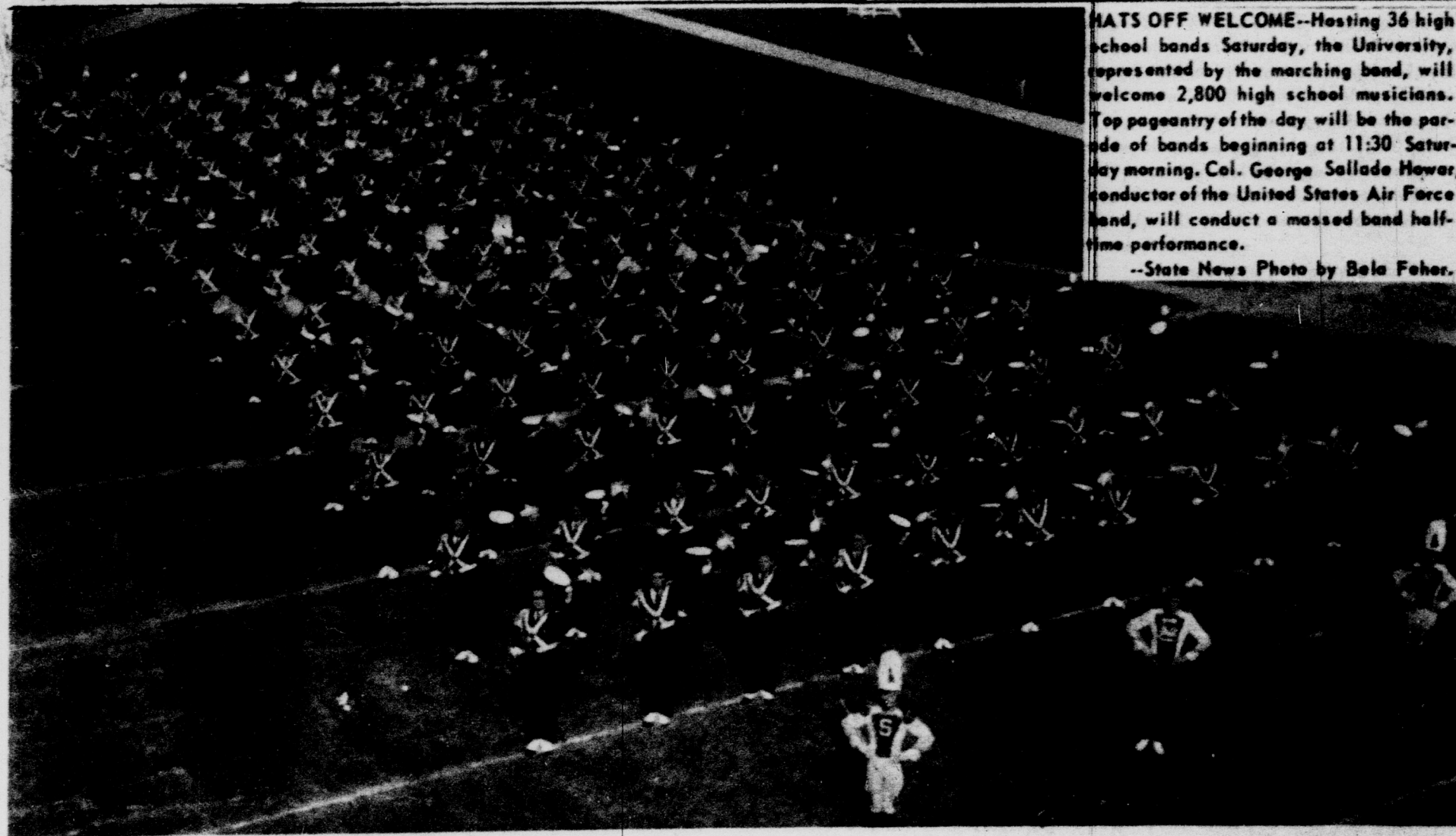
Craver, Morehead Scholar, is a 6'1", 219 lb. senior. In his bid for All-America honors, his coaches believe he could become the best and most rugged line-backer in North Carolina's history.

Hickey Looking for First Winning Year

If anxiety is any criterion for success as a head football coach, James Berson Hickey of the University of North Carolina imposes an omnipotent challenge to every adversary he faces.

Now in his fourth year at the helm of the Tar Heel staff, Hickey is yet to terminate a season to the tunes of a winning record.

His rookie season, 1959, saw North Carolina break even with five victories against five setbacks as the team rallied to a whirlwind finish with decisions

over Duke and Virginia.

