Remember That Day-- Dec. 7, 1941?

of the Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941. To commemorate the day, Hugh McDonald, junior majoring in journalism from Jackson, Mich., has written the following article:

7 December, 1941. Time 7:59 a.m. Sunday morning. Yeoman Third Class William Summers and Seaman John Connolly chattered amiably as they strolled down the gangplank of the battleship "Wisconsin," on their way to Mass.

At that precise moment, the first wave of Japanese dive bombers and fighter planes suddenly thundered out of the sky in what was to become one of the darkest days in American history.

To be sure, most of the present student body were to become the now famous war babies of World War II.

However, many Americans vividly recall that fateful Sunday morning as a date "which will live in infamy"--the disastrous attack on Pearl Harbor.

"It shocked the country to its very foundation," recalls Thomas R. Knipp, MSU English instructor, who, with his father and uncle, was listening to the Chicago Bears-Cards football game in Chicago on that quiet Sunday.

"Sam Goldberg was winning the game for the Bears," he recalls, "when suddenly the program was interrupted with the startling news that Pearl Harbor was attacked and the President presumably was at that moment preparing a declaration of war."

EMIL E. McCRAY, Journalism instructor at MSU, who ran a weekly newspaper in New Concord, Ohio, at the time, recalls that he was doing in his living room chair when the shocking news came over the radio.

"That gray Sunday afternoon, I'm sure, found many Americans in a meditative mood," he said.

Nearly 2,400 Americans lost their lives and almost 1,000 others were wounded in the surprise attack.

Aspects Of Indian Chinese Dispute

We Indians are very easily excited. This exactly seems to be the case in the present India-China border dispute. We also have a lot of patience. We have tolerated the Chinese incursions into what we regard as our territory for more than five years.

Setting all the noise one thing is clear. That is even if we succeeded in driving the Chinese out, we would have gained nothing.

Now the situation as it exists today is that the Chinese have declared a cease fire and offered to withdraw to the positions held as of Nov. 7, 1959. Nehru in effect has rejected this proposal. He is firm in his demand that first the Chinese withdraw from all disputed territory before any negotiations can be held.

I regard this as an unrealistic view. What would there be to negotiate if the Chinese were to withdraw from all the territory claimed by India?

I believe that there are always two sides to every question. We should try and understand the Chinese point of view if we are to live in peace. Everyone knows that in the next war nobody would be a winner.

It is true that the Chinese do not recognize the McMahon line.

McMahon line was drawn by the British Government for strategic reasons. Mr. L. C.

The Japanese forces sank or damaged 18 American ships, including aircraft carriers, knocked out nearly 200 of our planes--with relatively few of our vessels escaping unscathed.

Ironically, the disaster of Pearl Harbor probably did more to unite a badly divided America than any other single event in our history.

Such prominent Americans as Charles A. Lindbergh were strongly supporting a completely isolationist policy in tours throughout the country while other famous Americans such as William Allen White advocated an interventionist policy.

But Pearl Harbor united the people.

Actually, the Japanese were not entirely successful in their mission, as they quite probably could have easily destroyed the entire dive bombers and torpedo planes, as originally planned.


There exists among Americans (and particularly college students) a popular belief that the Japanese just as easily could have attacked the West Coast of the United States.

Actually, Pearl Harbor itself was a tremendous distance (3,300 miles) in which to move such a huge task force, and quite obviously our West Coast was simply out of reach.

The Japanese main objectives, obviously, were to render our fleet ineffective at Pearl Harbor to insure the safety of the Emperors forces in their battle in Southeast Asia.

In reality, the destruction of our battleships was not as devastating a blow to our Pacific Fleet as had first been imagined. As the war progressed, carriers were to become our most effective striking force, thus making the difficult-to-maneuver battleships fairly obsolete.

At any rate, we, as students on this December 7, 21 years later, attending classes and planning for weekends, might do well to remember the many fathers, husbands, and brothers who lost their lives that fateful Sunday.

Chief Lutuli, who won the Nobel Peace prize for his insistence on non-violent means to achieve human rights for his people, has started an Appeal for Action against Apartheid. This appeal asks all of us not to buy South African products, and to ask dealers who know who carry them, not to do so. This appeal urges the United States government to take action, including economic sanctions, thus helping to end the U.S. Congress assembly on November 6th asking all members to impose economic and diplomatic sanctions against South Africa.

If we do not act strongly, violent action in South Africa is inevitable, and we will see conflict that will make the "Ole Miss" episode in our country look like child's play. Nored people on the spot such as African Chief Lutuli, novelist Alan Paton, believe that pressure from abroad can bring about changes. Resistance continues strong within the country. The courage and determination of these forces must be supported by others if they are to be effective.

South Africa is a trading nation. Her gold, diamonds, wool, fruits, fish, are sent overseas. Her diplomats are received everywhere. Let us recognize that each of us, of whatever race, or nation, makes apartheid possible as long as we fail to take action against it.



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
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
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
