



Manpower Act Not Cure-All Infant Unemployment Plan May Serve As State Model

Language The along the Training Act will not solv problems of unemployment, Gov. John B. Swainson said Saturday at the Governor's Conference on Manpower and Training in Michigan at Kellogg Center.

The program is a major step forward indealing with unemployment throughout the country, and especially in Michigan, but there is still much to be done, Swainson said.

"Each of the trainees is a pioneer in a modern bechnological society," Swainson said. "W e must keep abreast of the times and do those things necessary to keep Michigan a happy state in which to live and to work."

Governor-elect George Romney, who had also been invited to speak at the conference sent a telegram decliningdue to a previous committment.

Retraining Program Leads Nation

The conference pointed out that since Michigan led the nation in instituting the program of retraining the unemployed for work in other capacities, it is being watched closely by the rest of the cou try, and may serve as a model for other state programs.

The first training class was started in the state Sept. 12, after appropriating Federal funds through the Manpower Davelopment Training Act which President Kennedy signed into law in March of this year.

Charles C. Killingsworth, professor of labor and industrial relations, and chairman of the State Manpower Development Committee which co-sponsored the conference gave a progress report on his committee's work on the training program.



Of Poll **Correct Source**

Of The State News Staff A U.S. foreign policy student opinion survey conducted at MSU and 11 other American colleges and universities last spring was not done under the auspices of the National Student Association as was reported Friday.

Harij Markevics, East Lansing senior, who supervised the poll here, said Sunday that the sampling was done at the request of the Student Foreign Policy Poll Committee (SFPPC), an organization supported by a number of foreign student groups with headquarters at Yale University. Although there was no affiliation with NSA during the actual taking of the poll, Markevics said, NSA since has indicated its approval of the sampling technique used and has subscribed to the relative accuracy of the poll.

The confusion over whose auspices the poll was conducted Bellringer-Concert under apparently resulted from a cover letter which NSA agreed send to the press to help to document the poil's authenticity,

were sent out May 24 to 200 undergraduate students, or one percent of the undergraduate enrollment. The sampling method used was to draw the first student's name

at random for the student directory after which every 100th student was selected.

Nationwide, more than 50 percent of those polled answered the questionnaire. The percentage at MSU was markedly lower. Only 60 students, or 30 percent of the number included in the sample, responded.

Markevics emphasized that the results of the poll at MSU were not necessarily indicative of student feeling since only a small (Continued on page 3)

"Upemployment has many problems. No single piece of legislation is going to meet all the aspects of the problem.

The META is "a highly significant, very importantnew approach to the problem of unemployment," Killingsworth added, if we worseld this program, we're going to have disillustonment."

Job Orientation Draws Completats

Killingsworth said there have already been complaints on the brogram because it is job-oriented, not case-oriented. This means that instead of finding areas of work for the individual with limitslong in certain fields, the program finds jobs available, then inds unemployed persons with qualifications to fill them.

"There are certain areas in the state that will probably not cenefit very much from the program," Killingsworth said. "This is due to the mahility of some areas to find places for more emphoyment.

Possible applications of the program in the future may include some training in reading and writing for the illiterate and other programs not directly connected with actual training for employ-

Limited Funds Reduce Application

Nowever, Killingsworth sald that with limited funds supplied by the finderal government for the program, such pilot programs Monday, 21 Union. muse be haid down.

"It is important to keep this program in perspective. METTA can nake a very important contribution to the problem of unemployment, but it's a mistake to think of it as a cure-all," Killingsworth concluded.