The transition into the decade of the sixties was anything but glamorous. The Blue and White exhibited, loose play which accounted for a sub-par 3-7 showing.

In 1961, nary a touchdown in the Duke and Wake Forest clashes prevented better than a .500 campaign.

Therein lies the reason for Hickey's demonstrative zeal.

For Jim, the post of head gridiron mentor came suddenly but sadly with the passing of Jim Tatum. Under Tatum for three seasons, he gained valuable experience. As the pigskin mentor at Hampden-Sidney College from 1951-1955, he compiled an enviable mark of 27 wins, 11 defeats and four ties. During his tenure, Jim's squads garnered two Mason-Dixon Conference titles while he himself was cited

as Virginian "Coach of the Year".

His coaching career began on a high note as he led John Marshall High School of Richmond, Va. to a 27-11-2 record during the 1947-1950 span.

Hickey spearheads a coaching crew composed of eight assistants. George Barclay, titlebearer of the head coach position from 1953-1955, now fulfills the capacity of freshmen mentor. Bud Carson, Emmett Cheek, Joe Mark, Vito Ragazzo, Bob Thalmann and Fred Tullai maintain specialized chores in the assistant roles. Head trainer is John Lacy, his assistant is Warren Morris, and the contingent's talent recruiter is Ernie Williamson.

A decade of service behind him, Charles P. (Chuck) Erickson, Director of Athletics at Carolina, has amassed a myriad of achievements with his administration. He has been the motivating figure in the scheduling of grid games.

Erickson hails from Oak Park, Ill. When enrolled at Carolina, he established himself as a mainstay in the halfback slot on the eleven then coached by Chuck Collins, an old Notre Damer. He also earned letters in track.

Chuck has been associated with the Tar Heels sports scene in many capacities for well over thirty years.

Signal Callers Cheer Coach

MADISON, Wisc., -- Coach Milt Bruhn of Wisconsin was encouraged by the showing of his top two signalcallers, senior Ron VanderKelen and sophomore Harold Brandt.

VanderKelen, whose only previous game experience was 11/2 minutes against Marquette as a sophomore in 1959, completed five of eight passes for 150 yards, including a 9-yard TD pass to Louis Holland. He also picked up 8-yards rushing on two carries.

Brandt completed four passes in as many attempts for 78 yards and two TD's, both to All-American end Pat Richter. Jot down Brandt to Richter as a combination, as three of the sophomore's tosses were to Richter for 58 yards. Brandt had 6 yards rushing, also, in two attempts.

Bruhn wanted to play both quarterbacks more for experience, but didn't, saying, "Every time they were in the game, especially Brandt, it seemed like we were going all the way."

Detroiters Rank High in NFL

NEW YORK, (UPI) -- Milt Plum and Yale Lary of the Detroit Lions continued to lead the National Football League in passing and punting, according to official NFL statistics.

Plum's passing average slipped considerably, but his average of 64.6 per cent completions kept him ahead of little Eddie LeBaron of the Dallas Cowboys with a 62.8 percentage. Plum has thrown for nine touchdowns to lead the league in that category. His average of 9.35 yards per pass was third best as was his total of 783 yards gained. He was second in completions with 53.

Lary continued to lead all league punters with an average of exactly 50 yards on nine kicks.

Other Detroit players among the statistical leaders included Nick Pietrosante, seventh in rushing with 178 yards gained in 45 plays for a four yard average. Terry Barr was fourth in pass receiving with 17 receptions for 338 yards and three touchdowns and Pat Studstill was fourth in punt returns with six returns for 79 yards.

Studstill was third in kickoff returns with seven for 231 yards. Wayne Walker was fifth in scoring with 27 points on four field goals and 15 extra points.

Florida A & M Tops

NEW YORK (UPI) -- Florida A & M tops the United Press International small college football ratings.

In the first week of balloting by the UPI board of coaches, Florida A & M piled up 126

points. Southern Mississippi is second, followed by Fresno State.

Delaware and Pittsburgh of Kansas are tied for fourth, followed by Southern Illinois, Southeast Louisiana and Lenoir-Rhyne.

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

Dorow Put on Waivers

HOUSTON (AP) -- Al Dorow, former Michigan State quarterback, was placed on waivers by the Buffalo Bills of the American Football League this week, as they underwent a shakeup.

The big shakeup is an effort by the Bills to break their current four game losing streak.

Also put on waivers were defensive back Joe Cannavino and rookie offensive back Carey Hendley. Linebacker Ralph Pelton announced his retirement to become a scout, and defensive end Lavern Torczon was traded to New York for a draft choice.

Placed on the active list were Nate Borden, a defensive end recently cut by the Dallas Cowboys, rookie quarterback Mack Wheeler; offensive end Monte Crockett; and Ray Abbruzzese, Dorow, who was the American Football League's fourth leading passer last season, was obtained by Buffalo in a winter trade that sent John Green, a quarterback, and Bill Atkins, a defensive back, to New York.

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IOWA CITY, Ia. -- Southern California never before has sent a football team to the University of Iowa's stadium but the unbeaten Trojans are coming Saturday to test the Hawkeye team which overran Oregon State in the opener.

USC has a 2-0 record: a 14-7 upset win over Duke and a crushing 33-3 victory over Southern Methodist at Dallas last Saturday night.

And if the schedule makers who booked the game about five years ago had been gifted with perfect foresight, they could not have picked a better non-conference opponent for the developing Hawkeyes.

After USC, Iowa has six straight Big Ten games and two straight on the road, Indiana and Wisconsin. It's obvious that the Hawkeyes must be ready and that USC will be just the team to boost them along.

Cross country coach Fran Dittrich named his team for the harriers' opening meet Saturday at Athens, Ohio, Wednesday. Opposition for the Spartans will be provided by Ohio State and Ohio University.

The squad was picked on the basis of performance in time trials over a four mile course at Old College Field.

Runners making the trip are Don Castle, Roger Humbarger, Orlin Larson, Ron Berby, Jan Bowen, Mike Kaines, Bob Pulcher and Bill Stewart.

"I would say they did pretty well," was Dittrich's comment on the time trials. He described the times turned in by his men as "very satisfactory."

Only 45 seconds separated the eight runners tabbed by the

coaching staff. Orlin Larson turned in the best time among varsity runners with a 20:58.

Ironically the runner with the fastest time can't make the trip to Athens. Freshman Dick Sharkey won't be able to compete for the varsity until next year.

Sharkey was a full minute better than the best of the varsity as he turned in a time of 19:57. Dittrich predicts great things for this runner who once clocked a high school mile of 4:13 at Detroit Redford.

As if weaving in and out of assorted freshmen footballers, baseball players and coeds playing field hockey wasn't enough handicap, sophomore Jan Bowen earned a place in Saturday's meet despite a sprained ankle suffered in the first half mile. Bowen's injury isn't serious, and he should be in good condition for the Ohio race.

"We should be able to win," said Coach Dittrich of his team's prospects Saturday.

Last year MSU triumphed in this race with a score of 35 to Ohio's 37 and Ohio State's 47.

wingback, is a two-letterman with all-round athletic ability. With the talent to make the big play, Marslander rates a possibility for All-Star honors.

End Bob Lacey a 6'3", 210-lb. junior, is considered by the Tar Heel coaching staff as one of the most talented players they have had in years. He doubles as field goal kicker when needed.

At other end for the Tar Heels will be two-year letterman Runcie. Runcie, bothered by injuries last year, is a 5'11", 199-lb. senior.

North Carolina's tackles, juniors Alderman and Esposito, are two of the biggest men on the team. Alderman is 5'11" and weighs 218-lbs. Esposito, billed as the best tackle, is 6'1" and weighs 215-lbs.

Junior Cabe and senior Tillery are the starting guards though neither tips the scales at 200-lbs. Cabe is 5'10" weighing 195-lbs. Tillery, only 187-lbs., has earned two letters on speed, desire and aggressiveness.

Smith, slated to be at the other halfback position, is a 5'10", 191-lb. junior. Like his teammate, Craver, is also a Morehead Scholar.

Willard, a big and speedy fullback, paced North Carolina's meager running attack against Ohio State. In ten tries he picked up 43 yards.

Edge will probably get the nod at quarterback over Gary Black. Sophomore Black, is only 15, and is billed as a triple-threat.

ANN ARBOR. -- Seeking to gain its first victory of the season, Michigan will tackle unbeaten Army in the Michigan Stadium Saturday in the ninth meeting between the two teams before an estimated crowd of 62,000.

Army holds a 5-3 edge over the Wolverines in series play which began in 1945. The Black Knights won the first five and lost the last three games to the Wolverines. This included last year's tilt here when coach Bump Elliott's charges scored a 38-8 victory.

The Black Knights, under a new coach, Paul Dietzel, downed Wake Forest, 40-14, and Syracuse 9-2, in its first two starts. Dietzel came to the Academy this year after seven years as head coach at Louisiana State where his platoon system was highly successful. He is using the same system at West Point with the "Regulars", "Bandits" and "Go" teams.

Wolverine scout reports show that the Black Knights are a spirited, hard-hitting team, particularly rugged defensively, soundly drilled in fundamentals. Michigan, shocked by a 25-13 loss to Nebraska last week, will be seeking to redoubt its fortunes with a determined bid against Army.

Coach Elliott, while taking nothing from the soundly drilled and hard hitting Cornhuskers, felt that first game mistakes contributed largely to the Wolverines downfall.

He has instituted a number of

line-up changes to strengthen the Wolverine picture. Left tackle John Bowman, after playing one of the better games in the line, has been lost indefinitely with a knee injury. Tom Keating, Chicago junior, has been moved to offensive tackle.

In other changes Dave Kurtz, letterman junior from Toledo, has been moved to the first string right guard while John Marcum, sophomore, has been shifted to the defensive unit. Bill Laskey, sophomore from Milan, has moved to right end with Ron Kocan coming up to the second team. Jim Ward, converted right half who started at right end, will work with the third group.

Jack Strobel has been sent to the first offensive unit at left

half to replace Harvey Chapman. At right half, Dave Rainey and Dick Rindfuss remain one-two.

Wayne Sparkman, Plymouth junior, who moved from fifth string to second string fullback last week, will start at fullback with Bill Dodd on the second outfit. Mel Anthony, regarded as top sophomore fullback, still will be sidelined with an ankle injury.

Elliott and his staff have been hard at work preparing for Army and seeking to bolster weak spots that cropped up in the opener against Nebraska. They have warned the squad that Army will bring a well-drilled spirited outfit to Ann Arbor, and that the Wolverines will have to be vastly improved to meet the attack they will face.

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This year's duck season has been cut to 25 days--shortest in the state's history. About 65,000 hunted during last year's 30-day season. Several years ago, nearly 150,000 hunters would take to the field each year during a 70-day water fowl season.

Dr. Miles D. Pirnie, MSU wildlife specialist who recently visited Dakota and Manitoba marshes, reports few ducks there and much local concern about the future.

Michigan's hunting season for rabbits, squirrels and grouse starts on October 1 north of M-20. Duck and geese hunting opens on October 12. Pheasant and rabbit hunters in southern counties will go to it on October 20.

It was like sitting in a funeral parlor. But it was a football writers' meeting with coaches of Michigan football teams. The gloom was thick.

A reporter mentioned that all Michigan college teams which played out-of-state teams last Saturday lost their games except Hillsdale. The Hillsdale representative was smiling. The others weren't.

Bump Elliott, the Michigan coach who was bumped by Nebraska, wasn't smiling. He conceded, "Nebraska was a good ball club. Our greenness showed."

Bump's frown deepened. He began talking about the game with Army his team has Saturday.

"They look like a ball club on fire. They have 33 men who fly at ya. They burned Syracuse and Wake Forest."

Bump Elliott looked a man who would soon sit in a hot seat, generated by the Army fire.

Sitting next to Elliott was his boss, Fritz Crisler. He is used to smiling. He wasn't. He is used to winning teams. Michigan isn't winning.

A reporter asked the Michigan coach about his four quarter-backs.

"Is any one better than the other? Who is the better thrower?"

Elliott ignored the question, except for "Can't say they were great, nor poor. I don't have a take-charge guy."

That Michigan State fella who is always smiling--Duffy Daugherty--sounded like smiling--at times--as he reported to the sports writers via tape recording. He smiled when he talked of the second string.

"It played three times better than the first. The second was very spirited."

Michigan State wasn't supposed to have any depth.

When asked by moderator Fred Stabley if the Michigan State defeat by Stanford taught the Spartans a lesson, Duffy cracked:

"I would rather learn another way."

The reporters laughed. Fritz didn't. Duffy keeps 'em rolling in the aisles.

The gloom was lifting. It was pushed a little higher when Bob Quincy, North Carolina's publicity expert, told about his team's woes.

"It's good to get north and away from Federal troops," he said.

"After being slapped down by Ohio State (last Saturday), we know how Patterson must have felt when hit by Liston."

"Kicking killed us in our first loss (of two) so we worked on it all week long. Ohio State didn't kick all day. Guess that doesn't say much for our defense."

Bob Quincy is a nice guy. Hope his North Carolina team is just as obliging Saturday as he is.

The black cloud dropped again. It was the University of Detroit's turn. They have been battered twice. They expect to be run into the ground this weekend, too, by New Mexico State.

Detroit has a great passer. Perhaps the nation's best. But Gerry Gross of Bay City doesn't have anyone to throw to. He doesn't have any blockers. He doesn't have anyone to hand the ball to.

Despite this, Detroit tallied 20 points last week to Xavier's 24. Gross gained 225 yards in tossing two touchdown passes and running for the other. He booted the two extra points.

Next was Hillsdale. If Duffy Daugherty would have been there in person he would have been frowning. The PR man told of the lineman destined to become Hillsdale's greatest.

That lineman is Howard Mudd, who was a Spartan lineman once. He got hurt and dropped down among the lower strings, so low the coaches couldn't see him any more. Mudd departed and visited Hillsdale's camp.

Following an early season injury, Mudd is ready to go again for Hillsdale.

And Duffy could use another lineman after last week's loss and the season's injuries to linemen.

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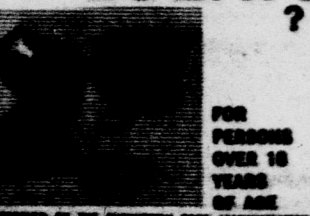

Paul Flatley Now Ace NW Pass Receiver

EVANSTON, Ill. -- Northwestern's Paul Flatley--a journeyman halfback-fullback the past two years--suddenly has emerged as one of the outstanding pass receivers in the Big Ten.

In the first game of the 1962 season, Paul caught eight passes--two more than he caught during the entire 1961 season, when he ranked as the Wildcats' No. 4 receiver.

Three of Paul's catches in the 37 to 20 opening victory over South Carolina were of the spectacular variety--a touchdown grab between two defenders at the goal line, a diving catch of a deflected pass and a shoestring catch.

Flatley's value as a receiver was minimized his first two seasons when he was pressed into heavy service as a ball carrier because of injuries to other Wildcat running backs. One of the most versatile backs on the squad, he filled in both at halfback and fullback. As a high school star in Richmond, Ind., he played quarterback.

The decision of Coach Ara Parseghian to build the Wildcat offense this season around a more wide open passing attack was based in great measure on his confidence that Flatley would provide him with a first-rate receiver. His first move in spring practice was to shift Paul to the flanker back position, where he is used almost exclusively as a receiver. A 187-pounder, Paul is 6-1.

"Flatley may not have the height of some of the other top receivers in the Big Ten," said Parseghian. "But he makes up for it with his tremendous spring. He also has fine hands and that receiving sixth sense that sets him apart from the ordinary pass catcher."

Herb Paterra, a rugged 200-pound junior from Glassport, Pa., appears determined to stick with his recent upsurge as a first team guard and should start. Steve Mellinger, a 200-pound junior from South Bend, will be at the other guard.

Jim Kanicki, who moved ahead of All-America Dave Behrman at the beginning of the week, will be starting center.

Although Behrman, Charlie Brown, and George Azar were dropped to the third team this week, they are expected to see some action Saturday.

The clash with North Carolina will probably answer many questions in the minds of fans. Uppermost among these questions; can the Spartans bounce back?

Purdue After First Victory

LAFAYETTE, Ind. -- Purdue, which netted a 7-7 tie in a hard hitting opening battle with Washington at Seattle, will tackle an even tougher assignment as they continue on the road against impressive Notre Dame at South Bend before a sellout crowd Saturday.

The 34th renewal of the intrastate rivalry with the Irish, who displayed both offensive versatility and defensive strength with their 13-7 win over Oklahoma Saturday, will provide another acid test for a Boilermaker combination that lacks experienced depth as far as the interior line is concerned particularly at guard and right tackle.

Purdue's injury problem appeared to be somewhat eased on Monday as quarterback Ron DiGravio and co-captain and end Forest Farmer, who were unable to drill all last week because of

bumps and bruises accumulated against the Huskies, returned to uniform.

Coach Jack Mollenkopf is hopeful that both DiGravio and Farmer will be ready for action against the Irish. If the two veterans are available, Mollenkopf has indicated that he will stick to fundamentally the same units that were used against Washington, although there may be some shifts at halfback.

Devising a defense capable of slowing down the Notre Dame attack as well as gearing up their own offense provides the big problem for the Boilermakers in preparing for the providing ground encounter of the keen Hoosier rivals.

"Notre Dame has a vastly better all-around squad than last year," reported assistant coach Bob DeMoss.

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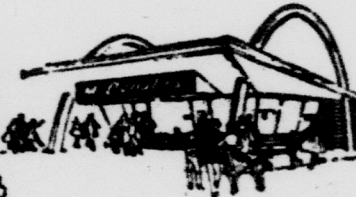
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
